WHEREAS, by the four hundred and tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, upon the completion of any new lighthouse (in which term are included floating and other lights exhibited for the guidance of ships) Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of every ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by and subject to which the light dues authorized to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected.

And whereas the Corporation of Trinity House, of Deptford Strond, are about to place a light-vessel off the Middle Cross Sand, near Yarmouth;

Now therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, from and after the date of the exhibition of the said light, there shall be paid in respect of the said light-vessel, for every ship, whether British or foreign, the toll of four-sixteenths of a

penny per ton of the burden of every such ship for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom if on an oversea voyage, and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton if on a coasting voyage.

The said toll shall be levied by the Corporation of Trinity House of Deptford Strond, subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the New Consolidated Tables of Light Dues sanctioned by Orders in Council dated, respectively, the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in an Order in Council dated the twentyfirst day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and also in the special section of the Consolidated Tables sanctioned by Order in Council dated the sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, or to such other regulations and exemptions as may from time to time be duly sanctioned, and subject also to the gross abatement or discount of seventy per centum sanctioned in an Order in Council dated the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, or to such other abatement or discount as may for the time being be in C. L. Peel.

And whereas the Commissioners of Irish Lights are about to place a new light-vessel near the Skulmartin Reef off the coast of the County Down and a light will shortly be exhibited therefrom:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, from and after the exhibi-

tion of the said light, or from and after the time Liddell do hereby in pursuance of the powers of the receipt of notice of such exhibition by the officers authorized to collect light dues, there shall be paid in respect thereof for every vessel, whether British or foreign, which shall enter or pass through the area defined by imaginary lines drawn from the Mull of Galloway to Donaghadee and from the Mull of Galloway to the Quinton Rock at the north side of the entrance to Lough Strangford a toll of three-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving beneat therefrom if on an oversea voyage, and one-sixteenth of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom if on a coasting voyage.

The said tolls shall be levied subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the new Consolidated Table of Light Duties sanctioned by Orders in Council dated respectively the twentyfourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the Order in Council dated the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and also in the special section of the Consolidated Tables prepared in pursuance of an Order in Council dated the sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, or to such other regulations and exemptions as may from time to time be duly sanctioned, and subject also to the gross abatement or discount of seventy per centum mentioned in an Order in Council dated the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, or to such other abatement or discount as may for the time being C. WHEREAS Adolphus George Charles Liddell, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, duly appointed in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, as Commissioner for the purpose of determining the boundaries of the Wards of the borough of Tynemouth, and of apportioning the Councillors thereto, transmitted to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State his determination and apportionment in the following terms:-

> "Municipal Corporations Act 1882. (45 and 46 Vict. cap. 50) Borough of Tynemouth.

"WHEREAS Her Majesty has been pleased by and with the advice of the Privy Council and in pursuance and exercise of the power vested in Her Majesty by the Municipal Corporations Act 1882 to fix the number of Wards into which the borough of Tynemouth shall be divided and to order and direct that the said borough shall be divided into four Wards, which Order was made on the nineteenth day of May 1885.

"And whereas on the tenth day of June 1885 the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State in pursuance of the 30th section of the said Act did duly appoint Adolphus George Charles Liddell Esquire Barrister-at-Law to be a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of such Wards and apportioning the number of the Councillors of the said borough among such Wards as in the said Act mentioned.

" Now I the said Adolphus George Charles !

given me by virtue of the said appointment under the said Act determine as hereinafter mentioned the boundaries of the four Wards into which the said borough is to be divided, which Wards are hereinafter numbered alld named as follows that is to say :

Ward No. 1 otherwise The Tynemouth Ward. Ward No. 2 otherwise The North Shields Ward. Ward No. 3 otherwise The Percy Ward East.

