Dantzick, June 2.

THE Elector of Brandenburg arrived here this Morning from Coningsberg; he was received by the Burghers in Arms, with a discharge of all the Cannon round the place, and splendidly entertained by the Magistrates at the Town House; and in the Evening his Electoral Highness continued his Journey towards Berlin. They write from Warsaw of the 26th past, That an Envoy was arrived there from the Cham of Tartary, with proposals of Peace, but that he had not yet had Audience.

Vienna, June 4. The Elector of Bavaria, who arrived here the 30th of the last Month, having assisted at several Councils of War, and received the Emperors Instructions concerning the design of the Campaign, parted again from hence the 2d instant, on his return towards the Empire, in order to take upon him the Command of the Army on the Upper Rhine, which will be composed of 24000 Imperialists, and the Forces of Bavaria, Suabia and Franconia. The Elector of Brandenburg will Command another Army between the Meuse and the Moselle, made up of his own Forces, and those of Munster and Neuchow; and the Elector of Saxony will have a third under his Command, consisting of his own Troops, with those of Hesse, and other Princes of the Empire. Prince Louis of Baden is gone to Bohemia, to settle his private Affairs, before he sets out for Bulgaria. The Letters from Nissa of the 13th past, tell us, That five of the Imperial Regiments that came from Transylvania were arrived near Orsova, where they designed to pass the Danube, and that the rest were expected in few days; and that several Parties which had been sent out to make Excursions were come back with good Booty, but without hearing of the Enemies being drawn together in any considerable Body. We have an account from the Blockade of Great Waradin, that our Troops had defeated a party of 100 Men belonging to that Garrison, and that the Prisoners confirmed the former Reports of the ill condition they within the place are reduced to. They write from Croatia, That a Detachment of their Troops had burnt the Town of Crupa, in which there were above 1000 Houses, and taken a great many Prisoners.

Frankfort, June 11. The Imperial Army continues encamp'd at Simzheim, where they are daily reinforced, and when the Forces of Bavaria, and those of the Circles have joined them, they will be between 40 and 50000 strong. The French Army lies between Lampshheim and Spire; their Parties have burnt Ingelheim, which was built by Charles VIII, and a great many Villages and small places thereabouts. The Troops of Saxony began their march the 10th instant towards the Rhine. We have an account from Zurich, that the Swiss Cantons have at their late General Diet resolved, to forbid all new Levies and Recruits for the Service of France.

Cologne, June 13. The General Rendevous of the Troops of Brandenburg is appointed in the Plains of Flingen, between Nuys and this City. But the Brandenburg and Neuburg Horse, that were quartered in the Country of Juliers, have orders to march towards the Eyffelt to observe the French, who are moving that way.

Liege, June 13. Yesterday our Prince took a review of his Troops at Flemel; with whom it was resolv'd, that some Detachements of the Confederate Forces should joyn, in order to their making the Marquis de Boufflers a visit; but he having notice of it, thought fit to retire with the Troops under his Command towards Charlemont.

Hamburg, June 13. Their Electoral Highnesses of Brandenburg returned on the 10th instant to Berlin; from whence the Elector will repair very speedily to his Army on the Rhine.

Paris, June 13. Several Couriers have of late passed between this Court and Savoy; the last that was sent thither carried, its said, Orders to Monsieur Carinat to begin Hostilities in case the Duke of Savoy still refused to comply with the Terms proposed to him from hence. On the other side we are told, that the Duke is putting himself into a posture of defence, and that he had sent to the Governor of Milan for Assistance; and there is even a Report, That he has received some Spanish Troops within his Territories. We have an account from the French Camp at Lampshheim in Germany, that the Dauphin arrived there the 3d instant, and that he had taken a review of the Army. The Letters from Brest of the 5th instant, tell us, that the Irish Troops which lately arrived there, were ordered to march towards Catalonia.

Brussels, June 13. On Monday last passed through this place 7 Regiments of Horse, which came from the Spanish Camp near Ghent, and went to joyn the Dutch Army at Genap. Yesterday five Dutch Regiments of Foot arrived at Vervoord on their march likewise towards Genap; where Lieutenant General d'Hubny with 1500 Spanish Horse, has already joined Prince Waldeck; who intends in few days to go and encamp at Tresignies, on the River Pieton. The Duke of Luxemburg has detached 9000 Men towards the Sambre; and it's believed he will follow himself with the rest of the Army, except a small Body which he will leave in Flanders. The 12th instant, died the Count de Salazar, Governor of the City and Citadel of Ghent.

