Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty the Queen has power and jurisdiction within the dominions of the Kings of Siam :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1843 to 1878, and the Act of the 20th and 21st of Her Majesty, cap. 75, and otherwise in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :—

I.—*Preliminary.*

1. This Order may be cited as the "Siam Order in Council, 1886," and is included in the expression "the Siam Orders in Council."

2. Words in this Order have the same meanings (unless the subject or context otherwise requires) as in the Siam (Foreign Jurisdiction) Order in Council, 1856, and the Siam Order in Council, 1884.

The expression "month" means a calendar month. Words importing the plural or the singular may be construed as referring to one person or thing, or more than one person or thing, and words importing the masculine as referring to females (as the case may require).

II.—*General Provisions respecting Her Majesty's Jurisdiction.*

3. All Her Majesty's jurisdiction in Siam for the judicial hearing and determination of matters in difference between British subjects or between foreigners (including subjects of the Kings of Siam) and British subjects, or for the administration or control of the property or persons of British subjects, or for the repression or punishment of crimes or offences committed by British subjects, or for the maintenance of order among British subjects, shall be exercised under and according to the provisions of this Order, and the provisions of the Siam Orders in Council, so far as they do not conflict with this Order, and not otherwise.

4. Subject to the provisions of the aforesaid Orders, the civil and criminal jurisdiction aforesaid shall as far as circumstances admit, be exercised upon the principles of and in conformity with the Common Law, the Rules of Equity, the Statute Law, and other law for the time being in force in and for England, and with the powers vested in and according to the principles of procedure and practice observed by and before the Courts of Justice and Justices of the Peace in England, according to their respective jurisdictions and authorities.

III.—*Juries.*

5. Every criminal case tried in Siam before a Judge of the Supreme Courts of the Straits

Settlements, acting under clause 14 of the Siam Order in Council of 1884, shall, if the defendant so requires, in manner prescribed by any Rules to be made under this Order, be tried before a jury.

6. Every male British subject resident in Siam being of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, being able to speak and read English, having or earning a gross income at the rate of not less than 250 dollars a year, not having been attainted of treason or felony, or convicted of any crime that is infamous (unless he has obtained a free pardon), shall be qualified to serve on a jury.

7. All persons so qualified shall be liable so to serve except the following :—

(a.) Persons in Her Majesty's Diplomatic, Consular, or other Civil Service in actual employment ;

(b.) Officers, clerks, keepers of prisons, messengers, and other persons attached to or in the service of any of Her Majesty's Courts ;

(c.) Officers and others on full pay in Her Majesty's army or navy, or in actual employment in the service of any department connected therewith ;

(d.) Clergymen and ministers of religion in the actual discharge of professional duties ;

(e.) Physicians, surgeons, and apothecaries in actual practice ; and

(f.) Persons disabled by mental or bodily infirmity.

8.—(1.) On or before the fourteenth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and in every subsequent year, Her Majesty's Consular Court at Bangkok shall make out a list of the persons so qualified, and liable resident within its district ;

(2.) The list shall, on or before the twenty-first day of the same month, be affixed in some conspicuous place in the Court, and shall be there exhibited until the end of that month, with a notice annexed that on a day specified, not being sooner than the seventh or later than the fourteenth day of the following month, the Court will hold a special sitting for the revision of the list.

(3.) The Court shall hold such special sitting accordingly, and at such sitting, or at some adjournment thereof (of which public notice shall be given), shall revise the list by striking out the name of any person appearing to be not qualified or not liable to serve, and by inserting the name of any person omitted and appearing to be so qualified and liable, either on the application of the person omitted, or such notice to him as the Court thinks fit.

(4.) The list shall be finally revised and settled not later than the twenty-first day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and in every subsequent year, and when settled shall be affixed in some conspicuous place in the Court, and be there exhibited during not less than two months.

9. Such list as settled, shall be brought into use on the first day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and in every subsequent year, and in every case shall be used as the Jury List of the Court until the first day of March next after the time of its being brought into use.

10.—(1.) When, in pursuance of this Order, a jury is required, the Court shall summon so many of the persons comprised in the Jury List as seems requisite.

(2.) Any persons failing to attend according to such summons shall be liable to such fine, not exceeding fifty dollars, as the Court think fit to impose, but such fine shall not be levied until after the expiration of fourteen days.

