The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the twenty-second day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas it is provided by the Queen's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions that Age Pensions from the funds of Greenwich Hospital may be granted to Naval Pensioners of the Seamen Pensioner Reserve Force who have completed six periods of fourteen days' drill, one period annually; and whereas cases have occurred in which two periods of fourteen days each drill in the same year have been sanctioned under special circumstances.

"We do humbly submit that Your Majesty will approve the award of such Age Pensions in those cases in which the said two periods of drill in any one year may have been performed prior to the twenty-second October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping (Colonial) Act, 1869," it is (among other thing-) enacted, that where the Legislature of any British Possession provides for the examination of, and grant of Certificates of Competency to, persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers on board British ships, and the Board of Trade reports to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualification and competency as those granted under the said Acts, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons, and in the like manner, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council :—

1. To declare that the said certificates shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts.
2. To declare that all or any of the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates of Competency granted under those Acts shall apply to the certificates referred to in the said Order.
3. To impose such conditions and to make such regulations with respect to the said certificates, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof, as to Her Majesty may seem fit, and to impose penalties not exceeding fifty pounds for the breach of such conditions and regulations.

And that upon the publication in the *London Gazette* of any such Order in Council as last aforesaid, the provisions therein contained shall, from a date to be mentioned for the purpose in such Order, take effect as if they had been contained in the Act, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to revoke any Order made as aforesaid.

And whereas by the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1876, it is provided that Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, revoke, alter, or add to any Order in Council made by Her under the said Acts :

And whereas by Order in Council dated the twenty-ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, Her Majesty has been pleased to declare that (subject to certain conditions and regulations therein contained) the Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the duly constituted authorities in the British possessions of Bengal, Bombay, Malta, New South Wales, New Zealand, Queensland, South Australia, Tasmania, and Victoria, to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, and Engineers, of British ships, and by the Governor of Newfoundland and the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in the possession of Canada, to persons intending to act as Masters or Mates on board British sea-going ships shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts relating to Merchant Shipping :

And whereas the Legislature of the British Possession of Canada has by "The Steamboat Inspection Act, 1882," and by "An Act further to amend the Steamboat Inspection Act, 1882," further provided for the examination by the Board of Steamboat Inspection in the said possession of persons intending to act as First Class Engineers and Second Class Engineers on board

British ships, and for the grant to such persons by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in the said possession of Certificates of Competency as First Class Engineers and Second Class Engineers for sea-going British ships, which certificates are hereinafter also denominated Colonial Certificates of Competency, and the Board of Trade have reported to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the said examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualifications and competency as those granted under the said Acts to First and Second Class Engineers, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons, and in the like manner :

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that it is expedient that the said recited Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, should be altered by the revocation of the conditions and regulations set out in the schedule thereto, and the substitution therefor of the conditions and regulations set out in the schedule hereto :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the first recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased—

1. To declare that the said Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in the Possession of Canada on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, to persons intending to act as First Class Engineers and Second Class Engineers of sea-going British ships shall be of the same force as if they had been Certificates of Competency granted under the said Acts to First or Second Class Engineers.

2. To declare that all the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates of Competency for the Foreign Trade granted under those Acts, except so much of the one hundred and thirty-ninth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and the tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," as requires the delivery by the Board of Trade to any master, mate, or engineer of a copy of any certificate to which he appears to be entitled as therein mentioned, so much of the third paragraph of the twenty-third section of the said last-mentioned Act as requires at the conclusion of a case relating to the cancelling or suspending of a certificate, such certificate, if cancelled or suspended, to be forwarded to the Board of Trade, and the whole of the provisions of the fourth paragraph of the same section shall apply to such Colonial Certificates of Competency.

3. To impose and make the conditions and regulations set out in the schedule hereto, numbered 1 to 10 respectively, with respect to the said Colonial Certificates of Competency, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof, and to impose for the breach of such conditions and regulations the penalties therein mentioned.

