Whitehall, May 31.

The following Address, signed by the Flag Officers, Captains, and other Officers of Their Majesties Fleet, was this day presented to the King, which His Majesty accepted very Graciously; and was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon Rear-Admiral Ralph Delaval, who, with several other Commanders, came up with it from the Downs.

May it please Your Majesties.

WE the Flag Officers, Captains, and other Officers of Your Majesties Navy, being now ready to enter upon Action for the Service of Your Majesties, and the Defence of our Country, do most Humbly beg leave to declare to GOD, Your Majesties, and to the whole World, That we do acknowledge Your Majesties to be the Undoubted Rightful King and Queen of England, and the Dominions thereto belonging: And we do hereby solemnly Renounce all Allegiance and Obedience to the late King James, and do faithfully promise, that we will, with our Lives, defend and assist Your Majesties against the said late King James, his Adherents, and all Your Enemies whatsoever. And we do therefore most humbly beseech Your Majesties, graciously to Accept of these Unfeigned Expressions of our Duty, with our fervent Prayers for Your Majesty's Safety and Success over all Your Enemies, which can alone create the Happiness of all Your Subjects, and in particular of us,

Dated on Board Your Majesties Most Dutiful, Their Majesties Ship Sandwich, in the Downs, May 30. 1690.

Cadiz, May 7: The 18th past arrived in this Bay Vice-Admiral Kitzbrow with the Resolution, the Bedford, the Greenwich, the Oxford, the Newcastle, the Tiger, the Portland, the Exeter, and the Unity Ketch; as also Vice-Admiral Allemond with the Gelderland, the Amsterdam, the Haerlem, the Unicorn, the Flamingo, and another Dutch Man of War, with a great Fleet of English and Dutch Merchant Ships. The 26th arrived Rear-Admiral Everet with two Dutch Men of War, more, and divers Merchant Ships. The 30th came in the Duke, the Montague and two other English frigates, from the Grapple; and on the 4th Instant, the Happy Return brought in a French Privateer belonging to St. Malo, of 36 Pieces of Cannon, and 200 Men: They had a sharp Fight, in which the French lost about 20 Men, and the English 4 or 5. It's said, the Privateer had on Board 30000 Pieces of Eight.

Madrid, May 16: The King went from hence the 25th past, attended by the Countable of Castile, the Duke de Pastrana, and others, of the first Quality; And on the 4th Instant, his Majesty met the

Queen at Valladolid, where the Marriage was celebrated the same day. The publick Rejoycings, Feasts, and other splendid and diverting Entertainments, prepared for this occasion, were continued till the 11th, when their Majesties parted from thence. On the 15th their Majesties arrived at the Pardo, within 2 Leagues of this place; and came this Evening to the Buen Retiro. On the 18th there is to be a Bull-Feast, and on the 20th the Queen will make her publick Entry. The Prince Palatine of Neubourg Great Master of the Teutonic Order, the Queen's Brother, took his Leave of her Majesty at St. Jago de Compostella, and went towards Lisbon, to visit the Queen of Portugal his Sister. We have advice, that the French have drawn together 10000 Foot and 2000 Horse on the Frontiers of Catalonia; upon which a supply of Money has been sent to the Duke de Villa Hermosa Viceroy of that Kingdom, with Orders to hasten into the Field with the Forces under his command, which will consist of 14000 Men. The last week was published an Order, by which, all persons are required to discover whatever French Goods they shall know to lye any where concealed; and the Magistrates are empowered to seize the same, and to take them away even out of Monasteries and Religious Houses.

Rome, May 13. Don Anronio Orrabon went on Tuesday last to Civita Vecchia, to see the Troops Embark, which are designed for the Assistance of the Venetians. The 11th arrived here an Express from Turin, with dispatches for the Resident of Savoy, who had the next day Audience of the Pope, whom he acquainted with the present State of Affairs on that side, and the Force the French threaten to make use of, to compel the Duke his Master to declare in favour of the Crown of France. The Imperial and Spanish Ministers do press the Pope to give, at the Emperor's Nomination, the first Cardinal's Hat that shall fall, which he has appointed a Congregation of Cardinals to consider of. The Cardinal Cenci lyes dangerously ill.

Venice, May 19. The Bassa of Erzeroum, who was lately taken Prisoner in Dalmatia, is ordered to be brought hither; he is about 72 years old, and in great Reputation with the Turks, having been engaged in many Actions with the Christians, and always successful till this last. We have the confirmation by the way of Oran, of the loss of two of our Ships, the St. Mark, and the St. Joseph. They being separated from the Fleet, met with 12 Turkish Men of War, commanded by Mezzomorte, and after a Fight of 2 hours, the St. Mark was blown up; The other continued notwithstanding to defend her self, but at last being quite disabled, and Captain Alexander Talier with most of the Men killed, the few that were left alive yielded; but the Ship was so shattered, that the Turks sunk her, after having taken out the Men.

Milan, May 17. On Saturday last there were found posted up in several places of this City, certain Papers or Tickets, summoning the People of this Duchy to send to Casal by the 25th Instant, to agree with Monsieur Catinat about Contributions, and threatening them if they do not with Military Execution. Our Governor in the mean time has very well provided all our Frontier Garrisons, and will have very speedily a good Army in the Field. It's said, the French demand passage through the State of Genoa, which very much Embarrasses that Republick.

