Her Majesty's Most Gracious Speech, delivered by the Lords Commissioners, to both Houses of Parliament on Thursday, August 19, 1886.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

HAVE summoned you to meet at this unusual season of the year for the transaction of

indispensable business.

The Session of the last Parliament was interrupted before the ordinary work of the year had been completed, in order that the sense of my people might be taken on certain important proposals with regard to the government of Ireland. The result of that appeal has been to confirm the conclusion to which the late Parliament had come.

The provisional nature of the arrangement which was made by the last Parliament for the public charge of the year renders it inexpedient to postpone any further the consideration of the

necessary financial legislation.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The Estimates which were submitted to the last Parliament, and were only partially voted, will be laid before you.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

At a period of the year usually assigned for the recess, and after the prolonged and exceptional labours to which many of you have been subjected, I abstain from recommending now, for your consideration, any measures except those which are essential to the conduct of the public service during the remaining portion of the financial year. I am confident that they will receive your prompt and careful attention.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it was (amongst other things) enacted that Her Majesty might from time to time, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, fix the establishment to be maintained by each of the General Lighthouse Authorities on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and beacons, or the annual or other sums to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund in respect of such establishments, and that no increase of any establishment or part of an establishment so fixed shall be made without the consent of the Board of Trade.

And whereas Her Majesty by Order in Council, dated the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, was pleased to fix the establishments which might be maintained by the Commissioners of Irish Lights, the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses, and the Corporation of Trinity House of Deptford

Strond (hereinafter called the Trinity House) respectively, and to fix that in respect of such said establishments the aggregate amount of the salaries which under the provisions of the said Order in Council should, for the time being, be paid to the officers of the said establishments should be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund:

And whereas it is expedient that the establishment by the said recited Order fixed to be maintained as aforesaid by the Trinity House on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and beacons should be varied, and in part increased in manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas it has been made to appear that the increase to the establishment of the Trinity House mentioned herein has, in pursuance of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," been made with the consent of the Board of Trade:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the power vested in Her by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to revoke as from the twenty-fourth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, so much of the Order in Council dated the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, as relates to the Trinity House, and to fix and doth hereby fix the establishment which may be maintained by the Trinity House as follows, that is to say:—

The establishment of the Trinity House shall, as from the twenty-fifth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, consist of the officers named in the schedule to this Order at the salaries of which the minimum annual increase and maximum are respectively mentioned in the same schedule, but the annual and triennial increments of such officers shall (except in the case of the Secretary) be only granted on a certificate by the Trinity House that the preceding period of the officer's service has been distinguished by zeal, industry, and regularity; and the officers who, on the twenty-fourth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, were on the establishment or in the service of the Trinity House, and who on or before the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, became members of the establishment fixed by this Order, may with the consent of the Board of Trade continue to receive the salaries and allowances to which they were respectively entitled before they became members of the establishment fixed by this Order in lieu of the minimum salaries respectively mentioned in the schedule to the said

Provided that, in consideration of the work to be performed by them, Messrs. Horace Smith and Arthur Owen may each receive an initial salary fifty pounds per annum in excess of the minimum of the class to which they belong:

Provided also that the Officers who on the twenty-fourth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, were on the establishment of the Trinity House as fixed by the Order in Council of the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and who on the said twenty-fourth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five were not entitled to their maximum salary, shall, on becoming members of the establishment fixed by this Order and if in receipt of the same rate of salary (exclusive of duty pay) as before, be entitled to their increments of salary on the same anniversaries as before:

The following provisions in respect of age, examination and appointment shall take effect as

from the second day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six:

Save as hereinafter provided all persons appointed to Second Class Clerkships or to Lower Grade Clerkships of the Establishment of the Trinity House shall at the time of such appointment be over the age of eighteen years and under the age of twenty-five years, and shall have previously passed before the Civil Service Commissioners such examination as may be arranged between the said Commissioners, the Trinity House, and the Board of Trade; and further that (except under special circumstances with the consent of the Board of Trade) all appointments under this Order to First Class Clerkships shall be made from the Class of Second Class Clerks, and all appointments under this Order to Principal Clerkships shall be made either from the First Class or from the Second Class of Clerks:

Provided nevertheless that in exceptional cases, with the consent of the Board of Trade, appointments to the Lower Grade may be made from the body of Extra Clerks in the service of the Trinity House at a minimum salary not exceeding the rate payable at the time of promotion if the age of each person so appointed did not upon his first appointment as such Extra Clerk exceed twenty-five years and does not at the date of his subsequent promotion exceed thirty-five years, and if he has either served five years as Extra Clerk or has passed an examination as aforesaid, and provided also that his service as an Extra Clerk shall not count towards his subsequent superannuation (if any):

Provided nevertheless that in exceptional cases, and with the consent of the Board of Trade, appointments to Second Class Clerkships may be made from the Body of Lower Grade Clerks in the service of the Trinity House at a minimum salary not exceeding the rate payable at the time of promotion if the aggregate previous service either as Extra Clerk or Lower Grade Clerk of each person so appointed amounts to ten years and if he is under the age of thirty-five years:

And Her Majesty by virtue and in further exercise of the power so vested in Her as aforesaid, and by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to fix and doth hereby fix that the salaries enjoyed by Mr. B. E. Drayner, Assistant Secretary, Mr. E. Darvall, and Mr. F. C. Seyfang, Senior Clerks, and Mr. H. C. Davy and Mr. E. B. Hodge, Second Class or Assistant Clerks, on the Staff of the Trinity House, as enumerated in Schedule A to the Order in Council of the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, may continue to be paid to them, respectively, up to and including the dates (not later than the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six) until which the aforesaid officers may respectively have remained in the service of the Trinity House. Provided that no new appointments to Second Class Clerkships or Lower Grade Clerkships, shall, under this present Order in Council date prior to the 1st day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

And Her Majesty, by virtue and in further exercise of the power so vested in Her as aforesaid, and by and with the advice aforesaid, is further pleased to fix and doth hereby fix that the salaries which under the provisions of this present Order in Council are for the time being payable to the Officers of the Establishment of the Trinity House shall be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty, of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eightysix, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation for altering the boundaries of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twentieth day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty and duly published in the London Gazette upon the twenty-third day of the same month a portion of the new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith in the county and diocese aforesaid and also a contiguous portion of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith in the same county and diccese were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Simon situate in the Rockley-road in the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Hammersmith and the same was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith should be altered so as to include within the limits of that cure all that further portion of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith which is hereinafter mentioned and described.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop

of the said diocese of London as such Bishop with the consents of John Derby Allcroft of Lancaster-gate in the said county of Middlesex Esquire of Henry William Grace Child of Hurstwood Bexley in the county of Kent Esquire of Francis Augustus Bevan of Princes-gate in the said county of Middlesex Esquire of Charles Hobhouse Bousfield of Elvaston-place, South Kensington in the same county Esquire and of the Reverend William Handcock now vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith, and with the consent of the Reverend Robert Handcock the incumbent of the same perpetual curacy and also with the consent of the Reverend John Hampden Snowden the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Saint Paul Hammersmith in the county and diocese aforesaid and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Hammersmith and with the consent of the Reverend William Allen Whitworth, the vicar or incumbent of the last-named vicarage (in testimony of which consents the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this representation the boundaries of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith shall be altered so that they shall include all that additional portion of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink and that from and after the day of the same date and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portion of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall thereupon be included in and shall become and be and form part of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Simon, Hammersmith.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with

the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the consolidated chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, being:—

"All that contiguous portion of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith in the county and diocese aforesaid wherein the present incumbent of such new parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded upon the north by the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith, upon the east by the new parish of Saint Matthew, Hammersmith in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south and upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Matthew Hammersmith from the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith aforesaid at the point on the northern side of Brook Green where Shepherd's Bush-road is joined by the road leading past the houses called or known as Albion-cottages to the houses called or known as Margaret-terrace and extending thence westward along the middle of the lastdescribed road for a distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts thereby passing along the northern side of the western portion of Brook Green aforesaid, to the point at the north-western angle of the said Green, where the said lastdescribed road is joined by the footway or passage which leads past the eastern and northern sides of the house called or known as Poplar House Laundry to the houses called or known as the Cottages and extending thence that is to say from the lastdescribed point at the north-western angle of Brook Green as aforesaid first northward and then generally westward along the middle of the last-described footway or passage for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its western end opposite to the house called or known as No. 7 the Cottages and continuing thence still westward and in a direct line for a distance of two and a half chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the line of the Hammersmith and City Railway and extending thence northward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of ten a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary opposite to the western end of the road called or known as Batoum-gardens which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith from the consolidated chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two, and of the Act of the thirtyfifth and thirty-sixth years of Your Majesty chapter fourteen have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Lleurwg situate at Hirwain in the parish of Aberdare in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Aberdare and of the parish of Penderyn in the county of Brecon and in the diocese of Saint Davids which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a dis-

