THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

## SCHEDULE.

An Area round Crastock Farm, in the parish of Woking, in the county of Surrey, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at a point in Berry-lane where a foot-path to the main Guildford and Knaphillroad leaves the lane, thence by such foot-path to its junction with such main-road, thence by an imaginary line to Sanders-lane, thence by Sanderslane to its junction with Berry-lane aforesaid, thence across Berry-lane and by the foot-path to Ellis Place Farm, thence by the south boundary fences of the fields numbered 1214 and 1213 on the 25 inch ordnance map to Berry-lane aforesaid, and thence by such lane in an easterly direction till the footpath leading to the main Guildford and Knaphill-road is again reached.
