It is The Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at the Levee shall be considered as equivalent to Presentations to Her Majesty.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

THIS day at Windsor Castle, in the presence of the Lord President of the Council, the oaths of office were taken by His Grace the Duke of Richmond and Gordon as President of the Board of Trade; by the Earl of Mount Edgumbe as Lord Steward; by the Earl of Lathom as Lord Chamberlain, and by the Earl of Bradford as Master of the Horse.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the forty-fifth and forty-sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, entitled "The Militia Act, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two," it is amongst other things enacted that, save as therein otherwise provided, the Militia shall be trained and exercised for not less than twenty-one days and not more than twenty-eight days in every year, at such times and at such places in every part of the United Kingdom, as Her Majesty may appoint, and also that Her Majesty may, from time to time, with the advice of Her Privy Council, order that the period of training and exercise, in any year, of all or any part of the Militia be extended, but so that the whole period of training and exercise be not more than fifty-six days.

And whereas it is expedient that the training of the 2nd Brigade, Scottish Division, Royal Artillery (formerly the Haddington, Berwick, Linlithgow and Peebles Artillery Militia) and the 2nd Brigade, Welsh Division, Royal Artillery (formerly the Royal Glamorgan Artillery Militia), and also of the Royal Anglesey Engineer Militia, the Southern Submarine Mining Militia, and the Royal Monmouthshire Engineer Militia, should be extended beyond the period of twenty-eight days for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the period of training and exercise of the before-specified Regiments and Brigades of Militia shall, for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, be extended, under the provisions of the before-cited Act, from twenty-eight days to the number of days in each case hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

2nd Brigade, Scottish Division, Royal Artillery, thirty-four (34) days.

2nd Brigade, Welsh Division, Royal Artillery, thirty-four (34) days.

Royal Anglesey Engineer Militia forty-two (42) days.

Southern Submarine Mining Militia fifty-six (56) days.

Royal Monmouthshire Engineer Militia forty-two (42) days.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, and dated the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, Her Majesty, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, was pleased to direct that, on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred

and eighty-five the Regulations contained in the Schedule to an Order in Council made as aforesaid and dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, should, as regards British fishing vessels and boats, when in the sea off the coast of Europe lying North of Cape Finisterre, be modified and added to inter alia, as follows, viz.:—

As regards sailing vessels engaged in trawling, such vessels, if of twenty tons net register tonnage or upwards, and having their trawls in the water, and not being stationary in consequence of their gear getting fast to a rock or other obstruction, shall between sunset and sunrise either carry and show the lights required by Article 6 of the Regulations aforesaid, or shall carry and show in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor, but not in addition thereto, other lights of the description set forth in Part II of the Schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

And whereas the Admiralty and the Board of Trade have, in pursuance of the said recited Act, jointly recommended to Her Majesty that the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, shall, as regards sailing vessels when engaged in trawling, be further modified and added to in manner following that is to say:

As regards sailing vessels engaged in trawling, such vessels having their trawls in the water and not being stationary in consequence of their gear getting fast to a rock or other obstruction, if they do not carry and show the lights required by Article 6 of the Regulations aforesaid, or the other lights of the description set forth in Part II of the Schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, shall carry and show in lieu of the lights required by Article 6 of the Regulations aforesaid, or the other lights of the description set forth in paragraph 2 of the Schedule to the said recited Order, other lights as follows, that is to say:

A white light in a globular lantern of not less than eight inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light all round the horizon, and visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere for a distance of at least two miles, and also a sufficient supply of red pyrotechnic lights, which shall each burn for at least thirty seconds, and shall, when so burning, be visible for the same distance under the same conditions as the white light. The white light shall be shown from sunset to sunrise, and one of the red pyrotechnic lights shall be shown on approaching, or on being approached by another ship or vessel in sufficient time to prevent collision.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, on and after the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, shall, as regards British sailing fishing vessels and boats, when in the sea off the coast of Europe lying north of Cape Finisterre, be further modified and added to accordingly, that is to say, such sailing vessels shall, whatever be their tonnage, be at liberty to carry the substituted lights hereinbefore described in lieu of, and in substitution for, but not in addition to, the lights prescribed to be carried by such sailing

vessels by the Orders in Council dated respectively the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the fifth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, made in pursuance of Section thirty-two of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," Her Majesty, on the application of the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board, being the Harbour Trust or body corporate owning or exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of the River Mersey, was pleased to make certain rules, set forth in the schedule thereto, concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, by vessels navigating the River Mersey.

And whereas the said Mersey Docks and Harbour Board have applied to Her Majesty in Council to make, and have submitted for approval, certain new rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, by vessels navigating the River Mersey, to be substituted for and in lieu of the rules set forth in the schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the fifth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one; and in such new rules there are embodied, subject to certain exceptions and additions therein mentioned, the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea," sanctioned by an Order in Council dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, made in pursuance of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and set forth in the schedule to the said last-mentioned Order in Council.

And whereas the new rules so submitted as aforesaid appear to be reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in Her vested by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby make the said new rules which are set forth in the Schedule hereto, and Her Majesty doth hereby direct that the same shall come into operation on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and shall be substituted for and in lieu of the rules set forth in the schedule to the said recited Order in Council of the fifth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and that on and after the said first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, the said last mentioned rules shall be, and the same are hereby rescinded.

SCHEDULE.

RULES concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding Collision to be taken, by Vessels navigating the River Mersey.

