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Rome, April 1.

After all the Endeavours that have been used by the Duke de Ghoulles and the Cardinals of the French Faction, to accommodate the Differences between this Court and France, several difficulties still remain, which obstruct the conclusion of this matter; and particularly about the Point of the Infallibility, which the Pope insists to have the Clergy of France own and subscribe to. The Vessels that have been hired at Genoua, for the transporting the Troops the Pope intends to send to the assistance of the Venetians, are daily expected at Civita Vecchia, where the Soldiers lye ready to Embark. The Pope has named Signior Corfini to be his Nuncio in Germany.

Naples, March 21. The Gallies of the Duke of Turji's Squadron will part from hence the next week with Soldiers to reinforce the Spanish Garisons on the Coast of Tuscany. And under their Convoy will go likewise the Vessels that are to transport the Forces that have been lately raised in this Kingdom for the Service of Catalonia. The Pope's Gallies, and those of Malta, are, we hear, to rendezvous at Messina, about the middle of the next Month.

Milan, April 5. Our Governour will part from hence to morrow to visit the Frontier Garisons of this State. We hear from Vienna, that Monsieur de Catinat arrived there the 27th of the last Month with several French Officers; and that the next day the new Ambassador from France made his Publick Entry. The Abbot de Croissy, who was lately taken in his passage through Mantua, continues a Prisoner in the Citadel of this place.

Venice, April 8. By a Vessel come from the Levant, which touched the 17th of the last Month at Zant, we have advice, That the Garison of Napoli di Malvasia had hung out a white Flag, in order to Capitulate; which is not only confirmed by a Barque that came the day after from that Island, but the Master adds, that the Capitulation with the Garison was looked upon to be as good as concluded. However, we must expect the certainty of this News from the Morea. They write from Cattaro, that the Bassa of Bosnia was drawing his Troops together, and that he had fortified several Posts to secure the Communication between Dalmatia and Albania; and that to favour this design, the Bassa of Arcegovina had sent a good Body of Men into the Country of Brepeglin; which the Governour of Cattaro being informed of, he ordered the Heydukes of the Countries of Castlenovo and Gravano to attack them, who in their march defeated a Party of Turks, and took a great Booty of Cattel. And that another Detachement of the Heydukes of Piperni had defeated 70 Turkish Horse, who served for a Convoy to several Wagons that were going with Provisions and Merchandises to Brepeglin.

Madrid, April 5. The 29th past arrived here an Express, with the news of the Queen of Spain's arrival at Ferol in Galicia. The King will go from hence the 10th, to meet her at Valladolid. We are told from Cadix, that the Spanish Galeons set sail the 14th of the last Month.

Warsaw, March 11. The Term for the sitting of the Dyet being ready to expire, a prolongation of 10 days was unanimously consented to by the Deputies that compose it. And they have since

made so good a progress in the publick Affairs that most necessarily require their Consideration, and particularly in the point about the prosecution of the War, that we have great reason to hope for a good conclusion of this Meeting; Which will give new life and vigour to the preparations for the Campagne. In the mean time, Commissions have been given out for Recruits and new Levies; A good Train of Artillery is ordered to be prepared; And the King has declared, that he will command his Army in Person. We have an account from Lemberg, that 6 Squadrons of our Horse had, in their march towards Podolia, met a strong Detachement of Turks and Tartars, who were returning to Caminiec with a rich Booty, and a great number of Christian Slaves; and charged them with that bravery and success, that they quite routed them; after which, they advanced upon the information they received from the Prisoners, towards Caminiec, to seize the Cattel that were feeding under the Walls of that place; Part of the Garison upon their approach sallied out, but being drawn into an Ambush, most of them were cut in pieces, and the rest taken Prisoners. It is said, the Enemy lost above 500 men in this occasion, and several thousand Head of Cattel, which our Men brought off. All our Advices from Moldavia assure us, that great Preparations are making on that side for the War.

Vienna, April 9: The most considerable alteration that was made here in the Capitulation of Canisa, is this; That whereas it was agreed, that the Garison should march out, so soon as the Wagons and other Conveniencies, that are to be provided for them, could be got ready, and that the Imperialists should in the mean time have possession only of one of the out Gates; it is now said, that the Turks, upon the arrival of the Emperor's Ratification, shall deliver up one of the principal Gates, but that they shall continue undisturbed in the place, till the said Wagons, &c. are provided. The Letters from Hermanstat, of the 28th past, tell us, that General Heussler had sent several Regiments, of the Imperial Forces quartered in Transylvania, towards Widin, Orsova, and Nissa, and that he was preparing to march himself with the rest. We have advice, that 150 Valachian Families are escaped from Lypoulhan, a Turkish Territory, and are come to Novi on the River Orma, desiring the Emperor's protection. And that on the 5th of the last Month, 200 Croats burnt a great Village called Kula, and killed 30 Turks that guarded it. We hear from Poland, that the Dyet has been again prolonged for 8 days, and it's hoped, things will go well there. A third Earthquake has almost quite destroyed the City of Insprucke.

