WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it was enacted that, on and after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, or such later day as might be fixed for the purpose by Order in Council, the regulations contained in the Table marked C. in the schedule to the said Act should come into operation and be of the same force as if they were enacted in the body of the said Act, but that Her Majesty might from time to time, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by Order in Council annul or modify any of the said regulations, or make new regulations in addition thereto.

or in substitution therefor; and that any alterations in, or additions to such regulations, made in manner aforesaid, should be of the same force as

the regulations in the said schedule:

And whereas by the same Act it was further provided that, whenever it should be made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any foreign country was willing that the regulations for preventing collisions contained in Table C. in the schedule to the said Act, or such other regulations for preventing collisions as are for the time being in force under the said Act, should apply to the ships of such country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, Her Majesty might, by Order in Council, direct that such regulations should apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not:

And whereas it was further provided by the said Act that, whenever an Order in Council had been issued applying any regulation made by, or in pursuance of, the said Act to the ships of any foreign country, such ships should in all cases arising in any British court be deemed to be subject to such regulation, and should, for the purpose of such regulation, be treated as if they were British ships:

And whereas by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the said recited Act, and dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, Her Majesty was pleased to direct that, on and after the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the regulations contained in the schedule thereto should, so far as regards British ships and boats, be substituted for the regulations then in force, and contained in the first schedule to an Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine:

And whereas since the date of the above-named Order in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred eighty-four, it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of Turkey is willing that the said regulations appended to the said Order, and to this Order, shall apply to Turkish ships when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction:

And whereas the said Government of Turkey is desirous that Article numbered 12 of the said regulations shall, as applied to Turkish ships, be modified as follows, viz.: that in lieu of, and in substitution for, the bell required by the said article to be provided and used as a sound signal for fog, &c., there may be placed and kept on board Turkish ships an efficient drum, which shall be sounded under the same circumstances, and at the same intervals, as by the 'said Article

a bell is required to be rung:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the said regulations appended to the said Order in Council bearing date the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and to this Order, shall, on and after the date hereof, apply to ships belonging to the said Government of Turkey, whether within British jurisdiction or not; and the Regulations shall be substituted as regards Turkish ships and boats, for the regulations contained in the first schedule to the Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine:

Provided, however, that it shall not be necessary for the bell required by Article numbered used on board steam and sailing ships as a sound signal for fog, &c., to be placed and kept on board Turkish ships, but that, in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor there may be placed and kept on board such Turkish ships an efficient drum, which shall be sounded under the same circumstances, and at the same intervals, as by the said Article a bell is required to be rung. REGULATIONS for preventing Collisions at Sea, approved by Order in Council, dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

ART. 1. In the following rules every steam ship which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a sailing ship; and every steam ship which is under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a ship under steam.

Rules concerning Lights.

ART. 2. The lights mentioned in the following Articles, numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 11, and no others, shall be carried in all weathers, from sunset to sunrise.

ART. 3. A seagoing steam ship when under way

shall carry-

- (a.) On or in front of the foremast, at a height above the hull of not less than 20 feet, and if the breadth of the ship exceeds 20 feet, then at a height above the hull not less than such breadth, a bright white light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz., from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least five miles.
- (b.) On the starboard side, a green light so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the starboard side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.
- (c.) On the port side, a red light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the port side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.

(d.) The said green and red side lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least three feet forward from the light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across

the bow.

ART.'4. A steam ship, when towing another ship, shall, in addition to her side lights carry two bright white lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 3 feet apart, so as to distinguish her from other steam ships. Each of these lights shall be of the same construction and character, and shall be carried in the same position as the white light which other steam ships are required to carry.

ART. 5. (a.) A ship, whether a steam ship or a sailing ship, which from any accident is not under command, shall at night carry, in the same position as the white light which steam ships are required to carry, and, if a steam ship, in place of that 12 of the said regulations to be provided and I light, three red lights in globular lanterns, each

not-less than 10 inches in diameter, in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 3 feet apart, and of such a character as to be visible, on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles; and shall by day carry in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 3 feet apart, in front of but not lower than her foremast head, three black balls or shapes, each 2 feet in diameter.