(3.) The proper officer of the Court shall forthwith give to the person fined notice in writing of the imposition of the fine, and require him, within six days after receipt of the notice, to pay the fine or to file an affidavit excusing his non-attendance (if he desires to do so). The Court shall consider the affidavit, and may, if it thinks fit, remit the fine.

11. A jury shall consist of five jurors.

12.—(1.) No challenges shall be allowed—

(2.) Except for cause shown to the satisfaction of the Court.

(3.) No Grand Jury shall be summoned.

A jury shall be required to give an unanimous verdict.

IV.—Coroners' Inquests.

13. Every Consular Court shall have and may exercise for and within its own district all the powers, rights, and duties appertaining to the office of Coroner in England, but it shall not be necessary to summon a jury in holding any inquest.

V.—Admiralty Jurisdiction.

14. The Consular Court at Bangkok shall be a Vice-Admiralty Court, and as such, shall, for and within Siam, and for vessels and persons coming to and within Siam, have all such jurisdiction as for the time being ordinarily belongs to Vice-Admiralty Courts in Her Majesty's possessions abroad.

The Consular Court shall have all powers and jurisdiction which can be exercised by Justices or a Vice-Admiralty Court under or for the purposes of the Acts relating to merchant shipping or the Passenger Acts, or relating to quarantine.

VI.—Lunacy.

15. The Consular Court at Bangkok shall, as far as circumstances admit, have in itself exclusively, for and within Siam, with respect to British subjects, all such jurisdiction relative to the custody and management of the persons and estates of persons of unsound mind as for the time being belongs to the Lord Chancellor or other person or persons in England intrusted, by virtue of Her Majesty's Sign Manual, with the care and commitment of the custody of the persons and estates of persons found, by inquisition in England, idiot, lunatic, or of unsound mind.

VII.—Probate and Administration.

16. The Consular Court at Bangkok shall be a Court of Probate, and as such shall, as far as circumstances admit, have, for and within Siam, with respect to the property of British subjects having at the time of death their fixed places of abode in Siam, all such jurisdiction as for the time being belongs to the Probate Division of Her Majesty's High Court of Justice in England.

17. A District Court shall also have power to grant probate or administration where there is no contention respecting the right to the grant, and it is proved on oath that the deceased had at the time of his death his fixed place of abode within the jurisdiction of the District Court.

18. Probate or administration granted by a District Court in Siam shall have effect over all the property of the deceased within Siam, and shall effectually discharge persons dealing with an executor or administrator thereunder, and that notwithstanding any defect afterwards appears in the grant.

19. Such a grant shall not be impeachable by reason only that the deceased had not at the time of his death his fixed place of abode within the particular jurisdiction.

20.—(1.) Every person having in his possession or under his control any paper or writing of a

deceased British subject being or purporting to be testamentary shall forthwith bring the original to the Court within the district whereof such person is at the time of his first knowledge of the death of the deceased, and deposit it there.

(2.) Any person neglecting to do so for fourteen days after having knowledge of the death of the deceased shall be liable to such penalty, not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, as the Court thinks fit to impose.

21. From the death intestate of a British subject having at the time of death his fixed place of abode in Siam until administration is granted, his personal property within Siam shall be vested in the Consul-General in Siam.

22. If any person other than one of Her Majesty's Consular officers takes possession of, and in any manner administers any part of the personal property of any person deceased, without obtaining probate or administration within three months after the death of the deceased, or within one month after the termination of any suit or dispute respecting probate or administration (if there is any such which is not ended within two months after the death of the deceased), he shall be liable to such penalty, not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars, as the Court having jurisdiction in the matter of the property of the deceased thinks fit to impose; and in every such case the same fees shall be payable by the person so administering as would have been payable by him if he had obtained probate or administration.

23. Where a British subject not having at the time of death his fixed place of abode in Siam dies there, the Court within whose district he dies shall, where the circumstances of the case appear to the Court so to require, forthwith on the death of the deceased, or as soon after as may be, take possession of his personal property within the particular jurisdiction, or put it under the seal of the Court (in either case, if the nature of the property or other circumstances so require, making an inventory), and so keep the property until it can be dealt with according to law.

VIII.—Punishments.

