TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS.

#### By Her Majesty's Command,

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, before twelve c'clock, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fiftyfive; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eightytwo; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation bearing date the tenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael and All Angels situate at Stoke Newington Common in the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill and of the parish of West Hackney in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parish and parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill and of the said parish of West Hackney should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels situate at Stoke Newington Common as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick, Bishop of the said diocese of London with the consent of the Reverend Arthur Brook, Clerk in Holy Orders rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Saint John at Hackney, and as such rector or incumbent the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill and with the consent of William Amhurst Tyssen-Amherst of Didlington Hall in the county of Norfolk, Esquire, a Member of the Commons House of Parliament the patron of the rectory of the said parish of West Hackney (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those conti-guous portions of the said new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill and of the said parish of West Hackney which are described in the schedule hercunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Michael and All Angels situate at Stoke Newington Common aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels Stoke Newington Common.<sup>3</sup>

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

#### "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Michael and All Angels Stoke Newington Common being :----

"All those several contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill and of the parish of West Hackney both in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point at or near to the junction of High-street Stoke Newington with Cazenove-road where the boundary dividing the said parish of West Hackney from the new parish of Saint Andrew Stoke Newington in the county and diocese aforesaid joins the boundary which divides the said parish of West Hackney from the new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill aforesaid and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of Cazenove-road aforesaid for a distance of forty- |

six chains or thereabouts to a point at the junction of the same road with the road called or known as Upper Clapton upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill from the new parish of Saint Matthew Upper Clapton in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence first southward and then southeastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts thereby following the middle of the last-mentioned road to the junction of the same road with Northwoldroad where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill from the new parish of Saint James Clapton in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence southwestward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts thereby following in part the middle of Northwoldroad aforesaid to the point on the north-eastern. side of Brooke-road where the said last-mentioned, boundary joins the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Clapton from the parish of West Hackney aforesaid and extending thence southward along the last-described boundary for a distance of three chains or thereabouts thereby crossing Brooke-road aforesaid to the point at or near to its intersection by Evering-road where the said last-described boundary joins the boundary which divides the said parish of West Hackney from the new parish of Christ Church Clapton in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence westward along the last-described boundary for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts thereby again crossing Brooke-road aforesaid at or near to its intersection by Jennerroad to the point a little to the north of Brookeroad aforesaid where such boundary strikes the . middle of the line of the Great Eastern Railway and extending thence that is from the said lastdescribed boundary north-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts thereby crossing Stoke Newington Common to a point on the northern side of the same common at the centre of the bridge which carries the road which leads from the church of Saint Michael and All Angels past the northern side of the said common and past the western end of Gibson's-buildings into High-street Stoke Newington aforesaid over the same line of railway upon the boundary which divides the said parish of West Hackney from the new parish of Saint Thomas Stamford Hill aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of nine and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby following in part the last-described boundary) to a point at the junction of the said last-described road with High-street Stoke Newington aforesaid opposite to the gates forming the castern entrance to Abney Park Cemetery upon the boundary which divides the said parish of West Hackney from the parish of Saint Mary Stoke Newington in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence northward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of one chain or thereabouts thereby following the middle of High-street Stoke Newington aforesaid to the point opposite to the lodge on the northern side of the said entrance-gates to the cometery aforesaid where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary which divides the said parish of West Hackney from the new parish of Saint Andrew Stoke Newington aforesaid and continuing thence still northward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of one chain or thereabouts thereby still following the middle of

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High-street Stoke Newington aforesaid to the first-described point at the junction of the lastnamed-street with Cazenove-road as aforesaid where the last-described boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of West Hackney from the new parish of Saint Thomas, Stanford Hill aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fiftyfive; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eightytwo; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventeenth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five in the words and figures following; that is to say :-