4. To revoke the conditions and regulations numbered 1 to 10 respectively, set out in the schedule to the Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and to substitute therefor the conditions and regulations set out in the schedule hereto, numbered 1 to 10 respectively, and to declare that from and after the date hereof, the conditions and regulations set out in the schedule

hereto, shall apply to all Colonial Certificates that may have been or shall be hereafter granted under the said Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, or that may have been granted under any of the Orders in Council revoked by the said last-recited Order, as though they had been imposed and made by the said Orders.

SCHEDULE.

Conditions and Regulations with respect to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension of Colonial Certificates of Competency.

Interpretation Clause.

In the construction and for the purposes of these conditions and regulations, the following terms shall have the respective meanings hereinafter assigned to them, that is to say:—

“*Colonial Certificate of Competency*” shall mean a certificate of Competency authorized to be granted by the Legislative authority of a British Possession to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers of British ships on similar principles and conditions as those granted under the Imperial Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

“*Authority*” shall mean the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Administrator, Head of the Government, Minister, Board, Body, or Corporation of or in any British Possession for the time being authorized by the Legislature of such Possession to grant Colonial Certificates of Competency.

CONDITIONS AND REGULATIONS.

Form of Certificate.

1. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be on parchment, and as nearly as possible similar in shape and form to the corresponding Certificate of Competency for the Foreign Trade granted by the Board of Trade under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

Name of Possession to be inserted.

2. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall have the name of the British possession in which the same is granted, inserted prominently on its face and back.

Certificates to be numbered consecutively.

3. The Colonial Certificates of Competency granted in each British Possession shall be numbered in consecutive order.

Lists of Certificates granted, cancelled, &c., to be sent to Registrar-General of Seamen.

4. The Authority in each British possession shall furnish the Registrar-General of Seamen in London, from time to time, with accurate lists of all such Colonial Certificates of Competency as may be granted therein or as may for any cause whatsoever be cancelled, suspended, renewed, or re-issued; and shall also furnish him with duplicates of the applications for examination made by the persons to whom such Certificates are granted.

Certificates to be granted only upon proof of service at sea.

5. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be granted only upon proof that the previous service at sea of the person applying for the same has been such as is required by the regulations for the time being in force in the United Kingdom with respect to certificates of the like grade.

Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation, or upon any false, incorrect or insufficient proof, certificate, or report of service,

qualification, conduct, or character shall be regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates not to be granted when former are cancelled.

6. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall not be granted to any person who may have had a certificate, whether granted by the Board of Trade or by the Government of a British possession, cancelled or suspended under the provisions of the said Acts or of any Act for the time being in force in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, unless the period of suspension has expired, or unless intimation has been received from the Board of Trade, or the authority by whom the cancelled or suspended certificate was originally granted, to the effect that no objection to the grant of such Colonial Certificate is known to exist, or unless a new certificate has been granted to him by such board or authority; and in the last-named event no such Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be for a higher grade than the certificate so last granted as aforesaid.

Colonial Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates improperly granted may be cancelled without formal investigation.

7. A Colonial Certificate of Competency which appears from information subsequently acquired, or otherwise, to have been improperly granted, whether in the above or in any other respect, may be cancelled by the authority by which the same was granted, or by the Board of Trade in the United Kingdom, without any formal investigation under “The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854,” and the holder of such certificate shall thereupon deliver it to the Board of Trade or such authority or as they or either of them may direct, and in default thereof shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping are thereby made recoverable.

Cancellation, &c., of a Certificate shall involve cancellation of all the other Certificates possessed by its Owner.

8. Every decision with respect to the cancellation or suspension of a certificate pronounced by any board, court, or tribunal under the provisions of the said Acts, shall extend equally to all the Colonial Certificates at the time possessed by the person in respect of whom the decision is made, as well as to all certificates granted to him under any of the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and whether such certificates be specified in such decisions or not.

Certificates believed to be fraudulent may be demanded.

