PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the three hundred and thirty-third section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for every Pilotage Authority by Bye-law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council from time to time to do within its districts all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section:—

And whereas the Dingle Harbour Commissioners, being the Pilotage Authority for the Harbour of Dingle within the meaning of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," have, in exercise of the powers vested in them by that Act and by "The Dingle Harbour Order, 1885," made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain Bye-laws and Regulations.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the proposed Bye-laws and Regulations are proper and reasonable.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of, and signify Her consent to, the said Bye-laws and Regulations as set forth in the schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Order refers.

BYE-LAWS made by the Dingle Harbour Commissioners, as the Pilotage Authority for Dingle, for the regulation and government of the Pilots within their district.

Pilotage District.

1. The Pilotage District shall comprise the area included within the following boundary, viz.:—An imaginary straight line drawn westward from the Beacon at Beenbawn Head to Carrigtutea Rock.

Rates of Pilotage.

2. Within the Pilotage District the following rates of Pilotage shall be payable:—

For a vessel trading foreign in and out on draught of water per foot...	5s.
For a coaster or cross channel trader in and out on draught of water per foot	2s. 6d.

Distance Money.

3. Outside the Pilotage District the following distance money shall be payable for vessels requiring the services of a Pilot bound to Dingle:—

From any place eastward of a line drawn from Bull Head to Counnanna ...	£2
From any place westward of a line drawn from Parkmoor Point to Counnanna... ..	£4

Masters to be informed of Rates.

4. Every Pilot shall hand a copy of the above rates to masters of vessels requiring his services, and shall also produce his Pilotage licence; any Pilot not doing so shall be fined in a sum not exceeding £3.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it

"is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas it is also enacted "That any such scheme or modification may be drawn up according to the regulations and directions in such Act contained, subject to the consent in writing of the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected thereby, under his or their hands, notwithstanding the vacancy of such benefice or benefices: and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council thereupon to make an Order for carrying such scheme or modification thereof, as the case may be into effect; and such Order being registered in the Registry of the diocese as directed by the said Act, shall come into operation and shall be forthwith binding on all persons whatsoever, notwithstanding such vacancy or vacancies."

And whereas Edward Henry, Lord Bishop of Exeter hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, represented in a writing dated the eleventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, to the Right Honourable Edward White, Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"We Edward Henry by Divine permission Bishop of Exeter do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. That there is in the county of Devon and our diocese of Exeter the parish of Countisbury which has its own parish church and is a perpetual curacy and benefice in our patronage as such Bishop as aforesaid and the same is now vacant but the present turn to present thereto is by reason of lapse vested in Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria.

"2. That the said parish by the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one had a population of one hundred and sixty-four persons.

"3. That the gross annual income of the said perpetual curacy is twenty pounds or thereabouts and there is no residence house belonging thereto.

"4. That the said parish of Countisbury adjoins the parish of Lynton in the county and diocese aforesaid which is also a perpetual curacy and benefice in our patronage as such Bishop as aforesaid and has its own parish church and contains a population of one thousand two hundred and thirteen persons. And the Reverend William

Lipsett Lawson is the incumbent of the same perpetual curacy and benefice.

"5. That there is in the said parish of Lynton the district and village of Lynmouth which is estimated to contain a population of four hundred persons and the approach therefrom to the parish church is by a long and steep hill which renders the access thereto exceedingly difficult.

"6. That a chapel has been erected in the said village and district of Lynmouth and licensed for Divine service for the accommodation of the persons residing within such village and district and the same is intended to be consecrated.

"7. That if the said district and village of Lynmouth were united to the said parish of Countisbury and formed into one benefice there is reasonable ground for believing that an adequate income for the incumbent of such benefice would be provided by voluntary offerings until a sufficient permanent endowment could be obtained.

"8. That the gross annual income of the said benefice of Lynton is four hundred and thirteen pounds or thereabouts.

"9. That it appears to us that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter forty-nine the district and village of Lynmouth aforesaid as described in the schedule hereto may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Lynton and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Countisbury to which the same may be more conveniently united.

