A PROCLAMATION,

For Dissolving the present Parliament, and declaring the calling of another.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday, the fifteenth day of July next: We do, for that end, publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for shires and burghs, of the House of Commons, are discharged from their meeting and attendance on the said Thursday, the fifteenth day of July next: And We, being desirous and resolved, as soon as may

be, to meet Our people, and to have their advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving subjects Our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a new Parliament; and do hereby further declare, that, with the advice of Our Privy Council, We have given order that Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain and Our Chancellor of Ireland do respectively, upon notice thereof, forthwith issue out writs, in due form and according to law, for calling a new Parliament. And We do hereby also, by this Our Royal Proclamation under Our Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, require writs forthwith to be issued accordingly by Our said Chancellors respectively, for causing the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, who are to serve in the said Parliament, to be duly returned to, and give their attendance in, Our said Parliament on the fifth day of August next; which writs are to be returnable in due course of law.

Given at Our Court at *Windsor*, this twenty-sixth day of *June*, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and in the fiftieth year of Our Reign.

A PROCLAMATION,

In order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We have in Our Council thought fit to declare Our pleasure for summoning and holding a Parliament of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on Thursday, the fifth day of August next ensuing the date hereof; in order, therefore, to the electing and summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, We do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood House, in Edinburgh, on Tuesday, the twentieth day of July next, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers to sit and vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and

of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing duly signed before witnesses, and both the constituent and proxy being qualified according to law); and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes, and immediately after such election made and duly examined to certify the names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said city, to take especial care to preserve the peace thereof during the time of the said election, and to prevent all manner of riots, tumults, disorders, and violence whatsoever. And We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, ten days at least before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such election.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the forty-fifth and forty-sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, entitled "The Militia Act, 1882," it is amongst other things enacted that, save as therein otherwise provided, the Militia shall be trained and exercised for not less than twenty-one days and not more than twenty-eight days in every year, at such times and at such places in every part of the United Kingdom, as Her Majesty may appoint, and also that Her Majesty may, from time to time, with the advice of Her Privy Council, order that the period of training and exercise, in any year, of all or any part of the Militia be extended, but so that the whole period of training and exercise be not more than fifty-six days.

And whereas it is expedient that the training of the 2nd Brigade, Lancashire Division, Royal Artillery (formerly the Royal Lancashire Artillery Militia), and the 2nd Brigade, North Irish Division, Royal Artillery (formerly the Antrim Artillery Militia), and also of the Royal Anglesey Engineer Militia, the Southern Submarine Mining Militia, and the Royal Monmouthshire Engineer Militia, should be extended beyond the period of twenty-eight days for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and direct that the period of training and exercise of the before-specified Regiments and Brigades of Militia shall, for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, be extended, under the provisions of the before-cited Act, from twenty-eight days to the number of days in each case hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

2nd Brigade, Lancashire Division, Royal Artillery, thirty-four (34) days.

2nd Brigade, North Irish Division, Royal Artillery, thirty-four (34) days.

Royal Anglesey Engineer Militia forty-one (41) days.

Southern Submarine Mining Militia fifty-five (55) days.

Royal Monmouthshire Engineer Militia forty-one (41) days.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby dispense with the calling out of the 3rd Battalion, Oxfordshire Light Infantry, and doth order and direct that there shall be no training and exercise thereof in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and that this Order be published in the London Gazette.

THE following Statute, passed on the 22nd day of May, 1886, by the Governing Body of Trinity College, Oxford, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 :—

Stat. II., cl. 21a.—THE President and Fellows may, if they think fit, by a majority of two-thirds of those present and voting at a meeting specially called with notice of the business to be transacted thereat, or at a stated general meeting, and either with or without public notice or examination, elect to a Fellowship—

(a.) Any Lecturer, Bursar, or other officer of the College, or any person previously a Fellow of the College, whom it shall be judged expedient to retain or re-elect as a Fellow.

(b.) Any person who holds the office of Professor or Reader in the University.

(c.) Any person who has attained distinction in one of the liberal professions, or in literature, science, or art.