9. Any officer of the Board of Trade, or the Registrar-General of Seamen, or any of his officers, or a superintendent of a mercantile marine office, or a consular officer, or duly appointed shipping officer in a British possession, may demand the delivery to him of any Colonial Certificate of Competency which he has reason to believe has been improperly issued, or is forged, altered, cancelled, or suspended, or to which the person using it is not justly entitled, and may detain such certificate for a reasonable period for the purpose of making inquiries respecting such issue, forgery, alteration, cancellation, suspension or possession, and any person who, without reasonable cause, neglects or refuses to comply with such demand shall incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or its equivalent in local currency, which shall be

recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping are thereby made recoverable.

Suspended Certificates to be re-issued only by Colony by which originally granted.

10. A Colonial Certificate of Competency which has from any cause been cancelled or suspended, shall be renewed or re-issued only by the Authority by which the same was originally granted.

WHEREAS by the three hundred and thirty-third section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for every Pilotage authority, by Bye-laws made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to do within its district all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section :

And whereas the Belfast Harbour Commissioners, being the Pilotage authority for the Port and Harbour of Belfast within the meaning of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," in exercise of the powers vested in them by that Act have made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain Bye-laws and Regulations :

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that it is desirable that the proposed Byelaws and Regulations should come into force for a limited period only :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of and signify Her consent to the said Bye-laws and Regulations, as set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, from and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, until the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

After the aforesaid thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, the Bye-laws and Regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, shall cease to be in force unless they are hereafter approved by Her Majesty.

SCHEDULE.

BYE-LAWS for the Regulation and Management of the Pilotage, Pilots and Pilot Boat, and of Masters and Mates of Vessels holding Pilotage Certificates, for the Port and Harbour of Belfast.

1. In the construction of these Bye-laws the expression "the Commissioners" shall mean the Belfast Harbour Commissioners; the word "Secretary" shall mean the Secretary for the time being of the Commissioners.

2. The Pilotage Department shall be under the general supervision of the Pilotage Superintendent, who shall perform such duties as shall from time to time be prescribed by the Commissioners.

3. Licensed Pilots shall be divided into three classes, viz. :—

Pilots of the first class, who may pilot vessels of any Tonnage and any Draught of water.

Pilots of the second class, who shall be confined to the piloting of vessels not exceeding eight hundred Tons net Register

Masters and Mates of Vessels holding Pilotage Certificates granted under the three hundred and fortieth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and who shall be confined to piloting the vessels specified on their Certificates.

4. Every Candidate for a Pilotage License must produce to the Secretary of the Commissioners the undernoted Certificates, viz. :—

A satisfactory Certificate that he has passed the Board of Trade Examination as Mate, or that he has complied with such conditions as to apprenticeship in the Pilot Service and other matters as the Commissioners may prescribe.

A Board of Trade Certificate as to his ability to distinguish colours.

A satisfactory Certificate of his sobriety and good conduct.

A Certificate that he has passed satisfactorily an Examination in the following subjects before the Pilotage Superintendent, or other Examiner or Examiners appointed by the Commissioners for that purpose, viz. : The course and distances between the Copeland Islands and Belfast, the rise and set of the tide, the depth and character of soundings, the best anchorages, the sand banks, mud banks, rocks, shores, and other dangers, and the landmarks, buoys, beacons, and lights, as well as the Docks and Basins within the above district. The variation and deviation of the compass and the application thereof. The use of charts. The management of vessels both steam and sailing, how to bring them to anchor and to keep them clear of their anchors in a tideway, to moor, unmoor, and get under weigh, and how to handle a vessel under any circumstances.

5. No person shall receive a License to act as a First Class Pilot until he shall have passed a further Examination on the subjects mentioned in the last preceding clause as regards the North Channel generally.

6. Every License granted by the Commissioners shall expire on the first day of the month of August which shall first happen after the granting thereof.