Ward No. 4 otherwise The Percy Ward West. "And I do hereby determine that the said Ward No. 1 otherwise the Tynemouth Ward shall comprise so much of the borough of Tynemouth as is contained within a line drawn from the River Tyne in a northerly direction to Tyne-mouth-road immediately to the eastward of Percysquare thence following the centre of the highway leading from Newcastle-upon-Tyne to the village of Tynemouth to Bedford-street and thence in a southerly direction down the centre of Bedfordstreet the Wooden Bridge and the Broad Quay to the River Tyne in which Ward are comprised all the streets lanes ways and passages lying within the aforesaid bounds and description.

"And I do hereby determine that the said Ward No. 2 otherwise the North Shields Ward shall comprise so much of the borough of Tynemouth as is contained within a line drawn from the River Tyne up the Broad Quay Wooden Bridge and Bedford street to the centre of the highway from Newcastle-upon-Tyne to the village of Tynemouth thence along the centre of the said highway easterly to Preston-road thence in a northerly direction up the centre of Preston-road to the village of Preston and afterwards in a westerly direction along the centre of the main street of the said village to Hawkey's-lane thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the said lane to the said highway from Newcastleupon-Tyne to the village of Tynemouth thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the said highway to Coach-lane thence along the centre of the said lane to the middle of Lawson-street thence in a westerly direction along the centre of the said street and Lawson-street West to the middle of Dock-street and thence along the centre of the said street in a southerly direction to the River Tyne in which Ward are comprised all the roads streets lanes ways and passages lying within the aforesaid bounds and description.

"And I do hereby determine that the said Ward No. 3 otherwise the Percy Ward East shall comprise so much of the borough of Tynemouth as is contained within a line drawn from the River Tyne in a northerly direction to the highway leading from Newcastle - upon - Tyne to the village of Tynemouth immediately to the eastward of Percy-square thence in a westerly direction along the centre of the said highway to Preston-road proceeding northward up the centre of Preston-road to the village of Preston thence in a westerly direction along the centre of the main street of the said village to the Preston North-road thence in a northerly direction along the centre of the said road to the boundary of the borough and thence in an easterly direction along the said boundary to the foreshore of the sea in which ward are comprised all the roads streets lanes and passages lying within the aforesaid bounds and description.

"And I do hereby determine that the said Ward No. 4 otherwise the Percy Ward West shall comprise so much of the borough of Tynemouth as lies to the westward of a line drawn from the northern boundary of the borough up the centre of the Preston North-road in a south-

erly direction to the village of Preston along the centre of Hawkey's-lane to the highway from Newcastle-upon-Tyne to the village of Tynemouth thence in an easterly direction along the centre of the said highway to Coach-lane thence along the centre of the said lane to the middle of Lawson-street thence in a westerly direction along the centre of the said street and Lawsonstreet West to the middle of Dock-street and thence along the centre of the said street in a southerly direction to the River Tyne in which Ward are comprised all the streets lanes ways and passages lying within the aforesaid bounds and description.

"And I the said Adolphus George Charles Liddell do hereby in further pursuance of the said Act and of the powers given me under the same by virtue of the said appointment assign and

HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding " of benefices in plurality, and to make better "provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, " hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts " may be separated from the parishes or mother "churches to which they belong, with great " advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial "may in some instances with advantage be " annexed to parishes or districts to which they are "contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to "his own diocese it shall appear to the Arch-

"bishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of "any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Arch-" bishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the "case may be, may be advantageously separated " from any parish or mother church and either be "constituted a separate benefice by itself or be " united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other "adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to "form a separate parish or benefice, or that "any extra-parochial place may with advantage "be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate " parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said "Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme "in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his "consideration) describing the mode in which it "appears to him that the alteration may best be " effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-"diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and "other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, "and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, "may be made with justice to all parties "interested; and if the patron or patrons of the "benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or "their hands to such scheme, or to such modifica-"tion thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any "such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall "be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make " an Order for carrying such scheme, or modifica-" tion thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas Richard Lord Bishop of Chichester bath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the tenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, to the Right Honourable Edward White Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:-

"To the Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend Richard Lord Bishop

of Chichester do hereby represent to your Grace:
"That there are in the county of Sussex, and my diocese of Chichester the rectory and parish church of Woolbeding, the rectory and parish church of Stedham, and the rectory and parish church of Linch, the limits and boundaries of the said parishes respectively being well-known and defined.