"10. That pursuant to the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act we have prepared the following scheme which together with the consents in writing of the patron and incumbent respectively of the said perpetual curacy of Lynton and the Right Honourable Farrer Baron Herschell Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain on behalf of Her said Most Gracious Majesty we hereby submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under our hand this eleventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty six.

"The SCHEDULE above referred to.

"All that portion of the parish of Lynton which is bounded towards the north partly by the Bristol Channel and partly by the parish of Countisbury and on all other sides by an imaginary line drawn in a southerly and straight direction from the western extremity of the foreshore lying on the western side of Lynmouth Pier (such extremity being about fifty yards west of the lime kiln on such foreshore) to the centre of the road called Wester-road and thence in an easterly direction along the centre of such road to the centre of the bridge, where such road crosses the River West Lyn and thence in a southerly direction along the centre of such river to the point where the north fence of a close called Lyn Wood No. 1173 on the tithe map of the said parish of Lynton touches the said river and thence in an easterly direction along such fence to a point where the boundary fence commences which divides the lands belonging to the Roe Trustees from those of William Kemeys Riddell Esquire and thence in a northerly and easterly direction along such fence until it joins the Watersmeet-road and thence in an easterly direction along the centre of such road to the east point of Middleham-gardens and thence northwards along the eastern boundary

of the said gardens to the boundary of the parish of Lynton in the centre of the River East Lyn and which said portion of the said parish of Lynton is delineated on the map hereto annexed and is therein coloured pink. "E. H. Exon."

And whereas the said scheme and consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"That the portion of the parish of Lynton aforesaid which is described in the schedule to the foregoing representation (hereinafter referred to as 'the District of Lynmouth') shall henceforth be separated for all ecclesiastical purposes from the remainder of the said parish of Lynton and be annexed to the said parish of Countisbury to which the same may be more conveniently united and form together one perpetual curacy and benefice by the name of the Perpetual Curacy of Countisbury and Lynmouth.

"That the said chapel within the district of Lynmouth shall when consecrated become and be a chapel of ease to the parish church of Countisbury aforesaid and the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Lynton shall be discharged from all cure of souls within the limits of the said district of Lynmouth.

"That the endowments and emoluments of the said benefice of Countisbury and the fees for marriages churchings and burials and all other ecclesiastical offices performed within the limits of the said perpetual curacy of Countisbury and Lynmouth and all ecclesiastical dues offerings and other emoluments arising within the same and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice (save and except all rent-charges in lieu of tithes and glebe, if any, belonging to the said perpetual curacy of Lynton) shall belong to the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Countisbury and Lynmouth.

"That except and subject as aforesaid all the endowments and emoluments now belonging to the said perpetual curacy of Lynton shall continue to belong to the same perpetual curacy as separated from the said district of Lynmouth and shall be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for ever and the ancient parish church within the said parish of Lynton shall continue to be the parish church thereof.

"That the said perpetual curacy of Countisbury and Lynmouth shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said perpetual curacy of Countisbury was subject to before such annexation and the incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of Countisbury and Lynmouth shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said parish of Countisbury and the said district of Lynmouth.

"That the inhabitants of the parish of Countisbury with the said district of Lynmouth annexed shall be exclusively liable for the maintenance of the parish church of Countisbury and of the said chapel of ease when consecrated and the inhabitants of the said district of Lynmouth shall be discharged from the maintenance of the parish church of Lynton and shall not be entitled to any accommodation therein and the inhabitants of the said parish of Lynton as separated from the said district of Lynmouth shall be exclusively liable for the maintenance of the said parish church of Lynton.

"That the patronage of the said perpetual curacy of Lynton and of the said perpetual curacy of Countisbury and Lynmouth shall respectively be vested in the Bishop of Exeter and his successors Bishops of Exeter.

"That churchwardens for the said parish of

Lynton as separated from the said district and village of Lynmouth shall be chosen by the inhabitants of the same parish as so separated and churchwardens for the said parish of Countisbury shall be chosen as heretofore except that the inhabitants of the said district and village of Lynmouth shall be entitled to vote in the election of churchwardens for the same parish.

