HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninetyseven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eleventh day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consoli-dated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew situate within the limits of the parish of Kingsbury in the county of Middlesex and in the Diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Kingsbury and of the parish of Willesden in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situated at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Kingsbury and of the said parish of Willesden should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew situate within the limits of the parish of Kingsbury as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony

Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London the patrons both of the vicarage of the said parish of Kingsbury and also of the vicarage of the said parish of Willesden (in testimony whereof they the said Dean and Chapter have affixed their corporate or capitular seal to this representation), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Kings-bury and of the said parish of Willesden which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew situate within the limits of the parish of Kingsbury as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Neasden-cum-Kingsbury.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

" The Consolidated Chapelry of Neasden-cum-Kingsbury being :-

"I. All that portion of the parish of Kingsbury in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London which is bounded on the north by an imaginary line commencing at the point in Woodlane where the boundary which divides the said parish of Kingsbury from the parish of Hendon in the county and diocese aforesaid diverges from such lane in a south-easterly direction the said point being near to the junction of the same lane with the church path leading to the church of Saint Andrew Kingsbury and extending then first northwestward and then westward along the middle of last-named lane for a distance of thirty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Churchlane and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction on the northern side of Fryent Farmhouse with the public footpath which leads into the road called or known as Salmon-street and extending thence, that is, from the last-described point of junction westward along the middle of the said footpath whereof he the said Bishop has signed and sealed for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts

to its junction at or near to Hillhouse Farmhouse with the road called or known as Salmon-street aforesaid and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to its junction with the public footpath which leads towards Preston and Kenton and extending thence first generally westward and then south-westward along the middle of the last-described footpath for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Kingsbury from the new parish of Saint John Wembly in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Kingsbury aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides, other than upon the north as aforesaid, that is to say, on the west, the south, the south-east, and the north-east, as follows, on the west and on the south by the new parish of Saint John Wembly aforesaid on the south-east by the parish of Willesden and on the north-east by the parish of Hendon aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Willesden wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Kingsbury from the parish of Willesden aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Metropolitan Railway over the River Brent and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of rather more than a mile thereby crossing under the line of the Midland and South-Western Junction Railway to the boundary at the centre of the bridge which carries Dudden Hill-lane over the line of the Metropolitan Railway aforesaid which boundary divides the said parish of Willesden from the district of Saint Andrew Willesden in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Willesden aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the south-west as aforesaid, that is to say, upon the south-east and north-east and the north-west, as follows, upon the south-east by the district of Saint Andrew Willesden aforesaid upon the northeast partly by the new parish of All Saints Childs Hill Hendon in the county and diocese aforesaid and partly by the said parish of Hendon and upon the north-west partly by the said parish of Hendon and partly by the hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Kingsbury aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London. PRESENT The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the

chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid hefore Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eleventh day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following, that is to say :-

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Saint Peter at Gowts in the city of Lincoln and in the diocese of Lincoln between that benefice and a certain other benefice namely the benefice (being a perpetual curacy or a vicarage) of Saint Andrew which said last named benefice is also situate in the same city and diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas the Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln is the patron in right of his See both of the said benefice of Saint Peter at Gowts and also of the said benefice of Saint Andrew.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Saint Andrew is at present insufficiently endowed and that the said benefice of Saint Peter at Gowts has endowments of such an amount as that after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments, the said benefice of Saint Peter at Gowts will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln is of opinion, and we are of opinion, that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the parish of Saint Andrew in the city of Lincoln aforesaid, by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Saint Peter at Gowts in the same city which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Saint Peter at Gowts is now full; the Reverend James Weston Townroe, Clerk in Holy Orders, being the present incumbent thereof.

"And whereas the said James Weston Townroe, has, as hereinafter appears consented that the apportionment hereinafter recommended and proposed of the income of the said benefice of Saint Peter at Gowts shall be an immediate apportionment.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Archbishop of Canterbury acting as Archbishop of the Province within which each of the said two benefices is situate and with the consent of the said Edward Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln acting as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof the said Archbishop has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his archiepiscopal seal, and the said Bishop has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said James Weston Townroe, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and as from the day on which such Order shall be so published in the London Gazette all the tithe rent-charges Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, glebe lands and all (if any) other the endowments may thereafter belong to the said benefice of Saint Peter at Gowts in the city and diocese of Lincoln shall be charged and for ever thereafter chargeable in favour of the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Andrew in the same city and diocese of Lincoln, with the annual sum or yearly charge hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, a clear annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred and seventy-five pounds, the same annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred and seventyfive pounds to be as from the day aforesaid due and payable to the incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Andrew in the city and diocese of Lincoln and the same annual sum or yearly charge to be apportionable between any outgoing incumbent of that benefice or his representative on the one hand and his successors in the same incumbency on the other hand and to be receivable by the incumbent in whose favour it is charged as aforesaid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in every