"That at the northern portion of the said parish of Linch and immediately abutting on one side thereof lies a certain contiguous part of the parish of Woolbeding (being a detached portion of the said last-mentioned parish). And that at another portion of the said parish of Linch, called Woodman's Green, and immediately abutting on one side thereof, lies another certain contiguous part of the said parish of Woolbeding.

" That at the said portions of the said parish of Linch and immediately abutting on the western side thereof and on the western side of the said contiguous parts of the said parish of Woolbeding lies a certain contiguous part of the said parish of

Stedham.

"That the parish of Woolbeding, the parish of Stedham and the parish of Linch are respectively set forth upon the plan which accompanies this memorial, and that on such plan the parish of [ Woolbeding is coloured part brown and part pink, the parish of Stedham is coloured part yellow and part green and the parish of Linch is coloured blue, such parts of the said parish of Woolbeding as lie contiguous as aforesaid to the said parish of Linch are the parts thereof coloured pink, and that part of the said parish of Stedham as lies contiguous as aforesaid to the said parish of Linch is the part thereof coloured green.

"That according to the last census the popula-tion of the said parish of Linch is 115 persons, the population of the said parish of Woolbeding is 398 persons, the population of the said parish of Stedham is 565 persons, the population of those portions of the said parish of Woolbeding which lie contiguous as aforesaid upon the said parish of Linch is 156 persons and the population of that portion of the parish of Stedham which lies contiguous as aforesaid upon the said parish of Linch and upon the said portions of the said parish of Woolbeding is 52 persons.

"That the parish church of Linch is conveniently situate for and adapted to the accommodation of the inhabitants of the said contiguous places being parts of the said parish of Woolheding, the most distant part of the same being 1½ miles more or less from the said parish church of Linch and approached by a good highway.

"That the same parish church of Linch is also conveniently situate for and adapted to the accommodation of the inhabitants of the said contiguous place being part of the said parish of Stedham, the most distant part of the same being 2 miles more or less from the said parish church of Linch and also approached by a good highway.

"That good roads lead from all parts of the said several contiguous places to the parish church

of Linch.

That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or landowners of the said contiguous places within the said parish of Woolbeding possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive right of any pews or sittings in the parish church of Woolbeding or in the parish church of Linch.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or landowners of the said contiguous place within the said parish of Stedham possess any legal rights by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive right of any pews or sittings in the parish church of Stedham or in the parish church of

"That the patronage of the said rectory and parish church of Woolbeding belongs to the Right Honourable Diana Harrict Louisa Lady Lanerton of Woolbeding House, Widow, the patronage of the said rectory and parish church of Stedham belongs to Annie Esther Scrimgeour of Wispers, Midhurst, Widow, and the patronage of the said rectory and parish church of Linch belongs to the Right Honourable Charles George Earl of Egmont of Cowdrey Park.

"That the rector of the said rectory and parish church of Woolbeding is the Reverend William Richard Wood Stephens, the rector of the said rectory and parish church of Stedham is the Reverend Robert Cooke Bull, and the rector of the said rectory and parish church of Linch is the Reverend Henry Godwin Billinghurst.

