NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 279.)—RED SEA.

Suez Canal.—Intended Additional Lights near the Suez Entrance.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 231, dated 11th December, 1885, on provisional regulations for navigating the Suez Canal at night:—

Information has been received from the Egyptian Authorities, that on 1st January, 1887, the four

undermentioned lights will be exhibited by the Suez Canal Company, near the Suez Entrance of the Suez Canal, for the guidance of vessels, fitted with an electric projector light, proceeding during the night:—

1. A fixed red light at the position $87\frac{3}{10}$ miles of the canal, near the red buoy marking the extremity of the canal, on the African side.

2. A fixed red light 328 yards north-eastward of light 1.

3. A fixed white light at the position of $87\frac{3}{10}$ miles of the canal, near the black buoy marking the extremity of the canal, on the Asiatic side.

The above three lights will be provisionally shown from ordinary signal lanterns.

4. A fixed white light at the position $85\frac{5}{10}$ miles of the canal, indicating the curve of the canal. This light will be elevated 13 feet above the mean level of the water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 3 miles.

WHEREAS the population of the said township of Bowdon, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons;

And whereas at a Meeting of the Vestry of the said township held, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on the 23rd day of July, 1886, it was resolved,—

“That the Local Government Board be re-

quested to issue an Order under their

“Hauds and Seal authorising the Overseers

“to enter into an agreement under the pro-

“visions of the Act 13 and 14 Vict., c. 57,

“for that portion of it only which relates to

“the providing of accommodation for hold-

“ing Vestry Meetings; and the Overseers

“are hereby authorized to apply to the

“Local Government Board to put in force

“so much of the said Act as relates to this

“matter.”

And whereas the Overseers of the said township have made application in writing to us, the Local Government Board, pursuant to the above-recited resolution:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to us by the Statutes in that behalf, we hereby order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—So much of the above-cited Act as relates to the providing of a room or suitable buildings for the purpose of holding Vestry or other Meetings, shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said township.

ARTICLE II.—A copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette by the Overseers of the Poor of the said township.
