REGULATIONS
TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOM.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Room, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Room, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the sixth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council dated the fourth day of February one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine establishing Regulations and Instructions for the government of Your Majesty's Naval Service, it is amongst other things directed that when men in receipt of Naval Pensions are admitted into Naval hospitals or infirmaries under the regulations defining their claims to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital, money allowances to themselves and to their wives and families may be granted as follows, viz. :—

"(a.) If admitted for treatment.

"To the Pensioner Nil.

"To their wives, or A sum not exceeding three shillings a week at the discretion of the officer in charge of the infirmary.

"(b.) If admitted permanently.

"To the pensioner One shilling a week during good behaviour.

"To their wives, or A sum not exceeding three shillings a week at the discretion of the officer in charge of the infirmary.

"We humbly beg leave to recommend that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to authorize the payment of these allowances in cases where Pensioners eligible for the benefits of Greenwich Hospital become inmates of Lunatic Asylums supported at public expense.

"And whereas the Regulations contained in Your Majesty's Order in Council previously referred to restrict the amount of the combined pensions from public and Greenwich Hospital funds to a sum of two shillings and six pence a day and such restriction has been found to be inadvisable in certain cases.

"We beg leave to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to approve of this restriction being

removed, and that we may be empowered, when we deem it expedient, to award a Greenwich Hospital Age Pension notwithstanding the amount of Naval or Marine or Civil Pension of which a man may be in receipt."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-first day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary situate at Ewshott within the limits of the chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott sometime part of the parish of Crondall in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott and of the said parish of Crondall which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such chapelry district and parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott and of the said parish of Crondall should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary situate at Ewshott.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester as such Bishop, and with the consent of the Reverend William Dann Harrison the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Crondall and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott, and with the consent of Charles James Maxwell Lefroy of the parish of Crondall aforesaid Esquire the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Crondall (in testimony whereof they

the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would, in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott and of the said parish of Crondall which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Mary situate at Ewshott aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary Ewshott.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary Ewshott, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott within the original limits of the parish of Crondall in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester which is bounded on the west and on the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Crondall from the chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott aforesaid at the point where the high-road leading from Farnham to Odiham is joined by the road leading to Brick Kiln Farm and extending thence first north-eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of thirty-nine chains or thereabouts to its junction at Brick Kiln Farm aforesaid with Ewshott-lane and continuing thence still south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of thirteen and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction near Hampton's Farm with the lane which leads past Nashe's Farm into the Reading-road and extending thence, that is, from Ewshott-lane aforesaid first generally northward then north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the last-described lane for a distance of seventy-eight chains or thereabouts (thereby passing Nashe's Farm aforesaid) to its junction at or near to the house called or known as Greendene Cottage with the Reading-road as aforesaid and with the field-road and footpath leading to the Government Waterworks Engine-house and extending thence that is from the last-described point of junction first eastward then south-eastward and again eastward along the middle of the said field-road and footpath for a distance of forty-seven chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing Parkhurst Corner Hill) to the point where the same field-road and footpath crosses the water-course of the overflow from the reservoir of the said waterworks (which said reservoir is numbered 2 upon the map hereunto annexed and upon the map of the ordnance survey of the said county of Southampton on the scale of six inches to a mile and published in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three), and extending thence due eastward and in a direct line for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott from the parish or parochial chapelry of Aldershot in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore described portion of the chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott

aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the west and the north as aforesaid that is to say upon the east upon the south-east and upon the south as follows, upon the east by the parish or parochial chapelry of Aldershot aforesaid upon the south-east by the new parish of Hale in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester aforesaid and upon the south by the parish of Crondall aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said parish of Crondall wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded upon the north-west, upon the west and upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Crondall from the hereinbefore-described portion of the chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott aforesaid, at a point about five chains to the south of the church of Saint Mary Ewshott in the middle of the road which leads from Ewshott to Dora's Green, and extending thence, that is from the said last-mentioned point southward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the high road leading from Farnham to Odiham aforesaid and extending thence westward along the middle of the said high road for a distance five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Redlands-lane and extending thence first westward and then south-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of twenty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath which forms the western boundary of a certain parish allotment ground, and which connects Redlands-lane with Heath-lane, and extending thence, that is, from the last-described point of junction southward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Heath-lane aforesaid and continuing thence still southward and in a direct line for a distance of fifty-five chains or thereabouts to the point where Dora's Green-lane is joined by the footpath leading to Old Park Farm and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned footpath for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Crondall from the parish of Farnham in the said county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Crondall aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the north-west, the west and the south-west as aforesaid, that is to say upon the south-east upon the east and upon the north as follows, upon the south-east by the parish of Farnham aforesaid and upon the east by the new parish of Hale aforesaid and upon the north by the hereinbefore described portion of the chapelry district of Crookham-cum-Ewshott aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four, and of "The Benefices (Tiverton Portions) Consolidation Amendment Act 1884" being the Act of the forty-seventh and forty-eighth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eighteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four and of 'The Benefices (Tiverton Portions) Consolidation Amendment Act 1884' being the Act of the forty-seventh and forty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme having reference to the parish of Tiverton situate in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Edward Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter acting under the provisions of the said hereinbefore-mentioned Acts has submitted to us the said Commissioners a plan bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, for effecting the consolidation, annexation and separation respectively of the portions into which the said parish of Tiverton is divided as aforesaid, or part or parts thereof respectively, and for the other purposes incident thereto.

"And whereas the said plan has the consent of and is executed by all the parties whose consents are requisite under the provisions of the said hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or any of them.

"And whereas we the said Commissioners, having considered the said plan are of opinion that the same may properly be carried into effect.