24. Every Court and authority in imposing punishments shall, as far as circumstances admit, and subject to the provisions of the Siam Orders in Council, have regard to the punishments imposed by the laws of England in like cases, and to the mode in which the same are inflicted in England.

25.—(1.) Where any person is sentenced in Siam to suffer the punishment of death, the Judge pronouncing the sentence shall forthwith send a report of the sentence, with a copy of the Minutes of the proceedings and notes of the evidence in the case, and with any observation the Judge thinks fit to make to the Governor in Council of the Straits Settlements.

(2.) The sentence shall not be carried into execution without the order of the Governor of the Straits Settlements in Council.

(3.) In any such case, if the said Governor in Council does not order that the sentence of death be carried into execution, he shall direct what punishment in lieu of the punishment of death is to be inflicted on the person convicted, and the person convicted shall be punished accordingly.

26.—(1.) Where any offender convicted before a Court in Siam is sentenced to suffer imprisonment in respect of the crime or offence of which he is convicted, and it is expedient that the sentence be carried into effect within Her Majesty's dominions, the offender may, in accordance with the 5th section of "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1843," be sent for execution of his sentence as follows:—

(a.) In the case of a prisoner who is, or who appears to the person signing the warrant under the said 5th section to be, a native of Burmah or of any other part of British India, and not of European descent, to Her Majesty's possession of Burmah, or some other part of British India.

(b.) In the case of any other prisoner, to the Colony of the Straits Settlements.

And the person for the time being acting as Her Majesty's Consul-General or Consul in Siam shall have authority for the purposes of the said section.

IX.—Offences against Religion.

27. If any British subject is guilty of publicly deriding, mocking, or insulting any religion established or observed in Siam, or publicly offering any insult to any religious service, feast, or ceremony established or kept in any part of Siam, or to any place for worship, tomb, or sanctuary belonging to any such religion, or to the ministers or professors thereof, or of wilfully committing any act tending to bring any such religion or its ceremonies, mode of worship, or observances into hatred, ridicule, or contempt, and thereby to provoke a breach of the public peace, he shall be liable (in the discretion of the Court before which he is convicted), to imprisonment for any term not exceeding three months, with or without hard labour, and with or without a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars without imprisonment.

28. Notwithstanding anything in the Siam Orders in Council, every charge against a British subject of having committed any such offence shall be heard and determined in a summary way, and a District Court shall have power to impose the punishment aforesaid.

X.—Foreign Tribunals.

29. Where it is shown to any of Her Majesty's Courts that the attendance of a British subject to give evidence, or for any other purpose connected with the administration of justice, is required in a Siamese Court or before a judicial officer in Siam of any State in amity with Her Majesty, the Court may, in cases and under circumstances which would require the attendance of that British subject before one of Her Majesty's Courts in Siam, and if it seems to the Court just and expedient so to do, make an order for the attendance of the British subject in such Court or before such judicial officer, and for such purpose as aforesaid, but so that a District Court shall not have power to make an order for such attendance of a British subject at any place beyond the particular jurisdiction of the Court.

30. Any British subject duly served with such an order, and with reasonable notice of the time and place at which his attendance is required, and having had the reasonable expenses of attendance paid or tendered to him, failing to attend accordingly, and not excusing his failure to the satisfaction of the Court making the order, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or to imprisonment for any term not exceeding one month, in the discretion of the Court.

XI.—General Provisions.

31. Any Court may order any person convicted before it of any crime or offence to pay all or any part of the expenses of or preliminary to his trial, and of his imprisonment or other punishment.

32. Where it appears to any Court that any charge made before it is malicious or is frivolous and vexatious, the Court may order all or any part of the expenses of the prosecution to be paid by the person making the charge.

33. In either of the two last-mentioned cases

the amount ordered to be paid shall be deemed a debt due to the Crown, and may, by virtue of the order, without further proceedings, be levied on the property of the person convicted or making the charge, as the same may be.

34.—(1.) Where the crime or offence with which any person is charged before any Consular Court appears to the Court to be such that, if proved, it would not be adequately punished by such punishment as the Court has power to impose, and the accused is not to be sent for trial to Her Majesty's dominions, the Courts may reserve the case to be heard and determined before a Judge of the Supreme Court of the Straits Settlements acting under the provisions of clause 14 of the Siam Order in Council, 1884.