7. The following charges shall be paid to the Commissioners on the granting and renewing of Pilotage Licenses and Pilotage Certificates, viz. :—

For an outsea Pilotage License, (Pilotage not compulsory), the sum of ... £0 10 0

For a Pilotage License, or Pilotage Certificate, the sum of ... 5 0 0

8. Any Pilot losing his License shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Pilotage Superintendent, stating the circumstances under which the License was lost, and the Secretary of the Commissioners may, if he shall think proper to do so at once issue to such Pilot a Duplicate License, in a form to be approved by the Commissioners.

9. For a Duplicate License, or for a Certificate issued to Masters and Mates on change of service, a charge of one pound shall be paid to the Commissioners.

10. The Master in charge of the Pilot Boat may in cases of necessity direct a Pilot to pilot a vessel exceeding in tonnage that sanctioned by his License. In every such case the Master shall forthwith report the case in writing to the Pilotage Superintendent, and shall state in such Report the reasons which made such action necessary, and the Pilot shall, if an opportunity of doing so occurs whilst he is in charge of the vessel, give

up the charge thereof to a Pilot qualified by his License to pilot the vessel, and shall as soon as possible return to the Pilot Boat.

11. The Commissioners shall have power at their discretion to recall, declare void, or suspend Licenses, and they shall also have power when any License shall have been recalled, declared to be void, or suspended, to grant to the person who held such License, for such time, and on such terms as they may think proper, a License of a lower class than that formerly held by such person; and also after such time, and on such terms as they may think proper, to renew to such person the License, recalled, suspended, or declared to be void.

12. The number of Apprentices attached to the Pilot Boat shall not exceed three.

13. Every Pilot Master, Pilot, and Apprentice shall perform such duties, and observe and carry out, such regulations as shall from time to time be prescribed by the Commissioners.

14. A Pilot or Apprentice shall not without the consent of the Commissioners demand or receive in respect of any services rendered by him whilst on board any vessel, any payment in excess of the amount which he shall, under the regulations for the time being in force, be entitled to receive in respect thereof.

15. In every case in which a Pilot, at the request of the Master or person in charge of any outward bound vessel, shall take such vessel beyond the limit of compulsory Pilotage, he shall be entitled to receive in respect thereof, such an amount, including expenses, as shall in each case be fixed by the Commissioners or their Secretary.

16. Every Pilot shall be entitled to receive in respect of the undernoted extra services the following sums, viz. :—

For Piloting a Vessel from Sea, to an Anchorage in the Lough, one pound.

For Transporting a Vessel from any Dock to any other Dock, or from any Dock to the River, or vice versa, ten shillings.

For remaining in charge of a Vessel during adjustment of Compasses, one pound.

17. The Pilot Boat shall cruise seaward of an imaginary line drawn between Sea Park House on the Co. Antrim side and Craigavad House on the Co. Down side of the Lough, and in the fair way for boarding vessels.

18. The Pilot Master in charge of the Pilot Boat shall keep a correct record of the daily proceedings, and shall enter the same in a Log Book, such record to include a list of the Pilots on board, and their rotation for being boarded, an account of all vessels boarded, and the time of boarding them, and the names of the Pilots supplied to or taken from such vessels. The position of the boat, and the state of the weather shall be recorded every four hours, and in case of coming to anchor, the particulars and reasons for so doing. A List of Watchkeepers for the preceding twelve hours shall be entered in the Log Book at the end of each half day. Every fortnight the Log Book shall be sent to the Pilotage Superintendent at the Harbour Office for the inspection of the Commissioners or their Secretary, and left with him until again required for use.

19. Every Pilot and Apprentice shall obey and execute all orders given by the Commissioners, their Secretary, the Pilotage Superintendent, or the Pilot Masters, as well as all orders given by the Deputy Harbour Masters or Dock Masters, relative to the docking, towing, transporting, or removing of vessels under their charge.

20. Every Pilot when on shore shall attend daily at the Harbour Office, at ten o'clock A.M.,

to receive such orders and directions as may then be given by the Secretary or the Pilotage Superintendent.