"And whereas the said plan is to be taken as an integral part of this scheme with respect to the whole of its contents; and the same plan is in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

"I, Edward Henry, Lord Bishop of Exeter, acting under the provisions of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of 'The Benefices (Tiverton Portions) Consolidation Amendment Act, 1884,' do hereby submit to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England the following plan for effecting the consolidation, annexation, and separation respectively of the portions into which the parish of Tiverton in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter is divided, or part or parts thereof respectively, and for the other purposes incident thereto hereinafter appearing:—

"Whereas by section seventy-two of the said Act of the third and fourth years of Her pro-

sent Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, it is enacted that with respect to any parish in which both the profits and the spiritual charge are divided between two or more incumbents, each having a mediety or portion of the benefice, a plan or plans may be framed by the Bishop of the diocese, with the consent of the patron or patrons, and so as not to prejudice the interest of any existing incumbent, for constituting any of such portions, separate benefices, or for consolidating two or more of such portions into one benefice to be held by one incumbent, or for making such other arrangements as he may judge likely to promote the efficient discharge of pastoral duties in such parishes, and any such plan may be carried into effect by the authority therein provided.

“And whereas by section nine, of the said Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-four, it is enacted that in every case where the respective incumbents of two or more benefices held in severalty (whether each of such benefices belongs to the same patron or to different patrons) have or shall have by statute or by custom the right in virtue of their respective incumbencies to execute the office of an incumbent within one and the same church, and within no other church other than a chapel of ease, then the powers and provisions of the aforesaid section of the said firstly herein-mentioned Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, shall be available for effecting the consolidation of both, or all of such benefices into one benefice to be held by one incumbent, subject to the conditions therein expressed.

“And whereas by the said Benefices (Tiverton Portions) Consolidation Amendment Act, 1884, after reciting the aforesaid provisions of the said Acts of the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and also reciting that the said parish of Tiverton is divided into four portions called respectively Pitt, Clare, Tidcombe and Priors, each being a separate benefice and having its own incumbent or minister, but the whole having but one parish church which is served in turns by the said incumbents or ministers, who also serve in turns a chapel of ease to the church called the chapel of Saint George, which by an Act of Parliament of the sixth year of George the Second intituled ‘An Act for making a chapel in the town of Tiverton, in the county of Devon, a perpetual cure, and for providing a maintenance for the ministers who shall officiate therein’ (hereinafter and hereinafter referred to as ‘the Local Act’) was made a perpetual cure to be served by the ministers of the said portions, and their respective successors who were constituted the chaplains thereof, and made a body corporate by the name of the chaplains of the new church of Tiverton, in the county of Devon, and which Act contains various provisions in relation to the vesting of such chapel, and the site thereof, and the chapelyard belonging thereto, and other adjacent property in the said Corporation, and to the performance of the services of such chapel by the said chaplains and to the making a yearly provision for them and otherwise; and also reciting that there is at West Exe within the said parish of Tiverton a church, to which a particular district taken out of the same parish has been assigned under the provisions of the tenth section of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of William the Fourth, chapter 38, and that

there are also within the said portions certain chapels of ease belonging thereto respectively besides the said chapel of Saint George; it was enacted that the powers and provisions of the said 72nd section of the Act of the third and fourth Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, should with the consent and subject to the conditions therein expressed, extend to authorize and should be available for the consolidation of any one or more of the portions into which the said parish of Tiverton was divided, or any part or parts thereof respectively, with any other or others of such portions, or any part or parts thereof respectively, or the separation of any part of any such portions from the rest thereof, and the formation of the same respectively into a separate benefice and parish, or separate benefices and parishes for ecclesiastical purposes, and for the appropriation or assignment to any such benefice and parish of any church or chapel within the same, as the parish church thereof, discharged as regards the said chapel of Saint George, from all or any of the provisions of the Local Act, and also for the appropriation and annexation to every or any such benefice of such of the endowments belonging to the portions of which or of any part or parts of which the same should consist, or belonging to any church or chapel within the same as might be considered expedient, and generally the making of all such arrangements and provisions incident to such consolidation, separation, or formation, and the period when the same should take effect as might be deemed necessary or expedient, the Local Act notwithstanding, provided always that the powers therein contained should not extend to or affect the said district of West Exe or the church or endowments thereof, save and except that with the consent of the respective patrons of such district, and of the portions affected thereby any part of any of the said portions or of the endowments thereof might under the powers aforesaid be annexed to the said district, but so as not to prejudice the rights of the existing incumbents of the said district or of any of the said portions.

“And whereas the said district of West Exe has, under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her present Majesty, chapter 104, become a new parish and vicarage, and is now called or known as, and is hereinafter mentioned as, ‘The new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton.’

“And whereas the patronage of the said benefices or portions of Pitt, Clare, and Tidcombe respectively is vested in the persons specified in the first part of the first schedule hereunder written who present thereto respectively by turns, and the patronage of the said benefice or portion of Priors is vested in the Provost and Scholars of King’s College, of Blessed Mary and Saint Nicholas, Cambridge, and the patronage of the said new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, is vested in the persons specified in the second part of the said first schedule.

“And whereas the said Provost and Scholars are liable to pay annually in perpetuity to the incumbent of the said benefice or portion of Priors, out of the rectorial tithe rent-charges belonging to them within the said parish of Tiverton, the sum of £120, and such annual sum together with one-fourth share of the annual income belonging to the said chapel of Saint George (which fourth share amounts to the annual sum of £15, or thereabouts) forms the endowments of the said benefice or portion of Priors, and the said Provost and Scholars are consenting to the arrangement by

this plan hereinafter proposed with respect to the said benefice or portion of Priors.

"And whereas the said benefices of Clare and Priors are respectively vacant.

"And whereas the Reverend William Knight, and the Reverend George Hadow, Clerks in Holy Orders, are respectively the incumbents of the said benefices called Pitt, and Tidcombe, and the Reverend Edward Baker, Clerk in Holy Orders, is the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton.

"And whereas the portion of the said parish of Tiverton which is known as All Fours, otherwise Town Quarter, belongs in common to the said benefices of Pitt, Clare, Tidcombe, and Priors, and for the purposes of this plan it is to be considered that one undivided fourth part of such portion is included in and forms part of each of the said portions of Pitt, Clare, Tidcombe, and Priors.

"Now I, the said Edward Henry, Bishop of Exeter, with the consent of the respective patrons of the said benefices of Pitt, Clare, Tidcombe, Priors and Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, and of the said incumbents of Pitt, of Tidcombe, and of the said new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton (testified by their respectively signing and sealing or sealing these presents), and also with the consent (in so far as such consent may be necessary) of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the Poor Clergy (in testimony whereof the said Governors have to this plan affixed their common or corporate seal), have framed the following plan, and do propose as follows :

"PART I.

