Rome, April 15.

ON Monday was held a Consistory, wherein the Cardinal Imperiale was declared Legat of Ferrara, the Cardinal Canteini Legat of Urbino, and Signior Cosim Archbishopp of Tarvis, Nuncio to the Emperor. Don Antonio Ottoboni is gone to take a review of the Troops designed for the Levant, who are to Embark the next week at Civita Vecchia. Don Livio Olsfalchi, Nephew to the last Pope, received two days ago an Express from Madrid, with the news of his being made a Grandee of Spain; and this day he parted from hence for Venice and Vienna. The Pope has appointed the Abbot Conti, Nephew to the Cardinal of that name, to carry the consecrated Sword and Cap to the Doge of Venice.

Milan, April 19. Commissions are daily given out here for new Levies, and the other preparations for the Campaign are carried on with an extraordinary application. We are told from Turin by Letters of the 15th Instant, that the Duke of Savoy had received an account from the Governor of Mondovi, that the People inhabiting the Mountains had taken Arms; That in a Rencontre with some of his Troops, they had killed the Major of the Regiment of Saluzzo, and 15 Soldiers; and that they had fortified and secured several Passes: Whereupon he immediately ordered the first Battalion of his Guards, with several Troops of Horse, to march against them.

Warsaw, March 24. The last prolongation of the Term for the fitting of the Dyet, expires to-morrow, being Easter Eve: In one of the late Sessions there happened a Difference between the Poles and Lithuanians, which was carried so high, that several were wounded, and the Dyet was in great danger of being broke, but by the King's interposition, the matter was composed, and since things have proceeded with more calmness; and it's hoped, though the time that remains is so very short, they will yet finish the most important matters before them. We have not heard what is become of Monsieur de Gravelle the French Minister, since he retired privately from hence, (of which you had formerly an account.) The Points charged upon him, were, That he had endeavoured to beget a division in the Royal Family; to excite the Subjects of this Crown to a Revolt; and to break the Dyet: To clear himself of which Accusation, he writ a Letter to the King before his departure, which it seems rather served to encrease, than lessen his Majesties resentment against him, seeing he had the presumption to own, that he had endeavoured to dissuade the Prince of Poland from the Marriage proposed with the Princess Palatine of Neubourg, and to give him an ill impression of those that laboured therein, in which he had perhaps spoke with too much freedom of the Queen, who, he was informed, had been the chief promoter of that Council and Resolution. The Letters from Lemberg, and other places on the Frontiers, con-

firm the news of the defeat of a great Party of Turks and Tartars, who had been out upon an excursion, and were returning with their Booty to Caminiec, and of the advantage our Troops had afterwards against a Detachment of the Garrison of Caminiec that sallied out upon them. The Preparations for the Campagne are making with all the diligence for the present State of Affairs here will permit, and the King has declared, that he will command his Army in Person this Summer.

Dantzick, April 14. The Letters from Warsaw of the 7th Instant tell us, That the Dyet, which 'twas thought would have ended on Easter Eve, had been again prolonged for 14 days, that so they might have time to dispatch the publick Affairs, and not leave them to another Dyet; which, according to custom, must meet the next time in Lithuania.

Vienna, April 23. This whole Court is going into Mourning for the Duke of Lorraine. About the same time the news came of his Death, we received an account also of the death of Abafsi Prince of Transylvania, who has left a Son of 13 years of age, to whom it's believed the Emperor will confirm the Succession. The Elector of Bavaria is named to command the Imperial Forces against the French, and Prince Louis of Baden against the Turks. This day Te Deum was sung here for the surrender of Carafa; in which place, the Imperialists have found great store of large Artillery, taken heretofore from the Christians, and some with old German Inscriptions. There will be more Troops sent to reinforce the Blockade of Great Waradin, which is already reduced to such extremities, that (as 'tis related by some Prisoners that have been lately taken) the Garrison has again mutined against the Bassa, demanding Money and Bread, or that he would capitulate, and that he had been forced to promise them, that if they were not very suddenly relieved, he would surrender. From Zagabria, the Capital City of Croatia, we have advice, That the Croats of Novi, and the Neighbouring Places, had made an Incurision into the Ottoman Territories as far as Montenegro, where they burnt a Castle called Hassaratagh, upon the River Krupa, in which 60 Turks were killed, and but 3 Croats. The Dyet of Poland continues still.

Brussels, May 3. The Baron d'Uubuy, who assisted on the part of our Governor at the Conference lately held at Aix la Chapelle between Prince Waldeck and the Brandenburg Generals, is returned hither, and has made his Report to his Excellency. We hear from Lisle, that the French are going to form a Camp between Tournay and St. Amand.