(b.) A ship, whether a steam ship or a sailing ship, employed in laying or in picking up a telegraph cable, shall at night carry, in the same position as the white light which steam ships are required to carry, and, if a steam ship, in place of that light, three lights in globular lanterns, each not less than 10 inches in diameter, in a vertical line over one another, not less than 6 feet apart; the highest and lowest of these lights shall be red, and the middle light shall be white, and they shall be of such a character that the red lights shall be visible at the same distance as the white light. By day she shall carry in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, in front of but not lower than her foremast head, three shapes not less than 2 feet in diameter, of which the top and bottom shall be globular in shape and red in colour, and the middle one diamond in shape and white.

(c.) The ships referred to in this Article, when not making any way through the water, shall not carry the side lights, but when making way

shall carry them.

(d.) The lights and shapes required to be shown by this Article are to be taken by other ships as signals that the ship showing them is not under command, and cannot therefore get out of the way. The signals to be made by ships in distress and requiring assistance are contained in Article 27.

ART. 6. A sailing ship under way, or being towed shall carry the same lights as are provided by Article 3 for a steam ship under way, with the exception of the white light, which she shall never carry.

ART. 7. Whenever, as in the case of small vessels during bad weather, the green and red side lights cannot be fixed, these lights shall be kept on deck, on their respective sides of the vessel, ready for use; and shall on the approach of or to other vessels, be exhibited on their respective sides in sufficient time to prevent collision, in such manner as to make them most visible, and so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side.

To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the colour of the light they respectively contain, and shall be pro-

vided with proper screens.

ART. 8. A ship, whether a steam ship or a sailing ship, when at anchor, shall carry, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a white light, in a globular lantern of not less than 8 inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon, at a distance of at least one mile.

ART. 9. A pilot vessel, when engaged on her station on pilotage duty, shall not carry the lights required for other vessels, but shall carry a white light at the masthead, visible all round the horizon, and shall also exhibit a flare-up light or flare-up lights at short intervals, which shall never exceed fifteen minutes.

fifteen minutes.

A pilot vessel, when not engaged on her station on pilotage duty, shall carry lights similar to those of other ships.

ART. 10. Open boats and fishing vessels of less than 20 tons net registered tonnage, when under way and when not having their nets, trawls, dredges, or lines in the water, shall not be obliged to carry the coloured side lights; but every such boat and vessel shall in lieu thereof have ready at hand a lantern with a green glass on the one side and a red glass on the other side, and on approaching to or being approached by another vessel such lantern shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side.

The following portion of this Article applies only to fishing vessels and boats when in the sea off the coast of Europe lying north of Cape

Finisterre:

(a.) All fishing vessels and fishing boats of 20 tons net registered tonnage, or upwards, when under way and when not required by the following regulations in this Article to carry and show the lights therein named, shall carry and show the same lights as other vessels under way.

- (b.) All vessels when engaged in fishing with drift nets shall exhibit two white lights from any part of the vessel where they can be best seen. Such lights shall be placed so that the vertical distance between them shall be not less than 6 feet and not more than 10 feet; and so that the horizontal distance between them measured in a line with the keel of the vessel shall be not less than 5 feet and not more than 10 feet. The lower of these two lights shall be the more forward, and both of them shall be of such a character, and contained in lanterns of such construction as to show all round the horizon, on a dark night with a clear atmosphere, for a distance of not less than three miles.
- (c.) A vessel employed in line fishing with her lines out shall carry the same lights as a vessel when engaged in fishing with drift nets.
- (d.) If a vessel when fishing becomes stationary in consequence of her gear getting fast to a rock or other obstruction, she shall show the light and make the fog signal for a vessel at anchor
- (e.) Fishing vessels and open boats may at any time use a flare-up in addition to the lights which they are by this Article required to carry and show. All flare-up lights exhibited by a vessel when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag net shall be shown at the after part of the vessel, excepting that, if the vessel is hanging by the stern to her trawl, dredge, or drag net, they shall be exhibited from the bow.
- (f.) Every fishing vessel and every open boat when at anchor between sunset and sunrise shall exhibit a white light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.
- (g.) In fog, mist, or falling snow, a drift net vessel attached to her nets and a vessel when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag net, and a vessel employed in line fishing with her lines out, shall at intervals of not more than two minutes make a blast with her fog horn and ring her bell alternately.

ART. 11. A ship which is being overtaken by another shall show from her stern to such last-mentioned ship, a white light or a flare-up light.