"1. That the parts of the parish of Tiverton specified in the first part of the second schedule hereto shall henceforth be separated from the benefices and portions to which the same respectively belong, and shall be annexed to and form part of the new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that an annual sum of £70 (being a part of the annual sum of £120, payable by the said Provost and Scholars of King's College, Cambridge, as aforesaid, and forming a portion of the endowments of the said benefice of Priors), shall henceforth be appropriated and annexed to the said new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, and shall be paid to the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the same new parish and to his successors for ever.

"2. That the parts of the parish of Tiverton, specified in the second part of the said second schedule hereto shall henceforth be separated from the benefices and portions to which the same respectively belong, and shall be formed into and constitute and henceforth become and be a separate benefice, being a vicarage, and parish for all ecclesiastical purposes by the name of the benefice and parish of Witleigh, and that the chapel of ease situate at Witleigh within the said portion of Clare shall cease to be such chapel of ease, and shall be appropriated and assigned as, and shall henceforth become and be, the parish church of the said benefice and parish of Witleigh, and all the endowments (if any) belonging to the same chapel, or to the incumbent of the benefice of Clare in respect thereof, and an annual sum of £50 (being the residue of the aforesaid annual sum of £120 forming part of the endowments of the said benefice of Priors), and also such of the endowments belonging to the benefice of Clare as are specified in the first part of the third schedule

hereto, shall be appropriated and annexed to the said vicarage and benefice of Witleigh, and shall henceforth belong exclusively to the vicar or incumbent of the same vicarage and benefice and to his successors for ever.

"3. That the parts of the parish of Tiverton specified in the third part of the second schedule hereto shall henceforth be separated from the benefice and portion or respective benefices and portions to which the same respectively belong, and shall be formed into and constitute and henceforth become and be a separate benefice, being a vicarage, and parish for all ecclesiastical purposes, by the name of the benefice and parish of Cove, and the chapel of ease, situate at Cove, within the said portion of Pitt, shall cease to be such chapel of ease, and shall be appropriated and assigned as, and shall henceforth become and be, the parish church of the said benefice, and parish of Cove, and all the endowments (if any) belonging to the same chapel, or to the incumbent of the said benefice of Pitt in respect thereof, and such of the endowments belonging to the said benefice of Pitt as are specified in the second part of the third schedule hereto shall be appropriated and annexed to the said vicarage, and benefice of Cove, and shall thenceforth belong exclusively to the incumbent of the same vicarage and benefice and to his successors for ever.

"4. That except and subject as hereinbefore provided, and subject also to the provisions hereinafter contained, the benefice and portion of Clare with the endowments thereof (not appropriated and annexed as aforesaid) shall henceforth be annexed to and consolidated with the benefice and portion of Pitt, with the endowments thereof (not appropriated and annexed as aforesaid), and shall form together one benefice by the name of Pitt-Clare, whereof the present incumbent of Pitt shall remain and be the incumbent.

5. "Except and subject as hereinbefore provided, and subject also to the provisions hereinafter contained, the benefice and portion of Priors, and the endowments thereof (not appropriated and annexed as aforesaid), shall henceforth be annexed to and consolidated with the benefice and portion of Tidcombe, with the endowments thereof, and shall form together one benefice by the name of Tidcombe-Priors, whereof the present incumbent of Tidcombe shall remain and be the incumbent.

PART II.

"6. That on the next avoidance of the benefice of Pitt-Clare, or of the said benefice of Tidcombe-Priors (whichever shall first happen), the parts of the parish of Tiverton specified in the fourth part of the said second schedule hereto, shall henceforth be separated from the benefices and portions to which the same respectively belong, and shall be formed into, and constitute, and thenceforth become and be a separate benefice, being a vicarage, and parish for all ecclesiastical purposes, by the name of the benefice and parish of Chevithorne, and the chapel of ease, situate at Chevithorne, within the said portion of Tidcombe, shall cease to be such chapel of ease, and shall be appropriated and assigned as, and shall henceforth become and be, the parish church of the said benefice and parish of Chevithorne, and all the endowments of or belonging to the same chapel or to the incumbent of the said benefice of Tidcombe-Priors in respect thereof, and also such of the endowments of or belonging to the said benefices of Pitt-Clare and of Tidcombe-Priors as are specified in the third part of the third schedule hereto, shall be appropriated and annexed to the said vicarage and benefice of Chevithorne,

and shall thenceforth belong exclusively to the incumbent of the same vicarage and benefice and to his successors for ever.

"7. That on the next avoidance of the said benefice of Pitt-Clare, or of the said benefice of Tidcombe-Priors (whichever shall first happen), the parts of the parish of Tiverton specified in the fifth part of the said second schedule hereto, shall henceforth be separated from the benefices, and portions to which the same respectively belong, and shall be formed into, and constitute and thenceforth become and be a separate benefice, being a vicarage, and parish for all ecclesiastical purposes, by the name of the benefice and parish of Saint George, Tiverton, and the aforesaid chapel, called Saint George's Chapel, shall be appropriated and assigned as, and shall thenceforth become and be, the parish church of the said benefice and parish of Saint George, Tiverton, discharged from all the provisions of the Local Act, and notwithstanding the same Act, the same chapel (discharged as aforesaid), and all the endowments of, or belonging to the same chapel, or to the incumbents of the said benefices of Pitt-Clare and of Tidcombe-Priors respectively in respect thereof, and such of the endowments of or belonging to the benefices of Pitt-Clare and Tidcombe-Priors respectively, as are specified in the fourth part of the third schedule hereto and also the parsonage house now belonging to the benefice of Pitt with its offices, gardens, and appurtenances shall, subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, for the temporary use by the said William Knight, of the said parsonage house of the said benefice of Pitt, in the event hereinafter mentioned, be appropriated and annexed to the said vicarage and benefice of Saint George, Tiverton, and shall thenceforth be vested in and, as to the same endowments, belong exclusively to the vicar or incumbent of the same vicarage and benefice and to his successors for ever.

