THE following Address was presented to the Queen on the occasion of the opening by Her Majesty of Royal Holloway College for Women at Egham, on the 30th June, 1886:—

May it please Your Majesty,

I HAVE the honour to express to Your Majesty, on behalf of the Governors and Trustees of this College, their deep sense of gratitude for the gracious proof of Your Majesty's interest in their important and responsible work, as evinced by your august presence on this occasion.

I will not venture to intrude upon Your Majesty at this moment with any lengthy description of the history and objects of the College, which was founded and planned by my relative, the late Thomas Holloway, upon the most generous and philanthropic lines for the advancement of women's education, morally and intellectually.

For many years his mind was dominated by the idea that if a higher form of culture could ennoble women, the sons of such mothers would be nobler men, and to this idea, which had already successfully passed the stage of experiment, he devoted his fortune and his energies.

As a College for these women students he has given this magnificent edifice which Your Majesty so graciously honours to-day, and it remains for the administration, under God's blessing, to realize and develop the Founder's wishes and desires; so that whilst Holloway College shall by its curriculum advance the intellectual standard of women's education, it shall ever remain an orderly Christian household, where every student may above all things feel her individual responsibility to God.

To which Address Her Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:—

"I THANK you for the loyal Address which you have presented to Me on behalf of the Governors and Trustees of this College.

"In opening this spacious and noble building, it gives Me pleasure to acknowledge the generous spirit which has been manifested in the completion, by voluntary effort, of a work promising so much public usefulness.

"I gladly give the assurance of My goodwill to the administration to which the College is about

to be entrusted, and I earnestly hope that their efforts to promote the objects for which it has been founded and planned by your relative may be rewarded by a career of abiding success."

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas we consider that the present system of granting an uniform rate of money allowance from the funds of Greenwich Hospital to the wives and families of Naval Pensioners admitted into Naval Hospitals or Infirmarys under the regulations defining their claims to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital does not meet the requirements of the more deserving cases of pensioners with long service.

"We beg leave to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by your Order in Council to authorize the substitution of the following scale for that laid down in the Regulations and Instructions for the Government of Your Majesty's Naval Service sanctioned by Your Majesty's Order in Council dated the fourth day of February one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, the provisions whereof were extended by Your Majesty's Order in Council dated the eighth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six to the wives and families of pensioners eligible for the benefits of Greenwich Hospital, when inmates of Lunatic Asylums supported at the public expense.

Rate of Man's Pension.	Allowance to Wives or to Persons having Charge of the Children, per Week.
From 6d. to 1s. a day	3s. per week
From 1s. to 1s. 6d. a day	4s. per week
From 1s. 6d. to 2s. a day	5s. per week

"When the pension exceeds two shillings a day the balance is to be given to the men's wives or to the persons having charge of their children instead of the above allowance, but in such cases the allowances are not to be less in amount than five shillings a week.

"Pensioners admitted as permanent inmates and having wives or children to receive one shilling a week; if without wives or children two shillings a week provided their pensions exceed one shilling a day.

"Pensioners admitted for treatment to receive no money allowance, as hitherto."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the "Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such Law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas in accordance with section 18 of "The Extradition Act, 1870," the Legislature of the Dominion of Canada has, by laws passed in the years 1877 and 1882, and respectively styled "The Extradition Act, 1877," and "An Act to Amend the Extradition Act, 1877," made provision for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in, or are suspected of being in, the Dominion:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the twentieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of the Equator, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Ecuador, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice, and to the prevention of crime within their respective territories and jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should under certain circumstances be reciprocally delivered up; Her Britannic Majesty and the President of Ecuador have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty for this purpose, that is to say:

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Frederick Douglas Hamilton, Esquire, her Minister Resident at Ecuador;

"And his Excellency the President of Ecuador, General Cornelio E. Vernaza, Minister of Foreign Affairs and of the Interior;

"Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

"Su Magestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña e Irlanda, y Su Excelencia el Presidente de la República del Ecuador, habiendo juzgado conveniente para la mejor administración de justicia, y para prevenir los crímenes dentro de sus respectivos territorios y jurisdicciones, que las personas acusadas ó convictas de los crímenes enumerados en seguida, y que estando fugitivas de la justicia deban, bajo ciertas circunstancias, ser entregadas recíprocamente; Su Magestad la Reina de la Gran Bretaña e Irlanda y el Presidente del Ecuador han nombrado sus Plenipotenciarios respectivos para celebrar un Tratado con este fin, es decir:

"Su Magestad la Reina del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña e Irlanda, al Señor Federico Douglas Hamilton (Escudero), su Ministro Residente en el Ecuador;

"Y su Excelencia el Presidente del Ecuador, al Señor General Cornelio E. Vernaza, Ministro del Interior y de Relaciones Exteriores;

"Quienes, después de haberse comunicado sus plenos poderes, y encontrándolos en buena y debida forma, han convenido y estipulado los Artículos siguientes:—

"ARTICLE I.

"It is agreed that Her Britannic Majesty's Government and that of Ecuador shall, on requisition made in their name by their respective Diplomatic Agents, deliver up to each other reciprocally any persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes hereinafter specified, committed within the jurisdiction of the requiring Party, shall be found within the territories of the other Party:—

"1. Murder, or attempt or conspiracy to murder.

"2. Manslaughter.

"3. Counterfeiting or altering money, or uttering counterfeit or altered money.

"4. Forgery, counterfeiting, or altering, or uttering what is forged or counterfeited or altered.

"5. Embezzlement or larceny.

"6. Obtaining money or goods by false pretences.

"7. Crimes against bankruptcy law.

"8. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, or director, or member or public officer of any company made criminal by any law for the time being in force.

"9. Rape.

"10. Abduction.

"11. Child stealing.

"12. Burglary or housebreaking.

"13. Arson.

"14. Robbery with violence.

"15. Threats by letter or otherwise with intent to extort.

"16. Piracy by law of nations.

"17. Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.

"18. Assaults on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.

"19. Revolt or conspiracy to revolt by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the captain or master.

"Provided that the surrender shall be made only when, in the case of a person accused, the commission of the crime shall be so established as that the laws of the country where the fugitive or person so accused shall be found would justify his apprehension and commitment for trial if the crime had been there committed; and, in the case of a person alleged to have been convicted, on such evidence as, according to the laws of the country where he is found, would prove that he had been convicted.

"ARTICLE II.

"In the dominions of Her Britannic Majesty, other than the foreign or colonial possessions of Her Majesty, the manner of proceeding shall be as follows:—

"1. In the case of a person accused:—

"The requisition for the surrender shall be made to Her Britannic Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs by some person recognized by the Secretary of State as a Diplomatic Representative of the Republic of Ecuador, accompanied by a warrant or other equivalent judicial document for the arrest of the accused, issued by a Judge or Magistrate duly authorized to take cognizance of the acts charged against him in Ecuador, together with duly authenticated depositions or statements taken on oath

"ARTICULO I.

"Se ha convenido en que el Gobierno de Su Magestad Británica y el del Ecuador deberán, previo pedimento hecho en su nombre por sus respectivos Agentes Diplomáticos, entregarse recíprocamente cualesquiera personas que siendo acusadas ó convictas de cualquiera de los crímenes puntualizados en seguida, cometidos dentro de la jurisdicción de la parte solicitante, sean encontrados dentro del territorio de la otra parte:—

"1. Asesinato, ó tentativa ó conspiración para asesinar.

"2. Homicidio.

"3. Falsificación, ó alteración de moneda, ó circulación de moneda falsificada ó alterada.

"4. Falsificación, contrahecho, ó alteración, ó circulación de lo falsificado, contrahecho ó alterado.

"5. Hurto, ocultación de bienes de una herencia aun no aceptada por el heredero, ó ratería.

"6. Obtener moneda ú otros efectos por medio de falsos pretextos.

"7. Crímenes contra las leyes de la bancarrota.

"8. Fraude por un individuo libre bajo fianza, banquero, agente, factor, síndico ó curador, director, miembro ó empleado público de alguna compañía, declarado criminal por ley vijente en ese tiempo.

"9. Estupro con violencia.

"10. Abduccion.

"11. Robo de niños.

"12. Robo nocturno, ó entrada en una casa con violencia con el objeto de robar.

"13. Incendio intencional.

"14. Robo con violencia.

"15. Amenazas por escrito ó de cualquier otra manera con el objeto de cometer algui act de extorsion.

"16. Piratería segun el derecho de gentes.

"17. Hundimiento ó destrucción de una embarcación en el mar, ó tentativa ó conspiración con este objeto.

"18. Asaltos á bordo de un buque en alta mar, con el intento de quitar la vida ó de causar graves daños corporales.

"19. Rebelion ó tentativa de rebelion ejecutada por dos ó mas personas á bordo de un buque en alta mar, contra la autoridad del capitán ó patron.

"Con tal que la entrega, en el caso de una persona acusada, se haga únicamente cuando se puntualice la perpetración del crimen de manera que las leyes del país en que sea hallado el fugitivo ó persona acusada justificaren su captura y enjuiciamiento si allí se hubiese cometido el crimen; y en el caso en que se declare convicta á una persona en mérito de pruebas que, segun las leyes del país en que ella sea hallada, bastarian para tenerla por convicta.

"ARTICULO II.

"En los dominios de Su Magestad Británica distintos de las posesiones coloniales ó extranjeras de Su Magestad, el procedimiento será como sigue:—

"1. En el caso de una persona acusada:—

"El pedimento de entrega se hará al Principal Secretario de Estado de Negocios Extranjeros de Su Magestad, por cualquiera persona reconocida por el Secretario de Estado como un Agente Diplomático de la República de Ecuador, acompañado de un testimonio ú otro documento judicial equivalente, para proceder al arresto del acusado, expedido por un Juez ó Magistrado debidamente autorizado para conocer de los actos de que ha sido acusada la persona en el Ecuador, juntamente con las deposiciones debidamente

before such Judge or Magistrate, clearly setting forth the said acts, and a description of the person claimed, and any particulars which may serve to identify him. The said Secretary of State shall transmit such documents to Her Britannic Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, who shall then, by order under his hand and seal, signify to some Police Magistrate in London that such requisition has been made, and require him, if there be due cause, to issue his warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive.

