(2.) *Channel Patch Buoy—Alteration in Character.*

Also, that the chequered buoy marking Channel Patch, South Traverse, is lighted by gas.

UNITED STATES—FLORIDA.—CAY WEST HARBOUR.

(3.) *North-west Channel Lighthouse—Ray of Red Light.*

The United States Government has given notice, that on 1st June, 1886, a ray of red light, to guide across the bar of North-west Channel, Cay West Harbour, would be shown from North-west Channel Lighthouse:—

This ray is visible through an arc of 4°, or between the bearings of S. by W. and S. by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W.; its eastern edge just covers the line of buoys across the bar, and its western edge guides clear of the 8½ feet shoal on the western side of the channel. The bell buoy at the entrance to the bar is in the axis of the ray.

NOTE.—Vessels entering North-west Channel from seaward, should pass close to the bell buoy, and then steer S. by W. $\frac{1}{8}$ W. for the light, keeping full in the red ray to clear all dangers.

Vessels approaching North-west Channel from Cay West Harbour, should hold their channel course until the edge of the red ray is just visible, and then at once steer N. by E. $\frac{1}{8}$ E. for the bell buoy, keeping well in the red ray until abreast it.

INCOME TAX.

WHEREAS by the Taxes Management Act, 1880 (43 and 44 Vict., ch. 19), power is given for increasing in certain cases the number of persons appointed, under the provisions made by the Income Tax Act of 1842, Commissioners for the general purposes of the Income Tax, and persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners in each district or division in Great Britain; and it appearing to the Board of Inland Revenue that the number of persons so appointed for the division of Melksham, in the county of Wilts, is insufficient for the proper discharge of the business therein arising under the Tax Acts, the said Board hereby authorize the increase in the number of the Commissioners for the said division to any number not exceeding ten, and of persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners to any number not exceeding ten; and we, the undersigned, two members of the said Board, do hereby convene a meeting of the persons appointed for putting in execution within the said county, an Act passed in the 38th year of the reign of King George the Third, intituled "An Act for granting an aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax to be raised in Great Britain for the service of the year 1798," being respectively qualified to act as Commissioners in the execution of the last-mentioned Act, to be holden at the Townhall, in Melksham, on Tuesday, the 6th day of July, 1886, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of choosing and appointing, according to the regulations of the said Income Tax Act of 1842, such number of fit and proper persons to be Commissioners for general purposes for the said division of Melksham, and of persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners, as may be sufficient to increase the number of such Commissioners to any number not exceeding ten, and of persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners to any number not exceeding ten.