"8. That except and subject as hereinbefore provided, and subject also to the provisions hereinafter contained, on the next avoidance of the said benefice of Pitt-Clare or of the said benefice of Tidcombe-Priors (whichever shall first happen), the benefice and portions of Pitt-Clare with the endowments thereof (not appropriated and annexed as aforesaid) shall be annexed to and consolidated with the benefice and portions of Tidcombe-Priors with the endowments thereof, and the said two benefices and portions as the same are specified in the sixth part of the said second schedule shall, together form one benefice, being a rectory, and parish by the name of the rectory and parish of Saint Peter, Tiverton, whereof the then incumbent of the said benefice of Pitt-Clare or of the said benefice of Tidcombe-Priors, as the case may be, shall remain and be the incumbent and rector.

"Provided always, that if the said benefice of Tidcombe-Priors shall be the first next avoided by the death, resignation, or cession of the said George Hadow, the said William Knight shall, during the period of his incumbency of the said rectory of Saint Peter, Tiverton, be entitled to retain for his residence the parsonage house now belonging to the benefice of Pitt, with its offices, gardens, and appurtenances, and that during that period the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage and parish of Saint George, Tiverton, shall be entitled to reside in and to have the use and occupation of the parsonage house now belonging to the benefice of Tidcombe with its offices, gardens, and appurtenances.

PART III.

"9. That the patronage of the said benefice of Tidcombe-Priors whilst existing, and of the proposed rectory and benefice of Saint Peter, Tiverton, and of the said proposed vicarage and benefice of Chevithorne, shall respectively be vested in the same persons or person, for the same estates or estate, and to, for, or upon the same uses, trusts, intents, and purposes, and with and subject to the same powers and authorities, in whom and to, for, upon, with, and subject to which the two-fourth shares of the advowsons of the said benefices of Pitt, Clare, and Tidcombe, hereinafter designated the Harrowby shares, are now vested or stand limited, and shall stand and be in lieu of such shares.

"10. That the patronage of the said benefice of Pitt-Clare whilst existing, and of the said proposed vicarage and benefice of Saint George, Tiverton, shall respectively be vested in the same persons or person for the same estate or estates, and to, for, or upon the same uses, trusts, intents, and purposes, and with and subject to the same powers and authorities in whom and to, for, upon, with, and subject to which the one-fourth share of the advowsons of the said benefices of Pitt, Clare, and Tidcombe, hereinafter designated the Carew share is now vested or stands limited, discharged, as regards the same vicarage and benefice, from all the provisions of the Local Act, and such patronage shall stand and be in lieu of the same share.

"11. That the patronage of the said vicarages and benefices of Withleigh and of Cove, shall be vested as to one moiety of the advowson of each of the same two vicarages and benefices respectively in the same person or persons for the same estate or estates, and to, for, or upon the same uses, trusts, intents, and purposes, and with and subject to the same powers and authorities in whom and to, for, upon, with, and subject to which the one-eighth share of the advowsons of the said benefices of Pitt, Clare, and Tidcombe; hereinafter designated the Vyvyan share, is now vested or stands limited, and shall stand and be in lieu of such share, and as to the other moiety thereof respectively in the same person or persons for the same estate or estates, and to, for, or upon the same uses, trusts, intents, and purposes, and with and subject to the same powers and authorities in whom and to, for, upon, with and subject to which the one-eighth share of the advowsons of the said benefices of Pitt, Clare, and Tidcombe, hereinafter designated the Spurway share, is now vested or stands limited, and shall stand and be in lieu of the same share, and the person or persons for the time being entitled to the first mentioned moiety shall have the first turn to present to the said vicarage and benefice of Withleigh, and the person or persons for the time being entitled to the secondly mentioned moiety shall have the first turn to present to the said vicarage and benefice of Cove.

"PART IV.

"12. That from and after the formation of the said benefices and parishes of Withleigh, of Cove, of Chevithorne, and of Saint George, Tiverton, respectively, and from and after the annexation of the aforesaid parts of the parish of Tiverton, to the said new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, the inhabitants of the same parishes and of the said parts of the said parish of Tiverton respectively, shall cease to have any rights in the parish church of Saint Peter, Tiverton, and from and after the formation of each of the same benefices and parishes respectively, the incumbent thereof shall have the exclusive cure of souls within

the same, and banns of matrimony may be published, and marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials may be solemnized or performed therein, or in the churches thereof respectively, and all the fees payable for the performance of such offices, as well as all other ecclesiastical fees, dues, oblations, or offerings arising within the limits of the same parishes respectively, shall belong and be paid to the incumbents for the time being of such parishes respectively, and each of the same parishes, subject to the aforesaid provisions as to the patronage thereof respectively, shall be deemed and taken to be a new parish within the provisions of the New Parishes Act, 1856.

"13. That the whole of the first fruits, tenths, and other ecclesiastical dues payable in respect of the benefice of Clare, shall be payable by the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage and benefice of Withleigh. The whole of the first fruits, tenths, and other ecclesiastical dues payable in respect of the benefice of Pitt shall continue payable by the incumbent of the benefice of Pitt-Clare until the formation of the vicarage and parish of Saint George, Tiverton, and thenceforth the same shall be payable by the vicar or incumbent of the last mentioned vicarage and parish. The whole of the first fruits, tenths, and other ecclesiastical dues payable in respect of the benefices of Tidcombe and Priors shall be payable by the incumbent of the benefice of Tidcombe-Priors until the consolidation thereof with the benefice of Pitt-Clare, and thenceforth the same shall be payable by the rector or incumbent of the rectory and benefice of Saint Peter, Tiverton.

"Provided always, that the charge in favour of the Governors of the bounty of Queen Anne, now affecting the benefice of Clare, shall be wholly borne and paid by the vicar or incumbent of the said vicarage and parish of Withleigh until the farms and lands called Stancombe-at-Manley and Manly Tenement, belonging to the benefice of Clare, and now outstanding for the life or widowhood of Margaret Spurway, shall fall into possession by her death or marriage, and thereupon and thenceforth such charge shall be wholly borne and paid by the incumbent of the benefice (that is to say the said benefice of Pitt-Clare or the said benefice of Saint Peter, Tiverton, as the case may be), to which such farms and lands shall for the time being belong by virtue of this plan, and shall be a charge upon all the endowments of such benefice.