Hague, June 16. The States of Holland are still assembled, but they will adjourn to morrow, till the 15th of the next Month. The Army of this State, Commanded by Prince Waldeck, marched the 12th instant from Waveren to Genap, from whence they would continue their march towards the Sambre. The 6000 Suedes are on their march to joyn the Forces of Saxony, and to act upon the middle Rhine. The Letters from Germany do not confirm the news about the defeat of 1000 French Horse by the Hussars of Mentz. Here are shortly expected two Plenipotentiaries from

Bremer, and one from Mentz, to assist at the Conference of the Allies.

Pembroke, June 4. The first Instant the Wind being at South, the Fleet that lay in this Harbour bound for *Higblake* and *Carrick-segus*; set Sail, and stood to Sea; They met at the Harbours Mouth with 15 Sail of Ships that came from *Bristol*, but the Wind changing, they were forced back into Harbour. The Wind is now at South again, and the whole Fleet will, it is believed, Sail this Tide, being about 160 Sail.

Bournemouth, June 5. Yesterday came into this Port two Dutch Capers with a Vessel of 10 Guns, which they took on *Tuesday* last off of *Ushant*: She pretends to be a *Portuguese*, but was bound in company of two French Men of War, and several other Ships, from *Dunkerke* to *Bordeaux*.

Plymouth, June 6. Yesterday passed by this Harbour to the Eastward three Men of War, with about 25 Merchant Ships under their Convoy, from the *Canaries*. The same day sailed from hence the *Ferley* Frigate, and the *Salamander*, with two Companies of Soldiers for *Scilly*.

Plymouth, June 8. Yesterday came in here two Dutch Capers, who lately took two French Prizes, which they sent to the Isle of *Wight*. And this day they sailed again to the Eastward.

Clester, June 7. On *Wednesday* last about 40 Dutch Flyboats arrived in *Higblake*, being designed for the Transporting of Horse. The same day, the two Battalions of the Dutch Foot Guards, and a Regiment of Dutch Horse embarked there: And yesterday the first Troop of Guards marched from hence to *Higblake*, with a great number of Wagons and Carriages.

The Kings and Prince of *Denmark's* Equigages came in yesterday, with many of the Nobility and Gentry that attend His Majesty; His Royal Highness was expected last night at the Bishops Palace, which was prepared for his Reception, but he lay at *Cripton*, about a Mile short of this City.

Clester, June 9. His Majesty came to *Peel's* Colonel *Whitely's* House, on *Saturday* about Noon, having through his whole Journey been attended with the Acclamations of vast crowds of People, who in a very remarkable manner followed His Majesty with Wishes and Prayers for his prosperous Voyage. Yesterday Morning His Majesty came hither, with a numerous attendance of Nobility and Gentry, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council in their Formalities, and on Horseback, with the 24 Companies of the Citizens in their Gowns, and with their Colours, waited on His Majesty at the cutting into our Liberties; His Majesty went directly to the Cathedral, the Mayor carrying the Sword, and the Senior Alderman the Mace before Him; at the Church Door, the Bishop and his Clergy received his Majesty, and conducted him into the Quire. After Divine Service, and a Sermon preached by the Bishop, His Majesty took Coach again, and went to *Gunton*, the House of Mr. *Gigg*, ten Miles off, where He was met by Sir *Cloude* *Seymour*, and the rest of the Sea Commanders. In the Evening His Majesty went to *Higblake* to see the Ships, and returned to *Gunton* about 10 at Night; and to-morrow His Majesty intends to Embark if the Wind permits.

The Letters from *Lisborne* of the 5th instant, give an account of the arrival there of the Count de *Schomberg* General of the Horse. And that they heard the Enemy were drawing together about *Ardee* and *Lurgan* River.

Perth, June 5. On the 6th and 7th instant, Their Majesties Ships the *Wasp*, and the *Crown*, sailed out of this Harbour to *Spithead*.

Deal, June 9. The 7th instant arrived in the Downs, 4 Merchant Ships from *Porto*; and one with a Sloop from *Jamaica*. The 8th, the *Soldados*, and the *Sake Rose*, with the *Fins* and *Yabeza* Yachts came in from the Westward. And last night arrived the *Canary* Fleet, being about 30 Sail of Merchant Men, under the Convoy of the *Samson*, the *Hambur*, and the *Berkley Castle*.
