NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 103.)—UNITED STATES—MASSACHUSETTS
 BAY.—GLOUCESTER HARBOUR.

(1.) *Eastern Point Lighthouse—Alteration in
 Character of Fog-Signal.*

THE United States Government has given notice, that on 1st May, 1886, the following alteration would be made in the character of the fog signal at Eastern Point Lighthouse, Gloucester Harbour Entrance:—

During thick and foggy weather the bell will be sounded twice in quick succession at intervals of twenty seconds.

LONG ISLAND.

(2.) *Light-Vessel with Fog-Signal Marking Wreck
 South-eastward of Fire Island Lighthouse.*

Also, dated 14th April, 1886, that Light-vessel No. 20 has been moored in 20½ fathoms water, about three cables eastward of the wreck of the British steam vessel "Oregon," lying sunk, with Fire Island Lighthouse bearing about N.W. by W. ¾ W., distant about twelve miles:—

The light-vessel is schooner rigged, painted lead colour, with the words Wreck of the Oregon in large black letters on her sides, and No. 20 in white figures on each quarter; she carries at each masthead a circular lattice-work day mark painted black.

From the foremast head a fixed red light is shown; and from the mainmast head a fixed white light, elevated 45 feet above the sea, and visible in clear weather from a distance of about twelve miles.

Position (approximate as given), lat. 40° 33' N., long. 72° 51' W.

During thick and foggy weather a bell on board this light-vessel will be sounded twice in quick succession every twenty seconds.

NOTE.—Vessels approaching from the eastward should pass southward of this light-vessel to avoid the wreck of the "Hylton Castle," lying in-shore and westward of her.

[The bearing is magnetic. Variation, 9° West-erly in, 1886.]