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Agnes situate at Toxteth Park in the particular district of Saint Clement Toxteth Park in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said particular district of Saint Clement Toxteth Park and of the district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such particular district and district chapelry respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said particular district of Saint Clement Toxteth Park and of the said district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Agnes situate at Toxteth Park as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Charles Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool as such Bishop with the consents of the Venerable John Jones Archdeacon of the Archdeaconry of Liverpool, of Charles Groves of New Brighton in the county of Chester Esquire, of Edward Whitley of the city of Liverpool a member of the Commons House of Parliament, and of Douglas Hebson of the same City Esquire, the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Saint Clement Toxteth Park and with the consent of George Henry Horsfall, of the city of Liverpool aforesaid Esquire the patron of the perpetual curney of the said district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said particular district of Saint Clement Toxteth Park and of the said district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Agnes situate at Toxteth Park as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Agnes Toxteth Park.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

#### "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Agnes, Toxteth Park, being :--

" I. All that portion of the particular district of Saint Clement Toxteth Park in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool which is bounded upon the north-east and upon the south by the district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the west and upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the two said cures at the point where Ullet-road is joined by the road called or known as Sydenhamavenue, and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called or known as Arundel-avenue, and continuing thence still northward across the last-mentioned road in a direct line to the southern end of the wall or fence which divides the house and garden known as Number 31 Arundel-avenue from the house and garden known as Number 33 Arundel-avenue, and continuing thence still northward along the said wall or fence for a distance of one and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the Toxteth Park Cemetery and extending thence eastward along the lastdescribed wall or fence for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the buildings and premises known as the Toxteth Park Union Workhouse and extending thence north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the enclosure known as

'the Friends Cemetery,' and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its north-eastern end on the southwestern side of Smithdown-road and continuing thence still north-eastward and in a direct line to the boundary in the middle of the last-named road, which boundary divides the said particular district of Saint Clement Toxteth Park from the hereinafter described portion of the district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park which is detached (or nearly detached) from the main body of the same district chapelry and which is bounded upon the south-west by the particular district of Saint Clement Toxteth Park aforesaid and is touched at its north-western extremity by a portion of the parish of Walton-onthe-Hill in the county and diocese aforesaid and is bounded upon the north-east and upon the east by the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wavertree in the said county and diocese and upon the south by the particular district of Saint Matthew and Saint James Mossley Hill in the same county and diocese."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Hor said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Liverpool. THE following Statute, passed on the 12th day of January, 1886, by the Governing Body of Oriel College, Oxford, and sealed on the 18th day of January, 1886, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 :--

A Statute to amend a Statute, made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict., c. 48), and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, in relation to Oriel College, in the University of Oxford, duly made at a General Meeting of the Provost and Fellows of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 12th day of January, 1886, and passed at such meeting by the votes of two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, and submitted to Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

Whereas by Statute IV, 7, made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, in relation to Oriel College, in the University of Oxford, it was enacted as follows :--

"7. Four exhibitions shall always be maintained "within the College, to be called the exhibitions of "Adam de Brome, and to be filled up by the elec-"tion of deserving persons whom the Provost and "Fellows shall have ascertained to be in need of "support at the University. Each Exhibitioner "shall receive such sum, not exceeding  $\pounds 30$  per "annum, from the Exhibition Fund, as the Provide "and Fellows shall from time to time determine."

"The Exhibitioners shall be elected by the "Provost and Fellows, with or without examination, " and with or without public novice, as the electors " shall think fit."

"The conditions of tenure of these Exhibitions "shall be the same in all respects as those of "Scholarships, save that in the event of any one of "the Exhibitioners being elected to a Scholarship "within the College, or censing, in the judgment of "the Provost and Fellows, to be in need of support "at the University, he shall thereupon vacate his "Exhibition."

And whereas under the said Statutes the emoluments of Adam de Brome Exhibitioners are the same as those of Scholars of the College, and the conditions of tenure, other than that of the Exhibitioners being in need of support at the University, of Adam de Brome Exhibitions are the same in all respects as those of Scholarships within the College.

And whereas it appears to us the Provost and Fellows of the said College, that the abilities and attainments of the persons qualified for election to Exhibitions of Adam de Brome, and offering themselves as candidates for such Exhibitions at elections held with examination and with public notice, are in many cases equal or not inferior to those of candidates for Scholarships within the College, and that it is desirable that such persons, if elected to such Exhibitions, should not be placed in respect of rank or title in a position interior to that which they would hold if elected to Scholarships within the College.

