It is The Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at the Levee shall be considered as equivalent to Presentations to Her Majesty.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

WHEREAS by the 3rd section of the Revising Barristers Act, 1873, it was enacted that Her Majesty, by Order in Council, might vary from time to time, either by way of increase or decrease, the number of Revising Barristers to be appointed for any Counties, Cities, Boroughs, or places, in pursuance of section 28 of the Parliamentary Electors Registration Act, 1843, and that the number fixed by such Order should be substituted for the number fixed by the said section, or by any previous Order in Council made under the Revising Barristers Act, 1873, or any other Act :

And whereas by Order in Council, dated the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, the number of Revising Barristers was prescribed as set forth in the Schedule of the same Order :

And whereas by section 29 of the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, it is enacted that where the Lord Chief Justice or Judge appoints in the present year Barristers for Counties and Boroughs, he shall appoint them to act for all the Counties

and Boroughs for which he has power to appoint Revising Barristers; and each Barrister, when acting for any County or Borough, shall have the same duties, powers, and authorities, as if he had been appointed sole Revising Barrister for such County or Borough.

It is therefore ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, that the number of Revising Barristers to be appointed in manner aforesaid in the present year shall be as set forth in the Schedule to this Order.

The said Order of the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, is hereby revoked.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Houghton-le-Spring in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham between that benefice and a certain other benefice namely the benefice (being a district chapelry) of Herrington which said last-named benefice is situate in the county of Durham and in the said diocese of Durham and was formerly a part of the new parish of Saint Matthew Newbottle, which new parish was sometime part of the parish of Houghton-le-Spring.

"Whereas the Bishop of the said diocese of Durham is the patron in right of his See of the

said benefice of Houghton-le-Spring, and also of the said benefice of Herrington.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Herrington is at present insufficiently endowed and that the said benefice of Houghton-le-Spring has endowments of such an amount as that after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments, the said benefice of Houghton-le-Spring will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Joseph Barber Bishop of the said diocese of Durham is willing and we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners are of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the district chapelry of Herrington aforesaid by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Houghton-le-Spring, which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Houghton-le-Spring is now full.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Archbishop of York, acting as Archbishop of the province within which each of the said two benefices is situate and with the consent of the said Joseph Barber Bishop of the said diocese of Durham acting as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed this scheme and sealed the same with their several episcopal seals), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly Gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and as from the day of the date at which the said benefice of Houghton-le-Spring shall from whatsoever cause be next avoided all the tithe rent-charges glebe land and all (if any) other the endowments which shall at the date of the next avoidance of the said benefice of Houghton-le-Spring belong or which may thereafter belong to the same benefice shall be charged and be for ever thereafter chargeable in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Herrington with the annual sum or yearly charge hereinafter mentioned that is to say a clear annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred pounds the same annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred pounds to be as from the day aforesaid due and payable to the incumbent of the said benefice of Herrington and the same annual sum or yearly charge to be apportionable between any outgoing incumbent of the benefice of Herrington or his representatives on the one hand and his successors in the same incumbency on the other hand and to be receivable by the incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of February and the first day of August in every year.

"And we further recommend and propose that the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Herrington shall have the following powers for recovering the said rent-charge of one hundred pounds per annum hereby proposed to be created in favour of the benefice of which he is the incumbent as aforesaid (that is to say) power, if and whenever any part of the said rent-charge shall at any time be unpaid for twenty-one days after any of the times appointed for the payment thereof (although there shall not have been any legal demand made thereof) to

enter into the receipt of the endowments charged therewith or any part thereof and to receive and take the same until he shall thereby or otherwise be paid and satisfied the same rent-charge and the arrears thereof due at the time of such entry or afterwards to become due during his being in possession of the same premises together with all costs and expenses occasioned by the non-payment thereof and for the purpose of collecting receiving and recovering such endowments or any of them to use exercise and enjoy all such powers and remedies for collecting recovering and enforcing payment thereof and of the annual sums payable for or towards the raising or making up the same as may be statutorily exercised or exercisable by him under the law then in force. Provided always that if at any time the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Houghton-le-Spring shall by any deed duly executed by him under his hand and seal in accordance with the provisions of any statute in that behalf enabling him grant convey and annex to the said benefice of Herrington any part or parts of the rectorial endowments belonging to the said benefice of Houghton-le-Spring which shall in the opinion of the Bishop of Durham for the time being be a good and fair equivalent for the said yearly charge of one hundred pounds hereby proposed to be created as aforesaid then the same annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred pounds shall thereupon and thenceforth cease and determine and be no longer payable as hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the forty-seventh and forty-eighth years of Her Majesty chapter sixty-five duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation, bearing date the fourth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for

England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the forty-seventh and forty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the district of Saint John the Baptist Great Marlborough-street in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the seventh day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five and published in the London Gazette upon the eighth day of the same month ratifying a scheme of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England prepared under the provisions of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven (the New Parishes Act 1843) certain portions of the parish of Saint James Westminster and of the new parish of Saint Luke Westminster both in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London aforesaid were constituted a separate district for ecclesiastical purposes, and the same was called 'The District of Saint John the Baptist Great Marlborough-street.'