"In witness whereof I, the said Edward Henry, Bishop of Exeter, have hereunto set my hand and caused my episcopal seal to be affixed, and we, the said patrons of the said benefices of Pitt, of Clare, of Tidcombe, and of St. Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, respectively, and we, the said Incumbents of the said benefices of Pitt, of Tidcombe, and of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, respectively, have hereunto set our hands and seals, and we, the said provost and scholars of King's College, of Blessed Mary, and St. Nicholas, Cambridge, being the patrons of the said benefice of Priors, have hereunto affixed our common or corporate seal, and we, the said governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the Poor Clergy have hereunto affixed our common or corporate seal, this twenty-ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE above referred to.

"THE FIRST PART.

"The patronage of the said benefices of Pitt, of Clare, and of Tidcombe is vested as to two

equal fourth parts thereof (hereby designated "the Harrowby shares") in the Right Honourable Dudley Francis Stuart, Earl of Harrowby, the Right Honourable Anthony, Earl of Shaftesbury, and Robert Baxter, of No. 5, Victoria-street, Westminster, Esquire, as to one other equal fourth part thereof (hereby designated "the Carew share") in Elizabeth Ann Carew and Beatrice Carew, both of Hacombe, in the county of Devon, Spinsters, as to one other eighth part thereof (hereby designated "the Vyvyan share") in the Reverend Sir Vyell Donnithorne Vyvyan, of Trelowarren, in the county of Cornwall, Baronet, and as to the remaining one other eighth part thereof (hereby designated "the Spurway share") in William Spurway, of the Temple, London, Esquire.

"THE SECOND PART.

"The patronage of the said new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, is vested in the said Dudley Francis Stuart, Earl of Harrowby, Anthony, Earl of Shaftesbury, and Robert Baxter, and their heirs and assigns."

"The SECOND SCHEDULE above referred to.

"THE FIRST PART.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, being—

"1. All that part of the parish of Tiverton aforesaid (comprising a part of the portion of Clare) which is situate and abuts upon the northern side of the said new parish and is bounded upon the south by the same new parish, and upon all other sides, that is to say, upon the west, the north, and the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the northern boundary of the said new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, at the point where Leat-street and Patches-road are joined by the Calverleigh-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading to Washfield, and extending thence first north-eastward and then northward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts to a point, at Swines Bridge, which carries the same road over the stream called or known as Swines Brook, upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Tiverton from the parish of Washfield in the said county of Devon, and in the diocese of Exeter aforesaid, and extending thence first northward and then eastward along the said parish boundary for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts (thereby continuing to follow in the first-named direction the course of the road leading to Washfield as aforesaid) to the point in the middle of the River Exe where the same parish boundary bends towards the north and extending thence generally southward along the middle of the said river for a distance of half-a-mile or thereabouts to the present northern boundary of the new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton aforesaid.

"And II. All that other part of the said parish of Tiverton (comprising, inter alia, a part of the portion of Priors and a part of Towns Quarter alias All Fours) which is situate and abuts upon the western side of the said new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, and which is comprised within and is bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the western boundary of the said new parish at the point where Patches-road is joined by Witheridge-road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of 45 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Ditches-lane, and extending thence eastward

along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of $8\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Hensleigh-road, and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction, near Great Hensleigh House, with Hensleigh-lane, and extending thence first south-westward and then south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of 1 mile or thereabouts to its junction, at Seven Crosses, with Cadeleigh-road, and extending thence first southward and then south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of one mile and thirty-two chains or thereabouts to a point, at Langley Bridge, which carries the same road over the River Dart, upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Tiverton from the parish of Cadeleigh in the county and diocese aforesaid, and extending thence generally south-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of one and a quarter miles or thereabouts, thereby following for the most part the course of the River Dart aforesaid, to the point where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Tiverton from the parish of Bickleigh in the county and diocese aforesaid, and extending thence first generally south-eastward and then generally north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of nearly two miles, thereby following in the first-named direction for the most part the course of the said River Dart, and in the last-named direction for the most part the course of the River Exe aforesaid, to the point where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary which divides the said parish of Tiverton from the parish of Halberton in the county and diocese aforesaid, and continuing thence still north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of rather more than 1 mile, thereby continuing to follow for the most part the course of the River Exe aforesaid, to the point where the same boundary diverges from the last-named river towards the east, and extending thence northward along the middle of the same river for a distance of sixty-nine chains or thereabouts to a point, where the said river is joined by the stream flowing from Cottey House, upon the western boundary of the new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, aforesaid, and continuing thence still northward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of one mile and eleven chains or thereabouts, thereby following in part the course of the said stream and in part the course of Patches-road aforesaid, to the first-described point where the last-named road is joined by Witheridge-road as aforesaid, at which point the said imaginary line commenced.

“ THE SECOND PART.

“ The parish of Withleigh, being—

“ All that the western part of the said parish of Tiverton (comprising inter alia, the greater part of the said portion of Clare and a part of the portion of Priors aforesaid) which is bounded on the east and south-east by the new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, and by the territory described in the first part of this schedule as to be annexed to that new parish, upon the south-west by the said parish of Cadeleigh, by a detached portion of the parish of Cheriton Fitzpaine, and by the parish of Cruwys Morchard, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, or in other words for the most part by the River Dart aforesaid, upon the west by the parish of Templeton, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the north-east and north by the parish of Loxbeare, by the parish of Calverleigh, and by the

parish of Washfield aforesaid, all in the county and diocese aforesaid.

“ THE THIRD PART.