We, the said Provost and Fellows of the said College, being the governing body thereof, do hereby in exercise of the power given to us by the 54th section of the said Act, alter Statute IV, 7, as hereinbefore set out, by adding thereto the following words :--

"It shall be 'awful for the Provost and Fellows, "at or upon the election after examination, and "with public notice of any such Exhibitioner, or "under and in pursuance of regulations made by "them from time to time respecting the election "after examination and with public notice of such "Exhibitioners to assign to any Exhibitioner or "Exhibitioners so elected the title of Scholar, and "to the Exhibition or Exhibitions so filled up, the "name of Scholarship, provuded that no exercise "by the Provost and Fellows of the power hereby "given shall offect the conditions of tenure herein-"before expressed with respect to such Exhibi-"tions."

THE following Statute, passed on the 22nd day of January, 1886, by the Governing Body of Merton College, Oxford, to be substituted for Statute IV, 6 (a), of the existing Statutes of the College, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 :--

#### PROPOSED NEW STATUTE.

A Postmastership shall be tenable for two

years from the commencement of the Michaelmas Term next following the day of election, and shall then determine, unless the Warden and Fellows have at the last preceding stated meeting declared themselves satisfied with the industry and good conduct of the Postmaster, in which case the Postmaster's tenure shall be renewed for a further period of two years. At the end of the latter period the Warden and Fellows may extend any Postmastership for one year longer, if for special reasons they deem it advisable, but not so as to interfere with the regular recurrence of vacancies.

#### War Office, February 8, 1886.

THE Secretary of State for War has received the following Despatch from Lieutenant-General Sir Frederick Stephenson, K.C.B., commanding Her Majesty's Forces in Egypt, relative to the recent operations on the Upper Nile and near Suakin :-

From the General Officer Commanding in Egypt to the Secretary of State for War.

Abri, January 2, 1886.

Sir, REFERRING to my telegram of the 30th ultimo, announcing the result of the operations against the enemy at Giniss on that date, I have now the honour to forward a detailed account of the action.

On the 29th December, the concentration of the Frontier Field Force being complete, the following dispositions were made, and orders issued.

The whole force to bivouac on a spot about 700 yards north of Kosheh Fort, the 1st Brigade and Cavalry in advance, the 2nd Brigade with screw battery in rear.

Troops to park blankets and greatcoats at bivouac in early morning.

Infantry to carry 80 rounds of ammunition-20 rounds per man in reserve to be carried on camels.

Men to breakfast at four A.M. One quart of water per man to be carried by transport in rear, on camels. One day's rations ready to be placed on camels, and moved off when sent for.

All reserve ammunition to be placed in Kosheh Fort.

The 1st Infantry Brigade, with Egyptian Battery and Camel Corps attached, to move off at five A.M.

The cavalry to follow upon Absarat road, keeping main body in touch with 1st Infantry Brigade.

The English Camel Corps to be in support of cavalry, and keep touch with 2nd Brigade.

The Bearer Company to move in rear of 2nd Brigade.

The Field Hospital to be erected on river bank near Kosheh Fort, and a small guard detailed in charge.

The Officer Commanding H.M.S. "Lotus" to get up steam at five A.M., ready to move at daylight.

By 5.15 A.M. the whole force had marched from bivouac.

The Infantry brigades moved off in a southwesterly direction, and seized a high rocky ridge running parallel to and overlooking the village occupied by the enemy, near Kosheh Fort, and also enemy's camp at Giniss, three miles from Kosheh Fort.

The 2nd Brigade arrived before daylight on its ground on crest of ridge about 1,200 yards from and directly opposite the village of Kosheh.

Good position was taken up by guns on crest of hill.

The Yorkshire Regiment was deployed in halfbattalions on the right and left of the guns, with the 1st Battalion Egyptian Army in rear.

At 6.10 A.M. Major Whateley's battery commenced shelling the village.

The enemy opened sharp but ill-directed fire on the brigade, which was answered by volleys from the Yorkshire Regiment.