1. Every vessel exceeding ten tons measurement, including river craft, while navigating, or anchored, or moored in any part of the River Mersey, shall, on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, observe and obey the "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea," as set out in the schedule annexed to the Order in Council made

in pursuance of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," and dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, with the exceptions and additions mentioned in the following rules.

2. Canal flats and all other vessels without masts, whilst being towed shall carry the lights prescribed for sailing vessels by Article 6 of the said "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea."

3. In addition to the lights for a steam vessel towing another vessel prescribed by Article 4 of the said Regulations, such steam vessel shall carry a bright white light showing astern as a guiding light to the vessel or vessels being towed.

4. Instead of the light prescribed by Article 8 of the said Regulations, every vessel when at anchor in the River Mersey shall carry two white lights in globular lanterns of not less than eight inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light visible all round the horizon for at least one mile, one of which lights shall be placed at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull on the fore-stay, or otherwise near the bow where it may best be seen, and the other at the main or mizen peak, or on the boom topping lift, or other position near the stern, at double the height of the bow light before mentioned.

5. Instead of the light prescribed by Article 11 of the said Regulations, a bright white light similar to the lights mentioned in Rule 4, shall be shown continuously from the stern rail of every vessel while under way and in motion in all weathers between sunset and sunrise.

6. A vessel anchored to mark the position of a wreck or other obstruction, shall carry, in all weathers from sunset to sunrise, two bright white lights similar to those mentioned in Rule 4, which lights shall be placed horizontally on a cross-yard on the foremast, at a height not exceeding twenty feet above the hull and twenty feet apart, and the said vessel shall carry, in all weathers, between sunrise and sunset, two black balls placed as hereinbefore ordered with regard to the lights aforementioned.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Theddlethorpe Saint Helen with Mablethorpe Saint Peter, in the county of Lincoln and in the diocese of Lincoln between that benefice and a certain other benefice, namely, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Spilsby cum Eresby, which said last-named

benefice is also situate in the said county of Lincoln and in the said diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas the Right Honourable Clementina Elizabeth Heathcote Drummond - Willoughby Baroness Willoughby de Eresby is the patron of the said benefice of Theddlethorpe Saint Helen with Mablethorpe Saint Peter, and also of the said benefice of Spilsby cum Eresby.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Spilsby cum Eresby is at present insufficiently endowed; and that the said benefice of Theddlethorpe Saint Helen with Mablethorpe Saint Peter has endowments of such an amount as that after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments the said benefice of Theddlethorpe Saint Helen with Mablethorpe Saint Peter will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edward, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, is of opinion, and we are of opinion, that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the parish of Spilsby with Eresby by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Theddlethorpe Saint Helen with Mablethorpe Saint Peter, which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Theddlethorpe Saint Helen with Mablethorpe Saint Peter is now vacant.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln acting as such Bishop (in testimony whereof he the said Bishop hath signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Clementina Elizabeth Heathcote Drummond - Willoughby Baroness Willoughby de Eresby in testimony whereof she hath signed and sealed this scheme we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and as from the day of the date at which the said Order shall be so gazetted all the tithe rent-charges glebe lands and all (if any) other the endowments which shall at that date or which may thereafter belong to the said benefice of Theddlethorpe Saint Helen with Mablethorpe Saint Peter shall be charged and for ever thereafter chargeable in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Spilsby cum Eresby, with the annual sum or yearly charge hereinafter mentioned that is to say a clear annual sum or yearly charge of two hundred pounds, the same annual sum or yearly charge of two hundred pounds to be as from the day aforesaid due and payable to the incumbent of the said benefice of Spilsby cum Eresby, and the same annual sum or yearly charge to be apportionable between any outgoing incumbent of the benefice of Spilsby cum Eresby or his representatives on the one hand and his successors in the said incumbency on the other hand, and to be receivable by the incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year.

"And we further recommend and propose that the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Spilsby cum Eresby shall have the following powers for recovering the said rent-charge of two hundred pounds per annum hereby proposed to be created in favour of the benefice of which he is incumbent as aforesaid (that is to say) power if and whenever any part of the said rent-charge shall at any time be unpaid for twenty-one

days after any of the times appointed for the payment thereof (although there shall not have been any legal demand made thereof) to enter into the receipt of the endowments charged therewith or any part thereof and to receive and take the same until he shall thereby or otherwise be paid and satisfied the same rent-charge and the arrears thereof due at the time of such entry or afterwards to become due during his being in possession of the same premises together with all costs and expenses occasioned by the non-payment thereof and for the purpose of collecting receiving and recovering such endowments or any of them to use exercise and enjoy all such powers and remedies for collecting recovering and enforcing payment thereof and of the annual sums payable for or towards the raising or making up the same as may be statutablely exercised or exercisable by him under the law then in force.

"Provided always that if at any time the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Theddlethorpe Saint Helen with Mablethorpe Saint Peter, shall by any deed duly executed by him under his hand and seal in accordance with the provisions of any statute in that behalf enabling him convey and annex to the said benefice of Spilsby cum Eresby any part or parts of the rectorial endowments belonging to the said benefice of Theddlethorpe Saint Helen with Mablethorpe Saint Peter which shall in the opinion of the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being be a good and fair equivalent, or not less than an equivalent for the said yearly charge of two hundred pounds hereby proposed to be created as aforesaid then the same annual sum or yearly charge of two hundred pounds shall thereupon and thenceforth cease and determine and be no longer payable as hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Lincoln.