"I the Right Honourable Farrer, Baron Herschell Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain on behalf of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, patron of the perpetual curacy of Countisbury for the present turn by reason of lapse. And we the Right Reverend Edward Henry Lord Bishop of Exeter and the Reverend William Lipsett Lawson, Clerk, respectively as patron and incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Lynton aforesaid do hereby consent to the foregoing scheme of the Lord Bishop of Exeter.

And whereas the said scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop being satisfied with the said scheme hath certified the same, and the consents aforesaid, to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the twenty-second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Edward Henry Lord Bishop of Exeter has represented unto us (amongst other things)

"That there is in the county of Devon and diocese of Exeter the parish of Countisbury which has its own parish church and is a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That the said parish church of Countisbury adjoins the parish of Lynton in the county and diocese aforesaid, which is also a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That there is in the said parish of Lynton the district and village of Lynmouth, which is estimated to contain a population of four hundred persons and the approach therefrom to the parish church is by a long and steep hill which renders the access thereto exceedingly difficult.

"That a chapel has been erected in the said village and district of Lynmouth.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said district and village of Lynmouth aforesaid as described in the schedule to the representation of the said Lord Bishop may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Lynton and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Countisbury.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with

the consents thereto in writing of the patrons of the said benefices respectively and of the incumbent of the benefice of Lynton (the benefice of Countisbury being now vacant) has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Father in God William by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York Primate of England and Metropolitan.

"I, the Right Reverend Joseph Barber Lord Bishop of Durham do hereby represent to Your Grace:—

"That there is in the county and diocese of Durham the rectory of Sedgefield the parish whereof comprises the township of Foxton-cum-Shotton the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That there is no church or chapel within the boundaries of the said township of Foxton-cum-Shotton and such township is distant from the parish church of Sedgefield aforesaid three miles or thereabouts.

"That the population of the said parish of Sedgefield according to the last census amounts to two thousand three hundred and twenty-eight persons and that the aggregate population of the said township of Foxton-cum-Shotton according to the same census is forty-eight persons.

"That there is also in the said county and diocese of Durham the vicarage and new parish of Stillington.

"That the said township of Foxton-cum-Shotton is immediately contiguous to the said new parish of Stillington and is distant from the parish church of Stillington one and a half miles or thereabouts.

"That the population of the said new parish of Stillington according to the last census is seven hundred and thirty-one persons.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Sedgefield is one thousand four hundred and ninety-nine pounds nine shillings and five pence and that of the benefice of Stillington is one hundred and sixty-two pounds.

"That the patronage of or right of presentation to the said two benefices of Sedgefield and Stillington is vested in me the said Lord Bishop of Durham in right of my Bishopric, and that the Reverend David Richard Falconer M.A., is rector of Sedgefield and the Reverend Thomas Varley is vicar of Stillington.

"That the patron and incumbents of the said benefices of Sedgefield and Stillington are consenting parties to the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed and to the various matters and things in the scheme hereunto annexed stated and proposed.

"That it appears to me the said Lord Bishop that the said township of Foxton-cum-Shotton may under the provisions of the Acts of Parlia-

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Lord Archbishop of York.

"I the Right Reverend Joseph Barber by Divine Providence Lord Bishop of Durham the patron or person entitled to present to the benefices of Sedgfield and Stillington in the county and diocese of Durham were the same now vacant and we the Reverend David Richard Falconer, rector of the rectory and benefice of Sedgfield and the Reverend Thomas Varley vicar of the vicarage and benefice of Stillington do hereby signify to your Grace our consent to the foregoing report and scheme and to the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.

"We the undersigned William by Divine providence Lord Archbishop of York do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Joseph Barber Lord Bishop of Durham has represented to us that it appears to him that the place or district known as the township of Foxton-cum-Shotton in the parish of Sedgfield in the county and diocese of Durham may be advantageously separated from that parish and be annexed to the parish of Stillington in the same county and diocese for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing and has transmitted the same to us for our consideration describing the mode in which it appears to him that the separation and annexation may be best effected with justice to all parties.

