WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to the eleventh day of November instant, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Proclamation, and publish and declare that the said Parliament be further prorogued to Thursday, the ninth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it is enacted that in the case of any harbour, river or other inland navigation for which rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried by vessels navigating the waters thereof, or concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by such ve-sels, are not and cannot be made by or under the authority of any Local Act, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, upon application from the harbour trust or body corporate, if any, owning or exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of such harbour, river or inland navigation, or if there is no such harbour trust or body corporate, upon application from persons interested in the navigation of such waters, to make rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels navigating such waters, and that such rules when so made shall, so far as regards vessels navigating such waters, have the same effect as if they were regulations contained in Table (C) in the schedule to the said Act, notwithstanding anything in the said Act or in the schedule thereto contained:

And whereas no rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried by vessels navigating the waters of the Port and Harbour of Waterford are or can be made by or under the authority of any Local Act:

And whereas the Commissioners for the improvement of the said Port and Harbour of Waterford are persons interested in the naviga-

tion of the waters of the said Port and Harbour, and have made application for Her Majesty in Council to make certain rules and bye-laws hereinafter set forth concerning the lights and signals to be carried by vessels (river craft) navigating the Port and Harbour of Waterford, viz.:—

All the space commonly called the River Suir, being within the flux and reflux of the tide, within the following limits, that is to say, from Granagh Castle to the Hook Lighthouse, including all the space between the junction of the Ross river with the said River Suir and the said Hook Lighthouse, and from Bilberry Rock to Swiny Head in the county of Waterford, including Saint Katherine's commonly called Saint John's Pill.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to make the rules contained in the schedule hereto concerning the lights and signals to be carried by vessels (river craft), navigating the waters of the port and harbour of Waterford as aforesaid, and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that the said rules shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

SCHEDULE.

RULES concerning the Lights and Signals to be carried by Vessels (river craft) navigating the waters of the Port and Harbour of Waterford, viz. :-All the space commonly called the River Suir, being within the flux and reflux of the tide, within the following limits, that is to say, from Granagh Castle to the Hook Lighthouse, including all the space between the junction of the Ross River with the said River Suir and the said Hook Lighthouse, and from Bilberry Rock to Swiny Head, in the county of Waterford, including Saint Katherine's, commonly called Saint John's Pill.

1. All barges, lighters, and other river craft on the River Suir below Granagh Castle or elsewhere within the limits of the Port and Harbour of Waterford shall, between sunset and sunrise, whether at anchor or under way, exhibit in the bows or on the mast an all round white light of sufficient power to be distinctly visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere at a distance of at

least one mile.

2. The person in charge of every lighter, barge, or other river craft under way, and showing the white light, shall dip said light repeatedly on the approach of any vessel or steamer in sufficient time to prevent a collision.

3. All steam tugs and steam barges, and all seagoing vessels, shall carry and exhibit between sunset and sunrise within the limits of the Port and Harbour of Waterford the lights required by the regulations for preventing collisions at sea.

4. The owner or person in charge of any barge or lighter failing in any respect to comply with, or in any way infringing the foregoing regulations, shall be liable to a penalty of and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding £5 for each offence, which penalties shall be recovered, enforced, and applied according to the provisions of the Waterford Harbour Act, 9 and 10 Victoria, cap. 292.

THE following Statute, passed on the 14th

the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:

A STATUTE to amend a Statute, made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict., c. 48), and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, in relation to Oriel College, in the University of Oxford, duly made at a General Meeting of the Provost and Fellows of the said College specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 14th day of October, 1886, and passed at such meeting by the votes of two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, and submitted to Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

Whereas by Statute IV, 11, made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, and approved by the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, in relation to Oriel College, in the University of Oxford, it was enacted as follow:-

"11. The Exhibitions on the foundation of Bishop Robinson shall be two in number, and " shall be tenable for two years. Each Exhibi-" tioner shall receive annually half the net income " of Bishop Robinson's benefaction, together with " such a sum from the Corporate Revenues as will " make up £100 at least. These Exhibitions shall " be open to all Bachelors of Arts of the University " who shall not have exceeded the twenty-seventh " Term from their matriculation. These Exhibi-" tioners shall be elected by the Provost and Fellows, after an examination in such subjects and con-"ducted in such manner as the electors shall deem "best adapted to encourage mature study and " research.

" Bishop Robinson's Exhibitioners shall be or " become members of the College, and shall pursue " the study of some branch of learning, either in "the University or in some place approved of by the Provost and Fellows as being better suited " for the pursuit of a particular branch of learning. They shall have the same privileges in respect of " dining at the High Table as are enjoyed by Mem-" bers of the College who are Masters of Arts."

And by Statute XIV, 4, made as above, it was

further enacted as follows :-

" 4. The provisions of these Statutes with respect " to the Exhibitions of Bishop Robinson shall come " into effect at such time as the Provost and Fellows " shall by Bylaw determine. Until that time the "regulations in force before the making of these " Statutes shall continue to be observed."