THE following Statute, passed on the 16th day of June, 1885, by the Governing Body of Magdalene College, Cambridge, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

STATUTE XII.

Fellowships.

There shall be seven Fellowships on the Foundation of the College.

Four of these Fellowships shall be denominated Founder's Fellowships, and the remaining three

shall be denominated respectively the Spendluffe and Wray, Drury, and Millington Fellowships, in commemoration of the benefactions made to the College by Mr. Spendluffe, Sir Christopher Wray, the Reverend Drue Drury, and Dr. Millington.

So long as the interests of the Master are regulated by previously existing Statutes, the election to one Fellowship shall be suspended and the income applied to such purposes as are considered by the Governing Body most advantageous to the College.

So long as the interests of the Master are regulated by previously existing Statutes, the Governing Body shall have power to suspend the election to one Fellowship in addition to the Fellowship next above-mentioned, if they think fit, and to apply the income to such purposes as they consider most advantageous to the College, provided that the dividend of a Fellow whose interests are regulated by these Statutes shall be less than two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) a year.

After the expiration of the interests of the Master which are regulated by previously existing Statutes, the Governing Body shall have power to suspend the election to one Fellowship if they think fit, and to apply the income to such purposes as they consider most advantageous to the College, so long as the dividend of a Fellow shall be less than two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) a year.

THE following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c., of the existing Corporation of Queenborough and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882.

"WHEREAS by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is enacted that where a petition for a charter of incorporation is referred to the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council and it is proposed by the charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the municipal borough to be created by the charter, the said Committee of Council may settle a scheme for the purposes in the said Act named, and containing such provisions as are in the said Act particularised:

"And whereas certain inhabitant householders of the parish of Queenborough have petitioned Her Majesty the Queen praying for the grant of a charter of incorporation:

"And whereas the said petition for a charter has been referred to the Committee of Council, and it is proposed to create the said district a municipal borough and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, and by the charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the municipal borough to be created by the charter:

"And whereas Queenborough is a place named in the schedule to the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, and the area of the said place is co-extensive with the area of the municipal borough proposed to be created by the said charter:

"And whereas by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, it is enacted that nothing in that Act shall prevent the application to any place of any

charter applying the Municipal Corporations Acts which Her Majesty may be pleased to grant, or affect anything done in pursuance of those Acts or any scheme thereunder, and shall not affect the operation of any such charter, thing, or scheme, save that nothing in the said Acts or scheme shall authorize the establishment or continuance of any court for the trial of civil actions, and that nothing in that Act shall affect the right to the benefit of any charity, or shall alter or confer any power of altering the defined charitable purposes (if any) to which any property was by law applicable at the passing of that Act:

"And whereas the Mayor, Jurats, Bailiffs and Burgesses of Quinborowe (now called Queenborough) are a Local Authority within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882:

"And whereas the Mayor, Jurats, Bailiffs and Burgesses of the borough of Quinborowe are a body corporate, under and by virtue of certain Royal or other charters:

"And whereas the Mayor, Jurats, Bailiffs and Burgesses of Quinborowe are the Harbour Authority, within the limits, precincts and jurisdiction of the said borough by water, under and by virtue of the Queenborough Harbour Act, 1876, and are thereby empowered to make bye-laws to secure the safe and proper navigation of the harbour, and to levy certain tolls, and borrow certain moneys, as therein is provided:

"And whereas the parish of Queenborough is within the district of the Guardians of the Isle of Sheppey Union as the Rural Sanitary Authority of the said Union and whereas the said Guardians as such Rural Sanitary Authority are a Local Authority within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 and it is expedient that all property and liabilities vested in or attaching to the said Sanitary Authority so far as the same relate to the said parish should be transferred to the New Corporation in manner provided by this scheme:

"And whereas previous to the year 1884 the parish of Queenborough was comprised within the district of the Isle of Sheppey Highway Board:

"And whereas the said Highway Board being duly authorized in that behalf did in the year 1875 borrow six several sums of one hundred pounds from certain persons for the purpose of defraying the costs of certain improvements within their district and did by certain deeds assign unto the persons specified therein their executors administrators and assigns certain proportions of the highway rates leviable in the highway parishes comprising the said district until the said sums respectively with interest at the rate of five pounds per centum per annum should be paid, and it was provided and agreed by the said deeds respectively that one of such six sums and all arrears of interest thereon (if any) should be paid off triennially until the whole of such sums should be paid off and that the order in which such sums respectively should be triennially paid off should be determined by lot under the provisions of the 85th section of the Commissioners Clauses Act 1847:

"And whereas by order dated the 24th day of June, 1884, the County Authority did under, and by virtue of the provisions of the Highways and Locomotives (Amendment) Act, 1878, declare that from and after the 1st day of July, 1884, the Rural Sanitary Authority of the Isle of Sheppey Union should exercise all the powers of a Highway Board, under the Highway Acts and by virtue of the said Act the Isle of Sheppey High-

way Board was from such date dissolved and from and after such date all property and liabilities vested in or attaching to the said Highway Board passed to and vested in and attached to the said Rural Sanitary Authority in the manner provided by the said Act :

"And whereas at the date of the commencement of this scheme four of the said six sums of £100 borrowed as aforesaid (which four sums are owing to the persons and secured by the deeds described in the schedule hereto) still remain unpaid :

"And whereas from and after the commencement of this scheme the New Corporation will as the Urban Sanitary Authority execute the office of and be the Surveyor of Highways within the borough to the exclusion of the said Rural Sanitary Authority :