(2.) Where any case is reserved under this section, the Consular Court shall take the depositions, and commit the prisoner for trial before such Judge of the Supreme Court of the Straits Settlements as shall next exercise criminal jurisdiction in Siam, under the powers given in clause 14 of the Siam Order in Council, 1884.

35.—(1.) If any British subject—

(a.) Wilfully obstructs by act or threat an officer of the Court in the performance of his duty; or

(b.) Within or close to the room or place where a Court is sitting, wilfully behaves in a violent, threatening, or disrespectful manner, to the disturbance of the Court or the terror of the suitors or others resorting thereto; or

(c.) Wilfully insults the Judge or any Consular officer, or any juror or assessor, or any clerk or officer of a Court during his sitting or attendance in Court, or in going to or returning from Court; he shall be liable to be immediately apprehended by order of the Court, and to be detained until the rising of the Court, and further, on due inquiry and consideration, to be punished with a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding seven days, at the discretion of the Court, according to the nature and circumstances of the case.

(2.) A Minute shall be made and kept of every such case of punishment, recording the fact of the offence, and the extent of the punishment, and in the case of a District Court a copy of such Minute shall be forthwith sent to the Consular Court at Bangkok.

36.—(1.) Whenever, under the Siam Orders in Council, any person is to be taken, in custody or otherwise, for trial or imprisonment, or by way of deportation, or for any other purpose, to Singapore or elsewhere in the Straits Settlements, or to England or elsewhere, the Court or other authority by the Siam Orders in Council authorized to cause him to be so taken may for that purpose, if necessary, cause him to be embarked on board one of Her Majesty's vessels of war, or if there is no such vessel available, then on board any British or other fit vessel, at any port or place, whether within or beyond the particular jurisdiction of that Court in authority, and in order to such embarkation may, if necessary, cause him to be taken, in custody or otherwise, by land or by water, from any place to the port or place of embarkation.

(2.) The writ, order, or warrant of any Consular Court, or of the Consul-General, as the case may be, by virtue whereof any person is to be so taken, shall be sufficient authority to every constable, officer, or person acting thereunder; and the commander or master of any vessel of war or other vessel (whether the constable, officer, or other person, or the vessel or the commander or master thereof, is named therein or not) to receive, detain, take, and deliver up such person, according to the writ, order, or warrant.

(3.) Where the writ, order, or warrant is executed under the immediate direction of the Court or authority issuing it, the writ, order, or warrant shall be delivered to the constable, officer, or other person acting thereunder, and a duplicate thereof shall be delivered to the commander or master of any vessel in which the person to whom the writ, order, or warrant relates is embarked.

37. Subject to the other provisions of the Siam Orders in Council, all expenses of removal of prisoners and others from or to any place in Siam, the expenses of deportation, and of the sending of any person to England or to India, shall be defrayed as the expenses as to distressed British subjects are defrayed, or in such other manner as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State from time to time may direct, provided that such expenses shall not be charged on Imperial funds otherwise than subject to the sanction of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury.

38. The provisions of the third section of the Siam Order in Council, 1884 (relating to the publication and commencement of the said Order), shall apply to this Order.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Rosebery and the Right Honourable the Earl of Kimberley, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the altera-

tion may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted "That when, by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the controul or interference of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas Arthur Charles, Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, hath represented in a writing, dated the thirteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, to the Right Honourable Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Charles Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells do hereby represent to your Grace that to the rectory and parish church of Street in the county of Somerset and my diocese of Bath and Wells belongs an ancient parochial chapelry known by the name of Walton the limits and boundaries whereof are well-known and defined.

"That according to the last census the population of Street is about two thousand five hundred and seventy-five and of Walton six hundred and seventy-five.

"That there is in Walton a church or chapel distant from the parish church of Street about one mile and a half and wherein Divine service is performed by the incumbent of Street.

"That the said chapelry of Walton appears to have been from time immemorial treated as a

separate and distinct parish for all civil purposes and baptisms churchings marriages and burials have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized and performed in the church or chapel of the said chapelry and the burial ground thereto belonging and the said chapelry has its own churchwardens overseers and parish officers and is in no way connected with the said parish of Street in respect to rates of any kind.