"That the patron and incumbents of the two benefices are consenting parties to the scheme hereunto annexed.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop of Durham with the consent of the patron and the incumbents are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the same into effect.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value shall not exceed five hundred pounds may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of York pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the seventeenth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"The undersigned William Lord Archbishop of York doth hereby state that it having appeared to

him that the vicarage and benefice of Saint Sampson and the vicarage and benefice of Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church both in the city and diocese of York might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one parish and benefice for ecclesiastical purposes under the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six and the thirteenth and fourteenth years of the same reign chapter ninety-eight he made enquiry into the circumstances of the case and that on such enquiry it appeared to him that the said union might be usefully made and that the said parishes if united would not be of inconvenient extent and that he therefore caused to be published as required by the said first-mentioned Act a statement in writing of the facts with notice to any person or persons interested to show cause in writing within the time prescribed by the said Act against such union and that such time has expired without any reasonable cause having been shown to him. Wherefore the said Archbishop doth hereby pursuant to the said first-mentioned Act certify to Your Majesty in Council that the circumstances of the case respecting the said union appeared on the before-mentioned enquiry to be as follows :—

"That the said two vicarages benefices and parishes are contiguous.

"That the aggregate population of the said two vicarages according to the latest returns of population made under the authority of Parliament does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons the population of the said parish of Saint Sampson being six hundred and fifteen and that of the said parish of Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church five hundred and ninety-five.

"That the net yearly value of the said benefice of Saint Sampson is one hundred and forty pounds and that of the said benefice of Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church is seventy pounds.

"That the church of Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church being in close proximity to the church of Saint Sampson the distance between the said two churches not exceeding one hundred yards and the said church of Saint Sampson being sufficiently large for the accommodation of the inhabitants of the said two parishes when united and standing in the centre of the area now occupied by the said two parishes, and further it having been certified to the said Archbishop that the said church of Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church is in an unsanitary condition and dangerous to the health of a congregation assembled there and also that the same church is owing to defective construction ill-adapted for public worship it is intended that the said last-mentioned church shall be dis-used if this scheme is carried into effect.

"That the patronage or right of nomination to the said vicarage of Saint Sampson is vested in the Sub-Chanter and Vicars Choral of the Cathedral Church of Saint Peter in York who are consenting parties to the union hereby proposed.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the said vicarage of Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church is vested in Sir Frederick Acclom Milbank of 2 Moreton-gardens, Kensington in the county of Middlesex Baronet M.P. as Master of the Hospital of Saint Michael-in-Well in the county of York who has given his consent to the union hereby proposed.

"That the Reverend William Haworth is the

incumbent of the said vicarage and parish church of Saint Sampson and the Reverend Alfred Harry Benden Lees is the incumbent of the said vicarage of Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church both of whom are consenting parties to the union hereby proposed.

"That if the proposed union is carried into effect it is proposed that the said parish church of Saint Sampson shall be the parish church of the united parishes vicarages and benefices of Saint Sampson and Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church and that all endowments benefactions and ecclesiastical dues and emoluments belonging or appertaining to the said benefice and parish church of Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church shall be transferred to the said church of Saint Sampson and shall become payable to the incumbent for the time being of the said united benefice of Saint Sampson and Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the united benefice and parish of Saint Sampson and Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church shall be vested in the said Sub-Chanter and Vicars Choral and the said Sir Frederick Acclom Milbank and his successors who shall exercise the right of patronage as follows :—On the occasion of the next two vacancies which shall occur after the taking effect of this scheme in respect of the said united benefice and parish of Saint Sampson and Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church the said Sub-Chanter and Vicars Choral shall be entitled to exercise the right of presentation and on the occasion of the third vacancy after the taking effect of this scheme the right of presentation shall be exercised by the said Sir Frederick Acclom Milbank or his successors Masters of the said Hospital of Saint Michael-in-Well and thereafter the said Sub-Chanter and Vicars Choral for the time being and the said Sir Frederick Acclom Milbank and his successors shall exercise the right of presentation to the said united benefice and parish successively provided always that the said Sub-Chanter and Vicars Choral and their successors shall be entitled to exercise such right of presentation twice in succession after every presentation made by the said Sir Frederick Acclom Milbank and his successors.