"And whereas it is equitable and expedient that the liability to repay one-eighth part of each of the principal sums of £100 as these same become due and one-eighth part of the interest payable in each year in respect of such sums which proportion of the said principal sums and interest the said parish of Queenborough would have been liable to contribute to the said Rural Sanitary Authority if the charter had not been granted and this scheme had not been made, and all other liabilities and property (if any) attaching to or vested in the said Rural Sanitary Authority as a Highway Board so far as the same relate to the said parish should be transferred from the Rural Sanitary Authority to the New Corporation in manner hereinafter provided :

"And whereas it is expedient that provision should be made for compensation to officers of the borough of Queenborough whose offices may cease to exist by reason of the grant of the new charter in manner provided by this Scheme :

"And whereas it is expedient, right, and just that a Scheme should be settled pursuant to Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, containing the provisions hereinafter contained :

"Now, therefore, the said Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby order and declare as follows :—

"1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as the Borough of Queenborough Scheme, 1885.

"2. This Scheme shall come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough created by the Charter above referred to, or at the date of its confirmation by Parliament or Order in Council, whichever is later. This date is herein mentioned as 'the commencement of this Scheme.'

"3. The 'Mayor, Jurats, Bailiffs and Burgesses of the Borough of Queenborough' are herein referred to as 'the Old Corporation.' The Corporation of the municipal borough created by the Charter above mentioned is herein referred to as the 'New Corporation.'

"4. The municipal borough created by the Charter above referred to shall be placed immediately on, from and after the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough aforesaid within the jurisdiction of the Council of the said municipal borough, as the Sanitary Authority, and shall no longer be within the jurisdiction, authority or district of the Rural Sanitary Authority of the Isle of Sheppey Union.

"5. All property, powers, rights and privileges conferred upon or vested in the Old Corporation, under or by virtue of the Queenborough Harbour Act, 1876, shall immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme, be transferred to

and vest in the New Corporation and be enforceable by the New Corporation ; and all duties and liabilities which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme attached to and were enforceable against the Old Corporation under or by virtue of the said Act, shall, immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme, attach to and be enforceable against the New Corporation : and any investigation legal proceeding or remedy in respect of any debt liability or forfeiture due to or incurred by or on behalf of the Old Corporation under or by virtue of the said Act may be continued prosecuted or enforced by or against the New Corporation ; and the said Act shall be read as if (as nearly as may be) 'the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Queenborough' were named or referred to in the said Act, instead of 'the Mayor, Jurats, Bailiffs and Burgesses of the Borough of Queenborough.'

"6. Immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme, the Old Corporation shall be and the same is hereby abolished, and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist, together with all the franchises, rights, privileges, powers, jurisdiction, authority, and exemptions of the said Old Corporation, and its members and officers as such of what kind soever they may be, which have no pecuniary value.

"7. All property (not being property which is within the meaning of section 4 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, applicable to charity or applicable to defined charitable purposes at the passing of that Act and not being property in paragraph 5 hereof referred to) possessed by or vested in the Old Corporation, or any person or body in trust for it, or any of its members as such, or applicable for the benefit or under the direction of the Old Corporation, or any of its members as such, or enjoyed by or enforceable in favour of the Old Corporation or any members thereof or any inhabitants of the Old Borough in aid of or relief of the rates of the Old Borough or for the purposes of the said borough shall vest in and be enjoyed by the New Corporation, and (save as is hereinafter expressly directed) shall by the New Corporation be held and applied exclusively for the municipal purposes of the municipal borough created as aforesaid, and the public benefit of the inhabitants of the said borough.

"8. All liabilities (other than liabilities in paragraph 5 hereof referred to) which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme attached to and were enforceable against the Old Corporation, or the property thereof, shall attach to and be enforceable against the New Corporation so far only as the property vested in it under paragraph 7 may extend to satisfy such liabilities, and no further.

"9. Any investigation, legal proceeding, or remedy in respect of any debt, liability, penalty, or forfeiture due to or incurred by or on behalf of the Old Corporation before the commencement of this Scheme may be continued, prosecuted, or enforced by the New Corporation or against the New Corporation so far only as the property vested in it under paragraph 7 may extend to satisfy such liabilities, and no further.

"10. All sewers, drains, culverts, pipes or other sanitary works, if any, situate within the area of the borough created by the said charter being the property of the Rural Sanitary Authority of the Isle of Sheppey Union and used by them exclusively for the purpose of the drainage, water supply, or cleansing of the said area and all liabilities, if any, attaching to the said Rural Sanitary Authority in respect of the said parish

shall immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme vest in and attach to the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the said municipal borough acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority to the extent to which the same relate solely to the said area and if they relate to the said area as well as to the rest of the district of the said Rural Authority then such portion thereof as bears the same proportion to the whole of such liabilities as the rateable value of the property within the said area for the purposes of the Public Health Act 1875 bears to the whole rateable value of the property within the said district for such purposes.