"That the net annual value of the said rectory of Street (exclusive of the value of the rectory house at Walton and appurtenances) is eight hundred and seventy-four pounds or thereabouts arising from glebe lands, tithe rent-charges and other endowments and emoluments including the tithe rent-charges of the chapelry of Walton of the net annual value of three hundred and eighty-five pounds or thereabouts.

"That there is a house of residence for the minister at Walton but there is no house of residence for the minister of Street.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or landowners of Street possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the church or chapel of Walton or that any of the inhabitants or landowners of Walton possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the church of Street.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and of the second and third years of the same reign chapter forty-nine the said chapelry of Walton may be advantageously separated from the said rectory and parish church of Street and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first mentioned Act I have prepared the following scheme which together with the consent thereto of the patron of the said rectory I do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same and such consent by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, and the consent of the patron referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"The SCHEME above referred to.

"That the said chapelry of Walton shall be separated from the said rectory and parish church of Street and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of the perpetual curacy of Walton of which the said church or chapel in the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"That the proposed separate parish and benefice shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said rectory of Street and that the incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That two churchwardens shall be annually chosen as heretofore in and for such separate parish and benefice and that every person so chosen shall be duly admitted and shall do all things pertaining to the office of churchwarden as to ecclesiastical matters within the said separate parish and benefice.

"That so much and such part of the tithe

rent-charges and other payments or compositions for or in lieu of tithes now belonging to the rectory of Street with the chapelry of Walton as arise or accrue or are payable within or in respect of the parish of Street and which are of the value of four hundred and eighty-nine pounds and fourteen shillings or thereabouts and that so much of the glebe lands belonging to the rectorial manor of Street and Walton as lie within the parish of Street together with the rents thereof shall belong and be attached to the rectory of Street for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being accordingly.

"That so much and such part of the tithe rent-charges or other payments or compositions for or in lieu of tithes belonging to the rectory of Street with the chapelry of Walton as arise and accrue or are payable within or in respect of the parish of Walton and are of the value of three hundred and eighty-five pounds or thereabouts and that so much of the glebe lands belonging to the rectorial manor of Street and Walton as lie within the parish of Walton together with the rents thereof shall belong and be attached to the proposed separate benefice of Walton for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being accordingly.

"That the tithe rent-charge of nine pounds and ten shillings now payable to the rector of Street with Walton in respect of lands situate in the adjacent parish of Ashcott be henceforth for ever payable to and received taken and enjoyed by the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Walton.

"That all fees and payments for churchings marriages burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the proposed separate parish and benefice of Walton and such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise within the said separate parish or benefice of Walton shall belong to the incumbent thereof.

"That the rector of the said rectory of Street for the time being shall continue to pay the same amounts for first fruits and yearly tenths as have heretofore been payable in respect of the said rectory with the said chapelry annexed and also shall continue to pay the sum of ten shillings and six pence yearly to the Archdeacon of Wells for procurations and also the fee farm rent of one pound eight shillings and eight pence payable to the Trustees of Mr. R. Parnell in respect of the rectory of Street.

"That the parishioners of the proposed separate parish of Walton shall as heretofore be exclusively subject and liable to all rates charges and assessments to be made for or in respect of the maintenance and repair of the church or chapel of Walton aforesaid and the expenses incidental to the due performance of Divine service therein and shall be exempt from all rates charges and assessments to be made for or in respect of the parish church of Street aforesaid or for or in respect of any other church or chapel situate elsewhere than within the limits of the proposed separate parish.

"That the patronage or right of nomination to the proposed separate benefice of Walton shall be vested in the Most Honourable the Marquess of Bath for the time and his successors for ever.

"That the parishioners of the said proposed separate parish shall not hereafter be entitled to accommodation in the church of Street nor shall the parishioners of Street be entitled to any accommodation in the church or chapel of Walton.

"Given under my hand this thirteenth day of

February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

"Arthur C. Bath and Wells."

"I the Most Honourable John Alexander Marquess of Bath of Longleat in the county of Wilts the patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said rectory of Street with the chapelry of Walton annexed in case the same were now vacant do hereby signify my consent to the scheme above proposed.

