

- The supply by the Corporation of materials used for private improvements.
- The repair and lighting of private streets, occupation roads, and footways, and their conversion into public streets or ways repairable by the Corporation.
- The mode of giving notices under Section 150 of the Public Health Act, 1875.
- The providing and cleansing of urinals, privies, ashpits, ashtubs, water and other closets, the conversion of privies into water or other closets, and the compelling of a supply of water thereto.
- The compelling houses to have a proper supply of water.
- Slaughter houses.
- The giving of certificates that buildings are fit for human habitation, and the preventing the occupation of any buildings unfit for that purpose.
- The disconnecting waste water pipes from drains and sewers.
- The payment by occupiers for removal from premises of refuse other than ordinary house refuse.
- The height and area and situation of rooms used for habitation.
- The prohibiting the turning into sewers and drains of steam condensing water, offal, and refuse.
- Private drains.
- The ventilation and drainage of, ingress to, and egress from, buildings of public resort.
- The fencing of vacant land.
- Ovens, furnaces, and vaults under streets.
- The security of platforms, balconies, and temporary erections.
- The removal and prohibition of wooden buildings.
- The deposit of building materials.
- Projections from or beyond buildings.
- The regulation of bicycles, tricycles, and other like mechanical contrivances.
- Frontage or building line.
- The deposit, approval, and disapproval of plans of new streets and buildings.
- The construction and the regulation of the workmanship, materials, drainage, ventilation, and sanitary arrangements and details of buildings.
- The formation, line, and level of new streets.
- The placing, removing, and prohibiting the erection of telegraph, telephone, and overhead wires.
- Rag and bone dealers.
- Obscene bills.
- Police powers over vacant land.
- The prohibiting or regulating of criers or touters for luggage carts, luggage carriers, refreshment houses, refreshment rooms, stalls, saloons, shows, exhibitions, vehicles, and places of amusement.
- Sunday trading and hawking.
- Stray dogs.
- Advertising vans.
- Advertisements and bill posting in or upon streets, buildings, vehicles, and property of the Corporation.
- Public libraries, public museums, schools for science, art galleries, and schools for art, and the property therein and the admission thereto.
20. To extend the definition of the words "house" and "room" in or for the purposes of Sections 35 to 41, 91 to 111, and 120 to 125 of the Public Health Act, 1875, so as to include all buildings, vehicles and caravans used for human habitation.
21. To define the word "person" in Section 65 of the Blackpool Improvement Act, 1879.
22. To make further provisions with respect to the licensing of pleasure boats and bathing machines, and their proprietors, crews, managers, and attendants, and the conditions and duties to be fulfilled by them respectively.
23. To prohibit in streets, public places, and vacant land, shows, exhibitions, entertainments, and street music and singing unless with the license of the Corporation, and to make provisions as to the granting of such licenses.
24. To empower the Corporation to sell or dispose of unclaimed property found in hackney carriages, boats, bathing machines, or in any street or market, and to appropriate the proceeds thereof.
25. To prohibit the employment of young children in the streets.
26. To make further provisions as to the granting and revoking and the amount of the fees for licenses granted by the Corporation.
27. To revise and extend the powers of the Corporation under the Blackpool Improvement Act, 1879, for the production and supply of electric light, heat, and motive power.
28. To enable the Corporation to deviate vertically and horizontally from the lines and levels of the works shown on the deposited plans to the extent to be prescribed by the Bill.
29. To enable the Corporation to purchase or otherwise acquire, compulsorily or by agreement, and to take leases of lands, buildings, easements, and other property for all or any of the purposes of the Bill.
30. To enable the Corporation to acquire by agreement, or to take leases of the whole or any portion of the foreshore within or adjacent to the borough, or so to acquire any rights or jurisdiction thereover now exercisable by Her Majesty the Queen in right of Her Duchy of Lancaster.
31. To enable the Corporation to enter into and carry into effect any agreements, and to confirm and if need be to vary any agreements which may have been or which during the progress of the Bill may be entered into by the Corporation, for or relating to the acquisition of any lands for any of the purposes of the intended Act.
32. To break up and also to stop up, alter, divert, and interfere with, either temporarily or permanently, and if permanently to appropriate the site of and extinguish all right of way over and to cross over, under, or upon all such streets, roads, highways, bridges, thoroughfares, railways, tramways, rivers, streams, brooks, water-courses, sewers, drains, gas and water pipes, and telegraph and other electric apparatus, as it may be necessary or convenient to break up, stop up, alter, divert, interfere with or cross for any of the purposes of the Bill, and to extinguish all rights of way and other rights in over or upon any lands to be acquired under the powers of the Bill.
33. To authorise the Corporation to sell for a gross sum or sums or annual rent charges, or to exchange or otherwise dispose of, grant building and other leases of and let for building purposes, all or any lands, buildings, and hereditaments from time to time belonging to or vested in them, and to sell or dispose of all such annual rent charges and the reversion in any land or buildings, and to extend the powers of the Corporation with respect to the holding, retaining, and disposing of lands.
34. To enable the Corporation to acquire by agreement any manorial rights, franchises and other rights in, over, or in any way affecting the borough, and themselves to exercise and enjoy or to extinguish those rights and franchises or any of them when acquired.
35. To enable the Corporation to create reserve funds for their gas undertaking and cemetery.