"And we further recommend and propose that the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Andrew in the city and diocese of Lincoln shall have the powers hereinafter specified for recovering the said rent-charge of one hundred and seventy-five pounds per annum hereby proposed to be created in favour of the benefice of which he is incumbent as aforesaid, that is to say; power, if and whenever any part of the said rent-charge shall at any time be unpaid for twenty-one days after any of the times appointed for the payment thereof (although there shall not have been any legal demand made thereof) to enter into the receipt of the endowments charged therewith or any part thereof and to receive and take the same until he shall thereby or otherwise be paid and satisfied the same rent-charge and the arrears thereof due at the time of such entry or afterwards to become due during his being in possession of the same premises together with all costs and expenses occasioned by the non-payment thereof and for the purpose of collecting receiving and recovering such endowments or any of them to use exercise and enjoy all such powers and remedies for collecting recovering and enforcing payment thereof and of the annual sums payable for or towards the raising or making up the same as may be statutably exercised or exerciseable by him under the law then in force: Provided always that if at any time the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Peter at Gowts in the city and diocese of Lincoln shall by any deed duly executed by him under his hand and seal in accordance with the provisions of any statute in that behalf enabling him grant convey and annex to the said benefice of Saint Andrew in the same city and diocese any part or parts of the endowments belonging to the said benefice of Saint Peter at Gowts which shall in the opinion of the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being be a good and fair equivalent or not less than an equivalent for the said yearly charge of one hundred and seventy-five pounds hereby proposed to be created as aforesaid then the same annual sum or yearly charge of one hundred and seventy-five pounds shall thereupon and thenceforth sease and determine and be no longer payable as hereinbefore recommended and proposed.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts

which shall on the day aforesaid belong or which or of either of them or of any other Act of may thereafter belong to the said benefice of Saint | Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

say:—
"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety - four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirtysecond and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint Ann, Hanger-lane, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, by adding to that cure certain portions of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill and of the parish of Saint Mary Stoke Newington both in the county and dircese aforesaid.

"Whereas by the authority of an instrument bearing date the eighth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one and being under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and also under the hand and seal of the then Bishop of London a certain part of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Tottenham in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London aforesaid was assigned as a particular district to the church of Saint Ann situate at Hanger-lane in the said new parish and was called 'The Particular District of Saint Ann, Hanger-lane' and the same particular district has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four, since become a new parish of the character con-templated by that Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them ... "And whereas it has been represented to us in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, and it appears to us to be expedient that the

boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane should be extended in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Ann, Hanger-lane, shall be altered by way of extension so that they shall include all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Stamford Hill, which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured green, and also all that portion of the parish of Saint Mary Stoke Newington aforesaid which is also described in the schedule hereunder written and is likewise delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink and that from and after the said day of publication as aforesaid and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portion of the new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill and also the said portion of the parish of Saint Mary Stoke Newington aforesaid so to be included as aforesaid shall become annexed to and together be and form part of the new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane aforesaid.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of

Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Ann, Hanger-lane, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London

"I. All that portion of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill in the said county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London aforesaid which is bounded on the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill from the district of Saint Andrew Stoke Newington in the county and diocese aforesaid at a point at the centre of the bridge which carries Amhurst Park-road over the high level line of the Great Eastern Railway, at the entrance to the Stamford Hill Railway Station, and extending thence northward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to the boundary near to the northern end of the said railway station which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill from the new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane aforesaid all which said hereinbefore described portion of the said new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the east as aforesaid that is to say, upon the north upon the west and upon the south as follows:-upon the north by the said new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane upon the west by the hereinafter described portion of the parish of Saint Mary Stoke Newington in the county [