"On the receipt of such order from the Secretary of State, and on the production of such evidence as would, in the opinion of the Magistrate, justify the issue of the warrant if the crime had been committed in the United Kingdom, he shall issue his warrant accordingly.

"When the fugitive shall have been apprehended in virtue of such warrant, he shall be brought before the Police Magistrate who issued it, or some other Police Magistrate in London. If the evidence to be then produced shall be such as to justify, according to the law of England, the committal for trial of the prisoner if the crime of which he is accused had been committed in England, the Police Magistrate shall commit him to prison to await the warrant of the Secretary of State for his surrender; sending immediately to the Secretary of State a certificate of the committal and a report upon the case.

"After the expiration of a period from the committal of the prisoner, which shall never be less than fifteen days, the Secretary of State shall, by order under his hand and seal, order the fugitive criminal to be surrendered to such person as may be duly authorized to receive him on the part of the Government of Ecuador.

"2. In the case of a person convicted:—

"The course of proceeding shall be the same as in the case of a person accused, except that the warrant to be transmitted by the recognized Diplomatic Representative, in support of his requisition, shall clearly set forth the crime of which the person claimed has been convicted, and state the fact, place, and date of his conviction. The evidence to be produced before the Police Magistrate shall be such as would, according to the law of England, prove that the prisoner was convicted of the crime charged.

"After the Police Magistrate shall have committed the accused or convicted person to prison to await the order of a Secretary of State for his surrender, such person shall have the right to apply for a writ of *habeas corpus*. If he should so apply, his surrender must be deferred until after the decision of the Court upon the return to the writ, and even then can only take place if the decision is adverse to the applicant. In the latter case the Court may at once order his delivery to the person authorized to receive him, without the order of a Secretary of State for his surrender, or commit him to prison to await such order. A like proceeding shall be observed towards criminals in prison in Ecuador.

"ARTICLE III.

"In the Republic of Ecuador the manner of proceeding shall be as follows:—

"1. In the case of a person accused:

"The requisition for the surrender shall be made to the Minister for Foreign Affairs of Ecuador by the Minister or other Diplomatic Agent of Her Britannic Majesty, accompanied by a warrant for the arrest of the accused, issued by a Judge or Magistrate duly authorized to take cognizance of the acts charged against

Si la prueba que deba entonces producirse fuere tal que justificase, segun las leyes de Inglaterra, el sometimiento á juicio del preso, si el crimen de que hubiese sido acusado lo hubiese cometido en Inglaterra, el Magistrado de Policía le someterá á prision para esperar el decreto de entrega expedido por el Secretario de Estado, enviando inmediatamente al Secretario de Estado un certificado de la prision practicada, y un informe del caso.

"Despues de expirado el periodo de detencion del preso, que nunca debe ser de ménos de quince dias, el Secretario de Estado, por orden firmada y sellada de su mano, ordenará que el criminal fugitivo sea entregado á la persona que esté debidamente autorizada para recibirle de la parte del Gobierno del Ecuador.

"2°. En el caso de una persona convicta:—

"El curso del procedimiento será el mismo que en el de una persona acusada, excepto que el auto que sea transmitido por el Agente Diplomático reconocido, en apoyo de su solicitud, manifestará con claridad el crimen del cual la persona reclamada haya sido convicta, y relacionará el hecho, lugar, y fecha de su convicción. La prueba que deba producirse ante el Magistrado de Policía debe ser tal que, en conformidad con las leyes de Inglaterra, probare que el preso fuese convicto del crimen que se le acusa.

"Despues de que el Magistrado de Policía haya puesto en prision á la persona acusada ó convicta para esperar la orden de un Secretario de Estado para su entrega, dicha persona tendrá derecho de pedir un escrito de *habeas corpus*. Si ella lo efectuare así, su entrega debe ser diferida hasta despues de la decision de la Corte sobre el pedimento de dicho escrito, y aun entonces tendrá lugar solamente si la decision fuese adversa al recurrente. En este último caso puede la Corte ordenar la inmediata entrega á la persona autorizada para recibirle, sin orden del Secretario de Estado sobre dicha entrega, ó someterlo á prision para aguardar la orden. Igual procedimiento se observará respecto de los delincuentes puestos en prision en el Ecuador.

"ARTICULO III.

"En la República del Ecuador, el procedimiento será como sigue:—

"1°. En el caso de una persona acusada:

"La petición para la entrega se hará al Ministro de Relaciones Exteriores del Ecuador por el Ministro ú otro Agente Diplomático de Su Magestad Británica, acompañada de un auto de arresto del acusado expedido por un Juez ó Magistrado debidamente autorizado para conocer de los actos de que se le acusare en la Gran Bretaña, junto

him in Great Britain, together with duly authenticated depositions or statements taken on oath before such Judge or Magistrate, clearly setting forth the said acts, and a description of the person claimed, and any other particulars which may serve to identify him.

"The said documents shall be transmitted to the Minister Secretary of State for the Interior Department, who shall then, by order under his hand and seal, signify to some Police Magistrate that such requisition has been made, and require him, if there be due cause, to issue his warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive.

"On the receipt of such order from the Minister Secretary of State, and on the production of such evidence as would justify the issue of the warrant, if the crime had been committed in Ecuador, he shall issue his warrant accordingly.

"When the fugitive shall have been apprehended in virtue of such warrant he shall be brought before the Police Magistrate who issued it, or some other authority of the same class. If the evidence to be then produced shall be such as to justify, according to the law of Ecuador, the committal for trial of the prisoner if the crime of which he is accused had been committed in Ecuador, the Police Magistrate shall commit him to prison to await the warrant of the Secretary of State for his surrender, sending immediately to the Secretary of State a certificate of the committal and a report upon the case.

"After the expiration of a period from the committal of the prisoner, which shall never be less than fifteen days, the Secretary of State shall, by order under his hand and seal, order the fugitive criminal to be surrendered to such person as may be duly authorized to receive him on the part of the Government of Her Majesty.

"2. In the case of a person convicted:—

"The course of proceeding shall be the same as in the case of a person accused, except that the warrant to be transmitted by the Minister or other Diplomatic Agent in support of his requisition shall clearly set forth the crime of which the person claimed has been convicted, and state the fact, place, and date of his conviction. The evidence to be produced before the Magistrate charged with the investigation of the case shall be such as would, according to the laws of Ecuador, prove that the prisoner was convicted of the crime charged.

"ARTICLE IV.

"A fugitive criminal may, however, be apprehended under a warrant issued by any Police Magistrate or other competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings as would, in the opinion of the person issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed or the prisoner convicted in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in which he exercises jurisdiction: Provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accused shall, in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate in London, and that he shall be discharged, if within thirty days a requisition shall not have been made for his surrender by the Diplomatic Agent of his country, in the manner directed by Articles II and III of this Treaty.

"The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes specified in this Treaty, committed on the high seas, on board any vessel of either country, which may come into any port of the other.

Si la prueba que deba entónces producirse fuere tal que justificase, segun las leyes del Ecuador, el sometimiento á juicio del preso, si el crimen de que hubiese sido acusado lo hubiese cometido en el Ecuador, el empleado de Policía le someterá á prisión para esperar el decreto de entrega expedido por el Secretario de Estado, enviando inmediatamente á este un certificado de la prisión practicada y un informe del caso.

"Después de expirado el periodo de detención del preso, que nunca debe ser de ménos de quince dias, el Secretario de Estado, por órden firmada y sellada de su mano, ordenará que el criminal fugitivo sea entregado á la persona que esté debidamente autorizada para rescibirle de parte del Gobierno de Su Magestad Británica.

"2°. En el caso de una persona convicta:—

"El curso del procedimiento será el mismo que en el de una persona acusada, excepto que el auto que deba ser transmitido por el Ministro ú otro Agente Diplomático en apoyo de su pedimento, deberá manifestar claramente el crimen del que la persona reclamada ha sido convencida, y determinar el hecho, lugar, y fecha de su convicción. Las pruebas que deban producirse ante el Magistrado encargado de la investigación del caso deben ser tales que, segun las leyes del Ecuador, probaren que el preso fuese convicto del crimen del que se le acusa.

"ARTICULO IV.

"El criminal fugitivo puede sin embargo ser aprehendido por un auto expedido por cualquiera Magistrado de Policía ú otra autoridad competente en cada uno de los dos países, con tales informaciones ó quejas y pruebas, ó después de tales procedimientos que en opinión de la persona que expida el auto, justificasen la expedición de un auto si el crimen hubiese sido cometido ó el prisionero convicto en aquella parte de los dominios de las dos Partes Contratantes en la cual el Magistrado ú otra autoridad competente ejerza jurisdicción; sin embargo que en el Reino Unido el acusado, en tal caso, será enviado con la brevedad posible ante un Magistrado de Policía en Londres, y que será puesto en libertad, si dentro de treinta dias no se hubiese hecho una solicitud para la entrega, por el Agente Diplomático de su país de la manera prescrita en los Artículos II y III de este Tratado.

"ARTICLE V.

"If the fugitive criminal who has been committed to prison be not surrendered and conveyed away within two months after such committal, or within two months after the decision of the Court, upon the return to a writ of *habeas corpus* in the United Kingdom, he shall be discharged from custody, unless sufficient cause be shown to the contrary.

"ARTICLE VI.

"When any person shall have been surrendered by either of the High Contracting Parties to the other, such person shall not, until he has been restored, or had an opportunity of returning to the country from whence he was surrendered, be triable or tried for any offence committed in the other country prior to the surrender, other than the particular offence on account of which he was surrendered.

"ARTICLE VII.

"In any case where an individual convicted or accused in Ecuador of any of the crimes described in the present Treaty, and who shall have taken refuge in the United Kingdom, shall have obtained naturalization there, such naturalization shall not prevent the search for, arrest, and surrender of such individual to the Ecuatorian authorities, in conformity with the said Treaty.

"In like manner the surrender shall take place on the part of Ecuador in any case where an individual accused or convicted in England of any of the same crimes who shall have taken refuge in Ecuador shall have obtained naturalization there.

"ARTICLE VIII.

"No accused or convicted person shall be surrendered, if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded shall be deemed by the party upon whom it is made to be one of a political character, or if he prove to the satisfaction of the Police Magistrate, or of the Court before which he is brought on *habeas corpus*, or to the Secretary of State, that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or to punish him for an offence of a political character.