21. A Pilot while on Service shall not on any pretence leave the Boat, except on duty, without the written permission of the Master, which shall be recorded in the Log Book.

22. Every Pilot shall, when on duty, always have with him a good watch, a Tide Table, a copy of Part V. of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," a copy of the Rules, Bye-laws, and Regulations of the Port and Harbour of Belfast, his License and his distinguishing flag; and immediately on taking charge of a vessel he shall exhibit his License to the officer in command.

23. On taking charge as Pilot of any vessel he shall cause his flag to be hoisted in some conspicuous place on board of such vessel, and he shall keep his flag continually flying until he is discharged or relieved by another Pilot.

24. A Pilot in charge of a vessel shall not leave her until she is safely docked or moored in the river, and then only with the written permission of the officer in command.

25. Every Pilot, on taking charge of an outward-bound vessel, shall, before proceeding to sea, ascertain that such vessel has a clearance from the Harbour Office, and any Pilot taking a vessel out of the Harbour which has not received such clearance, except under written instructions from the Secretary, is liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, besides the forfeiture of all Pilotage payable in respect of such vessel.

26. When in charge of an outward-bound vessel proceeding to sea, every Pilot shall see that his Flag is hoisted and kept flying at the fore, as a signal to the Pilot Boats to be prepared to take him from such outward vessel as soon as his duty has been performed.

27. A Pilot shall not engage to pilot a vessel outward beyond the limit of Compulsory Pilotage, unless the Master shall have previously signed a requisition for his services.

28. Whenever any Pilot shall observe any alteration in any of the banks or channels, or that any buoys or beacons have been driven away, broken down, damaged, or out of place, or any circumstance affecting the safety of navigation, he shall forthwith report the same to the Pilotage Superintendent, and the Superintendent shall furnish a correct statement thereof in writing to the Secretary.

29. Every Pilot shall behave himself with strict sobriety and with due respect towards the owners, commander, and officers of any vessel under his charge.

30. No Pilot Master, Pilot, or Apprentice shall at any time have or hold, directly or indirectly, any share or interest in any steam tug or other vessel used regularly or occasionally for towing vessels, nor shall he act as agent or canvasser for, or use his influence, directly or indirectly, on behalf of any broker, tradesman, or other person whatsoever.

31. It shall be the duty of the Pilotage Superintendent to exercise a supervision over all the Pilot Masters, Pilots, and Apprentices, to see that the Pilot Boat is at all times kept in good order and repair, and in every respect fitted for the Pilot service, for which purpose he shall once every month visit the Boat on her station, and shall carefully inspect all changes in the buoys, channels, lights, &c., which may have been reported or made since the time of his last visit, and shall enter the particulars of his inspection in a book to be kept for that purpose and to be laid before the Commissioners at their General Meet-

ings. He shall also see that such Bye-laws and Regulations as may from time to time be made and prescribed by the Commissioners are properly observed and carried out.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners Act 1840 Amendment Act 1885 duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of 'The Ecclesiastical Commissioners' Act 1840 Amendment Act 1885,' have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for augmenting the incomes of the Archdeaconry of Manchester in the diocese of Manchester and of the Archdeaconry of Blackburn in the same diocese.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that the augmentations hereinafter recommended and proposed are required in order to raise the average annual incomes of the said two Archdeaconries of Manchester and of Blackburn respectively to two hundred pounds each.

"Now therefore we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners with the consent of the Right Reverend James Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme) humbly recommend and propose that we be authorized to pay on the first day of January in every year out of the common fund created by the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen, firstly to the archdeacon of the said Archdeaconry of Manchester and to his successors in the same archdeaconry the sum of twenty-five pounds in addition to the yearly sum of one hundred and forty pounds now payable by us to the archdeacon for the time being of the said archdeaconry under and by virtue of an Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the first day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine and published in the London Gazette of the eighth day of May in the same year; and secondly to the archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Blackburn and to his successors in the same archdeaconry the sum of five pounds, in addition to the yearly sum of one hundred and eighty pounds now payable by us to the said last mentioned archdeacon under and by virtue of an Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the thirteenth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, and published in the London Gazette on the seventeenth day of August in the same year.