"As witness my hand this sixteenth day of February one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six. *"Bath."*

And whereas the Reverend John George Hickley, the incumbent of the said benefice of Street with the chapelry of Walton annexed has signed the consent following:—

"I John George Hickley Clerk Rector of Street with the chapelry of Walton annexed in the county of Somerset do hereby signify my consent to the scheme above proposed and am willing that the separation should take effect forthwith.

"Witness my hand this eleventh day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

"John George Hickley."

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration; and whereas the said Archbishop being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same, and the consents aforesaid, to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the eighteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Charles Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells has represented unto us (amongst other things)

"That to the rectory and parish church of Street in the county of Somerset and diocese of Bath and Wells belongs an ancient parochial chapelry known by the name of Walton the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said chapelry may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Street and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the Most Honourable John Alexander Marquess of Bath the patron and of the Reverend John George Hickley the incumbent of the said benefice has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the

first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this eighteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said scheme be carried into effect. *C. L. Peel.*

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the eighteenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to a certain benefice namely the church and cure (being a vicarage) of Saint Barnabas in the city of Oxford and in the diocese of Oxford by way of exchange for the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to a certain other benefice namely the church and cure (being a rectory) of Saint Martin otherwise Carfax in the said city of Oxford and in the said diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Barnabas Oxford is vested in the Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford for the time being and his successors.

"And whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Martin otherwise Carfax Oxford is vested in the Warden, Council and Scholars of Keble College in the University of Oxford and in their successors.

"And whereas the Right Reverend John Fielder now Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford and the Reverend Edward Stuart Talbot Clerk in Holy Orders the Warden of the said College and the Council and Scholars of the same College have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said two benefices may be assigned and transferred by way of exchange in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices and patronage and we do hereby certify to Your Majesty that the circumstances and present values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said John Fielder Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford (in testimony whereof he has affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme) and with the consent of the said Edward Stuart Talbot the Warden and of the Council and Scholars of Keble College aforesaid (in testimony whereof the said Warden Council and Scholars have affixed their common or corporate seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Barnabas in the city and diocese of Oxford now vested in the said John Fielder Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford as such Bishop as aforesaid shall be transferred from him the said John Fielder Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford and from his successors Bishops of the said diocese and shall thereupon and thenceforth

become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Warden Council and Scholars of Keble College aforesaid in the University of Oxford and their successors for ever; and that in exchange for the same, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Martin otherwise Carfax in the said city and diocese of Oxford now vested as aforesaid in the said Warden Council and Scholars of Keble College aforesaid shall thereupon and thenceforth be transferred from them the said Warden Council and Scholars and from their successors and shall be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the John Fielder Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint James, Milton of the new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea, and of the new parish of Saint Peter Southsea all within the original limits of the parish of Saint Mary Portsea in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the eighth

day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four and published in the London Gazette on the fifteenth day of the same month a part of the parish of Saint Mary Portsea aforesaid was assigned as a district to the consecrated church of Saint James situate in the same parish and such district was named 'The Chapelry District of Saint James Milton.'

"And whereas upon the passing of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four the said chapelry district of Saint James Milton became a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the said above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of an instrument bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five and being under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and also under the hand and seal of the Right Reverend Charles Richard the then Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester, a certain portion of the said chapelry district (then a new parish) of Saint James Milton, and a portion of the district chapelry of Saint Paul Portsea (within the original limits of the parish of Saint Mary Portsea aforesaid) and also a portion of the said parish of Saint Mary Portsea, were together assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church of Saint Bartholomew situate at Southsea, in the chapelry district (then a new parish) of Saint James Milton aforesaid, and the same particular district was named 'The Particular District of Saint Bartholomew, Southsea.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-third day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three and published in the London Gazette upon the twenty-eighth day of the same month a portion of the new parish of Saint Jude Southsea within the original limits of the parish of Saint Mary Portsea aforesaid, and also a portion of the district chapelry of Saint Paul Portsea aforesaid, were together assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Peter the Apostle situate within the limits of the said new parish of Saint Jude Southsea and the same was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Peter Southsea.'