"ARTICLE IX.

"Warrants, depositions, or statements on oath, issued or taken in the dominions of either of the two High Contracting Parties, and copies thereof, and certificates of or judicial documents stating the fact of conviction, shall be received in evidence in proceedings in the dominions of the other if purporting to be signed or certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the country where they were issued or taken.

"Provided such warrants, depositions, statements, copies, certificates, and judicial documents are authenticated by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of State.

"ARTICLE X.

"The surrender shall not take place if, since the commission of the acts charged, the accusation, or the conviction, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the country where the accused shall have taken refuge.

"ARTICLE XI.

"If the individual claimed by one of the two Contracting Parties, in pursuance of the present

"ARTICULO V.

"ARTICULO VII.

"En cualquiera caso en que un convicto ó acusado en el Ecuador de alguno de los crímenes detallados en el presente Tratado, y que se hubiere refugiado en el Reino Unido y obtenido naturalización allí, tal naturalización no impedirá la busca, arresto y entrega del individuo á las autoridades del Ecuador, en conformidad con dicho Tratado. De igual manera la entrega se verificará de parte del Ecuador, en cualquiera caso en que un individuo acusado ó convicto en Inglaterra de cualquiera de los mismos delitos se hallare refugiado en el Ecuador y hubiere obtenido allí naturalización.

"ARTICULO VIII.

"Ninguna persona acusada ó convicta será entregada, si el delito por el cual se demanda su entrega se estima por la parte á quien se solicita ser de carácter político, ó si la persona probare á satisfaccion del Magistrado de Policía ó de la Corte ante la cual es conducido en *habeas corpus*, ó del Secretario de Estado, que el pedimento de su entrega ha sido, en efecto, hecho con la mira de juzgarle y castigarle por un delito de carácter político.

"ARTICULO IX.

"Los autos, deposiciones ó relaciones bajo juramento, expedidos ó tomados en los dominios de cualquiera de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes, las copias de ellos y certificados ó documentos judiciales que establecen el hecho de la convicción, serán recibidos en prueba en los procedimientos que se sigan en los dominios de la otra, siempre que se encuentren firmados ó certificados por un Juez, Magistrado ó alguacil del país de donde han sido expedidos ó tomados.

"Con tal que dichos autos, deposiciones, relaciones, copias, certificados, y documentos judiciales sean autenticados con el juramento de algun testigo, ó sellados con el sello oficial de Ministro de Justicia ó de algun otro Ministro de Estado.

"ARTICULO X.

"La entrega no se efectuará si, desde la comision de los actos imputados, ó desde la acusacion ó convicción, el lapso del tiempo hubiese eximido al delincuente del enjuiciamiento ó del castigo, segun las leyes del país en donde el acusado se hallare refugiado.

"ARTICULO XI.

"Si el individuo reclamado por una de las Partes Contratantes, en ejecucion del present

Treaty, should be also claimed by one or several other Powers, on account of other crimes committed upon their territory, his surrender shall, in preference, be granted in compliance with that demand which is earliest in date.

"ARTICLE XII.

"If the individual claimed should be under prosecution, or in custody, for a crime or offence committed in the country where he may have taken refuge, his surrender may be deferred until he shall have been set at liberty in due course of law.

"In case he should be proceeded against or detained in such country on account of obligations contracted towards private individuals, his surrender shall nevertheless take place, the injured party retaining his right to prosecute his claims before the competent authority.

ARTICLE XIII.

"Every article found in the possession of the individual claimed at the time of his arrest shall be seized, in order to be delivered up with his person at the time when the surrender shall be made. Such delivery shall not be limited to the property or articles obtained by stealing or by fraudulent bankruptcy, but shall extend to everything that may serve as proof of the crime. It shall take place even when the surrender, after having been ordered, shall be prevented from taking place by reason of the escape or death of the individual claimed.

"ARTICLE XIV.

"Each of the two Contracting Parties shall defray the expenses occasioned by the arrest within its territories, the detention, and the conveyance to its frontier, of the persons whom it may consent to surrender in pursuance of the present Treaty.

"ARTICLE XV.

"The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the foreign or colonial possessions of the two High Contracting Parties.

"The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in a foreign or colonial possession of either Party, shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such possession by the Chief Consular Officer of the other at the seat of Government; or, if the fugitive has escaped from a foreign or colonial possession of the Party on whose behalf the requisition is made, by the Governor or chief authority of such possession.

"Such requisitions may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the respective Governors or chief authorities, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender, or to refer the matter to their Government.

"Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Ecuatorian criminals who may take refuge within such Colony, on the basis, as nearly as may be, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

"ARTICLE XVI.

"The present Treaty shall come into operation two months after the exchange of the ratifications. Due notice shall in each country be given of the day.

"Either Party may at any time terminate the

"ARTICULO XIII.

"Tudo objeto encontrado en poder del individuo reclamado, al tiempo de su arresto, será recaudado para entregarlo junto con su persona cuando deba verificarse su entrega. Tal devolución no se limitará á los artículos obtenidos por robo ó quiebra fraudulenta, sino que se extenderá á todas las cosas que puedan servir como prueba del delito. Esto se verificará aun cuando, después de ordenada la entrega de la persona, no hubiere tenido efecto por causa de la fuga ó muerte del individuo reclamado.

"ARTICULO XIV.

"Cada una de las dos Partes Contratantes costeará los gastos ocasionados por el arresto dentro de su territorio, la detencion y la remision á su frontera, de las personas que consienta en entregar en conformidad del presente Tratado.

"ARTICULO XV.

"Las estipulaciones del presente Tratado serán aplicables á las posesiones coloniales ó extranjeras de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes.

"La peticion de extradicion de un criminal fugitivo que se hubiere refugiado en una colonia ó posesion extranjera de cualquiera de las Partes, se hará al Gobernador ó autoridad principal de tal posesion ó colonia, por el principal Agente Consular de la otra Parte en el asiento del Gobierno; ó si el fugitivo se ha fugado de una posesion extranjera ó colonial de la Parte en cuyo favor se ha hecho la peticion, por el Gobernador ó autoridad principal de dicha posesion ó colonia.

"ARTICULO XVI.

"El presente Tratado comenzará á surtir sus efectos dos meses despues del cange de las ratificaciones. En cada país se dará el correspondiente aviso del día.

"ARTICLE XVII.

"In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same in duplicate, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

"Done at Quito, capital of the Republic of Ecuador, the 20th September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to her by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the second day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, the said Acts shall apply in the case of the Equator, and of the said Treaty with the Republic of the Equator.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered that the operation of the said Acts shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to the Republic of the Equator and to the said Treaty, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Acts aforesaid continue in force, and no longer.

WHEREAS by the 333rd section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for every Pilotage Authority, by Bye-laws made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to do within its districts all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section:

And whereas the Borrowstounness Harbour Commissioners, being the Pilotage Authority within the roadstead of Borrowstounness Harbour within the meaning of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," have, in exercise of the powers vested in them by that Act and by "The Borrowstounness Harbour Act, 1883," made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain Bye-laws and Regulations:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the proposed Bye-laws and Regulations are proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and signify Her consent to the said Bye-laws and Regulations as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order refers.

I. The limits of the Commissioners as Pilotage Authority under the "Borrowstounness Harbour Act, 1883," shall be the roadstead of Borrowstounness Harbour, and include that portion of the River or Firth of Forth between a line drawn from the Toll House at Carriden Toll Bar on the south shore to Crombie Point, and a line draw from the Smelting Furnaces at Kinneil on the south shore through the Hen and Chickens Buoy, situated on an imaginary line drawn from the Smelting Furnaces at Kinneil to Culross Abbey (or Church), all on the River or Firth of Forth.

II. No person shall pilot or take charge of any vessel as Pilot within said limits without a license from the Borrowstounness Harbour Commissioners, unless in the exceptional circumstances specified in the 362nd section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854." An unqualified or unlicensed person assuming or continuing in the charge of any ship after a licensed Pilot has offered to take charge of her, or using a license which he is not entitled to use for the purpose of making himself appear to be a qualified Pilot, shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding £50.

III. The Masters of all vessels desiring the services of a Harbour Pilot shall display and keep flying the usual signal for a Pilot, and shall by all means consistent with safety facilitate the getting on board of the first duly qualified Pilot who arrives at his said vessel in answer to said signal.

IV. No Shipmaster or other person shall be bound to employ a Pilot either inward or outward.

V. Every person desirous of being licensed by the Commissioners shall lodge with the Commissioners an application in his own handwriting, and shall set forth in said application his usual place of abode, his age, height, complexion, and any other circumstances or peculiarity descriptive of his person, and his employment during the three years preceding, and he shall also produce satisfactory certificates of moral character and sobriety.

VI. The Commissioners shall examine and inquire into the skill and ability of any person who shall offer himself to be admitted as a Pilot for the Harbour and within the Pilotage limits, by such ways and means as to them shall seem proper; and if upon such inquiry the person so offering himself as a Pilot shall be approved of by the Commissioners, the Commissioners may at any of their meetings grant a license or warrant certifying that such person is duly qualified to act as Pilot to conduct vessels within the pilotage limits, which license or certificate shall be subscribed by three or more of the Commissioners, and from thenceforth such person shall be deemed qualified to exercise the occupation of Pilot for the harbour

and pilotage limits : provided always that no person shall be appointed Pilot of the said limits unless he shall have been at least three years regularly engaged as a fisherman or sailor at or frequenting the said harbour ; and the Commissioners by granting such license or certificate to any Pilot shall not be responsible for any damage or losses sustained by any person by or through the inadvertence, negligence, or wilful act of the Pilot so licensed by them : provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to exempt the harbour from the provisions of any general Act relating to Pilots now in force, or which may hereafter pass during the present or any future session of Parliament.

VII. Every person who shall upon his first admission as a Pilot, receive such license or warrant shall for his first license or warrant pay to the Clerk of the Commissioners the sum of two shillings and six pence, and for every subsequent license or warrant the sum of one shilling and six pence ; and shall be subject to the several provisions of "The Borrowstounness Harbour Act, 1883," and to such orders, rules and bye-laws as shall be made in pursuance thereof, and every such license or warrant shall continue in force until recalled by the Commissioners as hereinafter mentioned.