Fellows elected under this clause shall be called extraordinary Fellows, and the whole number of such Fellows shall not exceed four at any one time. They shall be elected for such period not exceeding five years, as the President and Fellows may determine in each case, or for any period not exceeding five years, during which they may be the holders of any particular office in the College or in the University, and shall be entitled to be admitted actual Fellows immediately after their election and shall thereupon be entitled to vote, and in all other respects (subject to the provisions of this clause) shall have the rights and powers of ordinary actual Fellows of the College.

The President and Fellows may, if they think fit, attach to any Fellowship under this clause such stipend not exceeding £50 per annum, inclusive of all allowances and privileges as may be determined at the time of election ; but the payment of any such stipend shall be conditional on the attendance of the Fellow at the stated meetings of the College, if not prevented by reasonable cause,

Save as aforesaid, no emolument shall be attached to extraordinary Fellowships except the like privileges with other Fellows as to table allowances and rooms.

Such Fellows shall be eligible for re-election from time to time, and their Fellowships shall be tenable notwithstanding marriage.

The preceding clauses of this Statute other than clauses 16, 17, and 21, shall not apply to extraordinary Fellowships, and such Fellowships shall not be included in the number of Fellowships provided for under clause 1 of this Statute.

THE following Statute, passed on the 25th day of May, 1886, by the Governing Body of Oriel College, Oxford, and sealed on the 31st day of May, 1886, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 :—

A STATUTE to amend a Statute, made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict., c. 48), and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, in relation to Oriel College, in the University of Oxford, duly made at a General Meeting of the Provost and Fellows of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 25th day of May, 1886, and passed at such meeting by the votes of the whole number of persons present and voting, and submitted to Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

Whereas by Statute V, 5, made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, in relation to Oriel College, in the University of Oxford, it was enacted as follows :—

"5. The Treasurer, except as hereinafter provided, shall be appointed annually by the Provost and Fellows from among the Fellows of the College. A Fellow so appointed who shall become possessed of any benefice, property, pension, or office, which would in ordinary cases disqualify him for continuing a Fellow, or who shall have held his Fellowship for seven years from the time of his election, may nevertheless be retained in his Fellowship by the Provost and Fellows: provided that this power shall be exercised, if at all, at some stated General Meeting previous to the day on which the Fellowship would otherwise be vacated.

"The Provost and Fellows may, if they think fit, appoint a Treasurer, whether a Fellow of the College or not, for any period not exceeding five years; and may, if they think fit, at any stated General Meeting, elect such Treasurer, if not already a Fellow, to be a Fellow of the College, and may assign to him as the stipend of his office the emolument of an Ordinary Fellowship, together with such additional fixed sum as they shall from time to time determine.

"Any Treasurer elected to or retained in a Fellowship under this clause shall be entitled to hold his Fellowship so long as he shall continue to hold the office of Treasurer, and no longer."

" And whereas it appears to us the Provost and Fellows of the said College that it may in certain cases be for the advantage of the said College to continue in his Fellowship a Fellow of the College who has had experience in the office of Treasurer.

We, the said Provost and Fellows of the said College, being the governing body thereof, do hereby, in exercise of the power given to us by the 54th section of the said Act, alter the 5th Clause of Statute V. of the said Statutes as hereinbefore set out, by adding thereto after the words " and no longer," the following words:—

" *But if a Treasurer so elected or retained retire from his office after having held it for ten years, the Provost and Fellows may, if they think fit, by a majority of two-thirds of those present and voting at a Stated General Meeting, continue his Fellowship for such term and subject to such conditions with regard to re-election, as the Provost and Fellows shall determine at such meeting. No stipend shall be attached to a Fellowship so continued, and for the purposes of this Statute it shall not be considered an Ordinary Fellowship.*"

WHEREAS the New Governing Body of Eton School, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by " The Public Schools Act, 1868," did, on the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, make a further amendment of Statute XXIII of the existing Statutes of the School:

And whereas the said amendment has this day been laid before Her Majesty in Council, the same is published in the London Gazette in pursuance of the said Act:

And notice is hereby given, that it is lawful for the bodies or persons authorized so to do in that Act, within two months from the date of the publication of this notification, to petition Her Majesty in Council to withhold Her approval from the whole or any part of such amendment:

" Further amendment of Statute XXIII as made and altered by the New Governing Body of Eton School under the provisions of ' The Public Schools Act, 1868,' submitted by the said Governing Body for the approval of Her Majesty in Council.

