By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Swine-Fever (Infected Circles) Order of 1884 (in this Order referred to as the Circles Order), do direct and order, and it is hereby directed and ordered, as follows:

1. The Circles Order shall, from the dates mentioned in Article 2 of this Order, apply and extend to and be in force in the District mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, and shall continue to apply and extend to and be in force in that District until the Privy Council by further Special Order direct and order.

2.—(a.) The provisions of Article 5 (*Power to Local Authority to make Regulations*) of the Circles Order shall apply and extend to and be in force in such District from the date of this Order.

(b.) Except as aforesaid, the provisions of the Circles Order shall apply and extend to and be in force in such District from and immediately after the twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

(SWINE-FEVER.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 28th day of September, 1885.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Areas (namely),—(1.) the East Ilsley Petty Sessional Division, in the county

of Berks; (2.) the Wantage (with Lambourne) Petty Sessional Division, in the county of Berks; (3.) the Wallingford Petty Sessional Division, in the county of Berks; (4.) the Faringdon Petty Sessional Division, in the county of Berks; and (5.) the parish of Sandhurst (with Crowthorne), in the county of Berks,—which were declared by Orders of Council to be Areas infected with swine-fever, are hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and those Areas shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be Areas infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.