After the village had been shelled for a quarter of an hour, the Cameron Highlanders and the two companies of 9th Battalion, Egyptian Army, advanced along river bank from Khosheh Fort, and rushed the houses in the most gallant manner, bayonetting the dervishes and taking one brass

gun, the village being captured by 6.50 A.M. At the same time the "Lotus," under the com-mand of Lieutenant - Colonel Lloyd, Egyptian Army (Brevet Major, South Yorkshire Regiment), steamed up the river slightly in advance of the Cameron Highlanders and 9th Battalion Egyptian Army, bringing the Gardner gun and rifle fire of the West Kent detachment, under the command of Lieutenant Martyn, Royal West Kent Regiment, to bear on the enemy as the Cameron Highlanders drove them from house to house. The "Lotus" then anchored.

The Gardner gun of the "Lotus" did good service, killing about 60 men.

Meanwhile the 1st Brigade continued to move along the ridges, and when day broke was in its



proper position, a mile and a half south-east of the western end of Giniss.

The dervishes, who had been taken completely by surprise, now streamed out of their camp, riflemen lining the crests, pouring in a heavy but ill-directed fire on the 1st Brigade, which lasted for nearly forty minutes.

The enemy now attempted a charge on the left flank of the infantry line, coming on with great determination, their spearmen engaging the Egyptian Army Camel Corps hand to hand. Here Lieutenant Said Radwan received a sword cut on the hand, but killed his men.

Brigadier-General Butler, however, met them in line formation, and by steady volley firing broke them. They retired sullenly.

By this time the 2nd Brigade, which had been rejoined by the Cameron Highlanders and the 9th Battalion Egyptian Army, was in full sight of the village of Giniss and the camp of the dervishes, and the retreating enemy came under the fire of the screw guns, Gardner Battery, and the Infantry in line.

The 1st Brigade then advanced down the slope of the hill, and occupied at 9.5 A.M. the enemy's camp, which they found deserted, capturing two guns and fourteen standards.

The 2nd Brigade, advancing at the same time, occupied the village of Giniss at 9.20 A.M.

1,800 dollars were found in the village, but no supplies and very little grain.

As some fugitives from Giniss had re-occupied some houses in the village of Kosheh, I sent back a division of the Screw Gun Battery and the half battalion of the 1st Battalion Egyptian Army to retake it.

The dervishes fought with the greatest determination, and were not dislodged for a long time.

In taking these houses a promising Officer, Lieutenant Mohamed Hamdi, 1st Battalion Egyptian Army, and two Egyptian soldiers were killed. The Cavalry and Mounted Infantry swung

The Cavalry and Mounted Infantry swung round on left of 1st Brigade, and pursued in the direction of Atab, which was held weakly by the rebels, who were eventually dispersed by the Mounted Infantry, under Lieutenant - Colonel Barrow, Scottish Rifles, who drove them off with the bayonet, and by ten A.M. the Dervish Army was a disorganized mass of fugitives, their camp occupied, their treasury, four guns, and 20 standards falling into our hands.

At two P.M. the Brigade and all mounted men, excepting the two Camel Corps, which were attached to the 2nd Brigade, proceeded to Amara; supplies for them being sent forward by nuggars and "Lotus."

The whole of the preliminary arrangements, including the assembly of the troops and collecting of supplies and transport, were conducted by Major-General Grenfell with great promptitude and forethought.

The general plan of the attack on the 30th December was also made by him, and both in this as well as in the previons arrangements, he received most valuable support and advice from Brigadier-General Butler.

The occupation of the position held by our troops was carried out with secrecy and success, the enemy being completely taken by surprise.

The conduct of the troops, both officers and men, was marked by very great steadiness under fire and an eagerness to come into contact with the enemy, and has given me the greatest satisfaction.

The Cameron Highlanders and two companies intellig of Blacks, under the able command of Lieutenant-Colonel Everett, Cameron Highlanders, were conto him.

spicuous in these respects; their advance against the enemy was made with much gallantry, and the opportunity was not neglected of retaliating for the annoyance which the incessant fire of the enemy had subjected them to for the previous five weeks.

