Her Majesty's Most Gracious Speech, delivered by the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Saturday, September 25, 1886.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I AM glad to be able to release you from your arduous duties.

My relations with Foreign Powers continue to be friendly.

The mutiny of a portion of the Bulgarian army has led to the abdication of Prince Alexander. A Regency has been established, which is now administering the affairs of the Principality, and preparations are being made for the election of his successor, in accordance with the provisions of the Treaty of Berlin.

In answer to a communication addressed by the Porte to the Signatory Powers, parties to that Treaty, I have stated that, so far as this country is concerned, there will be no infraction of the conditions guaranteed by Treaties to Bulgaria. Assurances to the same effect have been given by other Powers.

The demarcation of the Afghan frontier has advanced to within a few miles of the Oxus. In view of the approach of winter, my Commission has been withdrawn; but the information which they have obtained will be sufficient for the determination, by direct negotiation between the two Courts, of the portion of frontier which still remains unmarked.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I thank you for the supplies which you have voted for the requirements of the public service.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I have directed the issue of a Commission to inquire into the circumstances which appear to have prevented the anticipated operation of recent Acts dealing with the tenure and purchase of land in Ireland.

I have observed with much satisfaction the interest which in an increasing degree is evinced by the people of this country in the welfare of their Colonial and Indian fellow-subjects; and I am led to the conviction that there is on all sides a growing desire to draw closer in every practicable way the bonds which unite the various portions of the Empire. I have authorized communications to be entered into with the principal Colonial Governments with a view to the fuller consideration of matters of common interest. I pray that the blessing of Almighty God may be with you.

Then a Commission for proroguing the Parliament was read; after which the Lord Chancellor said:

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Law relating to International Copyright," and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to carry into effect a Convention with France on the subject of Copyright. to extend and explain the International Copyright Acts, and to explain the Acts relating to Copyright in Engravings," doth order and it is hereby ordered that from and after the twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, the authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of any of the following works, that is to say, books, dramatic works, musical compositions, drawings, paintings, sculpture, engravings, lithographs, and any other works of literature and the fine arts, in which the laws of Great Britain give to British subjects the privilege of Copyright, and the executors, administrators, and assigns of such authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers, respectively, shall as respects works first published within the said parts of the German Empire after the said twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, have the privilege of Copyright therein for a period equal to the term of Copyright which authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of the like works, respectively, first published in the United Kingdom are by law entitled to, provided such books, dramatic works, musical compositions, drawings, paintings, sculpture, engravings, lithographs, or other works of literature or the fine arts shall have been registered and copies thereof shall have been delivered according to the requirements of the said recited Acts within twelve months after the first publication thereof in any part of the said parts of the German Empire.

And it is hereby further ordered that the authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions which shall after the day aforesaid be first publicly represented or performed within such parts of the German Empire, or their executors, administrators, or assigns, shall have the sole liberty of representing or performing in any part of the British Dominions such dramatic pieces or musical compositions during a period equal to the period during which authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions first publicly represented or performed in the United Kingdom are entitled by law to the sole liberty of representing or performing the same, provided such dramatic pieces or musical compositions have been registered and copies thereof have been delivered according to the requirements of the said first recited Act within twelve months after the time of their being first represented or performed in any part of such portions of the German Empire.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, and by virtue of the authority of the said secondly hereinbefore recited Act, doth hereby order that the authors of any works published or of any dramatic pieces first publicly represented in such portions of the German Empire at any time after the day next after the twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, who may choose to reserve the right of translating such works or dramatic pieces, their executors, administrators, and assigns, shall, until the expiration of five years from the date of the first publication of the translations authorized by them, respectively, of such works, or from the time at which the translations authorized by them of such dramatic pieces are first published or publicly represented, be entitled, subject to the provisions specified in the said last-mentioned Act, to prevent the publication in the British Dominions of any translation of such works or dramatic pieces, and the representation therein of any translation of such dramatic pieces not so respectively authorized by them.

And the the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary C. L. Peel. directions herein accordingly.

(a.) That notwithstanding anything contained in the aforesaid Orders in Council, a certificate as set forth therein shall not be required to authorize the keeping in any store, registered premises or for private use of Schultze gunpowder, E. C. sporting powder, E. C. rifle powder or other the whole or part of any such county (including I nitro-compound adapted and intended exclusively for use in cartridges for small arms only, and otherwise designated small arm nitro-compound, or of cartridges exclusively for small arms made with such small arm nitro-compound.