"11. All implements, materials, buildings, sheds and other property of any kind situate within the area of the said new borough and being the property of the said Rural Sanitary Authority as a Highway Board and used by them solely for the purpose of the repair and maintenance of the highways situate within the said area and the liability for the repayment of one-eighth part of each of the four principal sums of £100 described in the schedule hereto, and of one-eighth part of the interest payable in each year in respect of such sums, the payment of which sums and interest is secured by the deeds and to the persons described in the said schedule and all other liabilities (if any) attaching to the said Rural Sanitary Authority as a Highway Board so far as the same relate to the said parish shall vest in attach to and be enforceable by and against the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the said borough acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the said borough in lieu of the said Authority and the said liabilities shall be a charge upon and shall be defrayed out of the rate out of which the cost of repair of highways within the said new borough is for the time being to be defrayed under the provisions of the Public Health Act 1875 and where such liabilities relate both to the said area and the rest of the district of the said Rural Authority and not solely to the said area then such portion thereof as bears the same proportion to the whole of such liabilities as the rateable value of the property within the said area for highway purposes bears to the whole

rateable value of the property within the said district for such purposes.

"12. The term property in this Scheme means and includes all property, real and personal, and all things in action, and all rights of common or commonable rights and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books and documents, and all rights and all claims to relief and all rights to avoid contracts or otherwise and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in or in respect of any property so defined.

"13. Every officer of the Old Corporation who shall be in an office of profit at the time of the commencement of this Scheme whose office is abolished by reason of or who shall be removed from his office by reason of the grant of the New Charter or the operation of this Scheme and who does not obtain an office under the New Corporation which in the opinion of the Local Government Board is as remunerative as the one which he has lost may apply to the Local Government Board; and that Board, if satisfied that under all the circumstances he ought to receive compensation, may order that he shall receive such compensation as the Board may think just and no more; and such compensation shall be paid by the New Corporation out of the Borough Fund of the New Corporation. The decision of the Local Government Board shall be in every respect final and conclusive.

"14. Nothing contained in this Scheme shall authorise the New Corporation to take, use, or in any manner interfere with any portion of the shore or bed of the sea, or of any river, channel, creek, bay, or estuary, or any right in respect thereof belonging to the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, in right of Her Crown, and under the management of the Board of Trade; neither shall anything in this Scheme contained extend to take away, prejudice, diminish, or alter any of the estates, rights, privileges, powers, or authorities vested in, or enjoyed, or exercisable by the Queen's Majesty, Her heirs, or successors in respect of any such shore or bed.

THE following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c., of the existing Corporation of Montgomery, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882.

"WHEREAS by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is enacted that where a petition for a charter of incorporation is referred to the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council and it is proposed by the charter to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the municipal borough to be created by the charter, the said Committee of Council may settle a scheme for the

purposes in the said Act named, and containing such provisions as are in the said Act particularised:

"And whereas certain inhabitant householders of the parish of Montgomery have petitioned Her Majesty the Queen praying for the grant of a charter of incorporation:

"And whereas the said petition for a charter has been referred to the Committee of Council, and it is proposed to create the said district a municipal borough and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, and by the charter to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the municipal borough to be created by the charter:

"And whereas Montgomery is a place named in the schedule to the Municipal Corporations Act,

1883, and the area of the said place is co-extensive with the area of the municipal borough proposed to be created by the said charter :

"And whereas by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, it is enacted that nothing in that Act shall prevent the application to any place of any charter applying the Municipal Corporation Acts which Her Majesty may be pleased to grant, or affect anything done in pursuance of those Acts or any scheme thereunder, and shall not affect the operation of any such charter, thing, or scheme, save that nothing in the said Acts or scheme shall authorise the establishment or continuance of any court for the trial of civil actions, and that nothing in that Act shall affect the right to the benefit of any charity, or shall alter or confer any power of altering the defined charitable purposes (if any) to which any property was by law applicable at the passing of that Act :

"And whereas the Bailiffs and Burgesses of the borough of Montgomery are a local authority within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882 :

"And whereas the said Bailiffs and Burgesses are a body corporate under and by virtue of certain Royal or other charters :

"And whereas previous to the commencement of this scheme the parish of Montgomery formed part of the Rural Sanitary District of the Forden Union and whereas the Rural Sanitary Authority of the said district by virtue of the Public Health Act 1875 and with the sanction of the Local Government Board in the year 1876 borrowed from the Public Works Loan Commissioners a sum of £1,500, repayable by thirty annual instalments of principal and interest, in respect of which sum certain instalments of principal and interest now remain unpaid. And whereas such first-named sum has been spent in the drainage of the town of Montgomery in the said parish, and so much of it as now remains unpaid, is a charge upon rates leviable within the parish of Montgomery under the provisions of the Public Health Act 1875 :

"And whereas from and after the commencement of this scheme the New Corporation acting by the Council will become the Urban Sanitary Authority for the borough under the Public Health Act, 1875, and it is expedient that all property and liabilities vested in or attaching to the said Rural Sanitary Authority so far as the same relate to the parish of Montgomery should be transferred to the New Corporation in manner hereinafter provided :

"And whereas the said Rural Sanitary Authority is a local authority within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882 :

"And whereas it is expedient, right, and just that a scheme should be settled pursuant to Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, containing the provisions hereinafter contained :

"Now, therefore, the said Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby order and declare as follows :—

"1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as the 'Borough of Montgomery Scheme, 1885.'

"2. This Scheme shall come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough created by the charter above referred to, or at the date of its confirmation by Parliament or Order in Council whichever is later. This date is herein mentioned as the 'Commencement of the Scheme.'

"3. The Bailiffs and Burgesses of the borough

of Montgomery are herein referred to as the 'Old Corporation.'

"The Corporation of the municipal borough, created by the Charter above mentioned, is herein referred to as the 'New Corporation.'