“ The parish of Cove, being—

“ All that the northern part of the said parish of Tiverton (comprising the greater part of the portion of Pitt) which is bounded on the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Washfield from the parish of Tiverton aforesaid, at the centre of Washfield Weir, in the middle of the River Exe aforesaid, and extending thence north-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of one mile and fifteen chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the line of the Tiverton and North Devon Railway) to the point where the high road leading from Tiverton across Bampton Down to Clayhanger is joined by the road leading from the farmhouse called or known as Fire Beacon, and extending thence still north-eastward, but in a more northerly direction, along the middle of the said high road for a distance of fifty-six chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the western end of the fence which divides the close numbered 4,430 upon the tithe commutation map of the said portion of Pitt in the parish of Tiverton aforesaid, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 4,433 upon the said maps, and extending thence, that is from the middle of the high road aforesaid, eastward and in a direct line for a distance of fifty-nine chains or thereabouts to the point where the road leading from Chevithorne over Barton Down to Huntsham is joined by the road leading past Passmoorhayes to Longhayne, and extending thence, that is, from the last-described point north-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of thirty-four chains or thereabouts to the point where the boundary which divides the said portion of Pitt from the main body of the portion of Tidcombe aforesaid joins the boundary which divides the said parish of Tiverton from the parish of Huntsham in the said county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter aforesaid.

“ All which said lastly hereinbefore described part of the said parish of Tiverton is bounded upon the remaining sides, other than upon the south as aforesaid, that is to say, upon the east, upon the north, and upon the west as follows: upon the east by the said parish of Huntsham, upon the north by the parish of Bampton, in the said county and diocese, and upon the west partly by the parish of Stoodleigh, in the same county and diocese, and partly by the parish of Washfield aforesaid

“ THE FOURTH PART.

“ The parish of Chevithorne, being—

“ All that the eastern part of the said parish of Tiverton (comprising, inter alia, parts of the said portion of Pitt, and of the said portion of Tidcombe), which is bounded upon the greater part of the west and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Washfield from the parish of Tiverton aforesaid at the point where the said River Exe is joined by the stream known as Marsh Mill Leat, and extending thence north-eastward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the line of the Tiverton and North Devon Railway aforesaid, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of two miles or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the same line of railway over the River Lowman, and extending thence generally north-eastward along the middle of the last-named river for a distance of two and a half miles or thereabouts to

the boundary which divides the said parish of Tiverton from that detached portion of the parish of Halberton in the county and diocese aforesaid, wherein the houses called or known as Chief Lowman are situate.

"All which said lastly hereinbefore described part of the parish of Tiverton aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the greater part of the west and upon the south as aforesaid, that is to say, upon the east, upon the north, and upon the remaining part of the west as follows: upon the east partly by the last-mentioned detached portion of the parish of Halberton aforesaid and partly by the parish of Uplowman in the county and diocese aforesaid, upon the north partly by the parish of Huntsham aforesaid and partly by the territory described in the third part of this schedule as to be constituted a parish by the name of the parish of Cove, and upon the remaining part of the west by the parish of Washfield aforesaid.

"THE FIFTH PART.

"The parish of Saint George Tiverton, being—

"All that the south-eastern part of the said parish of Tiverton (comprising parts of the portion of Tidcombe, of the portion of Priors, of the portion of Pitt, of the portion of Clare, and of Town's Quarter, alias All Fours) which is bounded on part of the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the eastern boundary of the said new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton, at the centre of Exe Bridge over the River Exe in the town of Tiverton, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said bridge, and along the middle of the street called or known as Angel-hill for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to the junction of the said street with Saint Andrew-street and with Fore-street and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of nine and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bampton-street and with Gold-street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of nine and a quarter chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lowman Bridge over the said River Lowman, and continuing thence still eastward to the centre of the last-named bridge, and extending thence generally north-eastward to and along the middle of the River Lowman aforesaid for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to a point at the centre of the bridge which carries the said line of the Tiverton and North Devon Railway over the same river as aforesaid, upon the western boundary of the territory described in the fourth part of this schedule, as to be constituted a parish by the name of the parish of Chevithorne.

"All which said lastly hereinbefore-described part of the parish of Tiverton aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides, other than upon the part of the north as aforesaid, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the north, upon the east, upon the south-east, and upon the west, as follows: upon the remaining part of the north by the said territory described in the fourth part of this schedule as aforesaid, or in other words by the River Lowman aforesaid, upon the east partly by that detached portion of the parish of Halberton before mentioned, and partly by the parish of Uplowman aforesaid, upon the south-east and upon the south by the main body of the parish of Halberton aforesaid, and upon the west partly by the territory described in the first part of this schedule, as to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Paul, West Exe, Tiverton aforesaid, and partly by the now existing boundary of that new

parish, or in other words, upon the west by the River Exe aforesaid.

"THE SIXTH PART.

"The parish of Saint Peter, Tiverton, being—

"All that the remaining or residuary part of the said parish of Tiverton (comprising a part of Towns Quarter, alias All Fours, and parts of the portion of Pitt, of the portion of Tidcombe, of the portion of Priors, and of the portion of Clare), which is not included within any of the parishes set forth in the foregoing parts of this schedule.

"The THIRD SCHEDULE above referred to.

"THE FIRST PART.

"The tithe rent-charges to be appropriated and annexed to the benefice of Witleigh, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of £400 13s. 8d. per annum, being—

"All the commuted rent-charges in lieu of tithes, payable in respect of all the lands within *Clare Portion* aforesaid (save and except the commuted rent-charges in lieu of tithes, payable in respect of the lands within the same portion, numbered in the tithe apportionment and map thereof as follows, namely,—1313*, 1330, 1360*, 2258*, 2760A, 2913, 2914, 2916, 2929, 2931, 2941, and 5076, and 1313 to 1318, 1338 to 1410, 2256 to 2310, 2326 to 2337, 2729 to 2733, 2745 to 2747, 2754 to 2757, and 2759 to 2794, respectively both inclusive).

"THE SECOND PART.

"The tithe rent-charges to be appropriated and annexed to the benefice of Cove, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of £300 17s. 1d. per annum, being—

"All the commuted rent-charges in lieu of tithes or modus or moduses, payable in respect of the lands in *Pitt Portion* aforesaid, which in the tithe apportionment and map of the same portion are numbered respectively 3748*, 3875*, 4165*, 4404, 4443, 4833, and 4834, and 3622 to 4230, 4277 to 4307, 4309 to 4402, and 4406 to 4412, respectively both inclusive.

"THE THIRD PART.