"The said enquiry and consents are thus certified by the said Archbishop to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may by virtue of the said Acts issue an Order if Your Majesty in Council shall so think fit for uniting the said benefices and parishes of Saint Sampson and Holy Trinity King's Court otherwise Christ Church into one benefice and parish with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"As witness the hand of the said Archbishop the seventeenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six. "W. Ebor.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to

"parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration), describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order of Her Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts, for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the controul or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas Edward Henry, Lord Bishop of Exeter, hath represented in a writing dated the eleventh day of February one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six to the Right Honourable Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

“To the Most Reverend Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury..

“We Edward Henry by Divine permission Bishop of Exeter do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

“1. There is in the county of Devon and my diocese of Exeter the vicarage of West Alvington which comprises the parish and mother church of West Alvington and the parochial chapelry of South Milton, the boundaries of which said parish and chapelry respectively are well known and defined.

“2. According to the last census the population of the said parish of West Alvington is eight hundred and fifty-four and the population of the said chapelry is three hundred and forty-nine.

“3. The said parish and chapelry respectively have each its own parish church for the exclusive use and accommodation of its own inhabitants and each has its own churchwardens and parish officers and baptisms churchings marriages and burials and all ecclesiastical parochial offices have heretofore been and are now performed in the said churches respectively for the inhabitants of the same parish and chapelry respectively.

“4. The said churches are distant from each other about two and a half miles or thereabouts.

“5. There is a residence house belonging to the said vicarage of West Alvington and the gross annual value of the said vicarage is about eight hundred and seventy-eight pounds arising partly from rent-charges in lieu of tithes partly from glebe partly from a temporary grant from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and partly from surplice fees, but this amount will be reduced on the next avoidance of the said benefice by the termination of the said temporary grant which amounts to one hundred pounds per annum. And of such annual value the sum of one hundred and twenty-eight pounds arises from rent-charges in lieu of tithes payable in respect of lands in the said parochial chapelry of South Milton and two pounds from glebe within the said chapelry.

“6. The Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Sarum are the patrons of the said vicarage of West Alvington with the said parochial chapelry of South Milton annexed.

“7. The Venerable Alfred Earle Archdeacon of the Archdeaconry of Totnes in the said diocese is the vicar of the said vicarage.

“8. It appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter forty-nine the said parochial chapelry of South Milton may be advantageously separated from the parish and mother church of West Alvington and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

“9. Pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament I have prepared the following scheme which together with the consents in writing of the incumbent of the said benefice and of the Dean and Chapter of the said Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Sarum the patrons of the same I submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration

and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same to Her Majesty in Council.

“Given under my hand this eleventh day of February one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.
“E. H. Exon.”

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Lord Bishop of Exeter, and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

“SCHEME.

“That the whole of the parochial chapelry of South Milton be separated from the vicarage and parish of West Alvington and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of the Perpetual Curacy of South Milton of which the church within the said parochial chapelry shall be the parish church and that the vicar of West Alvington shall be discharged from all cure of souls within the limits of the said perpetual curacy of South Milton.

“That the proposed separate parish and benefice of South Milton shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of West Alvington and the incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have the exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

“That the whole of the vicarial rent-charges in lieu of tithes payable in respect of lands within the said parochial chapelry of South Milton and all the glebe lands belonging to the said vicarage within the same parochial chapelry shall belong and be annexed to the proposed separate parish and benefice of South Milton and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for ever.

“That the rectorial tithe rent-charges payable in respect of the lands numbered respectively 1006 to 1016, 1317 to 1349 and 1558 to 1601 respectively both inclusive 1667, 1668, 1566½, 1573½, 1600½, and 1601½ in the tithe apportionment and map of the said parish of West Alvington amounting altogether to the sum of thirty-four pounds two shillings and now belonging to the said vicarage of West Alvington shall from the time of this scheme taking effect be annexed and belong to the said perpetual curacy of South Milton and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent of the same perpetual curacy and his successors for ever.