VIII. Harbour Pilots shall not (unless they hold a license from the Trinity House or other licensing body as Firth Pilot), proceed in search of or board vessels outwith the limits, as defined in Article I hereof.

IX. The rates for Pilotage services shall be those specified in the table annexed hereto.

X. Any qualified Pilot demanding or receiving and also any Master offering or paying to any Pilot any other rate in respect of pilotage services whether greater or less than the rate for the time being demandable by law, shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding £10. (See section 358 "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854.")

XI. The Master of every vessel employing a Pilot shall sign and deliver, if so requested, to the Pilot in charge of his vessel a certificate stating the registered tonnage and draught of water of such ship. In case of refusal or of making a false declaration, the Master shall incur a penalty for every such offence double the amount of pilotage. (See section 359 "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854.")

XII. Every Pilot shall have a sufficient boat properly found to the satisfaction of the Commissioners and Harbour Master. Every Pilot shall be distinguished by the following characteristics in terms of 346th section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854 :— (1.) The Boat shall be painted or tarred a black colour outside ; (2.) On her stern the name of the owner thereof and the port to which she belongs shall be painted in white letters at least one inch broad and three inches long, and on the bow there shall also in like manner be painted the number of the license of such boat ; (3.) When afloat there shall be displayed at the mast head or in a sprit or staff or other equally conspicuous situation a flag of large dimensions, the upper horizontal half of which shall be white and the lower half red. It will be the duty of the Pilots to attend to said particulars, and to keep the name, number, and flag clean and distinctly visible. Failure will incur the penalty of £20 in terms of the Act of Parliament.

XIII. The Pilots must always be in readiness, with their boats fully found and manned, to take charge of any vessel when required. They shall attend exclusively to the vessel under their charge until she is berthed, if entering inwards, and so

long as their services are required or necessary, and they shall on no account whatever leave their said vessel while under their charge to assist other vessels except in cases of great necessity and extreme danger, and then only with the consent of the Master whose vessel they are engaged with.

XIV. Vessels bound for the harbour must, if necessary, heave to in the roads until a Harbour Pilot is obtained, and on no account, except in extreme cases of necessity, shall Pilots unlicensed for the harbour be permitted to pilot vessels within the said limits. The Harbour Master shall be the sole judge whether such necessity has arisen.

XV. Vessels not entering the harbour but merely passing through the pilotage limits, either up or down the Firth, shall not be bound to employ a Harbour Pilot. If a vessel bound to Borrowstounness Roads for orders is brought to anchor within the harbour limits by a Firth Pilot not licensed as a Harbour Pilot, such Pilot shall be entitled to stay by such ship until orders are obtained, when if such ship is to proceed to another port he is entitled to take her away, but if she receives orders to unload or enter the harbour he shall then cease to act as Pilot, and the pilotage will be undertaken by a Harbour Pilot.

XVI. The Pilots are required to make themselves thoroughly acquainted with the signals of the harbour, the bye-laws and regulations thereof, also with the harbour itself, the berths therein, the channel and fairway thereof, the flow and the ebb of the tides, and every other circumstance connected therewith essential for the due performance of their duties with safety and despatch. They must observe strict sobriety and civility in the exercise of their duties, and implicitly obey the directions of the Harbour Master in all matters connected with their pilotage duties ; and it will be the duty of the Harbour Master to see that all the Pilots execute their duties efficiently, and to report to the Commissioners all failures on their part so to do, and all breaches of these regulations. Inbound vessels waiting for the tide shall be so placed as to be ready to come in immediately on the proper signal being given, and the duty of the Pilot and his assistants shall not be fully discharged until the vessel is moored where the Harbour Master may direct at the tide or time she enters.

XVII. The Harbour Master has power to give directions to Pilots and to order them to take charge of any vessel when wanted.

XVIII. All Pilots licensed by the Commissioners must observe strict sobriety and civility in the discharge of their duties, and when a Pilot shall fail to observe, or shall commit any breach of the Regulations, or shall discharge his duties insufficiently, or shall use improper language to any of the Commissioners or their officers while in the discharge of their duties, the Commissioners shall punish such offender by exacting a fine or by temporary suspension or permanent deprivation of license ; and persons having cause of complaint against any Pilot are requested to communicate the same in writing to the Commissioners or the Harbour Master.

XIX. In case any Pilot who shall receive a license or warrant shall refuse to take the charge or conduct of any vessel, upon a proper signal being made, or a gun fired by any vessel inward bound, or upon the application of the master, commander, owner, or agent of any vessel outward bound, or of any one Commissioner, or shall refuse to assist any vessel in distress, or in case it shall appear to the Commissioners that such Pilot hath improperly conducted himself in the conduct

of any vessel, or in the execution of any part of his duty as a Pilot, or if any such shall refuse to obey any summons of the Commissioners or any three of them, requiring his appearance before the Commissioners, or shall refuse to obey such order as the Commissioners shall make, or shall in anywise offend against these regulations, then the Commissioners, upon examination and proof thereof, may suspend the license granted to such Pilot for such time as they shall deem proper, or recall such license and declare the same to be thenceforth utterly void. Any Pilot committing a breach of these regulations may in the option of the Commissioners be punished by the infliction of a penalty not exceeding £20, recoverable in terms of section 333 of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854." The Commissioners will also enforce the provisions of the 365, 366, and 367 sections of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," against any Pilot committing any of the offences therein mentioned.

XX. Ship Masters are directed and requested to apply at least four hours before high water at the Harbour Master's Office for Pilots previous to sailing.

XXI. The Harbour Master shall have power to direct the attendance of a sufficient number of Pilots at his office four hours before high water, so that they may be in readiness to perform the pilotage duties required.

XXII. Masters and Mates of Vessels may be licensed by the Commissioners in terms of sections 340 and 341 of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854." The fees payable by said Masters and Mates shall be twenty-one shillings each upon the granting of certificates, and ten shillings and sixpence upon each renewal thereof; and these fees shall be applied by the Commissioners to recover the general expenses connected therewith.

XXIII. In case any vessel shall be met with in distress by any Pilot so licensed as aforesaid, and shall stand in need of any extraordinary assistance of the crew or boat, then the compensation to be made to the said Pilot and crew shall be settled and determined upon according to the circumstances of the case by the Commissioners at their next meeting; and if any agreement for such extraordinary assistance shall at any time be made by the Master or Commander of such vessel and the Pilot, such agreement, if the Commissioners deem the same unreasonable, shall be null and void.

XXIV. The Commissioners shall not be liable or responsible for any accident, loss, or damage which may arise to any vessels, or to the cargo thereof, in consequence of the employment of any Pilot licensed by the Commissioners, but the Pilot so employed shall be answerable for any wilful or culpable neglect and mismanagement.

XXV. All numbers whether of money or of tonnage of vessels, &c., shall be stated by masters of vessels and others in words and not in figures.

XXVI. On arrival, vessels must be moored or berthed as ordered by the Harbour Master or his assistants, and Pilots who may be in charge of vessels must comply with such orders before their pilotage is considered to be due.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value shall not exceed five hundred pounds may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as herein-after directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop,

"against such union : and if, no sufficient cause
"be shown within such time, the said Archbishop
"shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid
"to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it
"shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to
"make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting
"such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories,
"vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with
"cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only ;
"and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in
"Council to give directions for regulating the
"course and succession in which the patrons, if
"there be more than one patron, shall present or
"nominate to such united benefice, from time to
"time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words following, that is to say :—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Charles Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the perpetual curacy of Cudworth in the county of Somerset and the perpetual curacy of Chillington in the same county and diocese having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice. We enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the said Lord Bishop in right of his See is the patron or person entitled to present or collate to both the said benefices if the same respectively were now vacant and that he consents to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed:

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"As witness our hand this twenty-sixth day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to

order, as it is hereby ordered, that the perpetual curacy of Cudworth, situate in the county of Somerset and diocese of Bath and Wells, and the perpetual curacy of Chillington, situate in the same county and diocese shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes ; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested ; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels

"augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted "That when, by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the controul or interference of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas John, Lord Bishop of Salisbury, hath represented in a writing, dated the twenty-eighth April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, to the Right Honourable Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend John Bishop of Salisbury do hereby represent to your Grace that to the benefice (being a vicarage) and parish church of Whitchurch Canonorum in the county of Dorset and my diocese of Salisbury belongs amongst other places the ancient parochial chapelry known by the name of Chideock the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That according to the last census the population of the parish of Whitchurch Canonorum exclusive of the said chapelry of Chideock is one thousand three hundred and twenty-seven and the population of the said chapelry is six hundred and seventy-four.

"That there is in the said chapelry a church or chapel affording accommodation for about three hundred and thirty persons and being distant two miles and four furlongs and one hundred and fifty-nine yards from the parish church of Whitchurch Canonorum.

"That baptisms marriages, churchings and burials have been from time immemorial and are now solemnized and performed in the said church or chapel of the said chapelry and in the burial ground thereto belonging and the said chapelry is for all civil purposes a separate and distinct parish from Whitchurch Canonorum.

"That the annual value of the said benefice with the said chapelry is nine hundred and eighty-three pounds or thereabouts of which two hundred pounds or thereabouts arises in respect of the endowments of or within the said chapelry of Chideock.

"That there is a house of residence at Chideock for the curate thereof.

"That the patronage of the said benefice of Whitchurch Canonorum with the chapelries thereto belongs to the Bishop of Salisbury for the time being and the Reverend John Richard Wykeham Stafford is the present incumbent thereof.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the sessions holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty cap. one hundred and six. and in the second and third years of the same reign cap. forty-nine the said chapelry of Chideock may be advantageously separated from the said benefice and parish church of Whitchurch Canonorum and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act I have prepared the following scheme which together with my consent thereto as patron and the consent of the Reverend John Richard Wykeham Stafford the incumbent of the said benefice I do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same and such consents by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Lord Bishop of Salisbury, and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"The SCHEME above referred to.

"That the said chapelry of Chideock shall be separated from the said benefice and parish church of Whitchurch Canonorum and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of 'The Perpetual Curacy of Chideock' of which the said church or chapel within the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"That the proposed separate parish and benefice shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said benefice of Whitchurch Canonorum and the incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That all the glebe lands tithe rent-charges or other payments for or in lieu of tithes and all other endowments whatsoever belonging to or arising within or in respect of the said chapelry shall henceforth belong and be attached to the said proposed separate benefice of Chideock for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being.

