All officers and men who served south of Assouan on or before 7th March, 1885, and all officers and men who were at Suakin on board H.M. ships named below during any of the periods specified, or who served with the Marine Battalion on shore between 26th March, 1884, and 14th May, 1885, will receive the Egypt Medal, if not already in possession of it, for the operations of 1882 or 1884, and such of the following Clasps as they may be entitled to:

2. A Clasp inscribed "The Nile, 1884-1885," to those who served south of Assouan on or before

7th March, 1885.

3. A Clasp inscribed "Abu Klea" to those who took part in the action fought there on 17th January, 1885, under the late Major-General Sir H. Stewart, K.C.B.

4. A Clasp inscribed "Kirbekan" to those who took part in the action fought there on the 10th February, 1885, under the late Major-General W. Earle, C.B., C.S.I.

5. A Clasp inscribed "Suakin, 1885," to those who were engaged in the operations at Suakin between the 1st March and 14th May, 1885 (both days inclusive).

6. A Clasp inscribed "Tofrek" to those who were actually present at the action fought there

on the 22nd March, 1885.

7. Those officers and men already in possession of the medal for former operations will only receive such of the Clasps specified above as they may be entitled to.