“That baptisms churchings marriages burials and all other parochial ecclesiastical offices shall as heretofore be performed in the church and separate parish of South Milton and that the fees for all such offices performed within the said church and separate parish and all Easter offerings and other ecclesiastical dues and fees (if any) arising within the same shall belong to the incumbent of the same church and separate parish.

“That except and subject as aforesaid all the endowments and emoluments now belonging to the said vicarage of West Alvington shall continue to belong to the said vicarage as separated from the proposed perpetual curacy of South Milton and shall be held received and enjoyed by the vicar thereof for ever and the church within the said parish of West Alvington shall continue to be the parish church thereof.

“That the one moiety of the first fruits tenths and other ecclesiastical dues and of the annual rent or sum of two pounds thirteen shillings and eight pence to the Custos and College of Vicars Choral of the Cathedral Church of Saint Peter in Exeter now payable by the Incumbent of West Alvington with the chapelry of South Milton annexed shall continue payable wholly by the

incumbent of West Alvington as separated from the said parochial chapelry of South Milton.

"That churchwardens shall continue to be annually chosen as heretofore in and for the said parishes of West Alvington and South Milton respectively.

"That the inhabitants of the parish of West Alvington as separated from the said parochial chapelry of South Milton shall be exclusively liable for the maintenance of the parish church of the same parish and the inhabitants of the said separate parish of South Milton shall be exclusively liable for the maintenance of the parish church thereof and the parishioners and inhabitants of the said proposed separate parish of South Milton shall not be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of West Alvington nor shall the parishioners and inhabitants of the parish of West Alvington be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of South Milton.

"That the patronage or right of nomination of or to the said proposed separate benefice of South Milton shall be exercised for the first turn by the said Venerable Alfred Earle as vicar of West Alvington aforesaid and subject thereto the said patronage or right of nomination shall be vested in and exercised by the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Sarum and their successors for ever.

"That there is in the county of Devon and diocese of Exeter the vicarage of West Alvington which comprises the parish and mother church of West Alvington and the parochial chapelry of South Milton the boundaries of which said parish

and chapelry respectively are well known and defined.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said chapelry of South Milton may be advantageously separated from the said parish of West Alvington and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and of the incumbent of the said benefice has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz.:

In the parish churchyard of Crickhowel, in the county of Brecon, until the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

In the parish churchyard of Barking, in the county of Essex, until the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. 1886.—Ordinance of Maritime Health, No. 11.

THE Ministry of the Interior, being officially informed of the appearance of cases of cholera in Trieste and Fiume, decrees:—

ART. 1. Ships bound for Sardinia, Sicily, and the small islands adjacent, and to the ports and landing-places of the Italian continent on the Ionian Sea, from the Cape of S. Maria di Leuca, and on the Mediterranean and its islands, and coming from any part of the Austro-Hungarian coasts, which have up to this date not been admitted to pratique in a port or landing-place of Kingdom without the Adriatic, will be subjected to a quarantine of observation of seven days, to

be undergone according to their respective destinations in the quarantine stations of Augusta, Gulf of Ceranci, Turanto, Gaeta, and Porto Santo Stefano.

ART. 2. The ships that come from the above-mentioned coast, and are bound for the Italian ports of the Adriatic as far as Cape S. Maria di Leuca, will be admitted to pratique, if they present a clean bill of health, and must undergo medical inspection and rigorous disinfection for twenty-four hours of all goods for personal use, of the bedding, of the deck, and of the interior of the ship, if they cannot present a clean bill.

ART. 3. This last treatment will from henceforward be applied to all ships having unclean bills of health, even if coming from a port or landing-place of the Kingdom.