"4. The municipal borough, created by the Charter above referred to, shall be and is hereby placed immediately on, from, and after the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough aforesaid within the jurisdiction of the Council of the said municipal borough as the Sanitary Authority, and shall thenceforth no longer be within the jurisdiction, authority, or district of the said Rural Sanitary Authority of the Forden Union or of the Pool and Forden Highway Board.

"5. Immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme the Old Corporation shall be and the same is hereby abolished, and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist, together with all the franchises, rights, privileges, powers, jurisdiction, authority, and exemptions of the said Old Corporation and its members and officers as such, of what kind soever they may be which have no pecuniary value.

"6. All property of any kind whatsoever possessed by or vested in the Old Corporation, or any person or body in trust for it, or any of its members as such, or applicable for the benefit or under the direction of the Old Corporation, or any of its members as such, which property is within the meaning of the second sub-section of section 4 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, applicable to charity or applicable to defined charitable purposes at the passing of that Act shall immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme vest in persons to be designated 'The Trustees of Municipal Charities in the borough of Montgomery,' (the first of whom shall be the Right Honourable Edward James, Earl of Powis, the Reverend John Lloyd of Castell Forwyn, Montgomeryshire, Clerk, John Maurice Edward Lloyd of the same place, Barrister-at-Law, William Jones of Llwynobin, Montgomery, Farmer, and Thomas Davies of Montgomery, Gentleman) jointly to be by them applied in the manner in which and for the purposes for which such property, or the income thereof, was before and at the passing of that Act applicable.

"7. All market property (if any) possessed by or vested in the Old Corporation and all liabilities (if any) attaching to the Old Corporation in respect of the same shall vest in and attach to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said Municipal Borough acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority.

"8. All the property other than that in paragraphs 6 and 7 hereof referred to, possessed by or vested in the Old Corporation, or any person or body in trust for it, or any of its members as such, or applicable for the benefit or under the direction of the Old Corporation, or any of its members as such, shall vest in the New Corporation, and (save as is hereinafter expressly directed) shall by the New Corporation be held and applied exclusively for the municipal purposes of the municipal borough created as aforesaid, and the public benefit of the inhabitants of the said borough.

"9. All liabilities which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme attached to and were enforceable against the Old Corporation, or the property thereof, shall attach to and be enforceable against the New Corporation so far only as the property vested in it under paragraph 8 may extend to satisfy such liabilities, and no further.

"10. Any investigation, legal proceeding, or remedy in respect of any debt, liability, penalty,

or forfeiture due to or incurred by or on behalf of the Old Corporation before the commencement of this Scheme may be continued, prosecuted, or enforced by the New Corporation or against the New Corporation, so far only as the property vested in it under paragraph 8 may extend to satisfy such liabilities, and no further.

"11. Any sewers, drains, culverts, pipes or other sanitary works situate within the parish of Montgomery being the property of the Rural Sanitary Authority of the Forden Union, and used by them for the purpose of the drainage, water supply or cleansing of the said parish of Montgomery and the liability of the said Rural Sanitary Authority in respect of the loan hereinbefore referred to and of all future instalments thereof, and of the interest thereon and all other liabilities attaching to the said Rural Sanitary Authority and incurred solely for the purposes of the said parish and such a proportional part of all other liabilities attaching to the said Sanitary Authority and incurred for the whole district of the said authority including the said parish as corresponds to the proportion, the rateable value (for the purposes of the Public Health Act, 1875) of the said parish bears at the commencement of this Scheme to the rateable value of the whole district of the said authority, shall vest in, attach to, and be enforceable against the New Corporation acting by the Council and the balance unpaid of the said loan, and all interest in respect thereof, shall be a charge upon the rates which the New Corporation acting by the Council are authorized to levy under the Public Health Act 1875 in the said borough.

"12. The term property in this Scheme means and includes all property, real and personal, and all things in action, and all rights of common or commonable rights, and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges, and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books, and documents, and all rights, and all claims to relief, and all rights to avoid contracts or otherwise, and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in or in respect of any property so defined.

"13. The term market property in this Scheme means and includes rights to market tolls and all franchises, liabilities, privileges, and rights relating to markets, and all lands and premises used for the purposes of markets."

"14. For the purposes of the Municipal Corporations Act 1883, and this Scheme so far as the same relate to freemen the Old Corporation shall be deemed to have been dissolved by the said Act; and all the rights and exemptions reserved by and the provisions of section 10 of the said Act shall apply accordingly.

"Every person now claiming to be entitled as a freeman or burgess or otherwise, in accordance with the provisions of section 10 sub-section (1) of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, shall, on or before the expiration of one calendar month from the commencement of this Scheme send to the Town Clerk his claim in writing, and future claims shall be similarly sent in on or before the 1st day of September in every year. The Town Clerk shall within one month after the expiration of the time for sending in claims make out a roll (to be called the 'Freemen's Roll') containing the names of all such claimants and the names of those previously admitted and then alive; and such rolls shall be revised and settled by the Mayor on such day or days as he shall from time to time appoint. Provided that such day or days shall be fixed to be at least one month after but within two months of the expiration of

the time for sending in claims and that public notice of every such appointment has been given by him by affixing notice thereof fourteen days previously on or near the outer door of the Town-hall in the said borough.

"On every such revision the Mayor shall examine into the claims and all objections thereto, and shall retain on or add to the roll the names of those persons only who are entitled to be on roll, and sign the roll when complete.

"No person who shall once have established his claim shall (if alive) be struck off the roll on any subsequent revision, unless notice in writing of any objection to his claim be served on him at least seven days previously to the date fixed for such revision.