Frankfort, April 13. We have an account from Neubourg, That the Marriage of the Prince of Parma with the Princess Dorothea Sophia Daughter to the Elector Palatine, was solemnized there on the 3d Instant, Prince Theodore

of Salsbach representing the Prince of Parma at this
Court; and that on the 5th, the Prince's would begin
his Journey towards Italy. The Fort which the Imperials
are building near Augst on the Frontiers of Switzer-
land, is almost finished. The Preparations for opening
the Campaign go on very vigorously. A great Magazine
is now raising at Hildesheim.

April 12. According to the last Advice from
Paris, we may expect our Fleet here before the end
of the Month. General Spaul is gone to visit the Beau-
seigneur's Camp in the County of Ely; which will
now very probably have their Quarters, and march towards
the Rhine. There will be 2000 Nienburgers in the
Field this Summer, besides 4000 that are to remain in
Gaulois.

April 15. The last Letters from Comminges
in the 10th Instant. That the 20th Instant is appointed
for the King's Army to do their Homage to his
Majesty's Ambassadors, that an Ambassador was sent
to Comminges his Accedion to the
League, and that the Court intend to return higher
about the middle of the next Month. In the meantime,
the French Army Troops march towards the Rhine, where
our Fleet will have, this Campaign, an Army of above
20000 Men, or his own Forces.

April 18. The Lauenburgers continue to
work with great diligence on the Fortifications of *Re-
ben*, which they hope to bring this Summer to perfection.
The Troops of *Allye* very quiet in their Quarters; but
those of *Hannover* have Orders to prepare for their March
We have from *Strasbourg*, that a general Review will be had
the beginning of the next Month, of the Swedish Forces
quartered in the Duchy of *Bremen*; Of which, 6000
Men are, this day, to march towards the *Rhein*, to join
the Imperial and Confederate Army.

April 21. Prince *Waldack* arrived the 14th
Instant at *Milpach*, where he was received by the *Gen-
eral* in Arms. The *Heer Dinkelman* took yesterday his
leave for the meeting of the Allies as Plenipotentiary from
the *Electors of Brandenburg*. The same day the Baron de
Leopold arrived here as Plenipotentiary from the *Electors of
Saxony*. The Letters from *France*
of the 18th Instant, contain the account we had by the
same Post of the return of the French Squadron to *Brise-
lay*, and that the same day were arrived there from *Ireland*; and
that the *Marquis de Bouchville* was daily expected with
the remainder of the Command. These Letters add, that they
were filled with the Impatience for the return of the Country,
which had been sent to the Duke of *Savoie*, to know his
Real Resolutions upon the Neutrality proposed to
him by the French King; who, in case he accepts of it,
promises to have *Verceil* and *Mantua* put into his
hands; and that, if he does not, to give into *Savoie* all
his Troops that are now quartered in *Dauphine*; giving
him, as he is told, but 48 hours to declare himself in
the manner wherein the French press him the more cur-
rently, for that they believe he inclines, by the advice of
the Prince of *Catignol*, and the *Marquis de Pavere* his
aid Minister, to join with the House of *Austria*.

April 15. Their Majesties Ships the *York*,
and the *Arcturion*, arrived here the 10th Instant, and sailed
again the next day to cruise to the westward. The
same day came in here the *Compassion*, with several Mer-
chant Ships under her Convoy, from the Eastward. And
yesterday several Dutch Men of War sailed by our Harbor
to the westward.

April 15. Yesterday was seen off of this
place a great number of Vessels with their Convoy bound for *Les-
land*, with the Forces they took in at *Brise-lay*. Major-
General *Baldwin's* Regiment is come hither, in order to
be quartered with the other Forces that are at present quartered
in *Brise-lay*, in *Ireland*.

April 14. On the 9th Instant Sir *Cloffe*,
with several other Men of War, and
a great number of Board Soldiers, Wagons, and Wagon
Horses, and a great many more, for the Army in *Ireland*, set sail
for *Brise-lay*, with a fair Wind. On the 10th, Colonel
Leopold arrived here, and about 1000 Men for Recruits,
which he had sent to *Hildesheim*, where they Embarked
yesterday, and set sail the 10th, and having had a fair
Wind, returned hither by they were at their Port the day
before yesterday of the King's Wagons, with their Horse
and Foot, and the like number we expect
to be here by the 15th. One or two Men of War coming
from *Brise-lay* with a Vessel, in which were 12 Irish Offi-
cers, and a great number of Men, who are brought Prisoners to *Hildes-*

April 15. The 13th Instant came to *Spire*,
a Dutch Man of War of 60 Guns, with 4 Fire-
ships, and 100 Men. And this day sailed from hence the

Forelight, with about 40 Sail of Merchant Ships, great
and small, under her Convoy for the Downs.