"That it appears to me that the said contiguous parts of the said parish of Woolbeding may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament passed in the session holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, cap. 106, be advantageously separated from the said parish of Woolbeding and be united to and be deemed part | bounded on the north and north-west by the

and parcel of the rectory and parish of Linch for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That it also appears to me that the said contiguous part of the said parish of Stedham may under the provisions of the same statute be advantageously separated from the said parish of Stedham and be united to and be deemed part and parcel of the rectory and parish of Linch for ecclesiustical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act of Parliament I have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may best be effected, and I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Right Honourable Diana Harriet Louisa Lady Lanerton, the patroness of the said rectory and parish church of Woolbeding, of Annie Esther Scrimgeour, Widow, the patroness of the said rectory and parish church of Stedham, of the Right Honourable Charles George Earl of Egmont, the patron of the said rectory and parish church of Linch, of the Reverend William Richard Wood Stephens as the rector of the said rectory and parish church of Woolbeding, of the Reverend Robert Cooke Bull as rector of the said rectory and parish church of Stedham, and of the Reverend Henry Godwin Billinghurst as rector of the said rectory and parish church of Linch, to the intent that your Grace may, if after full consideration and enquiry you should be satisfied with the said scheme, certify the same and such consents by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the said represention are as follows; -

"The SCHEME above referred to.

"That there shall be separated from the said rectory and parish church of Woolbeding and be united to and be deemed part and parcel of the rectory of Linch for ecclesiastical purposes.

"Firstly.—All that detached portion of the parish of Woolbeding (being the northern portion thereof) and which said detached portion is entirely separated from the remainder of the said parish of Woolbeding by a portion of the parish of Linch.

" Secondly.—All that portion of the said parish of Woolbeding bounded on the north and northcast by the said portion of the said parish of Linch, on the east by the parishes of Fernhurst and Easebourne on the south by an imaginary line starting from a boundary stone marked W. on the boundary line between the said parishes of Woolbeding and Easebourne thence passing westwards immediately south of the farmhouse known as Pigeon Hill Farm and south of the site of Linch parsonage at points marked by boundary stones and ending at a boundary stone marked WS. where the said imaginary line crosses the boundary of the parishes of Woolbeding and Stedham and on the west by the said parish of Stedham.

"All which said portions of the said parish of Woolbeding are comprised within the 'plan hereto annexed and are thereon coloured pink.

"That there shall be also separated from the said rectory and parish church of Stedham and be united to and be deemed part and parcel of the rectory of Linch for ecclesiastical purposes.

"All that portion of the said parish of Stedham

"That there shall be assigned and attached to the said rectory and parish of Linch the yearly sum of thirty-one pounds and eighteen shillings part of the rent-charge of two hundred and eighty pounds per annum given in lieu of the tithes of the lands within the said parish of Woolbeding under the provisions of the Act for the the Commutation of Tithes in England and Wales, such yearly sum of thirty-one pounds and eighteen shillings being composed of the several sums assessed upon the lands comprised in the following schedule :--

"That all fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for marriages churchings burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the parish or parish church of Linch in respect of the said detached and separated portions of the said parish of Woolbeding, and in respect of the said separated portion of the said parish of Stedham shall from henceforth belong to the incumbent of the said parish of Linch.

"That the inhabitants of the said detached and separated portions of the said parish of Woolbeding shall not in future be entitled to any accommodation in the said parish church of Woolbeding and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the said parish church but shall be entitled in common with the parishioners of the said parish of Linch to accommodation in the parish church of Linch and shall be liable subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rates Act 1868 to the repairs of the said church.

"That the inhabitants of the said separated portion of the said parish of Stedham shall not in future be entitled to any accommodation in the said parish church of Stedham and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the said parish church, but shall be entitled in common with the parishioners of the said parish of Linch to accommodation in the parish church of Linch and shall be liable subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rates Act 1863 to the repairs of the said church.

"In witness whereof we the said Diana Harriet Louisa Lady Lanerton, Annie Esther Scrimgeour, Charles George Earl of Egmont, William Richard Wood Stephens, Robert Cooke Bull and Henry Godwin Billinghurst have respectively hereto set our hands this fourth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Your Majesty (session 2) chapter twenty-six, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain alterations and improvements at the episcopal residence belonging to the See of Ripon, which is situate near Ripon in the West Riding of the county of York

"Whereas the Right Reverend William Boyd, now Bishop of the diocese of Ripon is desirous that certain permanent improvements should be made at the said episcopal residence near Ripon, and has submitted to us the particulars of such

proposed improvements.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said proposed improvements a sum of four hundred pounds should be provided by borrowing the same by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick of Ripon.