All that portion of the parish of Saint Mary Stoke Newington aforesaid which is bounded on the south partly by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named parish from that portion of the parish of Hornsey which is comprised within the limits of Finsbury Park at a point on the western side of Green Lanes Bridge which carries the road called or known as Green-lanes over the New River and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said New River for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Mary Stoke Newington from the district of Saint Andrew Stoke Newington aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Saint Mary Stoke Newington aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining part of the south and upon all other sides, that is to say: - upon the east upon the north and upon the west as follows upon the remaining part of the south by the district of Saint Andrew Stoke Newington aforesaid upon the east by the hereinbefore described portion of the new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill aforesaid upon the north by the new parish of Saint Ann Hanger-lane aforesaid and upon the west by the hereinbefore mentioned portion of the parish of Hornsey aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty chapter forty-one and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eighteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words and figures following, that is to say :-

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter forty-one, otherwise known as 'The Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850' and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now

humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for setting out and constituting a district for spiritual purposes and annexing such district to the consecrated church of Saint Mark situate in Holland-steet, Newton Heath, within the limits of the new parish (sometime district under the above-mentioned Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter forty-one) of Saint Philip Bradford-road Manchester in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district for spiritual purposes should be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Mark situate in Holland-street Newton Heath as aforesaid, which church was not consecrated under the provisions of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty

chapter thirty-seven.

" Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Philip Bradford-road Manchester which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme be severed and disannexed from such new parish and shall be set out and constituted for and annexed to the said church of Saint Mark situate in Holland-street, Newton Heath as aforesaid and shall become and be a district for spiritual purposes and shall be named 'The District of Saint Mark Holland-street Newton Heath.'

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinnamed Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Mark, Holland-street, Newton Heath, being :--

"All that part of the new parish (sometime district under The Parish of Manchester Division Act 1850') of Saint Philip Bradford-road Man-chester within the original limits of the parish of Manchester in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which is bounded upon the west and upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of the Rochdale Canal two and a half chains or thereabouts to the south-west of Royle's Bridge at which point the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Philip Bradford-road Munchester of the new parish of Saint Luke Miles Platting also within the original limits of the parish of Manchester aforesaid and of the new parish of Saint Barnabas Manchester also within the original limits of the said parish of Manchester are joined by the boundary which divides the township of Newton from the township of Manchester and extending thence first south-westward then southward and then north-eastward along the said township boundary for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts thereby following from Marcerstreet the course of the said township boundary as authorized by the Act of the 34th and 35th Vict. cap. 65 ('The Manchester Improvement Act

1871') and as defined and shown on the plan referred to in the 31st section of that Act and upon the map hereunto annexed, and also thereby following from Templar-street the middle of Sandal-street to the point where the new course of the said township boundary rejoins the old course of the same township boundary and continuing thence that is from the said township boundary still in precisely the last-named direction that is north-eastward and in a straight line along the middle of Sandal-street aforesaid for a distance of 10 chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the same street with Hulme Halllane, which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Philip Bradford-road Manchester from the new parish of Saint Luke Miles Platting within the original limits of the parish of Manchester as aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore described part of the new parish of Saint Philip Bradford-road Manchester aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the west and the south-east as aforesaid that is to say upon the north-east and upon the north-west by the new parish of Saint Luke Miles Platting aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbent of the new parish out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

parochial chapelry of Church within the original of the bridge which carries the same line of raillimits of the parish of Whalley in the county of way over the stream called or known as Fexhill Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul situate in the township of Oswaldtwistle as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parochial chapelry of Church which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Paul situate in the township of Oswaldtwistle as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul Oswaldtwistle.'

"And with the like consent of the said James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Paul, situate in the township of Oswaldtwistle as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Paul Oswaldtwisle being:-

"All that part of the parochial chapelry of chapelry of Church within the original limits of the parish of Whalley in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which is bounded upon the west partly by the new parish of Saint Peter and Saint Paul Rishton, partly by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Oswald Knuzden and partly by the new parish of Oswaldtwisle all in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the southwest by the last-named new parish upon the east by the new parish of Saint James Accrington both which two last-named cures are within the original limits of the parish of Whalley aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the north by an imaginary line commencing at the point at or near to the reservoir at Alleytroyds where the line of the East Lancashire Railway crosses the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Accrington from the pargchial chapelry of Church aforesaid and extending thence westward along the middle of the same line of railway for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts (thereby passing through the Church Railway (passenger) Station) to the centre

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in and when opened are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers given and reserved to us in and by the Post Office (Duties) Act, 1860, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners (by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. All letters received by the post on their own private concerns by commissioned, warrant, and subordinate officers in the Navy or Her Majesty's Indian Naval Forces, and by Commissioned and warrant officers in the Army or Royal Marines, or Her Majesty's Indian Military Forces, and by seamen employed in Her Majesty's Navy, and by non-commissioned officers and private soldiers in Her Majesty's Regular Forces, Militia, Colonial Corps, or Royal Marines, and by non-commissioned officers, private soldiers, and seamen in Her Majesty's Indian Military and Naval Forces, whilst respectively actually employed in Her Majesty's Service, shall be delivered to all such persons respectively free of foreign postage chargeable on or in respect of redirection on such letters when such letters shall have been redirected and again forwarded by the post and transmitted

or sent through any foreign country.