"And whereas the said particular district of Saint Bartholomew Southsea and the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Peter Southsea have each of them under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the said Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint James Milton, and of the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea, and of the said new parish of Saint Peter Southsea should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Harold Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or represen-

tation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parishes of Saint James Milton, of Saint Bartholomew Southsea, and of Saint Peter Southsea shall be altered as follows:—(1.) All that portion of the new parish of Saint James Milton and also all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea which are described in the first schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and are thereon both coloured pink shall be dis severed from such new parishes respectively, and shall be restored to and again become and be and form part of the said parish of Saint Mary Portsea: (2.) All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea which is described in the second schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured yellow shall be dis severed from such new parish and shall be annexed to and become and be and form part of the said new parish of Saint Peter Southsea: (3.) All that portion of the said new parish of Saint James Milton which is described in the third schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured violet shall be dis severed from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall become and be and form part of the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea: (4.) All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea which is described in the fourth schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured green shall be dis severed from such new parish and shall be restored to and shall again become and be and form part of the said new parish of Saint James Milton.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that all the said portions of the above-mentioned new parishes which are described in the said four several schedules and are respectively delineated and set forth and coloured upon the said map or plan as aforesaid shall from the above mentioned day of the date of publication in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order be dis severed from the said respective new parishes and shall be annexed or restored to and become and be and form parts of the said new parishes or of the said parish respectively in the order and manner mentioned in the said four schedules.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The FIRST SCHEDULE.

"(a) The territory to be dis severed from the new parish of Saint James Milton in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester and to be restored to the parish of Saint Mary Portsea in the same county and diocese, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint James Milton which is bounded on the west partly by the parish of Saint Mary Portsea aforesaid and partly by the next hereinafter-described portion of the new parish of Saint Bartholomew

Southsea in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south upon the south-east and upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea from the new parish of Saint James Milton aforesaid at the centre of Fratton Bridge over the line of the London and South-Western Railway and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of one mile and twelve chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses Milton-road which leads from Milton to Copnor at the junction of the same road with Tangier-lane and with New-road, and extending thence westward to and along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-six and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Milton from the parish of Saint Mary Portsea aforesaid.

"(b) The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea and to be restored to the parish of Saint Mary Portsea aforesaid, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea which is bounded upon the west upon the north and upon a small part of the east by the parish of Saint Mary Portsea aforesaid upon the remaining and greater part of the east by the lastly hereinbefore-described portion of the new parish of Saint James Milton aforesaid, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Milton from the new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea aforesaid at the centre of Fratton Bridge over the line of the London and South-Western Railway as aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to the point at the centre of the Somers-road Bridge which carries Somers-road over the same line of railway where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea from the parish of Saint Mary Portsea aforesaid joins the boundary dividing the last-named parish from the new parish of Saint Luke Portsea in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"The SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Peter Southsea in the county and diocese aforesaid, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea which is bounded upon the south-west by the said new parish of Saint Peter Southsea upon the north-west partly by the last-named cure and partly by the new parish of Saint Luke Portsea aforesaid upon the north-east by the lastly hereinbefore described portion of the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea, and on the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea from the new parish of Saint James Milton aforesaid at the centre of Fratton Bridge as aforesaid and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of Victoria-road North for a distance of twenty-one and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the last-named road with Bailey's-lane which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew

Southsea from the new parish of Saint Peter Southsea aforesaid.

"The THIRD SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint James Milton and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea as aforesaid, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint James Milton which is bounded upon the south by the new parish of Saint Simon Southsea in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the west by the new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north and upon the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint James Milton from the new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea aforesaid at the centre of the said Fratton Bridge over the line of the London and South-Western Railway as aforesaid, and extending thence eastward to and along the middle of the same line of railway for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with the line of the Southsea New Railway and extending thence first eastward then south-eastward and then southward along the middle of the last-named line of railway for a distance of sixty-eight chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the centre of the bridge which carries Albert-road over the same line of railway which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint James Milton from the new parish of Saint Simon Southsea aforesaid.

"The FOURTH SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea and to be restored to the new parish of Saint James Milton aforesaid, being:—

"All that outlying and detached portion of the said new parish of Saint Bartholomew Southsea which is bounded upon the south-east by the sea, upon the west by the new parish of Saint Simon Southsea aforesaid or in other words for the most part by Festing-road and upon the north and upon the east by the new parish of Saint James Milton aforesaid, or in other words upon the north by Highland-road and upon the east partly by Cromwell-road and partly by Saint George's-road."