"That all fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for churchings marriages burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Chideock and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise within the said proposed separate parish or benefice shall belong to the incumbent thereof.

"That there shall also be attached to and belong to the said proposed separate benefice of Chideock for ever and be held and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being a portion of the tithe rent-charge arising within the said parish of Whitchurch Canonorum and chapelry of Stanton Gabriel also belonging thereto which portion is more particularly specified in the schedule hereunder written and is of the gross value of twenty-five pounds.

"That the incumbent for the time being of the parish church of Whitchurch Canonorum shall continue to be exclusively liable for the first fruits and yearly tenths now charged upon or payable by the incumbent of the said benefice of Whitchurch Canonorum with the chapelries belonging thereto.

"That the patronage or right of nomination of or to the said proposed separate parish of Chideock shall belong to and be vested in the Bishop of Salisbury his successors and assigns for ever.

"That the parishioners of the said proposed separate parish shall not be entitled to church accommodation in any other church than in the church of the said proposed separate parish nor shall the parishioners of Whitchurch Canonieorum or of any other chapelries belonging thereto be entitled to any accommodation in the church of

the said separate benefice except nevertheless such person or persons (if any) as may possess a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in either of the said churches and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"Given under my hand this twenty-eighth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

" We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Woodland in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Carlisle.

Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-seventh day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six and published in the London Gazette of the fourth day of July following a part of the parish of Kirkby Ireleth in the said county of Lancaster and diocese of Carlisle was assigned as a district chapelry to the church of Saint John the Evangelist situate within the limits of the hamlet and ancient chapelry of Woodland in the said parish and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Woodland.'

" And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Woodland has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character con-

templated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Woodland should be altered so that they shall include a portion of the chapelry of Broughton in the said parish of Kirkby Ireleth, and also a certain other portion of the said parish of Kirkby Ireleth.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Harvey Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Woodland shall be altered so that they shall include all that portion of the chapelry of Broughton aforesaid and also all that other portion of the parish of Kirkby Ireleth aforesaid which are respectively described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and are thereon coloured pink and green respectively and that from and after the day of the same date and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portions of the said chapelry and parish so to be included as aforesaid shall become and be and together form part of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Woodland.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Woodland in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Carlisle comprising:—

"1. All that portion of the chapelry of Broughton in the parish of Kirkby Ireleth in the county and diocese aforesaid which is bounded upon the south-east by the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Woodland aforesaid and upon the east by the chapelry of Torver in the parish or parochial chapelry of Ulverston in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north-west and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said chapelry of Torver from the chapelry of Broughton aforesaid at the centre of Hunmer Bridge which carries the old highway from Coniston to Broughton over the stream called or known as Lord's Gill and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said highway for a distance of two and a half miles or thereabouts (thereby passing along the north-western side of Bracelet Moor) to the junction of the same highway with Height House-lane and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the stream called or known as

"II. All that portion of the parish of Kirkby Ireleth aforesaid which consists of the hamlet of Heathwaite and of that part of Kirkby Moor which is called or known as Heathwaite Fell and which is situate on the northern side of the road leading from Ulverston-over-Gawthwaite or Goathwaite Moor to Grizebeck all which portion of the parish of Kirkby Ireleth aforesaid is bounded upon the north by the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Woodland aforesaid on the east partly by the chapelry of Blawith in the parish of Ulverston aforesaid and partly by the new parish of Lowick in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the south partly by the remaining portion of Kirkby Moor aforesaid and partly by the hamlet of Middle Quarter in the parish of Kirkby Ireleth aforesaid and upon the west partly by the extra-parochial territory called or known as Angerton Moss and partly by the chapelry of Broughton aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the three cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation, and the patrons and the incumbents of two of such cures have respectively signified their assent thereto, but the patrons and the incumbent of the third cure, to wit, the parish of Kirkby Ireleth, have made certain observations or objections upon or to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has, notwithstanding such observations or objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Carlisle.

"And whereas the Reverend Henry William Majendie Clerk in Holy Orders is now the incumbent of the said benefice of Tormohun otherwise Tormoham and as such incumbent is willing that the apportionment hereinbefore recommended and proposed shall be now made and take immediate effect.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter is of opinion and we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England are also of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the said new parish of Cockington by means of that apportionment of the endowments of the said benefice of Tormohun otherwise Tormoham which is hereinbefore mentioned and is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the endowments of the said benefice of Tormohun otherwise Tormoham comprise (inter alia) a yearly rent-charge of thirteen pounds six shillings and eight pence chargeable upon the tithes of Cockington and also a certain yearly fee farm rent or annual sum of twenty-four pounds secured by a deed dated the fifth day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine which deed is now deposited in the Registry of the diocese of Exeter.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Edward Henry acting as Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter (in testimony whereof he hath to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal) and with the consent of the said Richard

Mallock as such patron of the said benefices of Tormohun otherwise Tormoham and Cockington as aforesaid and with the consent of the said Henry William Majendie as such incumbent of the said benefice of Tormohun otherwise Tormoham as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said lastly-named consenting parties have set their respective hands and seals to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and as from the day of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme the said yearly rent-charge of thirteen pounds six shillings and eight pence and the said yearly fee farm rent or annual sum of twenty-four pounds hereinbefore mentioned and described shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and such duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same as aforesaid cease to form part of the endowments of the said benefice of Tormohun otherwise Tormoham and shall thenceforth and thereafter belong to and form part of the endowments of the said benefice of Cockington.

"And we further recommend and propose that the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Cockington shall as to the said yearly rent charge of thirteen pounds six shillings and eight pence and as to the yearly fee farm rent or annual sum of twenty-four pounds to be annexed to his benefice as hereinbefore mentioned have all such rights and powers of ownership in respect of the same as are now enjoyed by the incumbent of the said benefice of Tormohun otherwise Tormoham.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Exeter.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent, recommend, and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Peter Devizes shall be altered so that they shall include all those additional portions of the said parish of Rowde and of the said chapelry of Saint James Southbroom, which are respectively described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and are thereon coloured green and pink respectively and that from and after the day of the same date and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portion of the said parish of Rowde shall be dis severed from such parish and the said portion of the said chapelry of Saint James Southbroom shall be dis severed from such chapelry and both the said portion of the parish of Rowde aforesaid and the said portion of the chapelry of Saint James, Southbroom aforesaid shall thereupon be included in and shall become and be and form parts of the said new parish of Saint Peter Devizes.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Peter Devizes in the county of Wilts and in the diocese of Salisbury being:—

"I. "We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter

ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Philip Litherland in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one and published in the London Gazette upon the fourth day of July following a part of the parish of Sefton in the county of Lancaster aforesaid and at that date in the diocese of Chester was assigned as a separate district to the consecrated church of Saint Philip situate at Litherland in such parish and the same was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Philip Litherland.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the seventeenth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy and published in the London Gazette on the nineteenth day of the same month a part of the said parish of Sefton was constituted a separate district or new parish for ecclesiastical purposes and the same was called 'The New Parish of Saint Thomas, Seaforth.'

"And whereas the district chapelry of Saint Philip Litherland aforesaid has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Philip Litherland should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles John Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Philip Litherland shall be altered so that they shall include all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Thomas Seaforth and also all that portion of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill which are described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and are thereon coloured pink and yellow respectively and that from and after the day of the same date and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portion of the said new parish of Saint Thomas Seaforth and the said portion of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill aforesaid shall be dis severed from such new parish and parish respectively and shall be included in and shall together become and be and form part of the said new parish of Saint Philip Litherland.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Philip Litherland in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool, being :—

"1. All that portion of the new parish of Saint Thomas Seaforth in the said county and diocese which is bounded upon the north-west by the consolidated chapelry of Saint John Waterloo in the same county and diocese upon the north-east by the new parish of Saint Philip Litherland aforesaid upon the south-east and upon part of the south-west by that part of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill in the county and diocese aforesaid which is known as the conventional district of Saint Mary Bootle, and upon the remaining part of the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said portion of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill from the new parish of St. Thomas Seaforth aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Liverpool Crosby and Southport Railway over Rimrose Brook and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas Seaforth from the consolidated chapelry of Saint John Waterloo aforesaid.

"2. And also all that portion of the hereinbefore described part of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill which is known as the conventional district of Saint Mary Bootle as aforesaid which portion is bounded upon the east by the district chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Walton-on-the-Hill in the county and diocese aforesaid upon the north by the new parish of Saint Philip Litherland aforesaid and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the west and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing at a point in the middle of the Leeds and Liverpool Canal where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Philip Litherland from the new parish of Saint Thomas Seaforth aforesaid joins the northern boundary of the said portion of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of thirty chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the London and North-Western Railway over the same canal, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned line of railway for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said portion of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill from the district chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Walton-on-the Hill aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts, and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct

that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Liverpool.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul situate at West Hartlepool as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Barber, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Stranton which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Paul situate at West Hartlepool as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul West Hartlepool.'

"And with the like consent of the said Joseph Barber, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Paul situate at West Hartlepool as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises

into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Paul West Hartlepool being :—

"All that part of the parish of Stranton in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded upon the north-west by the parish of Hart in the said county and diocese upon the north upon the north-east and upon the east by the new parish of Christ Church West Hartlepool in the same county and diocese and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south and upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church West Hartlepool from the parish of Stranton aforesaid at the point where Stockton-street is joined by Commercial-street and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with York-road and with Park-road and continuing thence still westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty chains or thereabouts to its present western end and continuing thence still westward and in a direct line for a distance of twenty-seven and a half chains or thereabouts, thereby following the intended course of the same road, to the point where Wooler-road joins Elwick-road which leads along the southern and western sides of the Ward Jackson Memorial Park to Elwick and extending thence first westward then north-westward and then northward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of thirty-seven chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Stranton from the parish of Hart aforesaid."

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the

sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seven and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to certain rural deaneries within the Archdeaconry of Rochester, in the diocese of Rochester and with respect to certain rural deaneries within the Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames in the same diocese.

