THE Queen has been pleased to declare and ordain that His Serene Highness Prince Henry Maurice of Battenberg shall henceforth, upon all occasions whatsoever, be styled and called "His Royal Highness," before his name and such titles as now do, or hereafter may, belong to him: And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

At the Court at Osborne, July 22, 1885.

THE Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by Letters Patent under Her Royal Sign Manual and the Great Seal of the Order, bearing date this day, to dispense with all the Statutes and regulations usually observed in regard to Installation, and to grant unto His Royal Highness Prince Henry Maurice of Battenberg, Knight of the said Most Noble Order, and duly invested with the Ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the aforesaid Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if His Royal Highness had been formally installed; any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) TRANSFER OF PARTS OF DISTRICTS ACT, 1884.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council approved on the 20th day of July, 1885, of an Agreement bearing date the 29th day of June, 1885, made between the Justices of the Peace of the county of Hereford in General Quarter Sessions assembled of the one part, and the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the city of Hereford of the other part, for the formation of a Joint Committee of such Local Authorities under section 3 of the above-mentioned Act, whereby such Local Authorities assigned to the said Joint Committee the whole of the district of the constituent Authorities aforesaid and delegated to the said Joint Committee the exclusive jurisdiction of making regulations for prohibiting or regulating the movement
