**N**OTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales will, by command of The Queen, hold a Levee at St. James's Palace, on behalf of Her Majesty, on Monday, the 13th of July next, at two o'clock.

It is The Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at the Levee shall be considered as equivalent to Presentations to Her Majesty.

## REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

### By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

## PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full

"consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas Charles John Lord Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the twelfth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five to the Right Honourable Edward White, Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I Charles John, Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, beg leave to represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol a district or chapelry known by the name of Cow Honeybourne which adjoins to the parish of Church Honeybourne in the county and diocese of Worcester but it is not known to what parish or mother church the said district or chapelry belongs;

"That the boundaries of the said district or chapelry are well known and defined;

"That the chapel of the said district or chapelry having been allowed to fall out of repair, was for many years from time immemorial converted into tenements or dwellings for the poor;

"That by a deed of conveyance duly made on October 13th 1856 by virtue of the Act of Parliament 5 and 6 Willm. 4th c. 69 the said tenements or dwellings were conveyed to certain persons therein named their heirs and assigns for ever;

"That the said persons having pulled down the said tenements or dwellings and erected on the site thereof a plain substantial building adapted in all respects for Divine service are now about to convey the property to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to be held by them for ecclesiastical purposes for ever;

"That the inhabitants of the said district or chapelry have resorted from time immemorial to the church of the said parish of Church Honeybourne for Divine service; and that baptisms, churchings, marriages, and burials have been performed for them in the said church of the said parish;

"That the populations of the said parish of Church Honeybourne and of the said district or chapelry of Cow Honeybourne were at the census of 1881 one hundred and forty-six and three hundred and thirty-seven respectively;

"That it appears to me that the said district or chapelry of Cow Honeybourne may, under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament 1 and 2 Victoria c. 106 and 2 and 3 Victoria c. 49 be advantageously separated from the parish or mother church (if any) to which the same may belong and be annexed to the said parish of Church Honeybourne in the diocese of Worcester for ecclesiastical purposes;

"That pursuant to the directions of the 26th section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament I have drawn up in writing a scheme appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may be best effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I submit the same to your Grace together with the

consents in writing of the Lord Bishop of Worcester and the patron and incumbent of the benefice of the said parish of Church Honeybourne to the intent that your Grace may, if you shall be satisfied with the said scheme, certify the same and such consents to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this twelfth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

"C. J. Gloucester and Bristol."

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

#### "SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the district or chapelry of Cow Honeybourne in the county of Gloucester from the parish or mother church (if any) to which it now belongs, and to annex it to the parish of Church Honeybourne in the county and diocese of Worcester for ecclesiastical purposes;

"That the vicar of the said parish of Church Honeybourne shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said district or chapelry;

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said district or chapelry in the church of the said parish of Church Honeybourne, and that the fees for all such offices performed within the limits of the said district or chapelry, and all ecclesiastical dues, offerings, and other emoluments accruing from or in respect of the said district or chapelry and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the vicar of the said parish of Church Honeybourne.

#### "CONSENTS.

"I, the undersigned, being the Bishop of the diocese in which the parish of Church Honeybourne is situate, do hereby testify my consent to the scheme above proposed.

"H. Worcester.

"I the undersigned, being the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of Church Honeybourne and also incumbent of the said parish do hereby testify my consent to the scheme above proposed.

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop being satisfied with the said scheme hath certified the same, and the consents aforesaid, to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the thirtieth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Charles John Lord Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol has represented unto us (amongst other things).

"That there is in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol a district or chapelry known by the name of Cow Honeybourne which adjoins to the parish of Church Honeybourne in the county and diocese of Worcester but it is not known to what parish or mother church the said district or chapelry belongs.

"That the boundaries of the said district or chapelry are well known and defined.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said district or chapelry of Cow Honeybourne may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament 1 and 2 Victoria chapter 106 be advantageously separated from the parish or mother

church (if any) to which the same may belong and be annexed to the parish of Church Honeybourne in the diocese of Worcester for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction dues rates and payments may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the Lord Bishop of Worcester and of the patron and incumbent of the benefice of Church Honeybourne has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this thirtieth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the sixteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of a certain benefice namely the cure (being a vicarage) of Alrewas with the chapel of Fradley in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield for the patronage of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Whittington in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage and presentation of and to the said benefice of Alrewas with the chapel of Fradley, is vested in the Right Reverend William Dalrymple Lord Bishop of the diocese of Lichfield in fee simple in right of his See.