" Whereas by ' The Public Schools Act, 1868,' section 11, the Governing Body of any school to which that Act applies is empowered from time to time to repeal or alter any Statute made in exercise of the powers of that Act subject to certain conditions and restrictions therein specified. And whereas on the thirteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, the Governing Body of Eton School in exercise of the aforesaid powers made certain alterations in Statutes XXI, XXIII, and XXIV of the said School, and the same Statutes as amended were on the twenty-third day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, approved by Her Majesty in Council. And whereas section 2 of Statute XXIII as so altered and approved is as follows:—" No boy shall be a candidate for such ' Scholarship after election one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four who on the day of election has not reached his twelfth or has passed ' his fourteenth birthday.' And whereas on the

tenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five it was resolved by the Governing Body that it was expedient to further alter section 2 of Statute XXIII being the section hereinbefore particularly referred to and set out. Now therefore we the Governing Body of Eton School do hereby alter the form and effect of the said section and the said section as altered by us will be in the terms following:—Statute XXIII section 2 as proposed to be amended:—

" No boy shall be a candidate for such Scholarship after election one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven who on the first day of June has not reached his twelfth or has passed his fourteenth birthday."

THE following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c., of the School Board of the parish of Morley, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, as amended by the School Boards Act, 1885:—

" WHEREAS, on December 31st, 1885, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty was pleased by Royal Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, to the Municipal Borough of Morley, created by the said charter.

" And whereas at the date of the said charter there was in existence a School Board for the parish of Morley, in the county of York, and the said School Board is a Local Authority within the meaning of the Municipal Corporations Acts, 1882 and 1885.

" And whereas the area of the said borough and the said parish are co-extensive.

" And whereas this Scheme was, before being settled by the Committee of Council, referred to the consideration of the Committee of the Lords of the Privy Council on Education (hereinafter referred to as the Education Department).

" And whereas it is expedient, right, and just that a scheme should be settled, pursuant to the said Acts, containing the provisions hereinafter contained.

" Now, therefore, the said Committee of Council have settled a scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby order and declare as follows:—

" 1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as the Borough of Morley Scheme, 1886.

" 2. This Scheme shall come into operation at the date of its confirmation by Parliament or Order in Council, which date is herein referred to as ' the commencement of this Scheme.'

" 3. Notwithstanding the creation of the said Municipal Borough, the School Board for the parish of Morley, in the county of York, shall be and continue to be the School Board for the Municipal Borough of Morley, by the name of the School Board of the borough of Morley, in all respects to the same extent and in the same manner as if at the time of the formation of the School Board for the said parish of Morley by the Education Department the said borough of Morley had been created a municipal borough and the School Board of the parish of Morley

had been formed and created for the said borough by the name of the School Board of the borough of Morley, and as if the local rate and the rating authority had been the borough fund or rate, and the Council of the said borough respectively, and everything in connection with the said Board and School District shall be done and had accordingly.

"4. All liabilities and assets attaching to and vested in the School Board for the parish of Morley immediately before the commencement of this Scheme, shall be and continue attached to and vested in the School Board for the borough of Morley, and all charges charged on the Poor Rate and School Fund of the said parish immediately before the commencement of this Scheme, shall be a charge upon the School Fund of the School Board for the borough of Morley and the Borough Rate or Fund respectively.

"5. Any Bye-laws in force at the date of this Scheme shall continue in force.

"6. Any act or omission done or made by the Education Department or the said School Board for the parish of Morley, or the Council of the said borough, or any Justice, since the date of the said Charter, shall be deemed to have been lawfully done or made if it might have been lawfully done or made by the said Department, School Board, Council, or Justice, if no Charter had been granted or the said School Board had been the School Board for the borough of Morley."

