Madrid, April 5.

**T**he King, upon the news of the Queen of Spain's arrival in Galicia, sent immediately the Marquis de Leganez to Receive and Compliment her; and his Majesty intends to part himself the 10th of this Month to meet her at Valladolid, where great Preparations are making for her Majesties reception; and on this occasion here have been Bonfires, Illuminations, and Fireworks, for 3 nights successively. The King has made the Marquis de Beamer Maître de Camp-General of his Forces in the Spanish Netherlands; and has given the Government of Hymart, vacant by the death of the Marquis de Risbourg, to the Count de Louvigny, at present Maître de Camp-General of the Forces in the Milanese. The Bishop of Mataga, whom the King lately sent for in order to make him President of Castile, has desired to be excused; but new Directions have been sent him to repair forthwith thither. We have advice from Africa, that the Moors have besieged Ceuta.

**Vicna, April 13.** Last night arrived here an Express from the Imperial Camp before *Caniſa*, with an account, That upon the return of the Aga with the Emperor's Ratification of the Capitulation made with the Turkish Garrison, one of the principal Gates of the Town was, at the demand of the Imperialists, delivered up to them on Sunday last; That the whole Garrison was to march out the Tuesday following, and to be lodged in the Forts built without the Town, where they were to continue till Saturday the 15th of this Month, when they would be conducted by the Count *Zichi* Lieutenant-Governor of *Raab*, to the River *Mur*, to Embark on the Vessels that are to transport them to the Turkish Territories. The Letters from *Nissa* of the 31st past, tell us, that the Rascian General Signior *Antonio* was marched, with the Troops under his command, into the County of *Cassava*, with a design to attack *Pecchia*, situated on the Confines of *Albania*, where 1000 Armes and 600 Tartars were fortifying themselves. That a Party of Hungarians and Rascians, being in all not above 150 Men, had made an Excursion from *Piro*, and advanced beyond *Sophia*, within 3 hours march of *Philippoli*, making all the Booby they could, till at last they were attacked by 1000 Turks of the Garrison of *Passerzack*, but being advantageously posted, they defended themselves so well, that they obliged the Enemy to retreat with the loss of 200 of their Company, and returned safe to *Piro* with 28 Prisoners. This Success encouraged another Party of 100 Germans to make, on the 26th past, an excursion towards *Notibord*, which they did with that success, that they sack'd the Town, killing above 100 Turks, and remaining with 500 measures of Corn, 30 Horses, and 1000 Head of Cattel: In which Action we lost 10 or 12 Men. That a Detachment of Turks had, about the same time, attack'd the Palanque of *Belgradsack*, but were beaten off by the Germans in Garrison there with considerable loss. And that 30 more of the *Coruzzi*, who had defeated *Tekela*, were come to *Wlain*, and reported, that a much greater number would quickly follow them. We have an account from *Transylvania*, that General *Hessler* was drawing the Imperial Forces together, in order, as 'twas believed, to march with them towards *Nissa*. An Express has been lately sent from hence with Letters to the Duke

of *Lorraine*, who, together with the Elector of *Bavaria*; is expected here in few days, to concert Matters with relation to the approaching Campaign; which will be now very suddenly opened. A very fine Firework is preparing here, on the occasion of the Election of the King of the *Romans*.

**Neubourg, April 10.** The first Infant arrived here the Marquis de *Vigolmo* Ambassador from *Parma*, who had the next day Audience of our Elector. On the 3d was celebrated the Marriage between the Prince of *Parma* (represented by the Prince of *Saltzbuck*) and the Princess *Dorothea Sophia*, with all the Solemnity and publick Expressions of Joy becoming the occasion. And on the 5th; the Princess began her Journey towards *Italy*, being accompanied several miles out of Town by the Elector her Father and the Princesses her Sisters, attended by the Principal Officers, and other Persons of Quality of this Court.

**Frankfort, April 19.** The Imperial Forces quartered in these Parts are preparing to take the Field, and in the mean time great diligence is used to make the necessary provision for them; though we do not hear, that the place for the General Rendezvous is yet fixed. The Bishop of *Ausbourg* being lately dead, the Prince of *Neubourg* succeeds him in that Bithoprick, of which he was before Coadjutor.

**Cologne, April 21.** The *Brandenburg* Forces, now in Garrison at *Bonne*, will march out in 3 or 4 days; the Elector of *Cologne* having undertaken to keep that place, as also *Keyserwert* and *Rünberg*, with his own Troops. The Baron *Spaen* Lieutenant-General of the *Brandenburg* Forces, is returned to *Nais*; from whence, it's believed, he will go and confer with Prince *Waldicke*, who arrived the 14th Instant at *Maafricht*. They write from *Ratisbonne*, that the Buiness of *Saxe Lawenburg* continues to give a great interruption to the Affairs of the Dyet; and that the Minister of *Saxony* had declared, that the Elector his Matter could not agree to the Expedient that had been proposed, of putting the Administration of that Duchy into the hands of the Princes Directors of the *Lower Saxony*. But that Endeavours were still used to dispose his Electoral Highness to consent thereto; and that the Elector of *Bavaria* had particularly written to his Electoral Highness, in answer to a Letter he had received from him, on that Subject. The Advices from *Hungary* say, that the Turks at *Caniſa* had, on the 9th Instant, delivered up one of the Gates of the Town to the Imperialists, who posted there 100 Men, and that it was agreed, that the Garrison should march out the 11th with their Goods and Baggage.