"And whereas under or by virtue of the will dated the twenty-third day of February 1853 of John Levett late of Wychnor Lodge in the county of Stafford deceased (which will was proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury on the sixteenth day of September one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four) and an indenture bearing date the second day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three and made between Theophilus Basil Percy Levett of Wychnor Park aforesaid Esq. of the first part Theophilus John Levett of Wychnor Park aforesaid Esq. a Member of the Commons House of Parliament of the second part and Robert Thomas Kennedy Levett of Packington Hall near Lichfield in the county of Stafford Esq. of the third part the advowson or perpetual right of patronage and presentation of and to the said benefice of Whittington now stands limited to the use of the said Theophilus John Levett for life with remainder to the use of the said Theophilus Basil Percy Levett his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And whereas it has been proposed to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners that the patronage of the said benefice of Alrewas with Fradley and the patronage of the said benefice of Whittington should be exchanged in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices of Alrewas with Fradley and of Whittington and of the patronage thereof respectively and we do hereby certify to Your Majesty that such circumstances and values respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereto annexed.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said William Dalrymple Lord Bishop of Lichfield (in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal) and with the consents of the said Theophilus John Levett and Theophilus Basil Percy Levett (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that from and after the publication in the London Gazette of this scheme and any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and without any transfer conveyance or assurance in the law other than the said scheme and Order so published in the London Gazette as aforesaid the advowson or perpetual right of patronage and presentation of and to the said benefice of Alrewas with Fradley shall be assigned and transferred from the said William Dalrymple Lord Bishop of Lichfield in whom as aforesaid it is now vested and from his successors and shall become and be and remain thereby duly and absolutely limited to the uses following that is to say to the use of the said Theophilus John Levett and his assigns for and during his life and after his decease to the use of the said Theophilus Basil Percy Levett his heirs and assigns for ever: And that, in exchange for the same, the advowson or perpetual right of patronage and presentation of and to the said benefice of Whittington shall as from the same day, and without any transfer conveyance or assurance in the law other than as aforesaid, be assigned and transferred from the said Theophilus John Levett and Theophilus Basil Percy Levett and each of them and from the heirs and assigns of the said Theophilus Basil Percy Levett, to the use of the said William Dalrymple Lord Bishop of Lichfield and his successors for ever as aforesaid to the end and intent that the said last-mentioned advowson or perpetual right of patronage and presentation may from time to time and at

all times be held and exercised by the said William Dalrymple Lord Bishop of Lichfield and his successors for ever as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from

recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lichfield.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following, that is to say:-

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven sections six and eight have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the Prebend of Stratton in the Cathedral Church of Salisbury and now vested in us.

"Whereas on the vacancy of the said prebend which occurred on or about the first day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine by the decease of the Reverend John Still the then prebendary all the lands tenements hereditaments and endowments theretofore belonging to the said prebend (except rights of patronage) became by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas our estate in the lands tenements hereditaments and endowments aforesaid consists of reversions expectant upon the determination of beneficial leases such leases producing only a small annual revenue and partly on that account and partly on account of the character or situation of the property the said lands tenements hereditaments and endowments are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas by an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four power is given to lessees holding under us in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions or the purchase of the leasehold interests to require us to purchase such leasehold interests at a valuation.

"And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said lands tenements hereditaments and endowments or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund it is expedient that the said lands tenements hereditaments and endowments or such parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to dispose of our interests therein or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorised and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty's reign with the consent of the holder or holders thereof (if any) to be testified by his her or their being made parties to such instruments all or any of the said lands tenements hereditaments and endowments formerly belonging to the said Prebend of Stratton and so vested in us as aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or other-

wise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes rent-charges tenements or hereditaments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz.:

In the parish churchyard of Alwalton, in the county of Huntingdon, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Feltham, in the county of Middlesex, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Sampford Peverell, in the county of Devon, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the churchyard of Tow Law, in the parish of Walsingham, in the county of Durham, to the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Ivybridge, in the county of Devon, to the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

(gold) to the customs duties upon various articles comprised in the Russian tariff. The Decision also provides for certain modifications in the existing Russian import duties upon wood and ether paper pulp, refined sugar, teas imported through Turkey or across the Chinese frontier, and looking-glasses and mirrors. "The following proposals of the Minister of Finance have been approved by the Council of the Empire:—