"And whereas no church has yet been provided for or consecrated within the said district of Saint John the Baptist Great Marlborough-street.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said district should be altered by way of extension so that they shall include the portion hereinafter described of the district chapelry of Saint Thomas Regent-street sometime part of the said parish of Saint James, Westminster.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said district of Saint John the Baptist Great Marlborough-street shall be altered by way of extension so that they shall include all that portion of the said district chapelry of Saint Thomas Regent-street which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and that from and after the said day of publication as aforesaid and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portion of the district chapelry of Saint Thomas Regent-street so to be included within the boundaries of the district of Saint John the Baptist Great Marlborough-street as aforesaid shall become and be and form part of the same district.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the district of Saint John the Baptist, Great Marlborough-street, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London being:—

"All that portion of the district chapelry of Saint Thomas, Regent-street sometime part of the parish of Saint James Westminster in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London aforesaid which is bounded on the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said district of Saint John the Baptist, Great Marlborough-street from the district chapelry of Saint Thomas Regent-street aforesaid at the point where Argyll-street joins the street called or known as Argyll-place and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said Argyll-place for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Regent-street and continuing thence still in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of one chain or thereabouts across the last-named street to the boundary on the western side of the same street at or near to its junction with Maddox-street, which boundary divides the said district chapelry of Saint Thomas Regent-street from the parish of Saint George Hanover-square in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London aforesaid, all which said hereinbefore described portion of the district chapelry of Saint Thomas Regent-street is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the south as aforesaid that is to say upon the west, the north and the east as follows, upon the west partly by the parish of Saint George Hanover-square aforesaid and partly by the new parish of Hanover Chapel (Regent-street) within the original limits of the last-mentioned parish, upon the north by the district parish or rectory of All Souls in Saint Marylebone in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London aforesaid and upon the east by the district of Saint John the Baptist Great Marlborough-street aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been submitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days'

previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating, that for the protection of the public health no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the following modifications, viz.:—

ATTLEBOROUGH.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Attleborough, in the county of Norfolk, and also in the churchyard after the thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order, viz., widows, widowers, sons and daughters, as can be buried at or below that depth.

WINSLOW.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Winslow, in the county of Buckingham.

ST. SIDWELL, EXETER.—Forthwith and entirely in the Baptist Chapelyard, Paris-street, Exeter, except for the burial of Miss Jessy Faulkner Rouse and Mr. James Jerman, at their decease.

HELHOUGHTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Helhoughton, in the county of Norfolk, and also in that part of the churchyard which lies to the south of the church, except as follows:—

(a.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet, without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

ALL SAINTS, HABERGHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of All Saints, Haberg-ham, in the parish of Whalley, in the county of Lancaster; and also in the churchyard

after the thirty-first July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffin or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(d.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard as have never before been buried in, and when opened are free from water, burials may be allowed of so many members the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

GUILDSBOROUGH.—Forthwith and entirely in the Baptist Chapelry in the parish of Guildsbrough, in the county of Northampton, within three yards of any dwelling, and in the rest of the yard, except for the burial of those members of the congregation who being widowers or widows of those interred therein shall have attained the age of seventy-five years at the date of the Order.

ACTON, CHESTER.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Acton, in the county of Chester; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

HIGHWORTH.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Highworth, in the county of Wilts; and also in the churchyard, except for the burial of Mrs. Richard Harris at her decease.

GREAT BURSTEAD.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Great Burstead, in the county of Essex; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled

graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

BRINKWORTH.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of Brinkworth, in the county of Wilts; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six except as follows:—

In such vaults and walled graves now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

SWINDON.—Forthwith and entirely in the particular Baptist Chapel, South-street, in the parish of Old Swindon, in the county of Wilts; and also in the chapelry except for the burial of so many members or late members of the congregation who shall have attained the age of sixty years at the date of the Order.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-fourth day of August next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twenty-fourth day of August.

(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the eleventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

An Area in the township of Quesdale, in the

county of Chester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at Cheadle Hulme Railway station, by the London and North-Western Railway line to Spath-lane Bridge, thence by Spath-lane (across Grove-lane) and Bramhall-lane to Bramhall Railway station, and thence by the Railway line to Cheadle Hulme station aforesaid.

(SWINE-FEVER.)

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:
