HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased to direct that the Right Honourable Sir Henry Thurstan Holland, Baronet, K.C.M.G., be appointed Vice-President of the Committee of Council on Education, and that the Right Honourable Sir Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do prepare a Warrant for Her Majesty's Royal signature accordingly, under the provisions of an Act passed in the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the appointment of a Vice-President of the Committee of Council on Education."

WHEREAS by the provisions of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, it is, amongst other things, provided:—

That if Her Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government or Governments of any foreign state or states for mutual protection of inventions, designs and trade marks, or any of them, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design, or trade mark in any such state shall be entitled to a patent for his invention, or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under the said Act, in priority to other applicants; and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the protection obtained in such foreign state.

Provided that his application is made in the case of a patent within seven months, and in the case of a design or trade mark within four months from his applying for protection in the foreign state, with which the arrangement is in force.

Provided that nothing in the aforesaid provision contained shall entitle the patentee or proprietor of the design or trade mark to recover damages for infringements happening prior to the date of the actual acceptance of his complete specification, or the actual registration of his design or trade mark in this country, as the case may be.

The publication in the United Kingdom or the Isle of Man during the respective periods aforesaid of any description of the invention, or the use therein during such periods of the invention, or the exhibition or use therein during such periods of the design, or the publication therein during such periods of a description or representation of the design, or the use therein during such periods of the trade mark, shall not invalidate the patent which may be granted for the invention, or the registration of the design or trade mark.

The application for the grant of a patent, or the registration of a design, or the registration of a trade mark under the said provisions, must be made in the same manner as an ordinary application under the said Act: Provided that, in the case of trade marks, any trade mark the registration of which has been duly applied for in the country of origin may be registered under the said Act.

And it is further provided,—

That where it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the legislature of any British possession has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks patented or registered in this country, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time by Order in Council to apply the provisions first recited, with such variations or additions, if any, as to Her Majesty in Council may seem fit, to such British possession.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the legislature of the colony of Queensland has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks patented or registered in this country.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said Act, doth declare, and it is hereby declared, that the provisions of the said Act hereinbefore specified shall apply to the Colony of Queensland.

And it is further ordered and declared that this Order shall take effect from the day and date above mentioned.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it was enacted that, on and after the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, or such later day as might be fixed for the purpose by Order in Council, the regulations contained in the Table marked C. in the schedule to the said Act should come into operation and be of the same force as if they were enacted in the body of the said Act, but that Her Majesty might from time to time, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by Order in Council annul or modify any of the said regulations, or make new regulations in addition thereto, or in substitution therefor; and that any alterations in, or additions to such regulations, made in manner aforesaid, should be of the same force as the regulations in the said schedule:

And whereas by the same Act it was further provided that, whenever it should be made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any foreign country was willing that the regulations for preventing collisions contained in Table C. in the schedule to the said Act, or such other regulations for preventing collisions as are

for the time being in force under the said Act, should apply to the ships of such country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, Her Majesty might, by Order in Council, direct that such regulations should apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not:

And whereas it was further provided by the said Act that, whenever an Order in Council had been issued applying any regulation made by, or in pursuance of, the said Act to the ships of any foreign country, such ships should in all cases arising in any British court be deemed to be subject to such regulation, and should, for the purpose of such regulation, be treated as if they were British ships:

And whereas by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the said recited Act, and dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, Her Majesty was pleased to direct that, on and after the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the regulations contained in the schedule thereto should, so far as regards British ships and boats, be substituted for the regulations then in force:

And whereas since the date of the above-named Order in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of Chile are willing that the said regulations appended to the said Order, and to this Order, shall apply to Chilian ships when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the said regulations appended to the said Order in Council bearing date the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and to this Order, shall, from the date hereof, apply to ships belonging to the Republic of Chile, whether within British jurisdiction or not, and shall be substituted as regards Chilian ships and boats, for the regulations contained in the first schedule to the Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine:

SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing Order.

REGULATIONS for preventing Collisions at Sea, approved by Order in Council, dated the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

ART. 1. In the following rules every steam ship which is under sail and not under steam is to be considered a sailing ship; and every steam ship which is under steam, whether under sail or not, is to be considered a ship under steam.

Rules concerning Lights.

ART. 2. The lights mentioned in the following Articles, numbered 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 11; and no others, shall be carried in all weathers, from sunset to sunrise.

ART. 3. A seagoing steam ship when under way shall carry—

(a.) On or in front of the foremast, at a height above the hull of not less than 20 feet, and if the breadth of the ship exceeds 20 feet, then at a height above the hull not less than such breadth, a bright white light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the

light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz., from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on either side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least five miles.

(b.) On the starboard side, a green light so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the starboard side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.

(c.) On the port side, a red light, so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on the port side; and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles.

(d.) The said green and red side lights shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least three feet forward from the light, so as to prevent these lights from being seen across the bow.

ART. 4. A steam ship, when towing another ship, shall, in addition to her side lights carry two bright white lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 3 feet apart, so as to distinguish her from other steam ships. Each of these lights shall be of the same construction and character, and shall be carried in the same position as the white light which other steam ships are required to carry.

ART. 5. (a.) A ship, whether a steam ship or a sailing ship, which from any accident is not under command, shall at night carry, in the same position as the white light which steam ships are required to carry, and, if a steam ship, in place of that light, three red lights in globular lanterns, each not less than 10 inches in diameter, in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 3 feet apart, and of such a character as to be visible, on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least two miles; and shall by day carry in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 3 feet apart, in front of but not lower than her foremast head, three black balls or shapes, each 2 feet in diameter.

(b.) A ship, whether a steam ship or a sailing ship, employed in laying or in picking up a telegraph cable, shall at night carry, in the same position as the white light which steam ships are required to carry, and, if a steam ship, in place of that light, three lights in globular lanterns, each not less than 10 inches in diameter, in a vertical line one over another, not less than 6 feet apart; the highest and lowest of these lights shall be red, and the middle light shall be white, and they shall be of such a character that the red lights shall be visible at the same distance as the white light. By day she shall carry in a vertical line one over the other, not less than 6 feet apart, in front of but not lower than her foremast head, three shapes not less than 2 feet in diameter, of which the top and bottom shall be globular in shape and red in colour, and the middle one diamond in shape and white.

(c.) The ships referred to in this Article, when not making any way through the water, shall not carry the side lights, but when making way shall carry them.

(d.) The lights and shapes required to be shown by this Article are to be taken by other ships as signals that the ship showing them is not

under command, and cannot therefore get out of the way. The signals to be made by ships in distress and requiring assistance are contained in Article 27.

ART. 6. A sailing ship under way, or being towed shall carry the same lights as are provided by Article 3 for a steam ship under way, with the exception of the white light, which she shall never carry.

ART. 7. Whenever, as in the case of small vessels during bad weather, the green and red side lights cannot be fixed, these lights shall be kept on deck, on their respective sides of the vessel, ready for use; and shall on the approach of or to other vessels, be exhibited on their respective sides in sufficient time to prevent collision, in such manner as to make them most visible, and so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side.

To make the use of these portable lights more certain and easy, the lanterns containing them shall each be painted outside with the colour of the light they respectively contain, and shall be provided with proper screens.

ART. 8. A ship, whether a steam ship or a sailing ship, when at anchor, shall carry, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a white light, in a globular lantern of not less than 8 inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon, at a distance of at least one mile.

ART. 9. A pilot vessel, when engaged on her station on pilotage duty, shall not carry the lights required for other vessels, but shall carry a white light at the masthead, visible all round the horizon, and shall also exhibit a flare-up light or flare-up lights at short intervals, which shall never exceed fifteen minutes.

A pilot vessel, when not engaged on her station on pilotage duty, shall carry lights similar to those of other ships.

ART. 10. Open boats and fishing vessels of less than 20 tons net registered tonnage, when under way and when not having their nets, trawls, dredges, or lines in the water, shall not be obliged to carry the coloured side lights; but every such boat and vessel shall in lieu thereof have ready at hand a lantern with a green glass on the one side and a red glass on the other side, and on approaching to or being approached by another vessel such lantern shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side nor the red light on the starboard side.

The following portion of this Article applies only to fishing vessels and boats when in the sea off the coast of Europe lying north of Cape Finisterre:—

(a.) All fishing vessels and fishing boats of 20 tons net registered tonnage, or upwards, when under way and when not required by the following regulations in this Article to carry and show the lights therein named, shall carry and show the same lights as other vessels under way.

(b.) All vessels when engaged in fishing with drift nets shall exhibit two white lights from any part of the vessel where they can be best seen. Such lights shall be placed so that the vertical distance between them shall be not less than 6 feet and not more than 10 feet; and so that the horizontal distance between them measured in a line with the keel of the vessel shall be not less than 5 feet and not more than 10 feet. The lower of these two lights shall be the more forward, and both of

them shall be of such a character, and contained in lanterns of such construction as to show all round the horizon, on a dark night with a clear atmosphere, for a distance of not less than three miles.

- (c.) A vessel employed in line fishing with her lines out shall carry the same lights as a vessel when engaged in fishing with drift nets.
- (d.) If a vessel when fishing becomes stationary in consequence of her gear getting fast to a rock or other obstruction, she shall show the light and make the fog signal for a vessel at anchor.
- (e.) Fishing vessels and open boats may at any time use a flare-up in addition to the lights which they are by this Article required to carry and show. All flare-up lights exhibited by a vessel when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag net shall be shown at the after part of the vessel, excepting that, if the vessel is hanging by the stern to her trawl, dredge, or drag net, they shall be exhibited from the bow.
- (f.) Every fishing vessel and every open boat when at anchor between sunset and sunrise shall exhibit a white light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.
- (g.) In fog, mist, or falling snow, a drift net vessel attached to her nets and a vessel when trawling, dredging, or fishing with any kind of drag net, and a vessel employed in line fishing with her lines out, shall at intervals of not more than two minutes make a blast with her fog horn and ring her bell alternately.

ART. 11. A ship which is being overtaken by another shall show from her stern to such last-mentioned ship, a white light or a flare-up light.

Sound Signals for Fog, &c.

ART. 12. A steam ship shall be provided with a steam whistle or other efficient steam sound signal, so placed that the sound may not be intercepted by any obstructions, and with an efficient fog horn to be sounded by a bellows or other mechanical means, and also with an efficient bell.* A sailing ship shall be provided with a similar fog horn and bell.

In fog, mist, or falling snow, whether by day or night, the signals described in this Article shall be used as follows; that is to say,—

- (a.) A steam ship under way shall make with her steam whistle, or other steam sound signal, at intervals of not more than two minutes, a prolonged blast.
- (b.) A sailing ship under way shall make with her fog horn, at intervals of not more than two minutes, when on the starboard tack one blast, when on the port tack two blasts in succession, and when with the wind abaft the beam three blasts in succession.
- (c.) A steam ship and a sailing ship, when not under way shall, at intervals of not more than two minutes, ring the bell.

Speed of Ships to be moderate in Fog, &c.

ART. 13. Every ship, whether a sailing ship or steam ship, shall, in a fog, mist, or falling snow, go at a moderate speed.

Steering and Sailing Rules.

ART. 14. When two sailing ships are approaching one another, so as to involve risk of collision, one of them shall keep out of the way of the other, as follows, viz. :—

- (a.) A ship which is running free shall keep out of the way of a ship which is close-hauled.
- (b.) A ship which is close-hauled on the port tack shall keep out of the way of a ship which is close-hauled on the starboard tack.
- (c.) When both are running free with the wind on different sides, the ship which has the wind on the port side shall keep out of the way of the other.
- (d.) When both are running free with the wind on the same side, the ship which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the ship which is to leeward.
- (e.) A ship which has the wind aft shall keep out of the way of the other ship.

ART. 15. If two ships under steam are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, each shall alter her course to starboard, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

This Article only applies to cases where ships are meeting end on, or nearly end on, in such a manner as to involve risk of collision, and does not apply to two ships which must, if both keep on their respective courses, pass clear of each other.

The only cases to which it does apply are, when each of the two ships is end on, or nearly end on, to the other; in other words, to cases in which, by day, each ship sees the masts of the other in a line, or nearly in a line, with her own; and by night, to cases in which each ship is in such a position as to see both the side lights of the other.

It does not apply by day to cases in which a ship sees another ahead crossing her own course; or by night, to cases where the red light of one ship is opposed to the red light of the other, or where the green light of one ship is opposed to the green light of the other, or where a red light without a green light, or a green light without a red light, is seen ahead, or where both green and red lights are seen anywhere but ahead.

ART. 16. If two ships under steam are crossing, so as to involve risk of collision, the ship which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

ART. 17. If two ships, one of which is a sailing ship, and the other a steam ship, are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steam ship shall keep out of the way of the sailing ship.

ART. 18. Every steam ship, when approaching another ship, so as to involve risk of collision, shall slacken her speed or stop and reverse, if necessary.

ART. 19. In taking any course authorised or required by these Regulations, a steam ship under way may indicate that course to any other ship which she has in sight by the following signals on her steam whistle, viz. :—

One short blast to mean "I am directing my course to starboard" :—

Two short blasts to mean "I am directing my course to port" :—

Three short blasts to mean "I am going full speed astern."

The use of these signals is optional; but if they are used, the course of the ship must be in accordance with the signal made.

ART. 20. Notwithstanding anything contained in any preceding Article, every ship, whether a sailing ship or a steam ship, overtaking any other, shall keep out of the way of the overtaken ship.

ART. 21. In narrow channels every steam ship shall, when it is safe and practicable, keep to that

* In all cases where the regulations require a bell to be used, a drum will be substituted on board Turkish vessels.

side of the fairway or mid-channel which lies on the starboard side of such ship.

ART. 22. Where by the above rules one of two ships is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course.

ART. 23. In obeying and construing these rules due regard shall be had to all dangers of navigation; and to any special circumstances which may render a departure from the above rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

No Ship, under any circumstances, to neglect proper Precautions.

ART. 24. Nothing in these rules shall exonerate any ship, or the owner, or master, or crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper look-out, or of the neglect of any precaution which may be required by the ordinary practice of seamen, or by the special circumstances of the case.

Reservation of Rules for Harbours and Inland Navigation.

ART. 25. Nothing in these rules shall interfere with the operation of a special rule, duly made by local authority, relative to the navigation of any harbour, river, or inland navigation.

Special Lights for Squadrons and Convoys.

ART. 26. Nothing in these rules shall interfere with the operation of any special rules made by the Government of any nation with respect to additional station and signal lights for two or more ships of war or for ships sailing under convoy.

ART. 27. When a ship is in distress and requires assistance from other ships or from the shore, the following shall be the signals to be used or displayed by her, either together or separately, that is to say:—

In the daytime—

1. A gun fired at intervals of about a minute;
2. The International Code signal of distress indicated by N C;
3. The distant signal, consisting of a square flag, having either above or below it a ball or anything resembling a ball.

At night—

1. A gun fired at intervals of about a minute;
2. Flames on the ship (as from a burning tar barrel, oil barrel, &c.);
3. Rockets or shells throwing stars of any colour or description, fired one at a time, at short intervals.

WHEREAS by the Worcester Extension Act, 1885, it is enacted as follows:—

Section 23. "The extended city shall be divided into six Wards and the names or distinguishing numbers and boundaries of such Wards shall be determined by a Commissioner to be for that purpose appointed by Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department within three weeks after the passing of this Act."

Section 26. "The Commissioner shall by his Scheme apportion all the existing Councillors among the new Wards described therein so as to provide (as far as practicable) for each Councillor continuing to represent as large a number as possible of his former constituents and every such Councillor shall hold his office in the Ward to which he shall be so assigned for the

"same period as he would have held such office, if the existing Wards of the city remained unaltered: and the Commissioner shall also by his Scheme state which of the five Aldermen assigned by the Council as Returning Officers shall act in respect of five of the new Wards and also which Alderman shall act in respect of the additional Ward."

"And whereas section 28 of the same Act applies certain sub-sections including sub-section 11 of section 30 of the Municipal Corporation Act 1882, so as to require the Commissioner to send the scheme to the Secretary of State, to be submitted by him to Her Majesty in Council for approval.

"And whereas Richard Holmden Amphlett Barrister-at-Law, Esquire duly appointed as Commissioner in pursuance of the aforesaid Worcester Extension Act 1885 has submitted to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State a scheme in the following terms:—

"Whereas it is provided by the sixth section of the Worcester Extension Act 1885 that the boundaries of the existing city should be extended so as to comprise in addition to the existing city so much of the parishes of Claines, Hallow, Saint John in Bedwardine, Saint Peter the Great, and Saint Martin, all in the county of Worcester, as lies between the present municipal boundaries of the city and the Parliamentary boundaries of the city as defined by the Boundary Act 1868.

"And whereas it is provided by the twenty-third section of the Worcester Extension Act, 1885, that the city of Worcester as extended by the said Act shall be divided into six Wards and the names or distinguishing numbers and boundaries of such Wards shall be determined by a Commissioner to be for that purpose appointed by Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department.

"And whereas it is provided by the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth sections of the said Act that after the division of the city into wards under the said Act the number of Aldermen should be twelve and the number of Councillors should be thirty-six, and that the Commissioner should by his scheme apportion all the existing Councillors among the new Wards described therein so as to provide (as far as practicable) for each Councillor continuing to represent as large a number as possible of his former constituents and that such Commissioner should also by his scheme state which of the five Aldermen assigned by the Council as Returning Officers should act in respect of five of the new Wards, and also which Alderman should act in respect of the additional Ward.

"And whereas the Right Honourable Sir Richard Assheton Cross Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, duly appointed me, Richard Holmden Amphlett, Barrister-at-Law, to be a Commissioner for the purposes of the said Act hereinbefore mentioned and upon my application and in pursuance of a power in that behalf contained in the said Act extended the time for the completion of this Scheme until the twenty-fourth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

"Now, therefore, I, the said Richard Holmden Amphlett, do hereby determine as follows:—

"That No. 1 Ward be called the Ward of Saint John, and include the part coloured green in the map hereunto annexed, being the parish of Saint Clement, and so much of the parishes of Saint John in Bedwardine and Hallow as is within the city of Worcester.

"That No. 2 Ward be called the Ward of Saint

Nicholas, and include the part coloured yellow in the map hereunto annexed, being the parishes of Saint Nicholas, Saint Swithin, and tything of Whiston.

"That No. 3 Ward be called the Ward of All Saints, and include the part coloured purple in the map hereunto annexed, being the parishes of All Saints, Blockhouse, Colledge Precincts, and the parishes of Saint Alban, Saint Andrew, Saint Helen, and Saint Michael in Bedwardine.

"That No. 4 Ward be called the Ward of Saint Peter, and include the part coloured blue in the map hereunto annexed, being so much of the parish of Saint Peter the Great as is within the city of Worcester.

"That No. 5 Ward be called the Ward of Claines, and include the part coloured brown in the map hereunto annexed, being so much of the parish of Claines as is within the city of Worcester, except so much of such parish, within the said city, as is situate on the east side of the Worcester and Birmingham Canal.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. From and immediately after the twenty-third day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, The England Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Temporary Order of July, 1885, shall be read and have effect as if four days was mentioned in Article 6 of that Order instead of three days as the period within which swine exposed at a public sale held by Licence of a Local Authority under the provisions of that Article are ordered to be slaughtered; and all Licences granted by a Local Authority under the provisions of Article 6 of that Order, and in force at the date when this Article takes effect, shall be read and have effect accordingly.

2. Notwithstanding anything in Article 2 of The England Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Temporary Order of July, 1885, that Order, as amended by this Order, is hereby continued to the thirty-first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and that Order shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, instead of the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and that Order shall be read and have effect as if the words thirty-first day of October were inserted in Article 2 of that Order in lieu of the words thirtieth day of September.

3. This Order may be cited as THE ENGLAND MARKETS AND FAIRS (SWINE FEVER) TEMPORARY ORDER OF JULY, 1885, AMENDMENT AND CONTINUANCE.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from the *Chargé d'Affaires* for Austro-Hungary, inclosing Notices respecting quarantine issued by the Imperial-Royal Government, of which the following are translations, viz. :—

Copy of a Decree of the Royal-Imperial Ministry of the Interior to the Municipal Authorities in Lemberg and the Local Government of Czernowitz on the 15th of August, 1885.

In those kingdoms and countries which were directly threatened during the last year by the outbreak of cholera in France and Italy a series of regulations were issued for the purpose of warding off the attack of this malady. In these countries a return to that policy of regulations in case of the outbreak of cholera in foreign states directly proximate to the Austro-Hungarian Monarchy will offer no practical difficulties.

From the great vehemence with which the epidemic has this year assailed the west of Europe, it is to be feared that it may make, as has been the case in previous years, a sudden and eccentric movement, and not improbably may at any moment break out in the eastern states of Europe, especially in Russia and Roumania. In this case Galicia and the Bukowina would be the Austrian countries which would be most directly threatened with the cholera, in which those prohibitory measures would most promptly have to be taken which were taken last year, in other parts of the monarchy, with the result that, by the promptitude of the Sanitary Authorities, the epidemic was prevented from crossing the frontier of the Empire.

In consequence of this, and further in consideration of the fact that such arrangements as these would take a longer time and greater exertions to carry out in Galicia and the Bukowina than in other parts of the Empire, it has been decided by the Ministry of the Interior to publish these regulations with regard to the foreign trade,

so that they may be ready to be put into prompt execution the moment that cholera shall be proved to have broken out in European Russia, including Russian Poland, or in Roumania, in uniformity with the Decree of the 4th of August, 1885, No. 12,717, so that directly that there is need to take prohibitory measures no time or energy may be lost.

1. At the railway stations along the whole Russian and Roumanian frontier a medical examination of travellers and their luggage is to be made in such a way that, on the arrival of each train, an experienced physician appointed by the local authorities, when practicable the station doctor established at the frontier station, shall be informed of any case of illness on the train arriving from the foreign country, and shall, in suspicious cases, have the authority to examine and isolate any of the travellers.

2. In the custom-house examination, which is to extend to hand-packages as well as to ordinary luggage, and to be undertaken by the physician in charge of the customs-office, the greatest care must be shown with regard to dirty linen or clothes ready for the wash, when stained with excrement or filth, and such clothes are to be disinfected by being placed for five days in wooden vessels filled with a solution of five per cent. carbolic acid, and afterwards with *boiling hot water*, or, in the case of articles which will not bear this treatment, by the application of hot air and heated steam.

Valueless travelling articles may, with the permission of the proprietors or their representatives, be at once disinfected by fire, which it will as a rule be most convenient to do in the furnace of the locomotive.

The articles for the wash, when they have been disinfected, are to be kept in evidence, and forwarded to the persons to whom they belong. As a matter of course, the disinfection, the cleansing, and the forwarding of articles is all to be performed at the travellers' expense.

Where there are no conveniences for the proper disinfection and cleansing of articles, the latter are under no circumstances to be allowed to pass into the country.

3. The police agents connected with the railway stations are ordered in all instances to give their support to the examining physician in the carrying out of his duty, as well as to take care to see that the effects which are disinfected, or to be disinfected, are kept in evidence, and that they are duly forwarded to the proprietors. The police authorities, moreover, under the direction of the physicians, are to see that all due care and attention is paid to such sick persons as are in quarantine.

The parishes in which the frontier stations are situated are bound to provide proper spaces, in accordance with the sanitary law, within which travellers from foreign countries on crossing the frontier can be placed so as to undergo the necessary examination before proceeding on their journey, as well as medical treatment and care. In cases where the expenses hereby incurred are greater than the parishes can well afford, a grant from the Treasury will not be refused.

4. After each passenger train has started a report must be sent in by the police authorities to the county-town in which the revising physician is to give the detailed particulars of its sanitary condition.

If the report is not very extensive in form it should immediately be sent up to the Ministry of the Interior by the promptest delivery, and brought before the attention of all police authorities, as a guide for them in proceeding with their sanitary

and general duties in assuring the health of the public.

5. At the frontier stations through which a direct movement of passenger carriages passes into Austria, as soon as the presence of cholera in the neighbouring country is confirmed, care should be taken to arrange as much as possible that there should be a change of carriages made in those direct trains.

6. The expenses of the salaries of physicians and the carrying out of the disinfection of articles of clothing, so far as they are not paid by the travellers themselves, will be paid out of the State Treasury, and applications for the same must be made by the revising physician through the Minister of the Interior.

7. With regard to the travelling packages not examined at the frontier stations, the regulations of the 7th of September, 1884, p. 14,155, are to be followed.

8. The sanitary examination of vagrants arriving from foreign countries is to be specially attended to in accordance with the Decree of the 6th of August, 1884, No. 12,815.

The authorities are empowered and directed to carry out the articles of these regulations with the greatest exactitude as soon as the breaking out of cholera in a neighbouring country appears to be confirmed.

The Ministry of Trade and the Ministry of Finance have promised to give their active support to the local authorities, to help them to contend against the threatened peril with the greatest possible energy.

As soon as it appears desirable that these Regulations should come into force, notice must be sent to this office with as little delay as possible, with a request for particulars how best to protect the frontier of the Empire on the side of Russia (with Poland) and Roumania from a spread of the epidemic.

To all :—

From information received by the Ministry of the Interior from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs regarding the disquieting condition of health in certain parts of Italy, especially as made public in the latest Decree of the 1st of September of the Italian Ministry of the Interior, by which a quarantine is ordered for ships arriving in Sicily and Sardinia from the continent of Italy, it seems to be beyond dispute that the cholera epidemic has spread to the continental part of Italy.

In view of the greatly increased danger of cholera to which the Austro-Hungarian monarchy is thus exposed, it is necessary very strictly to carry out all the regulations for protection against it which were recognized as desirable last year.

It has therefore been decided, in connection with the Decree of the 4th of August last year, No. 12,717, to extend the powers of that Decree to arrivals from Italy, and to include under the regulations of the Decrees of the 29th of July, 28th of August, and 7th of September, 1884, Nos. 12,087, 13,921, and 14,155, referring to the medical examination of travellers from Italy and their luggage, the following railway stations :—

1. Ala.

2. Görz.
3. Pontafel.

To all :—

The revision of luggage not examined on the frontier, nor kept in the custody of the custom-house, and the surveillance of freight in connection with the arrival of dirty clothes, bedding, &c., soiled with the results of cholera, is to be performed in the same mode and with equal exactness as last year, in communication with the Ministry of the Interior.

By order of the revising physicians, the local authorities are desired to be careful to see that the disinfectants and the utensils are properly ready, and that they are used for the purpose to which they are destined, and not wasted.

To 2. In the case that later on it should be found necessary to order a change of waggons from this place, it may perhaps be desirable to alter the point of medical revision and customs-examination from Görz to Cormons, in which case the instructions given above will apply to Cormons.

To 1, 2, and 3. The greatest care is to be shown in the performance of these duties.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Madrid, enclosing the following translation of a notice respecting quarantine issued by the Spanish Government, viz. :—

Circular.

To regulate the system of disinfection of vessels arriving from suspected or foul ports, His Majesty the King has been pleased to ordain the following :—

1. Suspected ports are those situated in infected provinces, though no case of cholera may have occurred in them within their municipal limits.
2. Infected ports are those where cholera cases have occurred within their municipal limits.
3. The appreciation of suspected and infected ports is to be made in view of the official statements contained in the Madrid Gazette.
4. Arrivals from suspected ports shall be subject to three days' observation in accordance with the hygienic measures given in Rule 2. of the Royal Order of 5th June, 1872. Noxious (contumez) cargo and luggage destined for the port of arrival must be discharged and disinfected at a convenient spot, selected in conjunction with the Board of Health. At other ports of call, whilst the vessel has on board noxious goods of suspected origin, these are to be disinfected at the spot selected for the purpose, as stated. Goods which are liable to deteriorate owing to the action of gases, are to be aired for a certain time, as ordered by the Director of the Port.

5. The expenses for the establishment of the stores necessary for disinfection and fumigation, and expenses incurred in airing, are to be defrayed by the Provincial Boards, the Municipalities, and the merchants interested. Where no such places can be permanently established, owing to the impossibility of finding a proper spot, or because the corporations and merchants will not give their consent, the consignees of vessels will defray the expenses incurred in obtaining a proper place, where, in accordance with the instructions of the

Director of the Port, the merchandize consigned to them are to be disinfected.

6. Arrivals from foul ports shall be dismissed to a lazaretto, in accordance with Article 35 of the Law, and for the object stated in the 5th chapter of same.

THE Board of Trade have been informed by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs that a Telegram has been received from Her Majesty's Minister at Berne, notifying that the Federal Government have decreed that the same measures which were adopted on the Franco-Swiss frontier against the introduction of cholera, are to be put in force on the Italian frontier.

These provisions direct that in every commune an appropriate building shall be kept in readiness for the reception of pauper cholera patients. The railway authorities are instructed to deposit at certain stations all passengers who may fall ill while travelling. All cases of cholera are to be reported immediately to the local authorities by the persons responsible for the patient.

Specially appointed doctors will visit all

travellers at the frontier stations. The waiting-rooms and buffets are to be disinfected. It is forbidden to transport persons suffering from, or suspected to be sickening with, cholera. Rags, worn bedding, and old clothes unwashed, may no longer be imported from France or Italy, passengers' luggage alone excepted.

TELEGRAPH ACTS, 1868-1885.

INLAND TELEGRAMS REGULATIONS.

I, THE RIGHT HONOURABLE SIR JOHN JAMES ROBERT MANNERS, G.C.B., Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (commonly called Lord John Manners), with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, given under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, whose names are hereunder signed and written, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Telegraph Act, 1885, and of every other power enabling me in this behalf, do hereby make the following Regulations for determining the hours during which the Offices appointed by me to be places for the receipt and despatch of Telegrams shall be open for the transaction of telegraphic business, and for fixing the sums to be from time to time paid on account of the transmission of written Telegrams (hereinafter referred to as Telegrams) within the United Kingdom, and on account of services rendered in connection therewith, and for the general conduct of telegraphic business.

Payment in Stamps.

1. All charges on account of the transmission, delivery, repetition, and re-direction of Telegrams, and of replies to, or extra copies of, Telegrams, and on account of all other services rendered in connection with Telegrams, shall be paid by means of stamps.

Charge for Transmission.

2. The charge for the transmission of a Telegram originating and intended to be delivered within the United Kingdom shall be as follows, that is to say :—

- (1.) If the length of the Telegram does not exceed twelve words, 6d.
- (2.) If the length of the Telegram exceeds twelve words, 6d. for the first twelve words, and one halfpenny for every additional word.

Names, &c., charged.

3. The names and addresses of the senders and addressees of Telegrams shall be counted as part of the words for which payment is required.

Free Delivery within certain limits.

4. The sum charged for the transmission of a Telegram shall cover the cost of delivery by special foot messenger at any address within the limit of one mile from the Terminal Telegraph Office, and (if the Terminal Telegraph Office is a Head Post Office) within the limits of the Town Postal Delivery, whatever may be the extent of such delivery.

Direction for Delivery by Post.

5. If the sender desires his Telegram to be forwarded by post from the Terminal Telegraph Office he may write the words "by Post" or "Post" (naming the Office at which the Telegram is to be posted) at the end of the address of the person to whom it is to be delivered, and in that case no charge will be made for

delivery, but the words "by Post" or "Post" will be charged for as part of the message.

Charges for Delivery to be paid by Sender.

6. The sender of a Telegram shall be responsible for all charges incurred in or about the delivery thereof.

Delivery by Messenger.

7. When the address of delivery of a Telegram is not within the limit of free delivery from the Terminal Telegraph Office, and the sender does not write the words "by Post" or "Post" at the end of the address, the Telegram shall, in the absence of some other special arrangement with either the sender or the addressee, be delivered at distances less than three miles from the Terminal Telegraph Office by special foot messenger, and at distances beyond that limit by mounted messenger.

Charge for Delivery by Foot Messenger.

8. The charge for delivery of a Telegram by special foot messenger shall be at the rate of 6d. for each mile or part of a mile, reckoned from the boundary of the district of free delivery to the address of delivery.

Charge for Delivery by Mounted Messenger.

9. The charge for delivery of a Telegram by mounted messenger shall be at the rate of 1s. for each mile or part of a mile, reckoned from the Terminal Telegraph Office to the address of delivery, except in some parts of Ireland, where the charge may be at the rate of 8d. for each mile or part of a mile, reckoned from the Terminal Telegraph Office to the address of delivery.

Charge for Delivery to be Prepaid.

10. When the address of delivery is not within the limit of free delivery from the Terminal Telegraph Office the sender must, when practicable, state its distance from such office and prepay the charge for delivery.

Delivery by Public Conveyance.

11. If the sender of a Telegram desires to have it delivered by a public conveyance he must pay the cost of such conveyance, or deposit 1s. to cover the cost of conveyance, and any unexpended balance of the sum deposited will be refunded to him.

Delivery on board Ship not alongside a Wharf, &c.

12. The sender of a Telegram, addressed to a person on board a vessel not alongside a wharf, pier, or jetty must deposit the following sums to cover the cost of boat hire:—

- (1.) If the vessel be in the Thames off Gravesend, in the Mersey off Liverpool, or in any similar situation, 5s.
- (2.) If the vessel be in the Pool, London, 1s.
- (3.) If the vessel be in any situation not included in either of the preceding classes, such reasonable sum as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time direct.

Any unexpended balance of the sum deposited will be returned by the Secretary of the Post Office.

Deposit of Telegrams in Letter Boxes.

13. Telegrams deposited with stamps attached thereto in wall or pillar boxes, or in letter-boxes of ordinary Receiving Offices or Post Offices, not being Telegraph Offices, shall be taken to the nearest Telegraph Office on the first collection of letters from the place of deposit, and forwarded thence in due course by telegraph.

Deposit of Telegrams with insufficient Stamps.

14. A Telegram so deposited without any stamp attached thereto will not be forwarded, but

a Telegram so deposited with a stamp attached will be forwarded, although insufficiently prepaid, and the deficiency, if not collected from the addressee, shall be paid by the sender.

Repetition by Sender.

15. The sender of a Telegram may have it repeated back, station by station, but no copy of the Telegram is in any such case given to the sender.

Repetition by Receiver.

16. The addressee of a Telegram may have it repeated from the office of origin.

Charge for Repetition.

17. The charge for repetition, whether requested by the sender or the addressee, shall be one-half of the charge for transmission, any fraction of one halfpenny being charged as one halfpenny.

Illustration.

If the charge for the transmission of a Telegram is 7½d., the charge for repetition will be 4d.; if 8½d., the charge for repetition will be 4½d.

Sender must pay beforehand for Repetition.

18. In the case of repetition from station to station at the request of the sender, the charge for repetition shall be prepaid at the same time as the charge for the transmission of the Telegram.

19. In the case of repetition at the request of the addressee, the charge for repetition shall be paid when the request for repetition is made; and if on such repetition the original Telegram is found not to have been accurately transmitted, the amount paid for repetition shall be returned.

Prepayment for Reply.

20. The sender of a Telegram may pay for the transmission of a reply thereto the same sum as would be paid for an ordinary Telegram of the same length, provided that the sum so paid by the sender shall in no case be less than 6d., or exceed 2s.

Pass for Reply.

21. When a reply to a Telegram has been paid for, a Pass shall be delivered to the addressee, which will enable him, or any person to whom he may deliver the same, to send from any Telegraph Office a Telegram not exceeding in length the number of words stated on the Pass, whether in reply to the original Telegram or not, and whether addressed to the sender of the original Telegram or not, at any time within two calendar months after the date indicated by the office stamp on the Pass.

Unused Pass.

22. If the Pass be not used, the sum prepaid for it will be repaid on application to the Secretary of the Post Office at any time within two calendar months after the date indicated by the office stamp on the Pass. The Pass must be forwarded together with the application, and the sum prepaid will be paid to the applicant whether such applicant be the sender or not.

Telegrams to several Addresses.

23. The sender of a Telegram may have copies of it delivered to several persons within the limits of free delivery from any Telegraph Office at an additional charge of 2d. for each copy, and for the purposes of this provision, any address within one of the postal districts of London shall be deemed to be within the free delivery from the head office in that district. The charge for Telegrams, of which copies are to be delivered in more than one of the Postal Districts of London, shall be at the full rate of an original Telegram for the initial copy for each district, and at the

rate of 2*d.* for each additional copy for that district; but the addresses of all such copies shall be reckoned amongst the chargeable words in the original Telegram.

Illustration.

A Telegram containing twelve words of text and the following addresses (which contain twenty words in all):—

Thomas, Bermondsey, S.E.,
Harrison, Borough, S.E.,
Smith, Dulwich, S.E.,
Brown, Covent Garden, W.C.,
Joseph, Vere-street, W.,
Williams, Piccadilly, W.,

will be charged as follows:—1*st.* 1*s.* 4*d.* for the thirty-two words of the original Telegram, then 6*d.* each or 1*s.* for the text of the two Telegrams addressed to Brown and Joseph respectively, and then 2*d.* each or 6*d.* for the three copies at the reduced rate addressed to Harrison, Smith, and Williams respectively, in all 2*s.* 10*d.*

Hours at Offices for Telegraphic Business.

24. The offices appointed by the Postmaster-General to be places for the receipt and despatch of Telegrams shall be open for the transaction of telegraphic business during such hours as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time in respect of each office appoint.

Telegrams tendered out of Office Hours.

25. Postmasters may on the request of any person keep open their offices for the acceptance of Telegrams after the appointed hours, and for the transmission of such Telegrams to any Postal Telegraph Office which is open at the time, or the attention of which (if the office be closed) can be gained, and the Postmaster of each office so kept open is authorized to accept (in addition to the ordinary Telegram charges) and to retain for his own use and the use of his clerks and messengers the following fees, in manner and subject to the provisions hereinafter mentioned, by way of remuneration for such special service, that is to say:—

- (1.) For each Telegram—
 - (a.) If the office is not open for either postal or telegraph business 1*s.* for the Postmaster, 1*s.* for the telegraph clerk, 1*s.* for a messenger, if one be required to call the clerk.
 - (b.) If the office is open for ordinary postal business but not for telegraph business, 1*s.* for the telegraph clerk, 6*d.* for a messenger, if one be required to call the clerk.
 - (c.) If the office is open for the receipt of Press news, but not for other telegraph business or for ordinary postal business, 6*d.* for the Postmaster, 6*d.* for the telegraph clerk.
- (2.) Separate fees shall be payable for each Telegram tendered.
- (3.) If a Postmaster or clerk be specially disturbed to send off a Telegram, and it subsequently appears that the Telegram cannot be despatched, the person desiring to send it must nevertheless pay the same fees as he would have done if the Telegram had been despatched.
- (4.) When Telegrams are handed in to be transmitted to an office at an hour when that office (hereinafter called the Terminal Office) is closed for telegraph business, the following fees for the clerk and messenger at the Terminal Office shall be paid by the sender of the Telegram, that is to say:—
 - (a.) If the Terminal Office is not open for either postal or telegraph business 1*s.* for the telegraph clerk, 1*s.* for the messenger, 6*d.* an

hour for the clerk if he has to wait at the office for a reply.

(b.) If the Terminal Office is open for ordinary postal business but not for telegraph business 1*s.* for the telegraph clerk, 6*d.* for the messenger.

(5.) The same fees that are payable to the Terminal Office shall be also payable to any intermediate transmitting office there may be if such intermediate office has closed or has to be kept open more than ten minutes beyond the appointed hour for closing.

26. When the Terminal Office for any Telegram is a Sub-Office, Branch Office, or Receiving Office, and such Terminal Office is closed at night or on Sundays, the Telegram may be delivered from the Head Office in the same town or place, but in that case the sum charged for the transmission of the Telegram shall cover the cost of delivery by special foot messenger within a distance of one mile only from the Head Office, and the rates of portage chargeable under the preceding Regulations shall be charged for all distances beyond one mile, even though the address of the Telegram is within the limits of the Town Postal Delivery of such Head Office.

Language of Telegrams.—Code Telegrams.

27. Telegrams written in Latin or in any modern European language and in English characters, shall be counted and charged for in the same way as Telegrams written in the English language, but all words not forming part of any modern European language or Latin, and all unintelligible combinations of letters shall be counted and charged for at the rate of five letters to a word.

Telegrams must be in English Characters.

28. Telegrams not written in English characters cannot be forwarded or accepted.

Mode of Counting.

29. A combination of two or more words shall be counted and charged for according to the number of separate words contained in it, except that the combination shall be counted and charged for as a single word, when so written and where according to ordinary usage the separate words may be written as one word or be connected by a hyphen.

Illustrations.

- (a.) The following combinations shall be counted and charged for as one word when so written: Mid-day, To-day, To-night, Tomorrow, Half-penny, Two-pence, can-not, Mother-in-law, Alms-house, Fifty-five.
- (b.) The following exceptional combinations shall be counted and charged for as one word: o'clock, O'Neil, McDonald, De Morgan.
- (c.) The names of all towns and villages shall be counted as one word each, thus: Newcastle-on-Tyne, New York, Malvern Wells, Newton-le-Willows, shall be each counted as one word.

30. The prefix St. shall be counted and charged for as part of the following word.

Illustration.

St. Pancras shall be counted as one word.

31. The following abbreviations of combinations of words shall be counted and charged for as single words—can't, won't, don't.

32. All initial capital letters shall be charged for separately as one word each, whether a full stop follow them or not.

Illustration.

"G.W." "G.N." shall be counted as two words,

each. The name "J. T. Smith" shall be counted as three words. Such a combination of letters as "N.E.R." if written in capitals shall be counted as three words, but if written together in small letters the same combination of letters shall be counted as one word in accordance with Regulation 27.

As an exception the initial letters denoting the several London Postal Districts shall be counted as one word for each set of district initials.

Illustration.

"E.C.," "S.E.," "S.W.," shall be counted as one word each.

33. If words are intended to be underlined or placed in a parenthesis or within inverted commas in the transcript of the message to be made at the Terminal Telegraph Office, two additional words shall be counted and charged for in respect of each underline or parenthesis or set of inverted commas.

34. When the sender of a Telegram desires that special instructions, such as "private," "confidential," "to be opened at once," or the like, shall be written on the envelope containing the transcript of the Telegram which is to be delivered to the addressee, he must write the instructions on the telegram form immediately after the address, and such instructions shall be counted and charged for as part of the Telegram.

35. Numbers expressed in figures shall be counted and charged for at the rate of five figures to a word.

36. Ordinal numbers expressed in figures shall be counted and charged for according to the last Regulation, and an additional word shall be counted and charged for in each case for the affixes st, nd, rd, th.

Illustrations.

1st shall be counted as two words.

13th shall be counted as two words.

122nd shall be counted as two words.

37. Where a group of figures is followed by a letter of the alphabet, the letter shall be counted and charged for as a word.

Illustration.

104 A shall be counted as two words.

38. The bar used in fractions shall be counted the same as a figure.

Illustrations.

$\frac{1}{2}$ shall be counted as one word.

$10\frac{7}{8}$ shall be counted as one word.

$94\frac{3}{8}$ ths shall be counted as two words.

39. In groups of letters and figures which express time, the division which separates hours and minutes shall be counted and charged for as one figure, and the letters "a.m." and "p.m.," when written without stops, thus "am" "pm," shall be each counted and charged for as one word.

Illustrations.

12.35 shall be counted as one word.

10.37 am shall be counted as two words.

40. Sums of money expressed in figures combined with letters and bars, or other symbols, shall be counted in the way indicated in the foregoing rules.

Illustration.

$\frac{7}{6}$ shall be counted as one word.

7s. 6d. shall be counted as four words.

£10/19/5 shall be counted as three words.

41. When sums are expressed partly in words and partly in figures, each set of figures shall be counted and charged for separately.

Illustrations.

7 pence shall be counted as two words.

10 pounds 17 shillings shall be counted as four words.

Cancellation.

42. The sender of a Telegram may cancel it before delivery to the addressee, subject to the following provisions:—

(1.) If the application be made before the commencement of the transmission of the Telegram from the office of origin, the sum prepaid for transmission, and the sum (if any) prepaid for delivery, will be returned on application to the Secretary of the Post Office at any time within three calendar months.

(2.) If the application be made after the commencement but before the completion of the transmission of the Telegram from the office of origin no part of the sum prepaid for transmission will be returned, but the sum (if any) prepaid for delivery will be returned on application to the Secretary of the Post Office at any time within three calendar months.

(3.) If the application be made after the transmission of the Telegram from the office of origin has been completed it may still be cancelled if practicable by means of a service message addressed to the Postmaster of the office of delivery, which shall be prepaid by the sender as an ordinary Telegram. In this case no part of the sums paid by the sender will be returned, but if the service message should arrive too late to prevent the despatch of the Telegram from the office of delivery the sender will, if practicable, be informed that the attempt to cancel the Telegram has failed.

Cancellation only by Sender.

43. When a Telegram has been accepted for transmission it shall not be cancelled, nor shall its transmission be suspended or interfered with, on the application of any person except the sender or addressee.

Delivery to known Addressee anywhere.

44. If the addressee of a Telegram is known to the messenger it may be delivered wherever on the road to the address the messenger may meet with him, but only on payment of such sum (if any) as would have been payable for the delivery of the Telegram if it had been delivered at the address of delivery.

Interruptions.

45. When by reason of an interruption of the means of telegraphic communication a Telegram cannot be transmitted by telegraph, notice of the interruption shall, if practicable, be given to the sender, together with a statement of the cost of forwarding and delivering the Telegram by special means, and on payment of such cost the Telegram shall be forwarded and delivered accordingly, or the sender may at his option cancel the Telegram, in which case and whether the Telegram shall or shall not have been transmitted from the office of origin, all moneys already paid by him shall be returned on application to the Secretary of the Post Office, at any time within three calendar months.

46. When by reason of an interruption in the means of telegraphic communication a Telegram cannot be transmitted by telegraph, and the sender cannot be found, or, if found, declines either to cancel the Telegram, or to pay for its transmission by special means the Telegram shall be forwarded and delivered without extra charge by post or in such other manne: as the Postmaster-General may deem practicable.

Indecent Telegrams not transmitted.

47. No Telegram shall be transmitted which

To all to whom these presents shall come the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England send greeting:

WHEREAS a new church has lately been built within the parish of Preston Candover, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, and has been consecrated and dedicated to the Virgin Mary.

And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and the Very Reverend George William Kitchin, Dean of the Cathedral Church at Winchester, acting on behalf of the Dean and Chapter of the said Cathedral Church at Winchester, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Preston Candover, and the Reverend Sumner Wilson, Incumbent of the same vicarage, have, by an instrument under their hands, bearing date on or about the twenty-seventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, certified to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, that it would be for the convenience of the said parish of Preston Candover, that the said new church of the Virgin Mary, situate within such parish, should be substituted for the old parish church (also dedicated to the Virgin Mary) of the same parish.

Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the power or authority in that behalf contained in the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her present Majesty, chapter

seventy, and in the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling us in the same behalf, do, by this instrument under our common seal, with the consent (testified as hereinafter mentioned) of the said Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, and of the said Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church at Winchester, and of the said Sumner Wilson, hereby declare that the said new church of the Virgin Mary, situate within the said parish of Preston Candover, and duly consecrated as aforesaid, shall be and the same is hereby substituted for the said old parish church (dedicated to the Virgin Mary as aforesaid) of the same parish, and that such new church shall henceforth be the parish church of the said parish of Preston Candover in lieu of the said old parish church of the Virgin Mary as fully in all respects as if the said new church of the Virgin Mary so hereby substituted had been originally the parish church of the same parish.

And we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in further pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities aforesaid, and with such consents as aforesaid (testified as hereinafter mentioned), do hereby transfer all the endowments, emoluments, and rights of or belonging to the said old parish church (dedicated to the Virgin Mary as aforesaid) of the said parish of Preston Candover or of or belonging to the Vicar or Incumbent thereof to the said new church of the Virgin Mary (now being by virtue of these presents the parish church of the said parish of Preston Candover, and to the Vicar or Incumbent thereof, and his successors for ever.

In witness whereof to these presents we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have set our common seal, and the said Edward Harold Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal, and the said Dean and Chapter of Winchester have affixed their common or corporate seal and the said Sumner Wilson has set his hand and seal this sixth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

Isle of Man Harbours Act, 1883.

THE following Resolution of the Court of Tynwald of the Isle of Man was, on the 7th September, 1885, approved by the Committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council for Trade:—

At a Tynwald Court, holden at Douglas, the 17th day of July, 1885—

The Court having, on the requisition of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, considered the advisability of appointing, under the provisions contained in "The Isle of Man Harbours Act, 1883" (being an Act of the Imperial Parliament), the payment of a duty on passengers carried for hire by vessels entering or leaving the harbours of Douglas and Ramsey, at which harbours improvements have been made for which it is considered reasonable to charge such duty—

Resolved—

That, subject to the approval of the Committee

of Her Majesty's Privy Council for Trade, from and after the expiration of one calendar month after the publication of this resolution in the London Gazette, the following duty shall be payable by the owner or owners or master of each vessel entering or leaving either of the said harbours of Douglas and Ramsey, that is to say:—

For every passenger carried for hire and embarked or disembarked at either of the said harbours, the sum of one penny:

Provided always, that such duty shall not be payable in respect of ferry or pleasure boats used or plying in or about either of the said harbours or either of the bays of Douglas and Ramsey and licensed by the Isle of Man Harbour Commissioners:

Provided also, that as to any vessel carrying passengers for hire on any single voyage or trip which begins and ends at either Douglas or Ramsey, the said duty shall be payable in respect of embarkation only: and that as to any voyage between Douglas and Ramsey the said duty shall be payable at each place in respect of embarkation only:

Provided also, that in the case of a voyage or trip being of the description commonly known as an "excursion" or "pleasure trip," the same shall be considered as a single voyage or trip, notwithstanding that stoppages may be made and passengers permitted to land during the course of the voyage at any place within this Isle other than Douglas and Ramsey, and other than that at which the trip commences or ends.

Resolved—

That, on the foregoing resolution commencing and taking effect, the resolution of this Court dated the 14th day of June, 1883, appointing a duty on passengers at Douglas, shall be and stand revoked.