(b.) That this Order shall be construed in like manner to the aforesaid Orders as if it were part of the Act; and that it shall come into operation immediately on its publication in the London Gazette, provided always, that it shall not affect rights, obligations, or liabilities acquired or incurred previously to such publication.

THEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it is provided that in the case of any harbour, river, or other inland navigation, for which rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried by vessels navigating the waters of any harbour, river, or other inland navigation, or concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by such vessels, are not and cannot be made by or under the authority of any Local Act, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, upon application from the harbour trust or body corporate, if any, owning or exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of such harbour, river, or inland navigation, or if there is no such harbour trust or body corporate, upon application from persons interested in the navigation of such waters, to make rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels navigating such waters; and such rules, when so made, shall, so far as regards vessels navigating such waters, have the same effect as if they were regulations contained in Table (C) in the schedule to the said Act, notwithstanding anything in the said Act or in the schedule thereto contained :

And whereas by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1876, it is provided that where Her Majesty has power under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, or any Act passed or thereafter to be passed amending the same, to make an Order in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time to make such Order in Council, and by Order in Council to revoke, alter, or add to any Order so made:

And whereas the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots, seamen of the Trinity House in Kingston-upon-Hull, being the body corporate owning and exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of the Rivers Humber, Ouse, and Trent, applied to Her Majesty in Council to make certain rules, which they submitted for approval. concerning the lights and signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels (except river craft under ten tons measurement) navigating such waters. And Her Majesty by Order in Council, dated the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, was pleased thereby to make the said rules, which were set forth in the schedule thereto, and thereby to direct that the same should come into operation on the first day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two:

And whereas the said Corporation have applied to Her Majesty in Council to alter the said Order in Council by the substitution for the said rules set forth in the schedule thereto of certain

annexed rules which they have submitted for approval, concerning the lights and signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels (except river craft under ten tons measurement) navigating such waters :

RULES made by the Corporation of the Guild or Brotherhood of Masters and Pilots, Seamen of the Trinity House, in Kingston - upon - Hull, concerning the lights to be carried by vessels (except river craft under ten tons measurement) navigating the River Humber, and the Rivers Ouse and Trent, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by Vessels navigating such waters.

I. All vessels, as well sailing vessels as steamers (except dumb-craft), while navigating, or anchored, or moored in the River Humber, or in any part of the River Ouse, below the North Eastern Railway Bridge crossing the River Ouse at or near Hook, or in any part of the River Trent, at or below Gainsborough, shall observe and obey the "Regu-lations for Preventing Collisions at Sea," set out in the first schedule, annexed to an Order in Council made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, and dated the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, and as varied and amended by an Order in Council, made as aforesaid, and dated the twenty-sixth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, with the exceptions and additions made in the following rules.

II. All vessels, as aforesaid, when at anchor in the River Humber, or in any part of the River Ouse, below the North Eastern Railway Bridge crossing the River Ouse at or near Hook, or in any part of the River Trent, at or below Gainsborough, shall, between sunset and sunrise, instead of the light prescribed by Article eight of the said regulations, exhibit from the fore-stay, or otherwise near the bow of the vessel, where it can best be seen, a white light in a globular lantern of eight inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light, visible all round the horizon, at a distance of at least one mile; and in addition thereto, all vessels having two or more masts shall exhibit another white light, at double the height of the bow light, at the main or mizen peak, or the boom-topping lift, or other position near the stern, where it can best be seen.

III. Dumb-craft shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit in the fore-part of the craft a white light behind an opal frosted or ground colourless glass shade, and distinctly visible on all sides, not less in height above deck or above any cargo or other obstruction on the deck :

When at anchor, than five feet;
 When being towed, than three feet; and

the sternmost of the craft towed shall also exhibit a white light at the stern.

IV. Any vessel which from unavoidable circumstances may be compelled to anchor in the fairway of the river shall, with as little delay as may be, remove to a proper roadstead or otherwise proceed on her course.

V. In interpreting these rules, the term dumbcraft shall include canal boats, mud barges, and other barges, lighters, vessels without masts, and vessels without either deck or mast, sloops and keels with their masts lowered, and rafts.