THE Ministry of Justice hereby orders quarantine, with respect to ships coming from or that have been in communication on the voyage with ships coming from Italian harbours on the Adriatic Sea, between the Austrian frontier and San Maria di Leuca.

Quarantine has already been ordered on ships coming from French ports between Nantes and Cherbourg, all Spanish ports, and Gibraltar.

The provisions contained in Clause II, section 1, of the Act of the 2nd of July, 1880, for preventing the introduction of contagious diseases into Denmark, are in force with respect to the following places:—

All French Mediterranean ports, Italian continental ports on the Gulf of Genoa and the Sea of Tuscany, all harbours in Sicily, Tunis, all harbours in Egypt, harbours on the Red Sea, Fez, Mequines, and Dar el Beida, in Morocco, Rio de Janeiro, Havana, and all harbours in Japan.

Prohibition against the importation into the Kingdom of used linen, used wearing apparel, used bedclothes, provided the said articles do not belong to a person's private effects, rags, used wadding, wool, paper refuse, hair, and skins is in force for all French ports, Italian continental harbours on the Gulf of Genoa and the Sea of Tuscany, as well as Spanish Mediterranean ports.

Prohibition against the importation into the Kingdom of used linen and wearing apparel, used bedclothes, provided the said articles do not belong to a person's private effects, is in force with respect to Rio de Janeiro and Havana.

With regard to the above it is specially commanded that linen, clothes, and bedding which are brought by travellers shall be purified under official supervision.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Odessa, the following translation of Quarantine Regulations issued by the Governor-General on the 4th instant:—

Paragraph 1. Vessels arriving from ports infected with cholera, or vessels that have been in immediate communication with other vessels not having clean bills of health, are, on their arrival at a Black Sea port, to be subject to a quarantine of observation of six days.

Paragraph 2. Vessels that can produce a certificate from the ship's doctor showing that since their departure from an infected port, or since they have been in communication with an infected or other vessel that is not in possession of a clean bill of health, and which can show that not a single case of doubtful disease has taken place on board, are to be subjected to three days' observation.

Paragraph 3. While the ship is undergoing quarantine:—(a.) All rags, wearing and bed linen, clothes, especially those which have been in use and are soiled or unwashed or have been worn, are to be destroyed or made innocuous. It is desirable that this object should be attained by percolating steam of the temperature of 100° during an hour, or by boiling for half an hour, or by soaking for a period of twenty-four hours in a solution of carbolic acid or a solution of chloride of lime of 1°; (b.) Leather articles, portmanteaus, boots, &c., are to be washed with the same solution; (c.) Waterclosets are to be washed not less than twice a day with a solution of carbolic acid of 5°, or a solution of chloride of lime of 4°; (d.) All suspicious provisions, animal refuse, and all kinds of rubbish are to be destroyed; (e.) All water taken on board at infected ports is to be thrown away; (f.) Water taken in at infected localities is to be poured out, the ballast tanks pumped out, and their contents replaced by sea water at least twice: the holds are to be carefully cleansed and maintained in this condition; (g.) The crew and passengers are to take baths; (h.) Any soiled ballast which a vessel may have on board is to be disinfected by means of the percolation of 100° of steam, or is to be watered with a solution of chloride of lime of 1°, and if, on the other hand, the ballast is of earth, chloride of lime is to be spread over it.

Paragraph 4. Infected vessels, i.e., vessels having cases, or vessels which have had cases of cholera on board during the last voyage, are to be directed to a quarantine port, and are not permitted to enter other Russian ports. Ships with cases of cholera on board are to be most strictly subjected to the regulations of the quarantine rules and to disinfection, as set forth in the Instructions issued on the 12th of September, 1884.

Paragraph 5. The discharge of cargo from an infected ship is not to take place until six days after the passengers have been landed, and after the ship has been cleansed according to the rules prescribed in paragraph 3 of the Instructions dated the 12th of September, 1884.

Paragraph 6. The landing of passengers from infected vessels into quarantine premises, or ships appointed for isolation, has to take place as soon as the disinfecting regulations for passengers and their luggage have been carried into effect.

On every parcel exceeding one pound, and not exceeding the maximum weight for the time being authorized for parcels transmitted by Parcel Post between the United Kingdom and the British West Indies, for the first pound sixpence, and for every additional pound or fraction of a pound in weight, sixpence.