Sound Signals for Fog, &c.

ART. 12. A steam ship shall be provided with

a steam whistle or other efficient steam sound signal, so placed that the sound may not be intercepted by any obstructions, and with an efficient fog horn to be sounded by a bellows or other mechanical means, and also with an efficient bell.* A sailing ship shall be provided with a similar fog horn and bell.

In fog, mist, or falling snow, whether by day or night, the signals described in this Article shall

be used as follows; that is to say,

(a.) A steam ship under way shall make with her steam whistle, or other steam sound signal, at intervals of not more than two minutes, a prolonged blast.

- (b.) A sailing ship under way shall make with her fog horn, at intervals of not more than two minutes, when on the starboard tack one blast, when on the port tack two blasts in succession, and when with the wind abaft the beam three blasts in succession.
- (c.) A steam ship and a sailing ship, when not under way shall, at intervals of not more than two minutes, ring the bell.

Speed of Ships to be moderate in Fog, &c.

ART. 13. Every ship, whether a sailing ship or steam ship, shall, in a fog, mist, or falling snow, go at a moderate speed.

Steering and Sailing Rules.

ART. 14. When two sailing ships are approaching one another, so as to involve risk of collision, one of them shall keep out of the way of the other, as follows, viz. :-

(a.) A ship which is running free shall keep out of the way of a ship which is closehauled.

- (b.) A ship which is close-hauled on the port tack shall keep out of the way of a ship which is close-hauled on the starboard tack
- (c.) When both are running free with the wind on different sides, the ship which has the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the other.
- (d.) When both are running free with the wind on the same side, the ship which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the ship which is to leeward.
- (e.) A ship which has the wind aft shall keep out of the way of the other ship.

ART. 15. If two ships under steam are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, each shall alter her course to starboard, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

This Article only applies to cases where ships are meeting end on, or nearly end on, in such a manner as to involve risk of collision, and does not apply to two ships which must, if both keep on their respective courses, pass clear of each other.

The only cases to which it does apply are, when each of the two ships is end on, or nearly end on, to the other; in other words, to cases in which, by day, each ship sees the masts of the other in a line, or nearly in a line, with her own; and by night, to cases in which each ship is in such a position as to see both the side lights of the other.

It does not apply by day to cases in which a ship sees another ahead crossing her own course; or by night, to cases where the red light of one ship is opposed to the red light of the other, or where the green light of one ship is opposed to the green light of the other, or where a red light without a green

light, or a green light without a red light, is seen ahead, or where both green and red lights are seen anywhere but ahead.

ART. 16. If two ships under steam are crossing, so as to involve risk of collision, the ship which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

ART. 17. If two ships, one of which is a sailing ship, and the other a steam ship, are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam ship shall keep out of the way of the sailing

ART. 18. Every steam ship, when approaching another ship, so as to involve risk of collision, shall slacken her speed or stop and reverse, if necessary

ART. 19. In taking any course authorised or required by these Regulations, a steam ship under way may indicate that course to any other ship which she has in sight by the following signals on her steam whistle, viz. :-

One short blast to mean "I'am directing my course to starboard":

Two short blasts to mean "I am directing my course to port":

Three short blasts to mean "I am going full speed astern."

The use of these signals is optional; but if they are used, the course of the ship must be in accordance with the signal made.

ART. 20. Notwithstanding anything contained in any preceding Article, every ship, whether a sailing ship or a steam ship, overtaking any other, shall keep out of the way of the overtaken ship.

ART. 21. In narrow channels every steam ship shall, when it is safe and practicable, keep to that side of the fairway or mid-channel which lies on the starboard side of such ship.

ART. 22. Where by the above rules one of two ships is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course.

ART. 23. In obeying and construing these rules due regard shall be had to all dangers of navigation; and to any special circumstances which may render a departure from the above rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

No Ship, under any circumstances, to neglect proper Precautions.

ART. 24. Nothing in these rules shall exonerate any ship, or the owner, or master, or crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper look-out, or of the neglect of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen, or by the special circumstances of the

Reservation of Rules for Harbours and Inland Navigation.

ART. 25. Nothing in these rules shall interfere with the operation of a special rule, duly made by local authority, relative to the navigation of any harbour, river, or inland navigation.