"And we further recommend and propose that the first payment of the said two yearly sums of twenty-five pounds and five pounds respectively so hereby recommended to be made as aforesaid shall be made on the first day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and that every such payment of twenty-five pounds or of five pounds as the case may be shall, as well as the said yearly payments of one hundred and forty pounds and one hundred and eighty pounds already made by us as aforesaid to the Archdeacon of Manchester and to the Archdeacon

of Blackburn respectively be made by us only after we shall have been satisfied that the archdeacon who applies for the same has, during the previous twelve calendar months, complied with the conditions as to residence which for the time being are required by law and that in the case of each of the said two archdeacons both of such yearly payments shall be apportionable between any archdeacon resigning or otherwise avoiding the archdeaconry or his representatives (as the case may be) and the archdeacon who shall next be instituted to the same archdeaconry.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

tion, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes herein-after mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the sixteenth day of August last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, as follows, viz.:—

THATCHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Thatcham, in the county of Berks; and also in the churchyard, after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order viz.:—widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth.

PENNINGTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Pennington, in the county of Lancaster; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are

now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order, viz.:—widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth:

(d.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in, and which, when opened, are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

BARHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Barham, in the county of Kent; and also in the churchyard, after the thirty-first March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

NETHER HEYFORD.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Nether Heyford, in the county of Northampton; and in the churchyard within two yards of any dwelling; and also in the rest of the churchyard after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, except as follows:—

In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

LANGHAM BISHOPS.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Langham Bishops, in the county of Norfolk; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

WYKE REGIS.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Wyke Regis, in the county of Dorset, and also in the old part of the churchyard; and in the part added in one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves now existing in this part of the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in this part of the churchyard, pro-

vided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in this part of the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

BURTON AGNES.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Burton Agnes, in the county of York; and also in the churchyard after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, except as follows:—

In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; also forthwith and entirely in

Harpham Church in the said parish of Burton Agnes; and also in the churchyard after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, except as follows:—

In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

CHARLBURY.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Charlbury, in the county of Oxford; and in the churchyard within seven feet of any dwelling; and in the rest of the churchyard after the first June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, except as follows:—

(a.) In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

HEYBRIDGE.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Heybridge, in the county of Essex; and also in the churchyard after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, except as follows:—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or

disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in, and, when opened, are free from water) burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

HASELEY.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Haseley, in the county of Warwick; and also in the churchyard after the first June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, except as follows:—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

PHILLACK.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Phillack, in the county of Cornwall; and that in the churchyard the following regulations shall be observed:—

1. No body shall be buried in any vault or walled grave unless the coffin be separately entombed in an air-tight manner, that is, by properly cemented stone or brick work which shall never be disturbed.

2. No earthen grave shall be dug within one foot of any other grave.

3. No coffin shall be buried in any unwalled grave within four feet of the ordinary level of the ground.

4. In no case on opening any grave shall human remains be disturbed or coffins exposed.

Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered :

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Order in Council of the sixteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said first recited Act.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered :—

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in Ingleton Church in the county of York; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order, viz., widows and widowers, parents and children, as can be buried at or below that depth :

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard (as have never before been buried in, and which when opened are free from water), burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Attleborough in the county of Norfolk; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) (d.) In the grave space reserved for the use of the Reverend W. C. Safford and his wife at their decease, on condition that each coffin is covered by four feet of earth at least.