**Brussels, April 22.** The French Troops are at present very quiet on our Frontiers, but they desert very fast, especially the *Germans* and *Swissers*; insomuch, that the French dare not trust the Regiments of those Nations on this side, but are sending them to serve in *Rouffillon*. We hear from *Dinant*, that the Enemy work very hard on the Fortifications there, and make what other Provision they can for the defence of that place, having apprehensions of a Siege. A Camp is going to be formed near this place, of the Forces quartered hereabouts.

**Hague, April 25.** The States of *Holland* met again this day, and, after having dispatched some Affairs, adjourned till Thursday, because of the Fast which is to be observed here to morrow, for the prosperous Success of the Arms of this State and the Allies. The Heer *Van Borswick*, *Bentben*, and *Casper*, are gone for *Utrecht* as Deputies from the States-General. We hear from *Amsterdam*, that they have advice from *St. Malo* by Letters of the

the 12th Instant, That 3 French Capers had, after a Fight of several hours, taken a Dutch Merchant Ship of 700 Tuns, bound home from *France* and *Cadix*. The Preparations for the War go on here very vigorously both by Sea and Land. The Letters from *Paris* of the 21st Instant give an account, That the Dauphiness dyed at *Verailles* the night before; and that the King and the Dauphin were thereupon retired to the Castle of *Marly*.

*Greenocke*, April 9. On Monday last sailed from hence Colonel *Seftle's* Regiment, the latt of the Danish Horse, who having had the Wind very fair, it's not doubted, but they are by this time landed at *Belfast*.

*Pembroke*, April 12. The 9th Instant came into our Harbor the *Europe* and *Saphire* from *Carrickfergus* with 7 small Merchant-men: They had under their Convoy 20 Sail more bound for *Bristol* and *Barnstaple*. The 10th arrived here the *Swallow*, and several Ships with Stores from *Plymouth*. They gave chase to a small French Privateer off of *Lundy*, but he escaped.

*Falmouth*, April 14. On Friday last arrived here Their Majesties Ships the *Tork*, the *Crown*, and the *Mordant*, from the Eastward, being ordered out to cruise. The same day came in a Dutch Caper with a Prize, being a Vessel of about 100 Tuns, bound for *France* from *Ireland*. Yesterday arrived here two Dutch Capers more, who brought in a Danish Ship of about 200 Tuns bound for *France*.

*Barnstaple*, April 15. This morning went down from hence, in eleven great Boats, the Regiment of Foot commanded by Colonel *Luttrell*, in order to their Embarking for *Ireland*, and Major-General *Trevelyan's* Regiment will follow them to morrow.

*Plymouth*, April 15. Yesterday came into this Port a Dutch Man of War, to convoy several Merchant Ships that are here bound for *Holland*. The same day arrived here a Vessel belonging to *Jersey* from *St. Malo*, with about 150 English and Scotch Seamen that have been exchanged.

*Chester*, April 16. On Monday and yesterday came in here about 400 Horse, for Recruits of the Regiments in *Ireland*. The Irish Officers who, I told you in my last, were taken on the Coast of *Ireland*, were yesterday brought hither Prisoners from *Highlake*.

*Portsmouth*, April 17. Yesterday sailed out of this Harbor 10 *Spithead* Their Majesties Ships the *Hampden-Court* and the *Edgar*. The Dutch Men of War that came lately from the westward, continue still at *Spithead*.

*Deale*, April 17. This morning arrived in the Downs Their Majesties Ships the *Sweetshakes* and *Forfight*; the latter brought in a Privateer of 10 Guns and 70 Men belonging to *St. Malo*, which she took yesterday off of *Beech*; She gave chase to another of about the same Force, but the Caper got away. The *Pembroke* sailed out of the Downs this morning.

*Whitehall*, April 17. His Majesty has been graciously pleased to create the Right Honourable *Richard Viscount Lumley* Earl of *Scarborough* in the County of *York*.

His Majesty has been likewise pleased to create the Right Honourable *Henry Lord Delamere* Earl of *Warrington* in the County of *Lancaster*.

His Majesty has been also pleased to create the Right Honourable *Henry Lord de Grey* of *Rutben* a Viscount of this Kingdom, by the Name and Style of Viscount *de Longueville*.

*Whitehall*, April 17. This day the *Turkey Company*, in pursuance of His Majesties Command to

propose to him a fit Person to succeed His Excellency *Sir William Trumball* in the Embassy at *Constantinople*, humbly presented to His Majesty *William Hussey* Esq; their Deputy-Governor; whom His Majesty has accordingly graciously appointed to be his Ambassador at the *Ottoman Port*; and at the same time His Majesty was pleased to confer upon him the honour of Knighthood.