2. Every such letter so received by the post by any non-commissioned officer, private soldier, or seaman, under or by virtue of this Warrant, must not exceed half an ounce in weight, and the postage of every such letter (unless the same be sent from parts beyond the seas) must be paid (or every such letter if posted within the United Kingdom must be duly and properly stamped) upon putting it into a post office established under the authority of the Postmaster-General, and must be directed to every such non-commissioned officer, private soldier, or seaman, specifying on the superscription thereof the regiment, corps, or detachment, or the vessel to which he shall belong, and the postmaster of the place to which such letter shall be sent to be delivered must not deliver such letter to any person except the noncommissioned officer, private soldier, or seaman to whom it shall be directed, or to some person appointed to receive the same by writing under the hand of the officer in command, and whenever any such letter so to be received by any such noncommissioned officer, private soldier, or seaman, shall be sent from parts beyond the seas without the postage of one penny being prepaid thereon, every such letter must be charged to the party receiving the same with a rate of twopence. And whenever any such letter so to be received by any such non-commissioned officer, private soldier, or seaman shall be conveyed by private ships, the gratuities payable by law to the masters of such vessels in respect of such letters must in all cases be paid to the post office, in addition to the postage.

3. In all cases in which a letter is sent by the post on his own private concerns addressed to any commissioned, warrant, or subordinate officer in the Navy, or in Her Majesty's Indian Naval Forces, or to any commissioned or warrant officer in the Army or Royal Marines, or in Her Majesty's Indian Military Forces, whilst respectively actually employed in Her Majesty's Service, and before the delivery of such letter at the place of its address, the officer to whom it shall be addressed, shall, in the execution of his duty, have removed from that place to any other place (whether at home or abroad), every such letter shall be directed to such officer at such other place, and shall he forwarded to the letter place, and

postage, British or Colonial, chargeable by law on or in respect of such re-direction, shall be and the same is hereby remitted, and such officer shall not be charged with more than the postage which would have been payable for such re-directed letter in case the same had been delivered at the place to which it was originally addressed.

4. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed according to the respective interpretations of the like terms and expressions contained or referred to in the Post

Office (Duties) Act, 1840.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, on and from which date the Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, dated the twenty-second day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, shall be repealed.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Interpretation Clause.

1.—(1.) The expressions "Parcels" and "Parcel" in this Warrant respectively mean any postal packet, which is posted or tendered for transmission by post as a parcel, in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same, in the United Kingdom, addressed to Malta, or posted or tendered for transmission by post as aforesaid in Malta, addressed to the United Kingdom.

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

(3.) The expression "Lord-Lieutenant" means the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being.

(4.) The expression "arms" includes any cannon, gun, revolver, pistol, and any description of fire-arms, also any sword, cutlass, pike, and bayonet, also any part of any arms as so defined.

(5.) The expression "ammunition" includes bullets, gunpowder, nitro-glycerine, dynamite, gun cotton, and every other explosive substance, whether fitted for use with any arms or otherwise.

(6.) The expression "prohibited district in Ireland" means any place in Ireland in respect of which the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council in Ireland, may have made or may make orders for prohibiting or regulating therein the sale or importation of arms and ammunition.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

2. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant any Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches, or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel), or which shall exceed in weight seven pounds.

Rates of Postage.

On every Parcel not exceeding one pound in

weight, eight pence.

Prepayment.

4. The postage chargeable according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned respectively shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall, in the United Kingdom, be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps.

Times of Posting.

5. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland, on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed

by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

6. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall, in the United Kingdom, be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public by the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

7. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:—

(1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at

the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

(3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall be paid by means of postage stamps affixed to such Parcel, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration as aforesaid, and until such Parcel has been so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon shall have been properly paid: and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration and without being so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon properly paid as aforesaid, such Parcel shall be detained, and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

8. Any packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter-box or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say:—

(1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as

the case may be).

(2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, the same may be forwarded to its destination as a Parcel charged with the sum of three pence in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel.