And whereas the Provost and Fellows are of opinion that in the existing circumstances of the College it is expedient to apply the Robinson Fund to the establishment of additional Scholarships of the same nature and conditions as those already existing in the College rather than to the immediate creation of such Exhibitions as by the clause hereinbefore set forth are directed to be created.

We, the said Provost and Fellows of the said College, being the Governing Body thereof, do hereby, in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th section of the said Act, alter Statute XIV, 4, and by adding thereto after the words "to be observed," the following words:—

"Provided nevertheless that it shall be lawful " for the Provost and Fellows from time to time, " if they shall think fit so to do, to apply the income day of October, 1886, by the Governing "of the benefaction of Bishop Robinson to the Body of Oricl College, Oxford, and sealed on the 27th day of October, 1886, has been submitted for "the same conditious and in all respects as those " of the Scholarships directed to be established " under Statute IV, clause 12.

HEREAS the Governing Body of Charterhouse School, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by "The Public Schools Act, 1868," did, on the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eightysix, make an amendment of Statute V of the existing Statutes of the School:

And whereas the said amendment has this day been laid before Her Majesty in Council, the same is published in the London Gazette in pursuance

of the said Act:

And notice is hereby given, that it is lawful for the bodies or persons authorized so to do in that Act, within two months from the date of the publication of this notification, to petition Her Majesty in Council to withhold Her approval from the whole or any part of such amendment.

Amendment of Statute V (as made by the Governing Body of Charterhouse School under the provisions of "The Public Schools Act, 1868") submitted by the said Governing Body for the approval of Her Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Public Schools Act, 1868," section 11, the Governing Body of any School to which that Act applies is empowered from time to time to repeal or alter any Statute made in exercise of the powers of that Act, subject to certain conditions and restrictions therein specified.

And whereas by Statute V for the Government of Charterhouse School it is provided that-

Admission to Senior Scholarships shall be determined by competitive examination, to be conducted as the Governing Body shall from time to time direct, and such Scholarships shall be open to all Boys who shall have been at the School at least twelve months previous to the commencement of the examination, and who shall be between the ages of fourteen and sixteen years.

And whereas on the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, it was resolved by the Governing Body of the said School that it was expedient to alter the

form and effect of the said Statute.

Now, therefore, we, the Governing Body of Charterhouse School aforesaid, do hereby alter the form and effect of the said Statute.

The said Statute, as proposed to be amended,

will be in the terms following :-

Admission to Senior Scholarships shall be determined by competitive examination, to be conducted as the Governing Body shall from time to time direct, and such Scholarships shall be open to all Boys who shall have been at the School at least twelve months previous to the commencement of the Examination, and who on the 15th day of July in the year of election shall be not less than fourteen nor more than sixteen years old.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of the accompanying Notice, extracted from the Russian Official Gazette, announcing the modification which has now been made in the Russian Customs Regulations respecting bags imported temporarily for the purpose of being filled with grain for export from Russia.

THE Russian Official Gazette of October 8-20. 1886, contains the following Notification:

The Committee of Ministers having taken into consideration a Minute of the Acting Minister of Finances, respecting the exemption from certain Customs' formalities of grain bags brought by sea from abroad for the purpose of being filled with grain destined for exportation, determined on the adoption of the following temporary measure :-

I. On the importation of foreign bags destined to be filled with grain or flour on board the same vessel which has imported them, the shipmaster shall, in his report, declare the purpose for which they have been brought, and specify the number and weight of the bags. This Declaration shall be as binding on the shipmaster as that required by the General Customs Regulations respecting foreign goods imported and re-exported by vessels, and for all errors in the Declaration the shipmaster shall be responsible in the same way as for inaccuracies contained in his Declaration of goods on board.

II. The bags so declared shall, until the ship is ready for loading, be left on board under leaden Customs' seals, for the integrity of which the shipmaster shall be responsible according to general law. When ready to put grain into the bags, the shipmaster shall give notice of such readiness to the Custom House, so as to enable it to issue timely orders for the gradual removal of the leaden seals, as necessity for the bags may arise, and for watching that the bags liberated from the seals be not taken away from the ship while she is being laden.

III. Detailed rules for the exercise of due

control by the Custom House over the bags specified in points 1 and 2 shall be established by the Minister of Finance in preliminary agreement with the Controller of the Empire.

eight miles an hour.

3. A car shall not be driven or drawn at a rate of speed greater than a walking pace along the portion of the tramway which crosses Duke-street and High-street between King-street and King'sroad, or along the portion of the tramway between Oxford-road and Broad-street.

4. The driver of every car shall so drive the same that it shall not follow a preceding car at a less distance than eighty yards along any portion

of the tramway, sidings excepted.

5. No more than one car shall be standing or remain at or near the eastern terminus of the tramway for a longer space than three minutes at any one time.

6. Except for the purpose of taking up passengers, no car shall stand or remain on the part of the tramway which passes over the bridge in King's-road, Reading, known as the Crown Bridge, or on any part of the tramway within fifty feet of the crown of that bridge.

7. Two cars shall not at one and the same time stand on any part of the trumway which passes over the bridge in King's-road, Reading, known as the Factory Bridge, or on any part of the tramway within fifty feet of the crown or
