PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz.:

In that part of the parish churchyard of Old Windsor which was added thereto in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Towcester, in the county of Northampton, to the thirteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Exning, in the county of Suffolk, to the twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

In the parish churchyard of Richmond, in the county of York, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

(SWINE-FEVER.)

AT the Council Chamber, *Whitehall*, the 29th day of *December*, 1885.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—the Abingdon Petty Sessional Division, in the county of Berks,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the third day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area so all, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirtieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.
