THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris copies of Notices issued by the French Government respecting quarantine, of which the following is a translation:—

A decision of the 24th April places arrivals from Sicily on the same footing as those from continental Italy as regards quarantine measures in French ports.

The sanitary measures taken in French ports against arrivals from Italy, Sicily, and Sardinia, have been adopted for Algeria since the 23rd April.

By a decision of the 23rd April, the quarantine of observation imposed in ports of Tunis on arrivals from Brindisi and its neighbourhood has been increased from three to five days. For arrivals from other Italian ports the observation is raised from twenty-four hours to three days, with the exception of arrivals from Sardinia, which will undergo an observation of twenty-four hours only.