1. The following Area (namely),—in the

borough of Winchester comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east the Didcot, Newbury, and Southampton Railway, on the west the South-Western Railway, on the south the city boundary, and on the north from the Didcot, Newbury, and Southampton Railway through College Walk to College Mill, across College Mead to Kingsgate-street, through Kingsgate-street to Romans-road, through Romans-road across Southgate-road and through Beaufort-road to the South-Western Railway,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twenty-eighth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

An Area in the Eastern Division of the county of Sussex, comprised within the following boundary, that is to say, commencing on the east at the top of the lane called Kelelands-lane leading out of the main-road from Burwash to Heathfield to the bottom of such lane, thence in a straight line passing Ryegreen House on the west to the stream from Glaziers Forge and Willingford to Park Mill on the south following the stream upwards to Glaziers Forge, thence in a straight line on the west by Westdown Farm to a lane on the west of Skinners Bank and along such lane into the said main-road as far as the point leading to the Railway Tavern at Burwash Common, and then down the road passing the Railway Tavern towards Ticehurst-road as far as the occupation-road leading to Witherhurst Farm, and thence in a straight line on past Woodlands Farm House on the east there taking the footpath into the said main-road from Burwash to Heathfield to the top of the said Kelelands-lane.

THE following Address from the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London was presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, who, as representing Her Majesty the Queen, laid the First Stone of the

New Tower Bridge on the 21st day of June 1886:—

To His Royal Highness Albert Edward,
PRINCE OF WALES, K.G.

WE, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London in Common Council assembled, heartily and gratefully welcome the presence of Your Royal Highness, on behalf of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, upon an occasion so interesting, and in its object so important, to the commercial interests of this vast Metropolis.

The Corporation of London has possessed for centuries estates charged with the maintenance of London Bridge. These estates were partly bestowed by generous citizens and partly derived from gifts made at the Chapel of Saint Thomas à Beckett, on London Bridge, for the maintenance of the bridge.

By careful husbanding and management of these estates, the Corporation has been enabled during the present century to rebuild, entirely free of cost to the ratepayers, London Bridge and Blackfriars Bridge, and to purchase and free from toll Southwark Bridge.

These obligations being provided for, the Committee charged with the management of the Bridge House Estates, brought up to the Court by the hand of their Chairman, Mr. Frank Green, in 1884, a full and exhaustive report, with plans, recommending that application be made to Parliament for powers to construct a new bridge across the River Thames from the Tower, which was agreed to.

In the session of 1885, the same Committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. Thomas Beard, successfully promoted a Bill in Parliament, authorizing the construction of a Bridge, to inaugurate which, in the name of Her Majesty the Queen, your Royal Highness so graciously attends to-day.

Its completion within the space of four years, at a cost of 750,000 pounds, will supply a paramount need that has been sorely felt by dwellers and workers on the north and south sides of the Thames below London Bridge, and at the same time will greatly relieve the congested traffic across that ancient and famous thoroughfare.

In conclusion, we desire to express on this the first day of the fiftieth year of Her Majesty's happy and prosperous reign, our unswerving loyalty and devotion to Her Majesty the Queen, and to heartily thank Your Royal Highness for the important part you have been pleased to undertake in the great work before us, enhanced as it is, to our intense gratification, by the graceful presence of Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, to whom, with Your Royal Highness, we wish long life and all prosperity and happiness.

In consequence the undersigned, in the name of their respective Governments, have the honour to announce to His Excellency the Minister for Foreign Affairs, that the commanders of the combined squadrons have received orders to raise the blockade of the coasts of Greece.

WITH reference to the Regulation made by Sir Harry Parkes on the 27th June, 1882, and to the further Regulation made by myself on the 5th September, 1885, copies of which are hereunto annexed, I hereby make known for the information and guidance of British subjects resident in, or resorting to Japan, that I have received a Note from His Excellency the Japanese Minister for Foreign Affairs, announcing the prevalence of cholera in the Kyoto, Osaka, and Hyogo Prefectures, and stating that the Regulations of the Japanese Government for the inspection of vessels will be put in force on and after the 20th instant at all ports throughout the Empire against all vessels arriving from the above-mentioned infected localities which have either cleared from or touched at any port in the said localities, or which after clearing from any such port have touched at any intermediate port.