ART. 4. Those of the ships indicated by the preceding articles on which during their passage any case, even suspected, of cholera should be proved to have occurred, will be subjected to a rigorous quarantine of twenty days in the lazaretto of Asinara if bound for the ports of the Ionian, of the Mediterranean, and the islands in the lazaretto of Poveglia, if bound for a point in the Adriatic.

ART. 5. Until the issue of new instructions the importation into Italy of rags, of old clothes, not washed, destined for sale, of bedding already used, and of manure coming from Austro-Hungarian territory will continue to be forbidden.

And whereas on such representation and consideration it appears to me that it would be for the convenience and advantage of the public that the times for the holding of the said Fairs should be altered as proposed :

Now, therefore, I, as the Secretary of State for the Home Department, in exercise of the powers vested in me by "The Fairs Act, 1873," do hereby order that the days shall be altered for the holding of the Fairs which have been annually held at Doncaster, on February 2nd, April 5th, August 5th, and November 16th, respectively ; and that such Fairs shall in future be held on the first Thursday in February, the first Thursday in April, the first Thursday in August, and the first Thursday in November in each year.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board. Cholera Regulations.—(Rags from Italy). :—

To all Port Sanitary Authorities ;—

To all Urban and Rural Sanitary Authorities ;—

To all Officers of Customs ;—

To all Medical Officers of Health of the Sanitary Authorities aforesaid ;—

To all Masters of Ships ;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS Cholera is now prevalent in certain parts of Italy, and it is expedient that regulations should be made with reference to Ships having on board bales of Rags from that country :

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, do, by this Our Order, and in exercise of the power conferred on Us by Section 130 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and every other power enabling Us in this behalf, make the following regulations, and declare that they shall be enforced and executed by the Authority or Authorities hereinafter specified :—

ARTICLE 1. In this Order—

The term "Sanitary Authority" means Port Sanitary Authority, Urban Sanitary Authority, or Rural Sanitary Authority ;

The term "Ship" includes vessel or boat ;

The term "Officer of Customs" includes any person acting under the authority of the Commissioners of Customs;

The term "Master" includes the officer or person for the time being in charge or command of a ship.

ARTICLE 2. From and after the date of this Order, and until the first day of November, 1886, no rags from Italy shall be delivered overside, except for the purpose of export, nor landed in any port or place in England or Wales.

ARTICLE 3. If any rags shall be delivered overside or landed in contravention of this Order, they shall, unless forthwith exported, be destroyed by the person having control over the same, with such precautions as may be directed by the Medical Officer of Health of the Sanitary Authority within whose jurisdiction or district the same may be found.

ARTICLE 4. All masters of vessels, consignees, and other persons having control of any rags prohibited under this Order from being delivered overside, except for the purpose of export, or landed, are required to obey these regulations.

ARTICLE 5. All Officers of Customs are empowered to prevent the delivery overside or landing of rags in contravention of this Order.

ARTICLE 6. It shall be the duty of the Sanitary Authority to take proceedings against masters of ships, consignees, or other persons having control over any rags, who shall wilfully neglect or refuse to obey or carry out, or shall obstruct the execution of any of these regulations.

From soundings recently taken in South Channel, the deepest water on the bar at low tide was two and a half fathoms (deepening to three and four fathoms on each side of the bar), lying with South Head Lighthouse bearing N.N.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E.

and Nine-pin Rock N.W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.; seaward of this position at the distance of two cables, and with South Head Lighthouse bearing N.N.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. there is a depth of $2\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms.

Heron Spit has extended about $3\frac{1}{2}$ cables in a south-east direction, and its southern edge (2 fathoms) now lies with South Head Lighthouse bearing N.E. by N., and Nine-pin Rock N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. Southward of this position, the water deepens quickly to $4\frac{1}{2}$ and 5 fathoms.

Emma Shoal has extended $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables in a southerly direction with depths of about 9 feet on it at low water; in rough weather there is less sea over the tail of this shoal than in South Channel, and it may be crossed when near high water.

South Head Beacons in line bearing N.N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. lead about one cable south-eastward of Heron Spit, and north-westward of the north-west end of Treachery Shoal and the south part of Transmere Shoal.