"The tithe rent-charges to be appropriated and annexed to the benefice of Chevithorne (when formed), amounting in the aggregate to the sum of £202 13s. 1d. per annum, being—

"1. All the commuted rent-charges in lieu of tithes payable in respect of the lands in *Tidcombe Portion* aforesaid, which in the tithe apportionment and map of the same portion are numbered respectively 3277*, 3343, 3344, 3378*, 4422A, 4422B, 4422C, and 4422D, and 3193 to 3317, 3321 to 3335, 3346 to 3364, 3369 to 3427, 4413 to 4429, 4499 to 4502, and 4507 to 4515 respectively both inclusive, and which commuted rent-charges in lieu of tithes amount in the aggregate to the sum of £150 13s. 8d. per annum.

"2. And also all the commuted rent-charges in lieu of tithes, payable in respect of the lands in *Pitt Portion* aforesaid, which in the tithe apportionment and map of the same portion are numbered respectively 3318*, 3345, 3600*, and 3613*, and 3318 to 3320, 3336 to 3342, 3365 to 3368, and 3569 to 3621, respectively both inclusive, and which commuted rent-charges in lieu of tithes lastly described amount in the aggregate to the sum of £51 19s. 5d. per annum.

"THE FOURTH PART.

"The tithe rent-charges to be appropriated and annexed to the benefice of Saint George, Tiverton (when formed), amounting in the aggregate to the sum of £616 5s. 7d. per annum, being—

"1. All the commuted rent-charges in lieu of

SCHEDULE No. 4.

REGULATIONS and CONDITIONS, &c., as to the Posting, Forwarding, Conveyance, and Delivery of Reply Post Cards conveyed or delivered for conveyance by Post as mentioned and described in the foregoing Schedules Nos. 1, 2, and 3,

1. Reply Post Cards, bearing on each half thereof an impressed stamp, shall be issued by the Postmaster-General for conveyance by post under this Warrant, and the Reply Post Cards so issued and no others shall be deemed to be Reply Post Cards within the meaning of this Warrant.

2. The address of the addressee and nothing else (except as hereinafter provided) shall after the issue of a Reply Post Card be written, printed, or otherwise impressed on that side of either half thereof which bears the impressed stamp, and no part of the address shall be written, printed, or otherwise impressed across such stamp: Provided always, and notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, that it shall be lawful for the sender of a Reply Post Card to add to that side of either half thereof which bears the impressed stamp his own name and address by means of a stamp, autograph stamp, or any method of printing.

3. Any thing (including a letter or communication in the nature of a letter), may be written, printed, or otherwise impressed on that side of each half of a Reply Post Card which does not bear the impressed stamp.

4. Nothing whatever shall be in any manner attached to a Reply Post Card except a postage stamp or stamps in payment of any deficient postage, or additional sum chargeable thereon for registration or for acknowledgment of delivery, nor shall a Reply Post Card after the issue thereof be cut or folded or otherwise altered, except that that half of a Reply Post Card which is intended to be used for the purpose of a reply (in these Regulations referred to as "the return half"), may be severed from the other half thereof.

5. If any Reply Post Card be posted in the United Kingdom, or at either of the British Post Offices in Constantinople, Smyrna, and Beyrout respectively, without the postage chargeable thereon being fully prepaid, such Reply Post Card shall be forwarded to its address charged with double the amount of the deficient postage.

6. If any Reply Post Card, or the return half thereof, be posted otherwise than in conformity with these Regulations, it shall be detained and returned or given up to the sender thereof.

7. Any Reply Post Card posted in the United Kingdom, or at either of the British Post Offices in Constantinople, Smyrna, and Beyrout respectively, addressed to any country or place mentioned in the First Column of Schedule No. 1, or to the United Kingdom, may be registered provided that all rates of postage and additional sums for registration chargeable thereon be fully prepaid.

8. The sender of any registered Reply Post Card so posted and addressed as aforesaid, may obtain from the addressee of such Reply Post Card an acknowledgment of the delivery of such Reply Post Card to such addressee by paying in advance at the time of posting such Reply Post Card an additional sum of two pence halfpenny.

9. There shall not be conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post any indecent or obscene Reply Post Card or return half thereof, or any Reply Post Card or return half thereof, having thereon any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character, and if any Reply Post Card or return half thereof shall be posted which shall prima facie fall within the aforesaid prohibition, it shall be stopped and submitted at the General Post Office in London to the inspection of an officer duly authorised in that behalf by the Postmaster-General.

10. Any Reply Post Card addressed to and received in the United Kingdom which shall be re-directed in the United Kingdom to any country or place mentioned in the First Column of Schedule No. 1 shall not be liable to or chargeable with any British postage in respect either of such re-direction or of the re-transmission thereof by post to the country or place to which the same shall be so re-directed.

11. On every Reply Post Card or return half thereof posted in any country or place mentioned in the First Column of Schedule No. 1, addressed to some part of the same country or place, and which shall be re-directed in such country or place and transmitted by post from thence respectively to the United Kingdom, or to the British Offices of Constantinople, Smyrna, or Beyrout, there shall be charged and paid in the United Kingdom, or in the British Offices of Constantinople, Smyrna, or Beyrout respectively on the delivery thereof in addition to any postage charged thereon in respect of the inland service of the country or place in which such Reply Post Card shall have been posted, the same rate or rates of postage with which such Reply Post Card would have been chargeable if the same had been originally addressed to the United Kingdom, or to the British Offices of Constantinople, Smyrna, or Beyrout, but in the case of a Reply Post Card of which the postage to its original address within such country or place as aforesaid has been prepaid by means of a postage stamp or stamps valid in the said country or place affixed to or impressed on such Reply Post Card, the value of such stamp or stamps shall be deducted from the total amount of postage chargeable under this Regulation on such Reply Post Card as aforesaid.

12. The Postmaster-General may in any case in which he shall consider it just or reasonable so to do remit any postage made payable by any Regulation contained in this Schedule.

13. In this Warrant and the Schedules thereto the expression "United Kingdom" means the

United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man.