"Whereas by virtue of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the thirtieth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight and published in the London Gazette on the tenth day of January following, the Rural Deanery of Deptford was formed out of the Rural Deanery of Greenwich within the Archdeaconry of Rochester aforesaid.

"And whereas by virtue of the said Order of Your Majesty in Council the areas of the several Rural Deaneries of Beddington, of Godstone, of Kingston, and of Reigate, were arranged and set forth, and were in the same Order expressed to be within the Archdeaconry of Southwark, in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid.

And whereas by virtue of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the fourteenth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine and published on the twenty-second day of the same month the said Rural Deaneries of Beddington, of Godstone, of Kingston, and of Reigate were (together with the Rural Deaneries of Barnes and of Streatham) severed from the said Archdeaconry of Southwark and were formed into and became a new Archdeaconry, to wit, the Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames, in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid.

And whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the said rural deaneries within the said two Archdeaconries of Rochester and of Kingston-upon-Thames within the said diocese are desirable and should be carried into effect and we are of opinion that the same may properly be carried into effect.

And whereas the said arrangements involve the transfer in certain cases of certain parishes or cures from one rural deanery to another rural deanery, and also involve the extinction or absorption of one rural deanery as such to wit, the Rural Deanery of Deptford in the said Archdeaconry of Rochester; and they also involve the formation of one new rural deanery, to wit, the Rural Deanery of Lewisham in the said Archdeaconry of Rochester.

"And whereas it appears to us to be convenient to set forth in the schedule to this scheme the names of all the parishes or cures which under the arrangements hereinafter recommended and proposed will be situate within and constitute the several rural deaneries of the said two Archdeaconries of Rochester and of Kingston-upon-Thames.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Anthony Wilson Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published

in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the said Archdeaconry of Rochester, and the said Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames respectively shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries, the names of which are set down in order under the name of each of the said two archdeaconries respectively in the said schedule to this scheme annexed and that every parish or cure, the name and quality of which, and the name or names respectively of the rural deanery or rural deaneries within which it is hereafter to be and has previously been situate, are set down in numbered order in the said schedule under the name of the Archdeaconry of Rochester or under the name of the Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames, as the case may be, and under the name of any specified rural deanery in either of the said two archdeaconries respectively shall belong to, and be, and form a part of the archdeaconry and of the rural deanery under the respective names of which it appears as aforesaid, and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the archdeacon of the same archdeaconry and of the rural dean of the same rural deanery, and shall not belong to or be or form a part of any other archdeaconry or rural deanery nor be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other archdeacon or rural dean which recommendation and proposals in this scheme and in the said schedule thereto set forth as aforesaid will have the effect (as by the same schedule appears) of extinguishing one rural deanery, namely the Rural Deanery of Deptford, in the said Archdeaconry of Rochester and of reabsorbing the area which was comprised within the same into the said Rural Deanery of Greenwich, and will have the effect of creating a new rural deanery by the name of 'The Rural Deanery of Lewisham' out of the said Rural Deanery of Greenwich within the said Archdeaconry of Rochester, and which recommendations and proposals will also have the effect (as by the same schedule appears) of transferring certain parishes and other cures from one rural deanery to another, within the said Archdeaconry of Rochester and within the said Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames respectively.

" Whereas the Right Reverend Ernest Roland now Bishop of the diocese of Newcastle is desirous that certain permanent improvements should be made at the said episcopal residence known as Benwell Tower, and has submitted to us the particulars of such proposed improvements.

" And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said proposed improvements a sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds should be provided by borrowing the same by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which may belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick of Newcastle.

" And whereas the said sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds together with a sum of six hundred and fifty pounds which by an Order of Your Majesty in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and published in the London Gazette on the ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three the said Bishop was authorized to borrow from the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty for the purpose of effecting certain other improvements at Benwell Tower aforesaid does not exceed two years' income of the See of Newcastle.

" Now therefore with the consent of the said Ernest Roland Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme, we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly

recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts, any sum not exceeding one thousand and five hundred pounds and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed of further mortgage for the term of thirty-five years or until the said sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied; and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following, that is to say:— during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term of thirty-five years, computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one thirtieth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid; and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid; and that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall have become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale: in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale: and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and shall bind as well the said Ernest Roland, now Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle, as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

“And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds shall be paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and that the receipt of our joint Treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge to the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds, the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient, towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the episcopal residence as aforesaid.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the herein

named Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Newcastle.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said new parish of Saint Paul Charlton which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

“And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

“And whereas Sir Spencer Maryon Maryon-Wilson of Charlton House Old Charlton Baronet has contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a capital sum of three thousand five hundred pounds sterling in aid of the endowment of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, then of the said new parish and of the maintenance of the minister or incumbent thereof for the time being and we have in respect of such sum agreed and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to such minister or incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the last-mentioned Act, the sum of one hundred and five pounds per annum so

long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said sum of three thousand five hundred pounds sterling has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that we should also make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein named Act to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said district or new parish when duly licensed as before-mentioned a grant of forty-five pounds per annum, and upon the further understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned to the said Sir Spencer Maryon Maryon-Wilson his heirs and assigns.

"And whereas we have undertaken and agreed to make the said grant of forty-five pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Anthony Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said new parish of Saint Paul Charlton which is described in the schedule hereunder written all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named, 'The District of the Holy Trinity New Charlton.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted, and when such district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Sir Spencer Maryon Maryon-Wilson and by his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of the Holy Trinity New Charlton being:—

"All that part of the new parish (sometime district) of Saint Paul Charlton in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Rochester which is bounded on the east by the new parish of Saint Thomas, Woolwich, in the said county and diocese upon the north by the northern boundary of the said new parish of Saint Paul Charlton or in other words by the River Thames upon the west

by the new parish of Christ Church East Greenwich, in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary dividing the said new parish of Christ Church East Greenwich from the new parish of Saint Paul Charlton aforesaid crosses the middle of the North Kent line of the South-Eastern Railway and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of sixty-four chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the north-eastern end of the Hanging Wood Tunnel on the same line of railway, which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Paul Charlton from the new parish of Saint Thomas Woolwich aforesaid."

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two and of the Act of the thirty-eighth and thirty-ninth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and seventy-two have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in

Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the church or chapel called or known as 'Carrington Chapel' which is situate within the limits of that tract of land in the county of Lincoln and in the diocese of Lincoln which is or sometime was called or known as 'The West Fen' and which is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan annexed to a certain award or instrument in writing made in pursuance of the Act of the forty-first year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and forty-two intituled 'An Act for dividing and allotting certain fens called the East and West Fens in the county of Lincoln' under and by which award or instrument in writing the said West Fen was divided and allotted.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that the said portions of the several parishes or chapelries hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter more particularly described and the said extra-parochial townships or places hereinbefore mentioned and also hereinafter more particularly described which are comprised within and form part of the said tract of land called or known as 'The West Fen' should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same consolidated chapelry should be assigned to the said church or chapel called or known as Carrington Chapel.

"And whereas the major part in number of the patrons of the respective parishes or chapelries out of which together with the extra-parochial townships or places hereinbefore mentioned the said consolidated chapelry is proposed to be formed as aforesaid concur as to the formation of such consolidated chapelry.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward, Bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln, as such Bishop and also as the patron in right of his See of the rectory of the said parish of Lushy and with the consent of the Reverend Henry Linton of Stirtloe Hall near Buckden in the county of Huntingdon Honorary Canon of Christ Church Oxford the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Freiston, and with the consent of Clementina Elizabeth, Baroness Willoughby de Eresby, the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Hundleby, and with the consent of the Right Honourable Roundell, Earl of Selborne, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, as the patron, on behalf of the Crown, both of the rectory of the said parish of Kirkby-upon-Bain, and of the vicarage of the said parish of Sibsey and also as the alternate patron on behalf

of the Crown of the rectory of the said parish of Leverton, and with the consent of Augustus Audley Neville Jackson-Booth, of No. 32, Rue Van Dost Brussels, in the Kingdom of Belgium, Esquire, as the other alternate patron of the rectory of the parish of Leverton aforesaid, and with the consent of James Bank Stanhope of Revesby Abbey near Boston, in the said county of Lincoln, Esquire, the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Revesby, and with the consent of John Joshua Jebb, of Boston aforesaid, Solicitor, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Skirbeck, and with the consent of Edward Weston Cracroft Amcotts, of Hackthorn Hall, near Lincoln in the said county of Lincoln Esquire, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of West Keal, the said consenting parties being the major part in number of the patrons of the respective parishes or chapelries aforesaid (in testimony of which consent they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical

"All which portion of the said tract of land called or known as 'The West Fen' as aforesaid, consisting of the said detached and outlying portions of such parishes or chapelries together with the whole of the said extra-parochial townships or places, forms one compact whole and coherent district containing by admeasurement twelve thousand five hundred and thirty-eight acres or thereabouts and as the same together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink, should be formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church or chapel called or known as Carrington Chapel, and that the same consolidated chapelry should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Carrington-with-Frithville.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the *London Gazette*, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Definitions.

1. In this Warrant:—

(1.) The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet which is posted as a Parcel in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same.

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

Places between which Parcels may be Transmitted.

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation, Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the Dominion of Canada.

Rates of Postage.

3. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant between the United Kingdom and the said Dominion there shall be charged and paid the rates of postage respectively specified in the Schedule hereto.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

4. No Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length two feet, or in width or depth one foot, or which shall exceed in weight three pounds, shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

Prepayment.

5. The postage chargeable according to the respective rates specified in the said Schedule shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall in the United Kingdom be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps. Provided that any parcel posted in the United Kingdom addressed to the said Dominion insufficiently prepared, which is prepaid to an amount equal to the postage which would have been payable thereon if the same had been addressed to Nova Scotia, shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the deficient postage together with an additional postage of one penny.

Times of Posting.

6. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post, may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

7. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall in the United Kingdom be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

8. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:—

(1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form, and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

(3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such Officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof, according to the rates specified in the said Schedule shall, subject as hereinbefore mentioned, be paid by means of postage stamps affixed to such Parcel, and shall be verified by such Officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the Post without being accompanied by, or having affixed thereto,

such declaration as aforesaid, and until such Parcel has been so measured and weighed, and the postage chargeable thereon shall, subject as hereinbefore provided, have been properly paid; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without being accompanied by, or having affixed thereto, such declaration and without being so measured and weighed, and the postage chargeable thereon, properly paid as aforesaid, such Parcel shall be detained and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof, or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may, if he think fit, from time to time authorize such officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Irregular Posting of Parcels.

10. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which, from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter Box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say:—

- (1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).
- (2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage the same may be forwarded to its destination as a Parcel charged with the sum of one penny, in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel. Provided that the postage prepaid upon any such Packet shall be allowed in part payment of any postage or other sum charged under this clause.

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

11. With regard to—

- (a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and
- (b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or for any other sufficient reason;

The following provisions shall apply, that is to say:—

- (1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at, or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined.
- (2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel or the

Declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given, by Post, to the sender through the Post Office of Canada that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender or his agent, upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or, at the request of the sender, will be forwarded to a corrected address or returned to him by post in either case upon the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

- (3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), and notice shall also be given to the Post Office of Canada that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender or his agent, or be returned to the sender by post.
- (4.) In any case the notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.
- (5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.
- (6.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions:—
 - (a.) Where the sender's name and address appear outside the Parcel and the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address and the Parcel is not, at the time of such correction, lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.
 - (b.) Where the sender's name and address do not appear outside the Parcel, or where such name and address do appear, but the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel, at the time of such correction, is lying at a Returned Letter Office, the sender shall pay a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.
- (7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in Section 14 of the "Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."
- (8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate

of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the parcel has become liable shall be prepaid by the sender in stamps before the return of the parcel to him.

(9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

(10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

(11.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General, it becomes offensive or injurious to any Officer of the Post Office or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Re-direction of Parcels.

12. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom and Canada is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

14. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

Prohibitions.

15. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel—

(1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not; or

(2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

(3.) Consisting of or containing—

(a.) Any explosive substance.

(b.) Any dangerous substance.

(c.) Any filth.

(d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.

(e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.

(f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature.

(g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance, or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

16. (1.) There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses.

(2.) If any such Parcel be posted or tendered for conveyance by post the contents thereof, so far as the same consist of Parcels, may be forwarded to the addressees of such Parcels charged with new and distinct rates of postage according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and so far as the same consist of other Postal Packets, may be treated and charged as unpaid Postal Packets, or such Parcel may be otherwise dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

17. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the Regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for safety of Parcels.

18. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

19. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage.

20. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect of or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

21. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of the Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882.

Remission of Postage.

22. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

23. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

To the Boards of Guardians of the several Unions and Separate Parishes in the Metropolis, and of the several other Unions in the Counties of Middlesex and Surrey ;—
And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 12th

year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for administering the laws for relief of the Poor in England, and they are thereby required, from time to time, as they shall see occasion, to make and issue all such rules, orders, and regulations for the management and government of any house or establishment wherein any poor person shall be lodged, boarded, or maintained, for hire or remuneration, under any contract or agreement entered into by the proprietor, manager, or superintendent of such house or establishment, or on his behalf, with any guardians, overseers, or other persons having the ordering or management

of the poor in any Union or Parish, or for the education of any poor children therein, in like manner and to the same extent as the said Commissioners are by law empowered to do in the case of any Workhouse belonging to any Union or Parish; and that all such rules, orders, and regulations shall have the like effect as other rules, orders, and regulations of the said Commissioners, and shall be obeyed accordingly, with the like penalties on any neglect or disobedience thereof, to be enforced upon summary conviction, as penalties under the Act of the fifth year of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the amendment and better administration of the Laws relating to the Poor in England and Wales," may now be enforced;

And whereas it is by the said Act also enacted that the said Commissioners may, from time to time, issue any order which they may deem necessary for regulating the mode in which any contract shall be entered into for the lodging, boarding, or maintenance of any poor person with the proprietor, manager, or superintendent of such house or establishment as aforesaid, or the terms or the duration of any such contract; and if, after the issuing of any such order, any contract or agreement be entered into with such proprietor, manager, or superintendent, or any person on his behalf, not in accordance with such order, the same shall be voidable, and if the said Commissioners shall so direct, the same shall be void and of no effect;

And whereas by an Order dated the 29th day of November, 1880, We, the Local Government Board, prescribed Rules and Regulations with respect to an Establishment situate at Rottingdean, near Brighton, in the county of Sussex, known as the "Downlands Convalescent Home," of which Establishment Justus F. Landquist was the Proprietor, and which was provided for the reception and treatment of poor children afflicted with scrofulous, cutaneous, or other diseases, and requiring the benefits of residence at the sea-side and of sea-bathing;

And whereas the said Justus F. Landquist has ceased to be the Proprietor of the said Establishment, and Mrs. Julia Percival Hall has become the Proprietor thereof, and We deem it expedient that the above-cited Order should be rescinded, and that rules, orders, and regulations should again be made for the management and government of the said Establishment:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us in that behalf, We hereby rescind the above-cited Order dated the twenty-ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and Order and declare that the following rules and regulations shall forthwith come into operation and be observed with respect to the said Establishment:

Contracts.

ART. 1. All contracts or agreements to be entered into by the Proprietor with the Guardians of any Union or Separate Parish for the reception, treatment, and maintenance of children in the Establishment shall be according to the Form (No. 1) in the Schedule to this Order, or in some Form to the like effect.

Admission and Discharge.

ART. 2. The said Establishment shall be limited to the reception of children under the age of sixteen years afflicted with scrofulous, cutaneous, or other diseases, and requiring the benefits of residence at the sea-side and of sea-bathing.

ART. 3. Every pauper child who shall be admitted into the said Establishment, either upon his first or any subsequent admission, shall be admitted upon an order signed by the Clerk to the Guardians of the Union or Parish from which he is sent, according to the Form (No. 2.) in the Schedule to this Order. But no such order shall be given unless a Medical Officer of such Union or Parish has previously examined such child, and signed the certificate at the foot of such Form.

ART. 4. No child shall be admitted from any Union or Parish unless a contract in the Form (No. 1.) prescribed in the Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect, shall have been entered into between the Proprietor and the Board of Guardians of such Union or Parish for the reception, treatment, and maintenance of children.

ART. 5. The Proprietor shall not admit into the Establishment, or retain therein, a larger number of children than that from time to time fixed by the Local Government Board; and in case such number shall at any time be exceeded, the fact of such excess shall forthwith be reported to the Local Government Board by the Medical Officer of the Establishment.

ART. 6. When any child, in the opinion of the Medical Officer of the Establishment, is sufficiently recovered to be sent back to the Union or Parish from which he was sent, such Medical Officer shall make a written report of the case to the Proprietor, who shall communicate with the Guardians of such Union or Parish, in order that such child may be sent back accordingly.

Classification.

ART. 7. The children shall be classed, according to the nature of their diseases, or otherwise, as the Proprietor, with the advice of the Medical Officer of the Establishment, shall direct.

Discipline and Diet.

ART. 8. The clothing to be worn by the children shall be made of such materials as shall be approved of by the Medical Officer of the Establishment, and shall be supplied at the cost of the Guardians of the Unions or Parishes from which the children are respectively sent.

ART. 9. The children shall be dieted in accordance with the directions of the Medical Officer of the Establishment.

ART. 10. Each child shall have a bed to himself.

ART. 11. The children shall, as far as practicable, be regularly instructed in reading, writing, arithmetic, and the principles of the Christian religion, and such other instruction shall be imparted to them as may be calculated to produce in them habits of industry and virtue, and to promote their future usefulness and welfare.

ART. 12. The Proprietor shall make such arrangements as, with the concurrence of the Medical Officer, he may deem expedient for allowing the children to quit the Establishment for the purpose of sea-bathing, or any other purpose, under the care and guidance of some one of the officers or assistants of the Establishment.

ART. 13. Subject to the provisions of the law and the regulations herein contained with respect to the religious visitation and instruction of children in the Establishment, any person may visit any child in the Establishment by permission of the Proprietor, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Medical Officer may prescribe.

ART. 14. Any licensed Minister of the religious persuasion of any child in the Establishment who

may at any time in the day enter the Establishment for the purpose of affording him religious assistance, or for the purpose of instructing him in the principles of his religion, shall give such assistance or instruction so as not to interfere with the good order and discipline of the Establishment; and such religious assistance or instruction shall be strictly confined to children who are of the religious persuasion of such Minister, and whom such Minister shall have been lawfully authorised to visit and instruct.

ART. 15. No work, except the necessary household work and cooking, shall be performed on any Sunday, Good Friday, Christmas Day, or any day appointed for a public fast or thanksgiving.

ART. 16. Prayers shall be read before breakfast and after supper every day, and Divine Service shall be performed every Sunday, Good Friday, and Christmas Day in the appointed place in the Establishment, unless the Proprietor, with the consent of the Local Government Board, shall otherwise direct.

ART. 17. It shall also be incumbent upon the Proprietor to discharge the following duties:—

No. 1. To cause the children, upon admission, to be cleansed and properly clothed.

No. 2. To send for the Medical Officer in case any child is taken suddenly ill, and to take care that all sick children are duly attended by the Medical Officer, and are provided with such medicines and attendance, diet and other necessaries, as the Medical Officer may direct, and in the case of dangerous sickness to send for the Minister of the religious persuasion of the child, and to give notice to any relative or friend of the sick child whom he may know to be resident within a reasonable distance.

No. 3. To take care that no child when suffering from severe illness, or at the approach of death, shall be left unattended either during the day or the night.

No. 4. To give immediate information of the death of any child in the Establishment to the Medical Officer, if not present at the death, and to the nearest relations of the deceased whose place of residence may be known to him, and who may reside within a reasonable distance, and to the Guardians of the Union or Parish from which the child shall have been admitted; and, if the body be not removed within a reasonable time, to provide for the interment thereof.

No. 5. When requisite, to cause the death of every child dying in the Establishment to be duly notified to the proper Registrar of Births and Deaths within five days after the day of such death.

No. 6. Once at least in every year, and as often as may be necessary for cleanliness, to cause all the rooms and offices belonging to the Establishment to be limewashed, and at all times to take care that all the rooms and offices, and the furniture and utensils, are kept clean and in good order.