Vienna, May 21. The last week a great Council of War was held in the Emperor's Presence at Luxemburg, to order Matters for the ensuing Campaign. General Caprara is on his departure for Germany, to command the Imperial Army on the Rhine. Yesterday Prince Louis of Baden accepted of the Command of the Imperial Forces in Bulgaria, which he had till then declined; and the

Comtes de Veterani, Aspermont, and Transmandorf, are to serve under him as Lieutenant-Generals. The last Letters from Nissa tell us, the Turks continued to draw together about Nicopolis.

Frankfort, May 31. The Advices from the Palatinate say, that the French Army was Encamped between Eys and Brem, about an hour's march from Worms, waiting the Forage, and destroying the Country round; but that they are not above 18000 strong, and had only with them 8 Pieces of Cannon. The Imperial Forces are drawing together at Eppingen, where there are already Encamped about 22000 Men; and General Dunewalt is himself advanced with a strong Detachment towards Heidelberg, to cover that City against any design the Enemy may have upon it. And we are told, that the Elector of Bavaria is expected there the 4th of the next Month.

Glogne, June 2. The Confederate Forces on this side are now all in motion; and the Elector of Brandenburg is very shortly expected at the Head of his Army. We hear from the Upper Rhine, that the French lay about Wormes, from whence they sent out their Parties to burn and ruin the Country; and that the Imperial Forces were Encamped between Eppingen and Smitzhelm.

Hamburg, June 2. The Forces of the Elector of Saxony are marching with all the diligence they can towards the Rhine, and we are assured, that his Electoral Highness will command them in Person. They write from Coumberg, that the Elector of Brandenburg received the 24th past the Homage of the States of Prussia, and that he would part from thence the 29th for Berlin.

Brussels, June 4. The French Army, commanded by the Duke of Luxembourg, is still Encamped between Deyse and Courtray; and our Governor-General continues with his Forces near Ghent to observe them. The Marquis de Pouffiers, who was with a Flying Camp on the Meuse, is marched with part of those Troops, if not all, towards the Meuse. The Dutch Army, under the command of Prince Waldeck, moves likewise towards that River; and the Troops of Liege draw towards Dinant, which makes us think, there is a design upon that place. There are several Letters that give an account, that the Dauphin is gone back to Paris, being, as is said, sent for by the King, but for what reason, is not known. The French Lieutenant-General Calvo dyed on the 30th past in the Camp at Deyse, where his loss is much lamented, being an Officer of great Experience. Prince Waldeck was yesterday at Wavren; he will have under his Command an Army of above 40000 Effective Men.

Hague, June 6. The States of Holland meet again to-morrow. The Forces of Saxony are on their march towards the Rhine. And the Elector of Brandenburg, who is now on his return from Prussia, will, by the middle of this Month, be at the head of a powerful Army on the Meuse. In Flanders, the Spanish and French Armies continue very near each other; And that of this State was, according to our last advice, advanced to Wavren. The Letters from Brussels speak of the Dauphin's sudden return from Germany; Which those from Paris of the 2d Instant, do not make any mention of. But they continue to tell us, that the Duke of Savoy had been forced to submit to the French Demands, and to sign the Treaty proposed by Monsieur Catina; though there are Letters by the way of Switzerland, of the 24th past from Milan, and of the 23d from Turin, which say, that Duke had not then complied with the French.

Lisburne, May 21. Since the taking of the Castle of Bedingarry, the Enemy have quitted and burnt three other Castles on that side. We hear likewise, that they are preparing to leave Dundalk, Ardee, Castle-Blaney, and Carrickmacross. One of our Parties, of 80 Horse and Dragons, went 2 or 3 days ago within a mile of Fintona, and took 5 Prisoners, with 80 Horses, and several hundred Head of Cattle. The Enemy came out with 100 Horse, but having just showed themselves, returned again, and our Men marched quietly away with their Booty.

Falmouth, May 25. Their Majesties Ship the Greyhound put to Sea this morning. On Friday last there was seen off the Island a great Whale, judged to be about 100 Foot in length, with another Fish following him, supposed to be the Sword-Fish; they were so near the shore, that several Guns were fired at them.

Plimouth, May 27. Yesterday came in here the Greyhound Brigat from Bristol, and two Coasting Vessels from Falmouth.

Chesler, May 28. The Dragons for Recruits, with the Wagons and stores that went hence on Monday last to Hagabake, are doubtless by this time near their Port in Ireland, the Wind having been latterly there 4 days.

Warrington, May 30. His Majesty has been pleased to continue Richard a Poole Esq. Sir Richard Reeves Kt. and Robert Robinson Esq. Commissioners of the Great Seal of Ireland; as also Commissioners of Oyer and Terminer,

and General Goal Delivery, within the said Kingdom of Ireland.

Whitehall, May 29. The Sieur Smettau Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, had this day his Audience of Leave of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Denmark, conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, May 31. The Baron de Bongars Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector Palatine, had the 25th past Audience of Leave of Their Majesties; the 30th of the Queen Dowager; and this day of the Prince and Princess of Denmark; conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, June 1. This day the Baron de Schutz Envoy Extraordinary from the Dukes of Brunswick and Lunenburg, had his Audience of Leave of the King and Queen, conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Master of the Ceremonies.