THE following Amending Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c., of the School Board of Saltash, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882":—

WHEREAS on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, thought fit, and did by Her Royal Charter of that date, create the Poor Law parish of Saltash, known as the township or chapelry of Saltash, a municipal borough, and incorporated the inhabitants thereof, and by the said Charter extended to that municipal borough, and the inhabitants thereof so incorporated, the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Acts. And whereas the said inhabitants are incorporated by the name of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Saltash :

"And whereas Her Majesty by Her Order in Council of the twelfth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, was pleased, under and pursuant to Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, to confirm the Borough of Saltash Scheme, 1885 :

"And whereas at the dates of the said Charter

and Scheme there was in existence a School Board for the said Poor Law parish, and the said School Board is a Local Authority within the meaning of the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885 :

"And whereas the Borough of Saltash Scheme, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, omits to deal with the said School Board for the parish of Saltash :

"And whereas the Municipal Corporation of the borough of Saltash have petitioned the Queen for an Amending Scheme :

"And whereas the said petition was referred to a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council :

"And whereas one month at least before the said petition was taken into consideration by the said Committee notice thereof, and of the time when the same was so to be taken into consideration, was duly published in the London Gazette and otherwise as directed by the said Committee, and the provisions and directions of the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885, have been in all respects complied with and obeyed :

"And whereas it is expedient, right, and just, that an Amending Scheme should be settled pursuant to the said Acts, containing the provisions hereinafter set forth.

"Now, therefore, the said Committee of Council have settled an Amending Scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby order and declare as follows :—

"1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as the Borough of Saltash Scheme, 1886.

"2. This Scheme and the Borough of Saltash Scheme, 1885, shall be construed and operate as one Scheme.

"3. This Scheme shall come into operation on the date of its confirmation by Parliament or Order in Council, which date is hereinafter referred to as 'the commencement of this Scheme.'

"4. Notwithstanding the creation of the said Municipal Borough the School Board for the parish of Saltash shall be and continue to be the School Board for the Municipal Borough of Saltash, by the name of the 'School Board of the Borough of Saltash,' in all respects to the same extent, and in the same manner as if, at the time of the formation of the School Board for the parish of Saltash, by the Committee of the Lords of the Privy Council on Education (hereinafter referred to as the 'Education Department'), the said Borough of Saltash had been created a Municipal Borough, and the said School Board for the parish of Saltash had been formed and created for the said borough by the name of the School Board of the Borough of Saltash, and as if the Local Rate and the Rating Authority had been the Borough Fund or Rate, and the Council of the said borough, respectively, and everything in connection with the said Board and School District shall be done, and had accordingly, and not otherwise.

"5. All liabilities and assets attaching to and vested in the School Board for the parish of Saltash immediately before the commencement of this Scheme shall be, and continue, attached to, and vested in the School Board for the borough of Saltash, and all charges charged on the Poor Rate and School Fund of the said Poor Law Parish immediately before the commencement of this Scheme shall be a charge upon the Borough Fund or Rate and the School Fund of the School Board for the borough of Saltash, respectively, and not otherwise.

"6. Any bye-laws in force at the date of this

Scheme in the School District of the said Poor Law Parish shall continue in force.

"7. Any act or omission done or made by the Education Department or the said School Board for the parish of Saltash, or the Council of the said borough, or any Justice, since the date of the said Charter shall be deemed to have been lawfully done or made if it might have been lawfully done or made by the said Education Department, School Board, Council, or Justice if no Charter had been granted, or the said School Board had been the School Board for the borough of Saltash."

which intended Railways Deviation Railway and works will be made or pass from, through, or into the several parishes following, or some of them (that is to say), St. Austell, St. Mewan, and St. Ewe, all in the county of Cornwall.

And it is intended by the Bill to take for, or in connection with, the proposed railways and works, or other the purposes of the Bill, certain lands, being or reputed to be commons or commonable lands, of which the following are particulars and the estimated quantities included within the limits of deviation shown upon the plans hereinafter mentioned, and the estimated quantities proposed to be taken (that is to say):—

(Power to Local Board to Produce and Supply Electricity; Purchase of the Undertaking of the Cockermouth Gas Light and Coke Company by agreement or compulsorily, and Winding-up and Dissolution of the Company; Power to Local Board and Company to make Agreements; Power to Local Board to Make and Supply Gas and Convert Residual Products, to Break up Streets, to Levy Rates, and Borrow Money; Providing for Transfer to other Local Authorities of Parts of Undertaking, with Power to them to carry on same and Levy Rates and Borrow Money; Incorporation of Acts; and other Purposes.)