"And whereas under the provisions of an Order (duly gazetted) of Your Majesty in Council dated the twenty-ninth day of June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five a sum of one thousand pounds was advanced by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty upon a mortgage of the lands

tenements and hereditaments belonging to the said bishoprick of Ripon.

" And whereas the monies (if any) now due in respect of the said mortgage together with the sum of four hundred pounds now proposed to be borrowed as aforesaid do not exceed two years

income of the See of Ripon. "Now therefore with the consent of the said William Boyd, Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme, we the said

Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts, any sum not exceeding four hundred pounds, and that as a security for the same, the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of thirty years or until the said sum of four hundred pounds with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following, that is to say during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term of thirty years, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage no part of the said principal sum shall be repay able, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter pay to the said Governors their successors and assigns one thirtieth part of the said principal sum, until the whole thereof shall be repaid and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore-mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall have become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale: in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale. And that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said William Boyd now Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese, until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of four hundred pounds shall be paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of our joint treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge to the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof and that upon the receipt of the said sum of four hundred pounds the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the episcopal residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinnamed Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ripon.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial " of the dead in England beyond the limits of the " Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning "the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid,

may seem fit: No 25539. And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by He Order in Council of the twentieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty - seven, to direct the discontinuance of burials in the church and churchyard of Holy Trinity, Bristol.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir Richard Assheton Cross, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the above-named parish ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that the said Order of Her Majesty in Council should be varied by substituting the directions hereinafter set forth for those contained in the said Order in so far as they affect burials in the said church and churchyard:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Order in Council of the seventeenth day of September last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the thirty-first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said first-recited Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order in Council, dated the twentieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty - seven, be varied, and that burials be discontinued in the said church and churchyard as follows, viz.:

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Holy Trinity, Bristol, in the county of Gloucester; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order, viz.:—widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth.

And whereas at the date of the said Charter there was in existence a School Board for the said parish of Croydon. The said School Board is hereinafter referred to as the Parish School Board. And whereas the said School Board for the said parish continued to act as a School Board for the whole of the said parish of Croydon, including the said detached portion thereof until the 25th day of March, 1883, when, by virtue of an order made by the Local Government Board under the provisions of the Detached Parishes Act, 1882, the said detached portion of the parish was severed therefrom and became annexed to and formed part of the parish of Sanderstead in the said county.

And whereas thereafter and until the 18th day of June, 1885, the said School Board acted as a School Board for the borough of Croydon created by the said Royal Charter.

And whereas on the 1st day of May, 1885, an Order was made by the Education Department for the election of a School Board for the borough of

duly elected, and the same is hereinafter referred to as the Borough School Board.

And whereas in the course of the ordinary conduct of business by the Parish School Board certain Acts were done by the Parish School Board, by the Council of the Borough of Croydon, and by certain Justices acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division of Croydon.

And whereas under the provisions of the School Boards Act, 1885, the Council of the said borough have petitioned Her Majesty in Council that a scheme may be made and settled containing the provisions hereinafter contained.

And whereas it is expedient, right, and just

that such a scheme should be settled

Now therefore the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council have settled a scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby order and declare as follows:-

(1.) This scheme may be cited for all purposes as "The Croydon School Board Scheme, 1885."

(2.) This scheme shall come into operation on the date of its confirmation by Order in Council, which date is hereinafter mentioned as the commencement of this scheme.

(3.) Upon the day of the commencement of this scheme the Parish School Board shall cease to exist, and upon and after the said day all the powers, rights, privileges, franchises, duties, obligations, property, things in action, and liabilities whatsoever, exerciseable by, or vested in, or attaching to the Parish School Board shall be transferred to and extend to continue and vest in and be exercised by and be enforceable against the Borough School Board.