ORDER of the Local Government Board rescinding General Order in part :—

Hackney Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Hackney Union, in the county of Middlesex;

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the several parishes comprised in the said Union;

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by an Order dated the 17th day of December, 1866, the Poor Law Board ordered that the Guardians of the Poor of the said Hackney Union might form one or two Committees out of their body and might from time to time assign to such Committee the whole or part of the District of any of the Relieving Officers of the said Union, in order that each such Committee might hear and determine all applications for relief on account of poor persons residing or being in the District or part of the District of any the Relieving Officers of the Union which might have been assigned to such Committee; and that each such Committee might give all directions respecting the continuance of relief to poor persons residing or being in such District or part of such District, in such manner as the said Guardians, acting as a Board, should be authorized to do;

And whereas by a General Order dated the 5th day of September, 1877, addressed, among others, to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Hackney Union, We, the Local Government Board, ordered that the said Guardians might authorize the said Relief Committee or Committees to deal with all applications for payment of school fees on account of parents, not being paupers, residing or being in the District or part of the District which might have been so assigned to such Committee or Committees; and that such Committee or Committees should thereupon hear and determine all such applications, and give all directions respecting the continuance of the payment of the fees, in such manner as the Guardians, acting as a Board, might be authorized to do;

And whereas by an Order dated the 4th day of February, 1881, the first above-cited Order was amended as therein mentioned;

And whereas it is expedient that the said Orders dated, respectively, the 17th day of December, 1866, and the 4th day of February, 1881, should be rescinded, and that the said General Order, dated the 5th day of September, 1877, should be rescinded, so far as it relates to the said Hackney Union;

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, We hereby rescind the said Orders dated, respectively, the seventeenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one; and the said General Order, dated the fifth day of September, one thousand eight

hundred and seventy-seven, so far as it relates to the said Hackney Union.

These lights kept in line lead through the channel, in the best water and clear of all obstructions, from the intersection with St. Pierre leading lights in line off Islets Shallow, to the intersection with Ange Gardien leading lights in line off Pavillon Point Black Buoy.

(3.) Leading Lights at St. Pierre.

The leading lights at St. Pierre, south side of the channel, are fixed white lights.

The front light, shown from a lighthouse on the point at the narrowest part of the channel, is elevated 20 feet above high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 9 miles. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric, or by reflectors.

The lighthouse, 23 feet high, constructed of wood and square in shape, is white, with red roof.

Position, lat. $46^{\circ} 55' 45''$ N., long. $71^{\circ} 2' 30''$ W.

The back light, shown from a mast, 50 feet high (white shed at base), is elevated 50 feet above high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 12 miles; it bears S. 69° W. from the front light, distant 180 yards. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses, of small power.

These lights kept in line lead clear of all obstructions, from mid-channel off St. Famille Wharf to the intersection with Ste. Famille leading lights in line.

(4.) Leading Lights at Ange Gardien.

The leading lights at Ange Gardien, north side of the channel and below Montmorenci Falls, are fixed white lights.

The front light, shown from a lighthouse on the point, is elevated 20 feet above high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 9 miles. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric, or by reflectors.

The lighthouse, 23 feet high, constructed of wood and square in shape, is white, with red roof. Position, lat. $46^{\circ} 53' 50''$ N., long. $71^{\circ} 7' 50''$ W.

The back light, shown from a lighthouse on the hill-side, is elevated 33 feet above high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 11 miles; it bears S. 44° W. from the front light, distant 440 yards. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric, or by reflectors.

The lighthouse, 21 feet high, constructed of wood and square in shape, is white, with red roof.

These lights kept in line lead clear of all obstructions, from the intersection with Ste. Famille leading lights in line to the junction of Orleans Channel with Ship or South Channel, opposite West Point, Isle of Orleans.

NOTE.—These three pairs of leading lights, used in conjunction with the buoys, lead through the best water of Orleans Channel, from off St. Anne to the western end of the channel. The lights are visible only over a small arc on each side of the line of the leading lines.

4. A stone beacon surmounted by a basket, both painted red, on the north-west extreme of

the coral reef extending north-westward of Tree Island (Pulo Angup), on the south side of western entrance to Main Strait.

Approximate position, lat. $1^{\circ} 9' 30''$ N., long. $103^{\circ} 39' 35''$ E.

5. A tripod beacon surmounted by a basket, painted red, on the rock situated 6 cables south-eastward of Middle Island (Pulo Sabarut), northern side of Main Strait.

Approximate position, lat. $1^{\circ} 12' 00''$ N., long. $103^{\circ} 48' 40''$ E.

6. A red stone beacon surmounted by a basket, on the eastern side of Terumbo Sileger, south coast of Singapore Island.

Approximate position, lat. $1^{\circ} 13' 40''$ N., long. $103^{\circ} 49' 40''$ E.

7. Sinki Strait.—On the northern side.—A white beacon on the eastern part of the reef south-west of Bon Accord Dock; and a white beacon on the extremity of the shoal extending southward of Teregeh Point.

On the southern side.—A red beacon on the edge of the reef between Gila and Kuchin Creeks; a red beacon on the edge of the reef opposite Kopih Village; and a red beacon on the extremity of the reef extending northward of Berala Point.

Reported Bank Westward of Diego Garcia.

INFORMATION has been received from Mr. W. Wight, commanding the British steam-vessel "Delhi," of the existence of a bank lying about 10 miles S.S.E. of Pitt Bank, and about 53 miles westward of Diego Garcia.

This bank (Wight Bank) was seen from the poop of the "Delhi" (drawing $24\frac{1}{2}$ feet) at noon of 25th December, 1885, the bottom, of coral and sand, being distinctly visible. The engines were immediately stopped, and a sounding of 10 fathoms was obtained. As the vessel forged to the eastward, the water gradually shoaled to $4\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms, the engines were then reversed at full speed for about five minutes, and a south course afterwards steered, the bottom being then lost sight of.

Position by reliable observations—the chronometer being found practically correct on arrival at Diego Garcia—lat. $7^{\circ} 25'$ S., long. $71^{\circ} 28'$ E.

NOTE.—As it is possible that less water than above given may exist on Wight Bank, mariners should navigate in the vicinity with caution.

Intended Flashing Light on Inch Garvie.

THE Contractors for the Forth Bridge Works have given notice, that on 16th March, 1886, and until further notice, a light will be exhibited from a lantern erected near the north-west end of Inch Garvie, upper part of the Firth of Forth:—
