REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the bishop

"of any diocese, or by the bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value shall not exceed five hundred pounds may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as herein after directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Thomas Legh, Lord Bishop of Saint Albans, as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Chickney in the county of Essex and the vicarage of Broxton in the same county and diocese having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that Alfred

Molyneux Cranmer-Byng of Quendon Hall in the county of Essex Esquire late a Captain and Lieutenant-Colonel in Her Majesty's Grenadier Guards being the patron or person entitled to present to the said rectory of Chickney if the same were now vacant and Richard Benyon of Englefield House in the county of Berks Esquire being the patron or person entitled to present to the said vicarage of Broxton if the same were now vacant consent to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices, with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Saint Albans our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consents in writing of the patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before-mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consents aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes. And for declaring that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present to the said benefices after the same shall have been united into one benefice upon each successive vacancy thereof shall be as follows that is to say that in case the said union shall take effect by the presentation institution and induction to the vicarage of Broxton aforesaid of the rector for the time being of Chickney aforesaid the first and every alternate turn of presentation to the said united benefice shall belong to and be vested in the said Richard Benyon the present patron of the said vicarage of Broxton his heirs and assigns and the second and every alternate turn shall belong to and be vested in the said Alfred Molyneux Cranmer-Byng his heirs and assigns. But in case the said union shall take effect by the presentation institution and induction to the rectory of Chickney aforesaid of the vicar for the time being of Broxton aforesaid then the first and every alternate turn of presentation to the said united benefice shall belong to and be vested in the said Alfred Molyneux Cranmer-Byng his heirs and assigns and the second and every alternate turn thereof shall belong to and be vested in the said Richard Benyon his heirs and assigns.

"As witness our hand this twenty-sixth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the rectory of Chickney, situate in the county of Essex and diocese of Saint Albans, and the vicarage of Broxton, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons, for the time being, shall pre-

sent to the said benefices shall be as follows, that is to say, that in case the said union shall take effect by the presentation, institution, and induction to the vicarage of Broxted aforesaid of the rector, for the time being, of Chickney aforesaid, the first and every alternate turn of presentation to the said united benefice shall belong to, and be vested in, the said Richard Benyon, the present patron of the said vicarage of Broxted, his heirs and assigns, and the second and every alternate turn shall belong to, and be vested in, the said Alfred Molyneux Cranmer-Byng, his heirs and assigns: but that in case the said union shall take effect by the presentation, institution and induction to the rectory of Chickney aforesaid, of the vicar, for the time being, of Broxted aforesaid, then the first and every alternate turn of presentation to the said united benefice, shall belong to, and be vested in, the said Alfred Molyneux Cranmer-Byng, his heirs and assigns, and the second, and every alternate turn thereof shall belong to, and be vested in, the said Richard Benyon, his heirs and assigns. *C. The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventeenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Chillington in the county of Somerset and in the diocese of Bath and Wells.

"Whereas it is intended that steps shall be taken under the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and six for uniting the said benefice of Chillington with a certain other benefice: to wit, the benefice of Cudworth, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"And whereas, we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners have agreed to make a certain augmentation of the benefices of Cudworth and Chillington aforesaid if and when the same shall have been united into one benefice as aforesaid.

"And whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Cudworth is vested in the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Charles

Bishop of Bath and Wells in right of his See and in his successors Bishops of the same diocese.

"And whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Chillington is vested in the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Bristol and their successors.

"And whereas under the circumstances aforesaid, both of the said two benefices are in public patronage and therefore are already eligible to receive (on the terms aforesaid) the said proposed augmentation, but the said Arthur Charles Bishop of Bath and Wells has made it a condition precedent of his necessary consent to the said proposed union, that the advowson of the said benefice of Chillington shall be transferred as hereinafter is mentioned.

"And whereas the Very Reverend Gilbert Elliot, Dean of the said Cathedral Church of Bristol and the Chapter of the same church are willing that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Chillington now vested in them as aforesaid shall in furtherance of and with a view to the effecting of the said union be so transferred to and vested in the said Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Bath and Wells.

"And whereas in token that the said transfer has that consent of the Bishop which by the Acts in the hereinbefore firstly mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Arthur Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas under the circumstances hereinbefore set forth it appears to us that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Chillington which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises and exists, that is to say, in the parish of Chillington aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Gilbert Elliot, the Dean of the said Cathedral Church of Bristol and of the Chapter of the same church (in testimony whereof they the said Dean and Chapter have to this scheme affixed their common or capitular seal) and with the consent of the said Arthur Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that when and if the benefices of Chillington and Cudworth aforesaid shall have been legally and permanently united under the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council and for so long after the publication of the last mentioned Order in the London Gazette as the same benefices shall continue to be so united, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Chillington now vested in the said Dean and Chapter of the said Cathedral Church of Bristol as aforesaid shall be transferred from them the said Dean and Chapter and from their successors, to the said Arthur Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells, and his successors Bishops of the same diocese, and shall thereupon become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Arthur Charles Bishop of the said diocese of Bath and Wells and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Bath and Wells.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventeenth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Clement situate in Friern-road East Dulwich in the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint John the Evangelist East Dulwich in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, East Dulwich and of the particular district of Saint Peter Dulwich Common in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parish and such particular district respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, East Dulwich and of the said particular district of Saint Peter Dulwich Common should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Clement situate in Friern-road East Dulwich as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right

Reverend Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester as such Bishop and with the consents of John Scott of Albyfield, Bickley in the county of Kent Esquire, of William Frederick Morgan, of Kerkellas, Sevenoaks in the said county of Kent Esquire, of George Steinman Steinman of Sundridge, Sevenoaks, aforesaid Esquire, of William Henry Cortlandt Mahon of Ridgmount, North Dulwich in the said county of Surrey Esquire and of Henry Bailey of Fernbank Sydenham Hill in the said county of Kent, Esquire, the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, East Dulwich, and with the consent of the Reverend William Calvert the incumbent, and also the patron of the perpetual curacy of the particular district of Saint Peter Dulwich Common aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist East Dulwich and of the particular district of Saint Peter, Dulwich Common which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Clement situate in Friern-road East Dulwich aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Clement East Dulwich.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the promises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Clement East Dulwich, being:—

"All that portion of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint John the Evangelist East Dulwich in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester and also all that contiguous portion of the particular district of Saint Peter Dulwich Common in the same county and diocese which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of Saint Peter Dulwich Common from the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist East Dulwich aforesaid at the point where Upland-road is joined by Piermont-road and extending thence first northward and then north-westward along the middle of the said Upland-road for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Crystal Palace-road and with North Cross-road and continuing thence still north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lordship-lane and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts to a point near Elm Lodge upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist East Dulwich from that portion of the parish of Saint Giles Camberwell in the county and diocese aforesaid wherein Dulwich College Chapel is situate and extending thence south-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts thereby continuing to follow the

middle of Lordship-lane aforesaid to the point opposite to the Plough Inn where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist East Dulwich from the particular district of Saint Peter Dulwich Common aforesaid and extending thence first south-eastward then eastward and then north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts thereby passing along the middle of Lordship-lane aforesaid of Barry-road of Etherow-street and of Friern-road to the intersection of the last-named-road by Goodrich-road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Upland-road aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to a point at the intersection of the said last-named road by Underhill-road upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of Saint Peter Dulwich Common from the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist East Dulwich aforesaid and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts thereby continuing to follow the middle of Upland-road aforesaid, to the first-described point at the junction of the same road with Piermont-road as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town,

or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twelfth day of December last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-eighth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, as follows: viz.:

NORTH HARBORNE.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of North Harborne, in the county of Stafford; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—