With the exception of the Cameron Highlanders and the battalion of black troops supporting them, who were obliged to resort now and then to independent firing, the whole of the Infantry fire was by volleys, steadily and accurately delivered.

The formation of the Infantry, after their positions were first occupied, was in line throughout the day.

Major Whateley's screw gun battery was very well handled; it came into action and limbered up, to occupy fresh positions, with great activity, and as promptly as the somewhat cumbersome process of screwing and unscrewing these guns will allow.

Their fire was rapid and very accurate, and officers and men worked with great spirit.

The first brigade, which bore the brunt of the enemy's attack, was most ably handled by Brigadier-General Butler, and the enemy's manœuvres were met by him with promptness of action and cool judgment, which are conspicuous in this excellent General Officer.

The enemy's actual force of fighting men on both banks I estimated at 6,000, irrespective of a large number of Dongolese and men of less warlike tribes who fied in the early part of the day.

I have great satisfaction in being able to speak in high terms of the good behaviour of the Egyptian troops, not only upon this occasion, but during their occupation of the line of railway.

They have displayed an excellent spirit, steadiness under fire in the open field as well as in the defence of their posts, and have come into personal contact with the dervishes, some of whom they bayoneted.

The good treatment they have received at the hands of their English officers, and the efficiency they have attained under their excellent guidance, coupled with the emulation brought into play by fighting side by side with English soldiers, have mainly produced this satisfactory condition, which holds out good promise for the future.

The liberality of Her Majesty's Government in awarding them a gratuity during the recent campaign, has also produced a very beneficial effect.

The hospital arrangements, both ambulance and field, were made in a most satisfactory manner by Deputy Surgeon-General Lithgow, and carried out by him until the arrival of Surgeon-General O'Nial at Halfa on the 26th December.

The Commissariat and Ordnance Store duties have been ably performed by Lieutenant-Colonel Skinner, Assistant Commissary - General, and Major Wintle, Assistant Commissary-General of Ordnance, respectively, whose energy has kept the force in the field well supplied.

It only remains for me now to mention those officers whose names I consider it my duty to bring to your favourable notice.

The services rendered by Major - General Grenfell, C.B., A.D.C., are the most conspicuous, and the very able manner in which he has conducted the arduous and responsible duties as Commander of the Frontier Field Force since the month of July last are deserving of all praise.

They have entailed much anxiety, and called into play great vigilance, forethought, and intelligence.

The success of the 30th December last is due to him.

He has been very ably and zealously assisted in these duties by Brigadier-General Butler, C.B., A.D.C., whose clear head, cool sound judgment, quick intelligence, and intimate knowledge of his duties thoroughly qualify him for high command.

Colonel Huyshe, C.B., Royal Berkshire Regiment, who commanded the 2nd Brigade, has fully justified my expectations; from his coolness in the field, quickness, and thorough knowledge of his duties I consider he will make an excellent Brigadier.

The Adjutant-General's Department was well represented by Colonel Ardagh, C.B., Royal Engineers, and Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel Murray, Royal Irish Fusiliers. The former rendered valuable assistance throughout the day, and the services of Lieutenant-Colonel Murray, who has been in charge of this department in the Frontier Force until Colonel Ardagh's arrival at Akasheh on the 27th December last, have been conspicuous f or unremitting application to duty and an inti-

mate knowledge of its details.

I am anxious to bring under your special notice the very valuable services rendered by Lieutenant-Colonel Colvile, C.B., Grenadier Guards, in charge of the Intelligence Department. It is to the untiring zeal he has displayed in collecting information, and the able manner in which he has organized his department, that I am indebted for the valuable guidance I have received in regulating the defence of the frontier.

Lieutenant-Colonel Hebbert, R.A., who commands the Artillery, English and Egyptian, has proved himself an excellent officer in the field, zealous and very competent; and under him Major Wodehouse, R.A., senior officer of Egyptian troops on the field, and in charge of the Camel Battery upon this occasion, displayed, as usual, activity and energy and great efficiency as an Artillery Officer.