(4.) The Municipal Borough of Croydon and the parish of Croydon shall be the School District of the School Board for the time being in force for the borough of Croydon.

(5.) The acts respectively mentioned in the schedules hereto shall be deemed to have been duly authorized by law, and to have been duly done by the Parish School Board, the Council of the said Borough, and the Justices of the Peace acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division of Croydon respectively.

(6.) The Borough School Board, elected pursuant to the said Order of the Education Department, shall be deemed to have been a legally constituted School Board, and any persons who have been or are acting as members of the Borough School Board shall be deemed to have been legally chosen and to have formed and to form a legal School Board, and on the retirement of all or any members of the said School Board the vacancies may be filled up in the same manner in all respects as if such retiring members or member had been and were in all respects legally chosen members of a legally constituted School Board.

# TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows :-

#### Interpretation Clause.

1.—(1.) The expressions "Parcels" and "Parcel" in this Warrant respectively mean any postal packet, which is posted as a parcel, in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same.
(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" in-

cludes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

(3.) The expression "Lord Lieutenant" means the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being.

(4.) The expressin "arms" includes any cannon, gun, revolver pistol, and any description of fire-arms, also any sword, cutlass, pike, and bayonet, also any part of any arms as so defined.

(5.) The expression "ammunition" includes | bullets, gunpowder, nitro-glycerine, dynamite, guncotton, and every other explosive substance, whether fitted for use with any arms or otherwise.

(6.) The expression "prohibited district in Ireland" means any place in Ireland in respect of which the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council in Ireland, may have made or may make orders for prohibiting or regulating therein the sale or importation of arms and ammunition.

Places between which Parcels may be transmitted.

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and British Guiana and Cyprus.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

3. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant any Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches, or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel), or which shall exceed in weight seven pounds.

Rates of Postage.

4. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant between the United Kingdom and British Guiana there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage (that is to say):-

On every Parcel not exceeding one pound in

weight ten pence.

On every Parcel exceeding one pound and not exceeding seven pounds in weight, for the first pound ten pence, and for every additional pound, or fraction of a pound in weight, eight

5. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant between the United Kingdom and Cyprus there shall be charged and paid the follow-

ing rates of postage (that is to say):—

In the United Kingdom.

On every Parcel not exceeding one pound in

weight, one shilling and four pence.

On every Parcel exceeding one pound and not exceeding seven pounds in weight, for the first pound one shilling and four pence, and for every additional pound, or fraction of a pound in weight, eight pence.

In Cyprus.

On every Parcel not exceeding one pound in weight, one shillings and three piastres.

On every Parcel exceeding one pound, and not exceeding seven pounds in weight, for the first pound, one shilling and three piastres, and for every additional pound, or fraction of a pound in weight, six piastres.

Prepayment.

6. The postage chargeable according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned respectively shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall, in the United Kingdom, be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps.

Times of Posting.

7. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland, on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post (

No. 25539.

Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

8. Except as otherwise provided in this W:11 rant, all Parcels shall in the United Kingdom be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

9. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:-

(1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at.

the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

- (3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall be paid by means of postage stamps affixed to such Parcel, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration as aforesaid, and until such Parcel has been so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon shall have been properly paid: and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration and without being so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon properly paid as aforesaid such Parcel shall be detained and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.
- 10. Any packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter-box or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say :-

(1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as

the case may be).

(2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage the same may be forwarded to its destination as a Parcel charged with the sum of three pence in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel.

Collection of Parcels.

11. The Postmaster-General may, if he think

fit, from time to time authorize such officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Retention of Parcels at Postes Restantes.

12. Any Parcel addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom "to be called for" shall, if not called for, remain in such office for a period of one week after the date of the arrival of such Parcel thereat, and shall then be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Parcels for Places beyond limits of free Delivery.

