Venice, April 14.

A Vessel that parted from *Modon* in the *Mores* the 25th past, being arrived here, without any news of the capitulating of *Napoli de Marochia*, there is now little credit given to the Report we had of it from *Zant*. The Senate have made an agreement with the Duke of *Saxony* for 2500 Men, who are expected here by the beginning of the next Month. The Republic of *Genova* have, at the Instance of the Pope, resolved to join two of their Gallies with those he sends to the Alliance of this State. The Turks, commanded by the Earl of *Bisina*, have lately made an Incursion into *Batavia*.

London, April 10. On the 7th Instant a French Man of War, that lay at Anchor in this Road, perceiving an English Merchant Ship, called the *Mauritanus*, standing in, dipr his Cable and bore towards her, and, after some dispute, took her; whereof notice being given to the Governor, he sent for the French Consul to complain of this Violation of the Freedom of the Port, and to demand Reparation; for which purpose, the Great Duke has likewise dispatched two Couriers to *France*.

Milan, April 12. Several Commissions have been given out here this week for new Levies, and among the rest, one to Don *Antonio Vasquez*, to raise a Regiment of Dragons in *Germany*. Monsieur *de Catinaut* is come to *Pignarol*, to compose a Quarrel that lately happened between the French and Suttlers in *Garison* there, which went so far, that some were killed. The French do very much press the Duke of *Saxony* to declare for them, or at least to agree to a Neutrality, but we do not hear that he has yet given them a final Answer thereupon, he desiring time to consider of it.

Rome, April 16. The Count *de Ker* arrived here last night from *Causse*, with Advice, That the Turks had actually surrendered that important Fortress to the Imperialists, the Garrison marching out on the 11th Instant, and being conducted with 200 Wagons to the River *Alto*, where they were to Embark, and so pass on by water. A great Council of War will be held here so soon as the Duke of *Lorraine* arrives, who is daily expected. In the mean time 'tis said, that the Imperial and Considerate Forces in *Germany* will act this Campaign in two Armies, the one on the *Rhine*, under the command of the Elector of *Bavaria*; and the other between the *Moselle* and the *Maine*, under the Duke of *Lorraine*. And besides these, it's believed, the *Brandenburg* Forces will make a separate Body. It is not yet declared who shall command the Imperial Forces employed against the Turks. The *Ottoman* Envoys continue still at *Comorra*.

Frankfort, April 23. We have an account from *Alsace*, that the French Troops are moving towards *Strasbourg*, near which place their Main Army, which is to be commanded by the Dauphin, is to Rendezvous. The French have begun to Mine the Walls of *Newstadt*, as also those of the Castle of *Rapsberg*, with intention, as 'tis believed, to demolish both these places.

Hamburg, April 25. The Letters from *Berlin* tell us, That the Elector of *Brandenburg* had given out Commissions for the raising of 4000 Men in *Prussia*; from whence, their Electoral Highnesses are expected back about the 20th of the next Month. The Elector of *Saxony* has appointed a General Review of his Forces to be held the 28th of this Month near *Torgau*, and then it's believed his Electoral Highness will declare, what number of Troops he will send to the *Rhine*. The Magistrates of this City do sollicite a prolongation of the Term set them for the Publishing the Imperial Avocatoria, but there is little appearance of their obtaining it.

Cologne, April 25. The two Battalions of *Brandenburgers*, now in *Garison* here, are ready to march; 'tis said, that the rest of his Electoral Highness's Forces, quartered in these Parts, are to join them, and that they will then advance towards the *Moselle*. A Regiment of Horse is raising here for the Service of the Emperor.

Brussels, April 26. Preparations are making for the Camp, which will be formed near this place the beginning of the next Month. The French have lately sent a Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition from *Mauberge* to *Dinant*. The Letters from *Germany* tell us, That the Imperial and Considerate Forces began to be in motion, in order to their taking the Field.

Paris, April 25. The Dauphiness dyed the 20th Instant about 7 a clock in the Evening: She was Daughter of *Ferdinand Maris* Elector of *Bavaria*, and of *Henrietta Adelaide* of *Saxony*; was born the 28th of *November*, 1660. and married to the Dauphin the 28th of *January*, 1680. She has given away to the value of 400000 Livres in Jewels to the Elector of *Bavaria* her Brother, and to the Great Dutchess of *Tuscany*, and the Dutchess of *Guise*. The King and the Dauphin retired presently after her death to the Castle of *Marli*. The Courier that was lately sent to *Saxony*, is not yet come back; but we hear in the mean time, that Monsieur *de Catinat* lyes ready with the Troops under his Command, to enter into that Duke's Territories, in case he does not comply with the Demands of this Court. We have advice, that the Privateers of *St. Malo* have taken a Dutch Merchant Ship of 500 Guns and 40 Guns, richly laden from the *Streights*. The Marshal Duke of *Luxemburg* will part next week for *Flanders*.

Hague, April 28. The Heer *Van Amurongen*, who is going Envoy Extraordinary from this State to the Court of *Denmark*, has received his Credentials, and will begin his Journey thither the next week. And the Envoys to the Emperor and the King of *Sweden* will likewise set out very speedily. The Prince of *East-Friseland* has given notice to the States, of his having taken upon him the Government of that Country, the Administration whereof has, during his Minority, been in the hands of the Princess his Mother. We have an account by Letters from *Guinea*, that our *Streights* Fleet had, after their departure from Admiral *Kings*, suffered very much by the terrible Storm which happened on the 27th past *New-York*, they being then about 340 Sail, English and Dutch, not far from *Cape Isister*; The exact Particulars they cannot tell us, but speak in general, of the loss of several Merchant Ships, and of the Comds commanded by Captain *Everez*, and another Dutch Man of War which sunk at Sea, but all the Men were saved. They add, that the English Vice-Admiral had lost his Main-mast, and that some others of the English Ships were likewise damaged in their Masts and Rigging. Lieutenant-Admiral *Everez* is to command the Fleet of this State this Summer, as he did the last. There are 9 Frigats ordered to cruise off of *Dunkirk*.