No. 7. To cause the Establishment, and all its furniture and appurtenances, to be kept in good and substantial repair; and from time to time to remedy without delay any such defect in the repair of the Establishment, its drainage, warmth, or ventilation, or in the furniture or fixtures thereof, as may, in the opinion of the Medical Officer, tend to injure the health of the inmates.

No. 8. To provide a Book, to be termed the Visitors' Book, in which Inspectors of the Local Government Board, and other persons

who may from time to time officially visit the Establishment may make such observations as they may think fit respecting the dietary, accommodation, and treatment of the inmates of the Establishment; also to provide the necessary Books and Forms for the use of the Medical Officer and for other Reports.

ART. 18. The Proprietor shall punctually enter up, and accurately keep, the following Books, according to the Forms and directions in the Schedule to this Order:—

No. 1. *The Admission and Discharge Book*, in the Form (No. 4.) In this Book shall be kept an account of every child admitted into, and of every child dying in, or discharged from, the Establishment, and such account shall be balanced weekly.

No. 2. The Proprietor shall at the close of each half-year prepare a statement from the *Admission and Discharge Book* of the Establishment, showing the number of children of all classes actually in the Establishment in the course of the previous half-year, and the other particulars, according to the Form (No. 9.) in the Schedule to this Order. This statement shall, within four weeks after the close of the half-year, be transmitted to the Local Government Board.

No. 3. *A Register of the Religious Creed* of the children, in the Form (No. 5.) in the Schedule to this Order.

Officers.

ART. 19. The Proprietor shall forthwith, and from time to time hereafter as vacancies occur, appoint a Medical Officer for the Establishment, at such salary or remuneration as the Local Government Board shall approve, and so many fit persons to hold such of the under-mentioned offices as the Local Government Board may deem to be requisite; namely,—

Matron or Superintendent Nurse,
Schoolmaster,
Schoolmistress,

with such assistants as may be necessary for the efficient performance of the duties of the said offices.

ART. 20. All appointments to the offices of Medical Officer, Matron or Superintendent Nurse, Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress shall be reported to the Local Government Board as soon as they are made.

ART. 21. No person shall hold the office of Medical Officer under this Order unless he be duly registered under the Medical Act of 1858, or other authority of law in that behalf, and be qualified by law to practice both Medicine and Surgery in England and Wales, such qualification being established by the production of a Diploma, Certificate of a Degree, Licence, or other Instrument granted or issued by competent legal authority in Great Britain or Ireland, testifying to the medical or surgical, or medical and surgical, qualification or qualifications of the candidate for such office.

Duties of the Medical Officer.

ART. 22. The following shall be duties of the Medical Officer:—

No. 1. To attend at the Establishment not less than three times in each week, and oftener if required or sent for by the Proprietor.

No. 2. To attend duly and punctually upon the children in the Establishment according to the necessities of their cases, and to give the requisite directions as to their treatment, nursing, diet, and clothing, and the ventila-

tion and condition of the rooms in which they are placed, and in accordance with such agreement as he may make with the Proprietor, to supply the requisite medicines, exclusive of cod liver oil, to the children.

No. 3. To examine the state of each child on his admission into the Establishment, and make a record of the same in the *Case Book*, and to give the requisite directions to the Proprietor.

No. 4. To give directions from time to time as to the diet, classification, and treatment of the children, and to make any suggestions to the Proprietor which he may deem requisite with reference to the health of the children in general.

Provided that if the Medical Officer be of opinion that any child is not fit to be retained in the Establishment, he shall make a written report of the case to the Proprietor.

No. 5. To make the written reports to the Proprietor required by Art. 6.

No. 6. To keep a *Case Book*, according to the Form (No. 7.) in the Schedule to this Order, and to insert therein the particulars required by such Form with respect to every child in the Establishment, employing therein, so far as is practicable, the terms used or recommended in the regulations and statistical nosology issued by the Registrar-General.

No. 7. To prescribe the dietary for the children in so many different scales as he shall deem expedient; and to enter the same at the commencement of *The Admission and Discharge Book*, according to the Form (No. 3.) in the Schedule to this Order, or some Form to the like effect.

No. 8. To keep a book, to be termed *The Medical Officer's Report Book*, in the Form (No. 8.) in the Schedule to this Order, in which he shall enter in writing, duly and punctually and under the correct dates, such Reports as he may think it necessary from time to time to make to the Proprietor as to defects in the diet, drainage, ventilation, warmth, and other arrangements of the Establishment; as to any excess in the number of any class of inmates which he may deem to be detrimental to health; as to every defect which he may observe in the arrangements of the rooms, and in the performance of their duties by the Nurses; and further, a Report of any other matter which, in the discharge of the duties of his office, he shall consider to require the attention of the Proprietor; and also such recommendations relating to any of the matters aforesaid as he may think it right to submit to the Proprietor or to the Local Government Board.

No. 9. To allow any Visitor appointed by the Local Government Board access to the *Case Book* and the *Medical Officer's Report Book* at all times that he may require to see it, and to produce it also to the Inspectors of the Local Government Board, whenever duly required to do so.

No. 10. To report specially to the Local Government Board on or about the first day of January and the first day of July in every year upon the several matters set forth in the Statement contained in Form (No. 6.) in the Schedule to this Order.

No. 11. To enter on a card in respect of each patient upon whom he shall be in attendance, the diet, extras, and medical treatment ordered by him.

No. 12. To report in writing to the Local Government Board the case of every sudden and every accidental death which may occur in the Establishment within twenty-four hours after he shall receive information of the same, and the cause of the death so far as he is able to explain it.

No. 13. To report to the Local Government Board, fortnightly, upon the Establishment, in such Form as they shall from time to time direct.

Duties of the Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress.

ART. 23. The following shall be the duties of the Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress respectively,—

No. 1. To instruct the children in accordance with the directions in Art. 11.

No. 2. To accompany the children when they quit the School for exercise or sea-bathing, according to such directions as the Proprietor may give.

No. 3. To inspect the children every morning to see that they are clean in their persons, and to report to the Proprietor every instance of a child who on such inspection shall appear to be not clean in his person, or not clean and neat in his clothing.

No. 4. To keep the children punctual, orderly, and decorous in their conduct, by enforcing proper discipline among them; to assist the Proprietor in maintaining due subordination, discipline, and propriety of behaviour at all times; and to report in writing to the Proprietor every occurrence in their opinion unfavourable to the welfare of the children and the general efficiency and prosperity of the Establishment.

Visitor.

ART. 24. If a Visitor be at any time appointed by the Local Government Board under the authority of Section VII of the above-recited Act, the Proprietor shall allow him free access to every part of the Establishment.

Interpretation of Terms.

ART. 25. In this Order—

The term "Union" includes any Union of Parishes incorporated or united for the relief or maintenance of the Poor under any Act of Parliament.

The term "Separate Parish" means a Parish or Place which is under a separate Board of Guardians.

The term "Proprietor" in this Order means Mrs. Julia Percival Hall, or such other person or persons as may hereafter become the Proprietor or Proprietors of the said Establishment, with a view to the reception and treatment therein solely of poor children afflicted with scrofulous, cutaneous, or other diseases, and requiring the benefits of residence at the sea-side, and of sea-bathing.

All words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular to include the plural and the plural the singular, unless the contrary as to gender or number is expressly provided.

Whenever in this Order any Article is referred to by its number, the Article of this Order bearing that number shall be taken to be signified thereby.

Whereas the said _____, herein-after termed the Proprietor, is the Proprietor of an Establishment known as the "Downlands Convalescent Home," at Rottingdean, near Brighton, in the county of Sussex, for the reception, maintenance, and treatment of poor children suffering from scrofulous, cutaneous, and other diseases, and requiring the benefits of residence at the sea-side and sea-bathing.

And whereas the Guardians of the Poor of the said _____ hereinafter termed the Guardians, have applied to the said Proprietor to receive into and maintain and instruct, and also to provide with medical attendance and medicines, and with sea-bathing, when necessary, whilst so maintained, in the said Establishment, a certain number of poor children under the age of sixteen years chargeable to the said _____

Now therefore, the Proprietor does hereby (in consideration of the payments hereinafter mentioned to be made) contract and covenant with the Guardians that he, the Proprietor, will receive into the said Establishment a certain number of poor children under the age of sixteen years, not exceeding _____, chargeable to the said _____, and that such poor children

while in the said Establishment shall be maintained, instructed, and provided with medical attendance and medicines, and with sea-bathing, when necessary, in the same manner in all respects as required by the Regulations of the Local Government Board, at the following rate of charge, namely, the sum of _____ per week, and after the same rate for any less time than a week for each person, each week to commence on the day of admission into the said Establishment.

Provided, that the requisite clothing to be worn by the children shall be supplied at the cost of the Guardians.

Provided also, that the limit hereinbefore prescribed for the number of children to be admitted into the said Establishment may be increased or diminished by the parties hereto, with the consent of the Local Government Board previously obtained.

And the Guardians do hereby covenant with the said Proprietor to pay to him, his executors or administrators, within one calendar month after Lady Day, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, and Christmas Day respectively, during the subsistence of this contract, and within one month after its termination, the said sum of _____ per week, and after the same rate for less time than a week, for each of the children so received into the said Establishment so long as such child shall remain an inmate thereof.

And it is hereby mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto, that in the case of the death in the said Establishment of any child admitted from the said _____, the Proprietor, after giving the notices required by the Regulations of the Local Government Board, shall, if the body be not removed within a reasonable time, provide for the interment thereof; and that the Guardians shall pay to the Proprietor the expenses incurred in and about such interment upon being furnished by the Proprietor with particulars and vouchers of such expenses.

Also, that no child from the said _____ shall be admitted into the said Establishment without a certificate from a Medical Officer of the said _____

Also, that no child who is imbecile shall be admitted into the said Establishment.

Also, that the Guardians will not remove any child from the said Establishment without a request in writing addressed to the Proprietor, and signed by their Clerk, and forwarded _____ days before the day when the removal is to take place.

Also, that if the Guardians shall appoint a Committee from their own body, not exceeding three Guardians, with their Clerk or other officer, to visit the children in the said Establishment, such Committee shall be admitted into the said Establishment at all reasonable times to visit therein the children belonging to the said _____

And Lastly, it is hereby covenanted and agreed, that if either of the said parties hereto shall be desirous of putting an end to this contract, the party so desirous shall give three calendar months' notice thereof in writing to the other of them.