"The Freemen's Roll shall be kept by the Town Clerk, and shall be open to inspection at his office by any person at all reasonable times on payment of a fee of one shilling, and he shall supply printed copies thereof to any applicants at the price of one shilling each.

"The property to which the freemen aforesaid are for the time being entitled shall be managed by the New Corporation, and the payments specified in or authorized by sub-section 1 (a) of section 10 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, shall be made by the Treasurer of the borough, who shall annually prepare an account showing in detail all such payments, and the surplus remaining after payment thereof, and the New Corporation shall deal with the surplus as by law required.

"The payments specified or referred to in sub-section 1 (d) of section 10 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, shall be made to the Treasurer of the borough.

"The Town Clerk is authorized and required, when making out the first Roll of Freemen, to insert the name of any freeman whom the books of the Corporation show to have taken up his freedom, and who is known to be alive."

"And whereas the said petition for a charter has been referred to the Committee of Council and it is proposed to create part of the said district a municipal borough and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof and by the charter to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the municipal borough to be created by the charter:

"And whereas New Romney is a place named in the schedule to the Municipal Corporations Act 1883 and the area of the said place is not co-ex-

tensive with the area of the municipal borough proposed to be created by the said charter :

" And whereas by the Municipal Corporations Act 1883 it is enacted that nothing in that Act shall prevent the application to any place of any charter applying the Municipal Corporation Acts which Her Majesty may be placed to grant, or affect anything done in pursuance of those Acts or any scheme thereunder and shall not affect the operation of any such charter thing or scheme save that nothing in the said Acts or scheme shall authorize the establishment or continuance of any court for the trial of civil actions, and that nothing in that Act shall affect the right to the benefit of any charity, or shall alter or confer any power of altering the defined charitable purposes (if any) to which any property was by law applicable at the passing of that Act.

" And whereas the Mayor Jurats and Commonalty of the town and port of New Romney are a Local Authority within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 :

" And whereas the said Mayor Jurats and Commonalty are a body corporate under and by virtue of certain Royal charters :

" And whereas previous to the commencement of this scheme the parish of New Romney formed part of the district of the Rural Sanitary Authority of the Romney Marsh Union and the said Sanitary Authority is a Local Authority within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 and it is expedient that all property and liabilities vested in or attaching to the said Rural Sanitary Authority so far as the same relate to the area of the proposed borough should be transferred to the New Corporation in manner hereinafter provided :

" And whereas it is expedient right and just that a scheme should be settled pursuant to Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 containing the provisions hereinafter contained.

" Now therefore the said Committee of Council have settled a scheme containing the provisions herein and do hereby order and declare as follows :

" 1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as the Borough of New Romney Scheme 1885.

" 2. This Scheme shall come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough created by the Charter above referred to or at the date of its confirmation by Parliament or Order in Council whichever is later. This date is herein mentioned as the commencement of this Scheme.

" 3. The Mayor Jurats and Commonalty of the town and port of New Romney are herein referred to as the 'Old Corporation.' The Corporation of the municipal borough created by the Charter above mentioned is herein referred to as the 'New Corporation.'

" 4. The municipal borough created by the Charter above referred to shall be and is hereby placed immediately on from and after the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough aforesaid within the jurisdiction of the Council of the said municipal borough as the Sanitary Authority and shall thenceforth no longer be within the jurisdiction authority or district of the Rural Sanitary Authority of the Romney Marsh Union.

" 5. Immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme the old Corporation shall be and the same is hereby abolished and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist together with all the franchises rights privileges powers jurisdiction authority and exemptions of the said old Corporation and its members and officers as such

of what kind soever they may be which have no pecuniary value save such as are vested in the old Corporation or any of its members by virtue of the old Corporation being one of the Cinque Ports.

" 6. And whereas the United Kingdom appears to be threatened with a certain epidemic disease, that is to say, the Asiatic Cholera: and whereas it is expedient to make provision thereanent:—

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the above-recited section of the said recited Act, the Lords of the Council do order, and it is hereby ordered, that the provisions for the prevention of diseases, contained in Part III of the Act thirty and thirty-first Victoria, chapter one hundred and one, be put in force in Scotland, for the space of six calendar months, after the publication of this Order in the Edinburgh Gazette.

NOTICE with regard to Quarantine Measures against the introduction of Cholera from Spain. June 8, 1885.

I. For the protection of the frontiers of the empire from the introduction of cholera which has broken out in certain places in Spain, orders have been issued by the Minister of the Interior, on the 1st of June, for the adoption of the following sanitary quarantine measures:—

1. Ships arriving from Spanish ports, in the Black Sea, must undergo observation and disinfection in accordance with the regulations approved on the 12th September, 1884, by the Minister of the Interior.

2. Ships arriving from Spanish ports, in the Baltic, with clean bills of health, are to undergo severe sanitary inspection; ships with unclean bills of health will not be allowed at all to enter these last-named ports.

II. These dispositions of the Minister of the Interior have been communicated to the Minister of Finance, the Governor-General of Odessa, the

Governors of Courland, Livonia, and Esthonia, on the 1st of June, and to the Minister of Foreign Affairs on the 6th of June.

A Translation of the Regulations of 12th September, 1884, above referred to, was published in the London Gazette of the 14th October last.