In the case of vessels arriving at Yokohama and Tokyo the said inspection will take place at Nagaura.

Any British subject who shall wrongfully and willfully contravene or infringe or interfere with the execution of the provisions of the Regulations issued by the Japanese Government on the 23rd day of June, 1882, so long as and wherever such Regulation shall from time be in force and form a part of the municipal law of Japan, shall be deemed to have committed an offence against this Regulation, which is a Regulation of urgency, and on conviction thereof by or before any of Her Majesty's Courts in Japan, shall be liable to be

imprisoned for any term not exceeding three months, with or without hard labour, and with or without a fine not exceeding three hundred dollars or to a fine not exceeding three hundred dollars, without imprisonment, and with or without a further fine for a continuing offence not exceeding twenty-five dollars for each day during which the offence continues after the original fine is incurred.

From the northern end of the bank, the soundings decrease gradually from 15 to 6 fathoms (the least water obtained); this depth, extending over a small area, is near the southern extreme of the bank, and southward of it, the water deepens quickly.

The heavy sea from the south-eastward, prevailing at the time, caused Captain Wiseman from prudential motives to haul out to the eastward, when the water again deepened to 14 fathoms.

The above bearings were obtained when the water had deepened to 10 fathoms, and Lobos Isle was shortly after steered for on a course of N. by W. ¼ W., without further sign of the shoal.

A patch of 3 fathoms has been several times reported in various positions, vaguely fixed, to the southward of Lobos Isle, and though search by H.M. ships has hitherto been unsuccessful, it appears probable that the "Caroline" has again struck the edge of the shoal.

Mariners should use every precaution in navigating the vicinity of this spot, until the result of the renewed search, shortly to be made, is reported.

1. The words "Town Council" mean the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Birmingham, acting by the Council.

The word "Tramways" in these Bye-laws shall include all tramways now or hereafter constructed by the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses within the borough.

The word "Lessees" means the persons, Corporation, or Company to whom, in accordance with the statutory provisions in that behalf, the Town Council may have demised or granted the right of user of the tramways, and of demanding and taking in respect of the same the authorized tolls.

The word "Conductor" shall include any officer or servant having charge of a carriage or being in the employ of the lessees.

2. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall apply to all carriages used on the tramways, and to all places with respect to which the Corporation as the Promoters of any tramway now have, or at any time hereafter may have, power to make Bye-laws and Regulations.

3. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise.

4. No person shall smoke inside any carriage.

5. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

6. A person in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed to enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall be immediately removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

7. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage or engine, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

8. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings of any carriage, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on any carriage or

engine, or break or scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage or engine. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

9. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of a conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and, if found in the interior of any carriage, shall, at the request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

10. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorized officer the fare legally demandable for the journey.

11. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorized officer, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

12. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the tramways, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artizans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

13. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artizans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage. The conductor may decline to take into or upon any carriage any luggage which from its size or otherwise is not suitable for conveyance in or upon the carriage.

14. No passenger or other person not being an officer of the Town Council, or a servant of the lessees, shall be permitted to ride on any engine, or travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

15. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, or an officer of the Town Council, or a servant of the lessees, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on

by or to any part of any carriage or engine; nor shall any passenger travel in or upon any carriage otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

16. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

17. When a carriage contains the full licensed number of passengers a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a conspicuous position on the carriage.

18. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

19. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave any carriage whilst in motion.

20. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage in breach of this Regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request, may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

21. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the lessees with loaded fire-arms.

22. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the lessees in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage, engine, or tramway.

23. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations to the best of his ability.

24. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws and Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

25. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

26. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 4th day of August, 1886.

27. From and after the said 4th day of August, 1886, the Bye-laws relating to tramways, which were made on the 2nd day of October, 1877, by the Town Council as the Promoters of the Birmingham Corporation Tramways, and which were confirmed by the Board of Trade on the 4th day of January, 1878, shall be repealed.