13. If the place of address in the United Kingdom of any Parcel be beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district to which the same may be forwarded by post, such Parcel shall be detained at the nearest Post Office until an opportunity of delivering the same shall occur, or in default of any such opportunity until a period of one week shall have elapsed from the time of the receipt of Parcel at such Post Office. Upon the expiration of such period without such Parcel having been called for, such Parcel shall be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Parcels addressed to Ships.

14. Any Parcel addressed to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom shall, if from any cause such Parcel cannot be delivered at such ship, be detained at the Post Office at such port for a period of one calendar month, and if not delivered at the expiration of that time such Parcel shall be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

15. With regard to

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within the respective times in this Warrant specified in that behalf; and

(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or

for any other sufficient reason;

The following provisions shall apply, that is to

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary,

be there opened and examined.

(2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel, or the Declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given by Post to the sender by the Post Office of the place from which the Parcel was transmitted to the United Kingdom that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender or his agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be returned to him by post, in either case upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned.

(3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), and notice shall also be given to the Post Office of the place from which the Parcel was transmitted to the United Kingdom, that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender or his agent, or be returned to the sender by post.

(4.) In any case the notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who in the Postmaster-General's judgment is entitled to receive the Parcel, it shall be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.

(5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.

(6.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of the "Post Office (Parcels) Act,

7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of the sum of one penny in respect of every day or part of a day during which the Parcel remains at the place appointed as aforesaid after the expiration of three calendar months from the day on which the

Parcel has arrived at such place.

(8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable shall be prepaid by the sender in stamps before the return of the parcel to him.

(9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a

Parcel is entitled to receive the same. (10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

11.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General it becomes offensive or injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel, have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Re-direction of Parcels.

16. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its

original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland parcel.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

17. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

### Prohibitions.

18. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post any Parcel consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene picture, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, print, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article or thing of any other kind or any Parcel having thereon, or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscenc, libellous, or grossly offensive character, and if any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which prima facie appears to be, or which any Officer of the Post Office may have reasonable cause to suspect to be, a Parcel within the description aforesaid, the same shall be detained, opened, and examined, and if on such examination it be found to infringe this or any other of the Regulations contained in this or any other Treasury Warrant relating to the Post Office, it may be dealt with and disposed of in any manner which may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

19. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for

conveyance by post:---

(1.) Any Parcel containing any substance, material, article, or thing of any kind whatsoever, which might, in the course of transmission through the post, be or become, or be rendered injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or any other person who may deal with such Parcel, or to any bag, basket, box, or other receptacle in or by which such Parcel may be conveyed by post, or to any other Parcel or other contents of any such receptacle.

(2.) Any Parcel consisting of or enclosing any bladder or other membraneous substance con-

taining a liquid of any kind.

(3.) Any Parcel containing a live animal of

any kind whatsoever.

(4.) Any Parcel which either from the nature of the contents thereof, or from the absence of proper packing or covering, is, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General or his officers, likely to injure any person in the course of the conveyance of the Parcel through the post, or any receptacle in or by which such Parcel may be conveyed by post, or any other Parcel or any other contents of such receptacle.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

20. There shall not be posted or tendered for conveyance by post any Parcel consisting of or

containing more than one Parcel or other Postal Packet, where any one of such Packets is intended for delivery to a person other than the addressec of such Parcel, and if any such Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post the contents thereof, so far as the same consist of Parcels, may be forwarded to the addressees of such Parcels charged with new and distinct rates of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and so far as the same consist of other Postal Packets, may be treated and charged as unpaid Postal Packets, or such Parcel may be otherwise dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

21. There shall not be conveyed or tendered or delivered for conveyance by post in or to any prohibited district in Ireland any Parcel containing arms or ammunition, and any such Parcel, if posted or tendered or delivered for conveyance by post as aforesaid, may be detained and opened and returned to the sender thereof, or otherwise

dealt with according to law.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

22. In any case not hereinbefore expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for safety of Parcels.

23. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

24. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage.

25. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect or in consequence of any loss of or damage to any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

26. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of the "Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

27. The Postmaster-General may, in any case

in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

28. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.