Appointment of Stocktaker:—

Dore Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Dore Union, in the Counties of Hereford and Monmouth:—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by General Orders of the Poor Law Board, dated respectively the 14th day of January, 1867, and the 16th day of February, 1869, addressed (among others) to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Dore Union, it is required that certain Accounts relating to the provisions, clothing, and other stores in the Workhouse, when made up and balanced, shall be submitted to the Visiting Committee or to some Member thereof, who shall enter a memorandum at the foot of such Accounts, certifying to the same having been submitted, and to the correctness, or otherwise, of such Accounts as regards the stock remaining in store;

And whereas it is expedient to empower the said Guardians to appoint a competent person or persons to examine the stores at the Workhouse belonging to the said Union, and to perform the other duties hereinafter set forth;

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us

by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—The Guardians of the Poor of the said Dore Union may, as and when they shall think fit to do so, appoint a competent person or persons to perform the duties of a Stocktaker as hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE II.—Every such appointment shall be made in the manner prescribed by the Regulations as to the appointment of Officers in force in the said Union for the time being.

ARTICLE III.—The Guardians shall pay to the person or persons appointed under this Order such salary or remuneration as We may from time to time direct or approve.

ARTICLE IV.—Every person appointed under this Order shall hold office until he shall die, or resign, or be dismissed by the Guardians, subject to Our consent, or be removed by Us, or be proved to be insane by evidence which We may deem sufficient; and the said Guardians shall give notice to Us of every such death or resignation, and state the cause of such resignation, so far as it may be known to them.

Provided nevertheless, that the Guardians may, if they think fit, with Our assent appoint a person or persons to discharge the duties hereby prescribed for the Stocktaker, for a limited period only.

ARTICLE V.—The Stocktaker shall, on the day next after the termination of each quarter, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stores at the Workhouse and compare the same with the quantities of stock remaining in store as shown by the entries in the proper columns in the accounts termed respectively the "Quarterly Balance of the Provisions Account" and the "Quarterly Balance of the Necessaries and Miscellaneous Account."

He shall also, on the day next after the termination of each half-year, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stock of clothing at the Workhouse and compare the same with the balance appearing in the Accounts termed respectively the "Clothing Materials Receipt and Conversion Account" and the "Clothing Receipt and Expenditure Account."

ARTICLE VI.—After making the examination and comparison referred to in Article V, the Stocktaker, if he find the stock to be correct, shall sign a certificate at the foot of each of the aforesaid Accounts in the following form:—

"Submitted to me this _____ day of _____ 188____, and found to be correct
"as regards the quantities of stock remaining in
"store.

"(Signed) _____
"Stocktaker."

If he find the stock to be in any respect incorrect, he shall make such addition to the said certificate as he may deem necessary, specifying the particulars in which he finds the quantities of stock to be incorrectly stated.

ARTICLE VII.—The Master of the Workhouse shall, when required by the Stocktaker to do so, on the days and at the times referred to in Article V, submit to him the Stores and Accounts therein mentioned, and render to him such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of such examination and comparison as aforesaid.

ARTICLE VIII.—The Master of the Workhouse shall lay each of the said Accounts before the Guardians at their next meeting after the date of the entry therein of any such certificate as aforesaid.

ARTICLE IX.—So long as a Stocktaker is appointed it shall not be necessary for the Visiting

Committee to examine the stores or to enter in any Account the memorandum required by the above-cited Order dated the fourteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

River Humber—Intended Adoption of the Uniform System of Buoyage.

THE Trinity House, Hull, has given notice, that during the summer of 1885, it is intended that the Uniform System of Buoyage, recommended by the report of the Buoyage Conference of 1st May, 1883, under the presidency of H.R.H. the Duke of Edinburgh, shall be adopted in buoying the channels of the Humber.

The principal arrangements of the uniform system as applicable to the Humber, are as follows:—

CHANNEL BUOYS.

The term "starboard hand" denotes that side of a channel, which, when inward bound, is on the right hand of the mariner. The term "port hand" denotes the left hand of the mariner in the same circumstances.

The shape and colours of the buoys to be used are:—

Starboard hand buoys, conical, black.

Port hand buoys, can, black and white vertical stripes.

Middle grounds will be marked by spherical buoys, painted with white rings on a black ground. The buoys will be numbered consecutively from seaward.

The shapes above-mentioned as conical and can denote those hitherto known as nun and can respectively.

Under this re-arrangement, the colours of the buoys in the Humber will remain as at present.

BEACON BUOYS.

When a buoy is surmounted by a beacon—a staff and globe indicates a starboard hand buoy; a staff and cage, a port hand buoy; a staff and diamond or triangle, a buoy intervening between two channels.

Also, that in accordance with the foregoing, the proposed alterations will be commenced on 13th July, 1885, and proceeded with as quickly as possible, and after the various alterations have been made, the buoys will be distinguished as follows:—

Buoys on the Starboard Hand entering the Humber from Seaward.

No. 1. Outer Banks (Binks) will be a conical buoy, painted black, with staff and globe.

No. 2. Middle Banks will be a conical buoy, painted black.

No. 14. Upper Hebbles will be a conical buoy, painted black.

No. 1. Sand Haile will be a can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes, with staff and cage.

No. 2. Bull will be a can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes.

No. 3. Cleo Ness will be a can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes, with staff and cage.

No. 4. Lower Burcom will be a can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes.

No. 5. Middle Burcom will be a can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes.

No. 6. Upper Burcom will be a can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes.

No. 7. Skitter Sand End will be a can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes, with staff and cage.

No. 8. Skitter Sand Elbow will be a can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes.

No. 9. Anson will be a can buoy, painted black and white in vertical stripes.