Paris, May 2. The Court continues still at Marli. The Heart of the Dauphiness was, on the 25th past, carried by the Bishop of Meaux to Val de Grace, where it was deposited in St. Anne's Chapel. The Duke of Luxemburg is on his departure for Flanders. The Letters from Savoy give an ac-

count, of a great Insurrection of the People inhabiting about *Mondovi*, and that they were grown so strong, that the Duke of *Savoy* had not only been obliged to send his own Guards against them, but to order several of his Troops, that were posted in the Valley of *Lucerne*, to march that way; and that the *Vaudois* had thereupon made an Incursion into *Pradmont*. It's said, that Duke has sent hither for Assistance.

*Hague*, May 5. The Heer *Van Amerongen* Envoy Extraordinary from this State to the King of *Denmark*, parted from hence this week on his Journey thither; and in his way will negotiate some Affairs at *Munster*, *Hamburg* and the other Hanse Towns. And the Heer *Van Heemskerke*, and the Heer *Van Hairen*, who go in the same Quality to the Emperor and the Court of *Sueden*, are preparing for their departure. The Count *de Horne* is going to his Government of *Stuyce*: The report of a Treachery said to be discovered there, does not hold.

*Edinburg*, April 22. This day our Parliament met, in pursuance of their last Adjournment, and after some debate, and the taking of the Oaths by the Earl of *Belcarres*, and others, Adjourned till Friday the 25th Instant. There have been lately two descents made by the *Highlanders*; one near *Inverness*, whereupon Sir *Thomas Levison*, the Governor thereof, detached 600 Foot and 300 Horse, who advanced towards the Enemy, and found them 1000 strong, and very advantageously posted on the top of a Hill with Bogs and Woods on each side of them; Sir *Thomas Levison* seeing they could not be assaulted there, ordered a Detachment of Horse and Dragoons to get beyond them, which the Enemy perceiving, and fearing their Retreat would be cut off, immediately broke to pieces in spite of their Officers, and made the best of their way home. Another Party of the *Highlanders* shewed themselves near *Montross*, where the *Angus* Regiment lies, but upon the first appearance of the Garrison, retired in great confusion. Six hundred Foot are to Embark at *Greenock*, under the Convey of the *Dartmouth*, *Lark*, and *Farsan*, in order, as 'tis said, to some design upon the Isle of *Mull*.

*Belfast*, April 20. On Friday last arrived here two Regiments of Foot, commanded by Colonel *Foules* and Colonel *Lloyd*, from *Bristol*.

*Chester*, April 28. On Monday last the *Ruby*, that conveyed to *Ireland* the Ships from *Bristol*, arrived in *Highlake* with several Vessels from *Belfast*. On Thursday Count *Nassau's* Regiment marched from hence to *Highlake*. The same day came in here the *Brandenburg* Regiment, which marched the next day to *Highlake*. Sir *Clouffy Shovel* arrived there the 25th in the Evening; The 27th, sailed above 60 Ships with Recruits, Wagons, Horses, &c. And the Regiments and Horses that were then shipping, went to Sea, as 'tis believed, with this morning Tide.

*Pembroke*, April 23. On Monday last came in here the *Kingsfisher*, with about 30 Sail of Merchant-men under her Convoy, having on Board Colonel *Trelawny's* Regiment, and some Recruits: They stay here for a fair Wind to carry them for *Ireland*. Here is also in Port the *Sardar*, the *Esripe*, and the *Saphire*.

*Plymouth*, April 27. On the 25th Instant, Admiral *Ruffel* in the *Suffolk*, with the *Rupert*, the *Barack*, the *Dorford*, the *Expedition*, and a Dutch Man of War of 30 Guns, arrived here from the *Groyne*; whence they parted on the 11th Instant: Their Majesties Ship the *Duke*, with several other Men of War, English and Dutch, being gone into the *Straits*. At the same time arrived here a Dutch Caper with 4 or 5 French Prizes. This day Admiral *Ruffel* sailed with 5 Men of War to the Eastward, the *Dejeux* remaining here. This day likewise arrived here the *Courier* Galley, with two Merchant Ships under her Convoy, bound for the *Dowry*.

*Bristol*, April 27. Yesterday arrived here several Vessels from *Carriackfergus*; the Matters whereof I, y, That People come daily from *Dublin*, and give an account, that the Irish Troops are in a very ill condition,

that they have little or no Horse that's serviceable, so that the Soldiers are very much disheartened.

*Portsmouth*, April 27. On Friday last passed by *St. Helena* to *Comes* the *Constant Warwick*, the *Ship*, *St. Helena*, the *Gregory*, with about 60 Sail of Vessels laden with Stores for *Ireland*; They will take with them the last 53 boats that are now at *Cowes*, and sail with the same Wind. Yesterday came to *St. Helens* Their Majesties Ship the *Forrester* and *Galania*, with the *Mary*, *Katherine*, and *Kitchen* Yachts, from the *Dowry*.

*Dial*, April 28. Yesterday the *Wolwich* sailed out of the *Dowry* with several Vessels under her Convoy for *Ireland*. Yesterday was brought in a Vessel laden with Butter and Hides from *Ireland*, and bound, as is pretended to *Offenburg* but she had several persons on Board that design to land in *France*.