tance from the several churches of such parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Aberdare and of the said parish of Penderyn should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Lleurwg

situate at Hirwain as aforesaid. "Now therefore with the consents of the Right Reverend Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff as such Bishop and of the Right Reverend William Basil, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Davids as such Bishop, and with the consents of the Most Honourable John Patrick Marquess of Bute, of the Reverend William Henry Cleaver now rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Pulham Saint Mary in the county of Norfolk and of the Reverend Lewis Jones the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Cadoxton-juxta-Neath in the said county of Glamorgan the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Aberdare, and with the consent of William Powell of Maes-dderwen, Hirwain aforesaid Esquire, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Penderyn (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Aberdare and of the

said parish of Penderyn which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Lleurwg situate at Hirwain as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Lleurwg Hirwain,' and that such consolidated chapelry should become and be and form part of the said diocese of Llandaff and should be included within and form part of the rural deanery known as Llandaff Upper Rural Deanery (Northern Division) and of the Archdeacony of Llandaff within the said lastly-named diocese.

"" We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Lleurwg

Hirwain, being :--

"All that portion of the parish of Aberdare in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff, wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls and also all that contiguous portion of the parish of Penderyn in the county of Brecon and in the diocese of Saint Davids which said portions of such parishes are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the western boundary of the new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare in the county of Glamorgan and diocese of Llandaff aforesaid which boundary divides the said new parish from the parish of Aberdare aforesaid at the point where the said western boundary crosses the north-eastern side of the line of the Aman Branch of the Great Western Railway at which point the road leading from Gamlyn into the high road from Aberdare to Neath strikes the said north-eastern side of the said line of railway and extending thence southwestward and in a direct line for a distance of twenty-three and a half chains or thereabouts to the milestone situate upon the south-western side of the said high road leading from Aberdare to Neath and indicating a distance of two miles from Aberdare and of seventeen and a half miles from Neath and continuing thence still south-westward and in a direct line for a distance of two miles and four chains or thereabouts (thereby passing a little to the south of the buildings called or known respectively as New Drift and as Graig Colliery and Brick Works) to the pile of stones situate at the point called or known as Bwich-y-Liadron upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Aberdare from the parish or parochial chapelry of Ystradyfodwg in the said county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff aforesaid and extending thence northward along the lastmentioned boundary for a distance of one mile and three-quarters or thereabouts thereby descending the northern slope of the hill called or known as Cynddau and following the course of the stream called or known as Nant-y-bwlch to the point where the same stream joins the River Cynon and where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the county and diocesan boundary which divides the said parish or parochial chapelry of Ystradyfodwg from the parish of Penderyn aforesaid and extending thence first north-westward and then northward along the last-described boundary for a distance of one quarter of a mile or thereabouts

thereby following the course of the River Cynon aforesaid to the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Vale of Neath section of the said Great Western Railway over the same river and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of one mile and a half or thereabouts to a point at the centre of the bridge which carries the same line of railway over the stream called or known as Nanthir upon the county and diocesan boundary which divides the said parish of Penderyn from the parish of Aberdare aforesaid and extending thence first southward then eastward and then again southward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts thereby following the course of the last-named stream to its junction with the River Cynon aforesaid and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of the said river for a distance of half a mile or thereabouts to the said western boundary of the new parish of Saint Fagan Aberdare aforesaid which boundary divides the said new parish from the parish of Aberdare aforesaid and extending thence south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to the firstdescribed point where the same boundary crosses the north-eastern side of the Aman Branch of the Great Western Railway aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff and by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Davids respectively.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Christ Church Fenton sometime part of the parish of Stoke-upon-Trent in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield and to be restored to the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent,
