My Lords and Gentlemen.

AM glad to be able to relieve you from the labours of a Session which has been protracted and eventful.

When you assembled in October last I informed you that an Expedition was advancing up the valley of the Nile for the relief of Khartoum. Three months later, with a deep sorrow, which was shared by all my people, I learnt that the Expedition had arrived too late, and that the heroic General Gordon and his companions had fallen. An endeavour, which was ineffectual, was made to reach Khartoum by constructing a railway from Suakin to Berber. My troops were ultimately withdrawn from the whole of the Eastern Soudan except Suakin, and from the Western Soudan down to Alashkert.

Although the objects of the Expedition have not been attained, I have great reason to be proud of the bravery and endurance which have been displayed by my soldiers and sailors, and of the skill with which they have been commanded.

I received with great pleasure loyal offers of military assistance in this campaign from my Colonies and from the native Princes in India, and a Contingent from the Colony of New South Wales served with distinction in the actions which took place on the coast of the Red Sea.

The death of the Mahdi will probably enable me to perform with less difficulty the duties towards the Ruler and people of Egypt which events have imposed upon me. I shall not relax in my efforts to place the government and good order of that country upon a firm foundation.

My relations with other Powers are of a friendly nature.

Difficulties which at one time were of an anxious character arose between my Government and that of Russia as to the limits of the territory of my ally, the Ameer of Afghanistan. Negotiations still continue, and will, I trust, lead, at an early period, to a satisfactory settlement.

The progress of events in South Africa has compelled me, in the interest of the native races, to take under my protection Bechuanaland and certain adjacent territories.

I am taking the necessary steps to place the north-western frontier of my Indian Empire in a condition of adequate defence, in the absence of Gentlemen of the House of Commons.

I thank you for the liberality with which, during the past year, you have provided for the Services of the country.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have had pleasure in giving my assent to a measure for enabling federal action in certain matters to be taken by the Colonies of Australasia ; to a much-needed amendment of the Crimi-, nal Law; and to a Bill for establishing a new Department for Scottish Affairs. I have also been glad to concur in a measure for increasing the number of occupying freeholders in Ireland.

I notice with sincere gratification that an endeavour has been made by a Bill, to which I have assented, to diminish the evils of overcrowding and of insanitary dwellings, which hinder so seriously the moral and material well-being of the labouring classes.

I regret to say that the depression which has so long prevailed in many important trades and in the agricultural and manufacturing industries of the country still continues. I have directed the issue of a Commission to inquire into the causes of it and to ascertain whether it can be alleviated. by any legislative measures.

During the past Session your time has been principally occupied by the enlargement of the Electorate, and the extensive changes which you have, in consequence, made in the constitution of the House of Commons. I earnestly trust that these comprehensive measures may increase the efficiency of Parliament, and may add to the contentment of my people.

It is my purpose before long to seek their counsel by a dissolution of Parliament. I pray that the blessing of God may rest upon their extended liberties, and that the numbers who are called to the exercise of new powers will use them with the sobriety and discernment which for so long a period have marked the history of this nation.

Then a Commission for proroguing the Parliament was read ; after which the Lord Chancellor said :

My Lords and Gentlemen,

By virtue of Her Majesty's Commission, under the Great Seal, to us and other Lords directed, which the prosperity and tranquillity of my Indian and now read, we do, in Her Majesty's name, and

in obedience to Her commands, prorogue this Parliament to Saturday, the thirty-first day of October next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Saturday, the thirty-first day of Octoder next.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by the 11th section of the VV Volunteer Act, 1863, it is amongst other things enacted that "Her Majesty in Council " may, from time to time, declare what is requisite " to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an Efficient " Volunteer by an Order in Council defining for " that purpose the extent of attendance at drill to " be given by the Volunteers and the course of " instruction to be gone through by him, and " the degree of proficiency in drill and instruction "to be attained by him and his Corps, such pro-ficiency to be judged of by the Inspecting "Officer at the Annual Inspection of the Corps, " or otherwise as by Order in Council is from " time to time directed ; and that the draft of " any scheme to be from time to time submitted " to Her Majesty in Council for approval under " the present section shall have been laid before " both Houses of Parliament for one lunar month " at least, either before or after, or partly before " and partly after, the passing of this Act during " the present or for the like period during any " subsequent session of Parliament before such " scheme receives the approval of Her Majesty in " Council."

And whereas it is deemed expedient that the Order in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, declaring what is requisite to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an Efficient Volunteer be varied so far as it relates to the Forms of Certificates of Efficiency annexed.

And whereas new Forms of Certificates of Efficiency to provide for the Engineer Volunteer Corps (Submarine Miners), and a new Form of Certificate of Efficiency to provide for the 1st Oxfordshire (Oxford University) Rifle Volunteer Corps, 2nd Cambridgeshire (Cambridge University) Rifle Volunteer Corps, and 2nd Bucks (Eton College) Rifle Volunteer Corps, and a new Form of Certificate of Efficiency to provide for the Volunteer Medical Staff Corps, were, on or before the twenty-fifth June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, laid before both Houses of Parliament in the words mentioned and set forth in the schedule to this Order annexed, and, one lunar month having elapsed since that time, the said amendment of the said scheme hath this day been submitted to Her Majesty for Her approval thereof:

Now therefore, Her Majesty having this day taken the said amendment into consideration, doth, in pursuance and exercise of the power in Her Majesty by the said Act of Parliament in that behalf vested, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, hereby vary the Order in Council of the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and doth declare Her Royal approval of the Forms of Certificates of Efficiency referred to.

Attendance at a brigade drill or a review may be counted as a battalion drill. To constitute a company drill reckoning towards efficiency, 16 at least of all ranks (exclusive of band) must be present, of whom not less than 2 must be officers and serjeants, or officers or serjeants.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The following Area (namely),—the Worcester Petty Sessional Division, in the county of Worcester,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the sixteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

1. Each of the Areas described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twentieth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.