Deputy Surgeon-General Lithgow. Modical Staff, made all the preliminary medical arrangements for the assembly of the troops at the front, and for the advance against the enemy, to my entire satisfaction, fully justifying confidence in him as a Principal Medical Officer.

him as a Principal Medical Officer. Lieutenant-Colonel Skinner, Assistant Commissary-General, Commissariat and Transport Staff, and Major Wintle, Assistant Commissury-General of Ordnance, Ordnance Store Department, have shown great energy and intelligence in providing the necessary supplies for the moops, and are well qualified to be entrusted with their present responsibilities as heads of their departments in the field.

I should also mention the name of Colonel St. Leger, commanding Cameron Highlanders, who though not actually on the field on the morning of the 30th, had nevertheless for the five preceding weeks held command of the important post of Kosheh during a trying time, and on the morning of the 30th itself assisted the advance of the Camerom Highlanders and detachment Black battalion by a well directed fire from the fort.

As regards my own personal Staff, I venture to bring to your favourable notice Major Gordon Money, Cameron Highlanders, and Lieutenant Romilly, Scots Guards; the former, ever since he has been upon my Staff, has shown great ability, quick intelligence, and close application to his work, and makes an excellent Assistant Military Secretary. The latter has, by his intelligence, professional acquirements, and intimate knowledge of Soudanese warfare (this being his third campaign against the Soudanese), proved himself an excellent Aide-de-Camp.

valuable assistance during the time they have been upon my Staff, and especially since I have taken the field.

The Rev. R. Brindle, Roman Catholic Chaplain, Chaplains' Department, displayed his usual zeal upon this occasion, being present during the action, and welcome to all for his coolness under fire and popularity with all ranks.

The light, shown from the mainmast, is a fixed white light, elevated 38 feet above the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of about 10 miles.

The light-vessel has a mainmast and jiggermast, and carries as day marks two half globes (circular parts uppermost) at the mainmast nead; and is painted black with white streak, and the word "Skulmarth" in white letters on her sides.

Mew Island Light, N. 1 E., distant 10 miles. South Rock Light-vessel, S. & W., distant 81 miles.

Also, that a double explosive fog-signal is established on board the light-vessel, which, during thick or foggy weather, will be fired in quick succession every ten minutes.

(1.) Alterations in Belem Light.

#### Borough of Dudley.

ByE-LAWS made by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Dudley, in the county of Worcester, acting by the Council as the Local

Anthority, under section 46 of "the Tramways Act, 1870," altering certain Bye-laws made by them under the said section, on the 5th day of May, 1885.

The Bye-laws, numbered 3, 5, and 7, and made on the said 5th day of May, 1885, are hereby repealed from and after the date of these Bye-laws coming into force, and, in lieu thereof, the following Bye-laws shall take effect :-

3. The driver of every car shall drive the same at a rate of not more three miles per hour whilst travelling from the corner of Saint Edmund's Churchyard, at the junction of Castle-street with the Birmingham-road, to Union-street, and on Fair Days and Saturdays, and during the prevalence of a fog, at not more than two miles per hour, and at the rate of not more than four miles per hour from Union-street to Junction-street, and at the rate of not more than eight miles per hour from Junction-street to the boundary of the borough at Hart's Hill, and at the rate of not more than four miles per hour along any tramway. constructed in any other part of the borough.

5. Every driver or conductor shall stop the car as soon as practicable when and where required so to do by any passenger desirous of leaving, or by any person desirous of entering the car for whom there is room, or by any Police Constable of the borough.

7. Whenever it is necessary to avoid impending, danger the engine shall be brought to an immediate standstill, and it shall also be brought to a standstill on the request of any person driving or in charge of any vehicle, or of any person who is riding orin charge of any horse, and who holds up his hand or otherwise indicate that a stoppage is required.

#### Penalty.

The same penalties attached to a breach of the Bye-laws of the Local Authority, made on the 5th day of May, 1885, shall apply to a breach of these Bye-laws, or any of them, and for the purpose of the prosecution of any offence shall apply hereto as though these Bye-laws were incorporated therewith.

These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 12th day of April, 1886.