Special Lights for Squadrons and Convoys. ART. 26. Nothing in these rules shall interfere

with the operation of any special rules made by the Government of any nation with respect to additional station and signal lights for two or more ships of war or for ships sailing under convoy.

ART. 27. When a ship is in distress and requires assistance from other ships or from the shore, the following shall be the signals to be used or displayed by her, either together or separately, that is to say :-

In the daytime-

1. A gun fired at intervals of about a minute;

^{*} In all cases where the regulations require a bell to be used, a drum will be substituted on board Turkish

2. The International Code signal of distress indicated by N C;

3. The distant signal, consisting of a square flag, having either above or below it a ball or anything resembling a ball.

At night-

1. A gun fired at intervals of about a minute;

 Flames on the ship (as from a burning tar barrel, oil barrel, &c.);

3. Rockets or shells throwing stars of any colour or description, fired one at a time, at short intervals.

WHEREAS, by the four hundred and tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy or beacon Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of every ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by and subject to which the light dues authorized to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected.

And whereas the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses are erecting a new lighthouse on the Oxcars Rocks in the Firth of Forth, and a light

will shortly be exhibited therefrom;

Now therefore Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, from and after the exhibition of the said light, there shall be paid in respect thereof for every vessel, whether British or foreign, which shall pass into or out of the inner basin of the Firth of Forth through the Queen's Ferry, or which shall cross to the westward of an imaginary line drawn from Burntisland to Granton, or which shall trade between ports within the area enclosed by said imaginary line and Queen's Ferry, inclusive, but excluding Burntisland and Granton, a toll of eight-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom if on an oversea voyage, and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom if on a coasting voyage.

The said tolls shall be levied subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the New Consolidated Table of Light Duties sanctioned by Orders in Council dated, respectively, the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the Order in Council dated the twentyfirst day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and also in the special section of the Consolidated Tables prepared in pursuance of an Order in Council dated the sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, or to such other regulations and exemptions as may from time to time be duly sanctioned, and subject also to the gross abatement or discount of seventy per centum mentioned in an Order in Council dated the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, or to such other abatement or discount as may for the C. L. Peel. time being be in force.

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be post-

poned as follows, viz.:

In the parish churchyard of Stanwix, in the county of Cumberland, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In that part of the parish churchyard of Old Windsor which was added thereto in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, to the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Towcester, in the county of Northampton, to the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred

and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Northfleet, in the county of Kent, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Exning, in the county of Suffolk, to the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the churchyard at Lyndhurst, in the county of Hants, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

of June, 1885, by the Governing Body of the Queen's College, Oxford, have been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

"Whereas by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, clause 54; it is provided that a Statute made by the Commissioners for a College may after the cesser of the powers of the Commissioners be subject to alteration from time to time by statutes made by the College under the said Act, and not otherwise. And whereas

the Governing Body of the Queen's College, in the University of Oxford, did, at a General Meeting specially summoned for the purpose, unanimously make the following Statutes, altering some of the Statutes made by the Commissioners as is hereinafter set forth. And whereas it is provided by the aforesaid Act, clause 55, that Statutes so made shall be submitted to the Queen in Council, and proceeded on as is by the aforesaid Act provided.

"Now we the Provost and Scholars of the said College, being the Governing Body thereof, humbly submit the following Statutes to the Queen in Council, to be proceeded on as is in the aforesaid

Act provided :-

THE STATUTES.

" In Statute III:-

1. 1. Vessels arriving at the Black Sea ports from Spanish ports are subject to observation and purification during 14 days, according to the instruction confirmed on the 12th September,

1884, by the Minister of Interior.

2. If, after the sanitary examination of the crew and passengers and inspection of the vessel and her cargo made by the quarantine department, the Captain of the vessel with a clean patent will declare his consent to begin the systematic purification for his own account, then the observation will continue only seven days.

3. Subject to the systematic purification are:—Rags of every description, clothing, underclothing, bed clothing, especially such as was in use and is dirty and not washed, old cloth, portions of animals of every kind, different kinds of rubbish, skins, hides, hair, bristles, feathers, wool, felt, &c.; forecastle, cabins, and hold; also crew and passengers.

4. Vessels arriving at Baltic ports from Spanish ports with the clean patents are subject to strict sanitary inspection; vessels without clean patent are altogether forbidden to enter the Baltic ports.