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may if he think fit from time to time authorize such officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Retention of Parcels at Postes Restantes.

10. Any Parcel addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom "to be called for" shall, if not called for, remain in such office for a period of one week after the date of the arrival of such Parcel thereat, and shall then be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Parcels for Places beyond limits of free Delivery.

11. If the place of address in the United Kingdom of any Parcel be beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district to which the same may be forwarded by post, such Parcel shall be detained at the nearest Post Office until an opportunity of delivering the same shall occur, or in default of any such opportunity until a period of one week shall have elapsed from the time of the receipt of the Parcel at such Post Office. Upon the expiration of such period without such Parcel having been called for, such Parcel shall be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Parcels addressed to Ships.

12. Any Parcel addressed to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom shall, if from any cause such Parcel cannot be delivered at such ship, be detained at the Post Office at such port for a period of one calendar month, and if not delivered at the expiration of that time such Parcel shall be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

13. With regard to

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within the respective times in this Warrant specified in that behalf; and

(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon,

or for any other sufficient reason.

The following provisions shall apply, that is to say:—

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined.

(2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel, or the Declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given by Post to the sender (and in the case of a Parcel posted in Malta such notice shall be given by the Post Office of that place) that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender or his agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be returned to him by post, in either case upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned.

- (3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), and in the case of a Parcel posted in Malta, notice shall also be given to the Post Office of that place, that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender or his agent, or be returned to the sender by post.
- (4.) In any case the notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who in the Postmaster-General's judgment is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.
- (5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.
- (6.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of the "Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."
- (7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of the sum of one penny in respect of every day or part of a day during which the Parcel remains at the place appointed as aforesaid after the expiration of three calendar months from the day on which the Parcel has arrived at such place.
- (8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable shall be prepaid by the sender in stamps before the return of the parcel to him.

(9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof

to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

- (10.) Where no application is made for, a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.
- (11.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General it becomes offensive or injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel, have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Re-direction of Parcels.

14. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel if it had been a Parcel posted in the United Kingdom for delivery at an address in the United Kingdom.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

15. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed:

Prohibitions.

16. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post any Parcel consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene picture, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, print, book, or card, or any indecent or obscene article or thing of any other kind, or any Parcel having thereon, or on the cover thereof, any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character, and if any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which prima facie appears to be, or which any Officer of the Post Office may have reasonable cause to suspect to be a Parcel within the description aforesaid, the same shall be detained, opened. and examined, and if on such examination it be found to infringe this or any other of the Regulations contained in this or any other Treasury Warrant relating to the Post Office, it may be dealt with and disposed of in any manner which may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

17. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for

conveyance by post:-

(1.) Any Parcel containing any substance, material, article, or thing of any kind what-soever, which might, in the course of transmission through the post, be or become, or be rendered injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or any other person who may deal

with such Parcel, or to any bag, basket, box, or other receptacle in or by which such parcel may be conveyed by post, or to any other Parcel or other contents of any such receptacle.

(2.) Any Parcel consisting of or enclosing any bladder or other membraneous substance containing a liquid of any kind.

(3.) Any Parcel containing a live animal of

any kind whatsoever.

(4.) Any Parcel which either from the nature of the contents thereof, or from the absence of proper packing or covering, is, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General or his officers, likely to injure any person in the course of the conveyance of the Parcel through the post, or any receptacle in or by which such Parcel may be conveyed by post, or any other Parcel or any other contents of such receptacle.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

18. There shall not be posted or tendered for conveyance by post any Parcel consisting of or containing more than one Parcel or other Postal Packet, where any one of such Packets is intended for delivery to a person other than the addressee of such Parcel, and if any such Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post the contents thereof, so far as the same consist of Parcels, may be forwarded to the addressees of such Parcels charged with new and distinct rates of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and so far as the same consist of other Postal Packets, may be treated and charged as unpaid Postal Packets, or such Parcel may be otherwise dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

19. There shall not be conveyed or tendered or delivered for conveyance by post in or to any prohibited district in Ireland or to Malta, any Parcel containing arms or ammunition, and any such Parcel, if posted or tendered or delivered for conveyance by post as aforesaid, may be detained and opened and returned to the sender thereof, or otherwise dealt with according to law.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

20. In any case not hereinbefore expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for safety of Parcels.

21. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

22. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage.
23. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect or in consequence of any loss of or damage to any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

24. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of the "Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

25. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

26. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.