APPPLICATION will be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session thereof by the Local Board of Health for the district of Cockermouth, in the county of Cumberland (hereinafter called "the Local Board"), for leave to bring in a Bill for the following or some of the following among other purposes (that is to say):—

1. To enable the Local Board to produce and supply electricity for all purposes within the limits hereinafter defined, and for that purpose on any land for the time being belonging to or occupied by them, to make and maintain works for the production, storage, supply, and distribution of electricity for the purposes of light, heat, and motive power, and to exercise with respect thereto all or any of the powers of the Electric Lighting Act, 1882, and the Gas Works Clauses Act, 1847, and the Gas Works Clauses Act, 1871, and such other rights and powers as may be necessary or expedient for the purposes aforesaid.

2. To authorise the Local Board to purchase, and to transfer to and vest in, or to provide for the transfer to and vesting in them of the undertaking, lands, mains, pipes, machinery, stock-in-trade, plant and property, powers, rights, and

9. To authorise the Local Board for the purposes of the Bill, or any of them, to acquire and hold lands, and to stop up, divert, break up, and interfere with streets, roads, highways, railways, tramways, streams, watercourses, sewers, drains, mains, and pipes, and to alter, remove and interfere temporarily or permanently with electric apparatus.

10. To empower the Local Board to supply electricity and gas to any company or local authority within or without their prescribed limits, and to enter into and fulfil contracts and agreements for that purpose, to confer upon such company or local authority all necessary powers of levying rates and borrowing moneys for such purposes, and to apply for such purposes any moneys under their control.

11. To authorise the Local Board to demand and recover rents and charges for and in relation to the supply of electricity and gas, and to confer, vary, or extinguish exemptions from payments of rents and charges.

12. To authorise the Local Board to apply to all or any of the objects or purposes of the Bill any rates, rents, and charges levied by them or under their control, and to levy other and additional rates, whether general or special, for any of the objects or purposes of the Bill, and to alter existing rates, rents, and charges, and to confer, vary, and extinguish exemptions from rates and charges.

13. To alter and enlarge the present borrowing powers of the Local Board and to enable them to apply to the purposes of the Bill any moneys they are already authorised to borrow; and to borrow and re-borrow additional moneys on mortgage, debentures, debenture stock, and annuities; and to charge as well the Undertaking, rents, revenues, and property, or any part thereof which they may acquire under the Bill, as also the General District Rate and any other rate or rates levied within the said district, and all or any the estate, rents, revenues, and property of the Local Board, with and as security for all or any part of the moneys to be borrowed.

14. To empower the Local Board, after the vesting in them of the Undertaking of the Gas Company, to transfer by sale or otherwise any part or parts thereof to any local authority or body, and to authorise such authority or body to purchase and acquire the same, and when so acquired to manufacture and sell gas, to levy rates and borrow moneys, and to exercise within their district all the powers, rights, and privileges which the Local Board might have exercised if no such transfer had been made.

15. To alter, vary or extinguish all rights and privileges which would impede or interfere with any of the objects of the Bill, and to confer upon the Local Board such further or other rights, powers and privileges as may be necessary or expedient for effecting the several objects of the Bill, or in relation thereto.

16. The Bill will or may incorporate with itself, with or without alteration, such of the provisions as may be deemed expedient of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts, 1845, 1860, and 1869; the Electric Lighting Act, 1882; the Gas Works Clauses Act, 1847, the Gas Works Clauses Act, 1871; the Commissioners Clauses Act, 1847; the Public Health Act, 1875; and the Local Loans Act, 1875.
