

from France. His Highness has released such of the *Zandais* as were Prisoners; and has given leave to all to join those in the *Vallies*.

Strasbourg, June 15. We are told from the *Palatinate*, That the French Army is encamped between *Lautau* and *Philippsburg*; and that the *Dauphin* is returned to *Strasbourg*. The Forces of *Saxony* are on their march towards the *Rhin*. The *Hussars* in *Garison* at *Mentz* marched from thence the 12th, to join the Imperial Army at *Sintzheim*.

Cologne, June 16. We have advice, That the Troops of *Munster* consisting of 5000 Foot, and 1200 Horse, were to pass the *Lippe* this day on their march towards the *Melle*. The Elector of *Barbaria* went from *Munster* on the 10th instant, towards the Imperial Army on the *Rhin*.

Hamburg, June 16. The Letters from *Poland*, tell us, That the Envoy from the *Cham of Tartary* had had Audience of the King, and that among other Conditions of Peace he had offered the Retirution of *Cambrice*. The Swedish Troops will begin their march the 20th instant, from *Bremen* and *Pomeran*, towards the *Rhin*, consisting of 5200 Men.

Paris, June 16. The Duke of *Savoie* has at last declared against this *Crown*, and received 5 Battalions of Spaniards, into the Citadel of *Turin*. He has put a Guard upon the French Ambassador. And the like is done here upon the Ambassador of *Savoie*. We are told, That the *Swiss-Companie*, and several Princes of *Italy*, offer him assistance.

Brisbach, June 16. The Duke of *Luxemburg* detached on the 10th instant from his Camp at *Daynsé*, 10 Battalions, and 30 Squadrons, towards *Pont Eperies*; and yesterday he retired himself with the rest of the Army to *Harsbucke*; from whence, it's said, he will march with 15000 Men towards *Tourmay* and *Maubeuge*, to join the Troops Commanded by the *Marquis de Boufflers*; who, according to our last advices, lay within three Leagues of *Dinant*. The Dutch Army Commanded by *Prince Waldeck* is encamped from *Warren* to *Genap*; where the *Count de Flod* has joynted them with 5000 Men, and the *Baron d'Alton* with the Forces that were Commanded towards *Ghent*, so that this Army is now very numerous, and will quickly enter upon *Acti'on*. Our Governor General was expected this Evening at *Dendermonde*; the Troops that were encamped near *Ghent* return likewise towards *Brabant*; and according to all appearance our Army will have its Rendezvous near *Alost*, in the way from hence to *Ghent*. The Letters from *Munster* of the 11th inst, give an account, That Vice Admiral *Killigrew* had been engaged with the French Squadron from *Toulon*, and that he had taken and sent into *Gibraltar*, three Frigats, one of 30, another of 24, and a third of 12 Guns, and was in pursuit of the rest.

Hague, June 20. The Letters from *Genova* of the 9th, and from *Paris* of the 15th instant, which are come in this Morning, do bring a very important piece of News, to wit, That the Duke of *Savoie* had declared against *France*, and received a Spanish Garrison into the Citadel of *Turin*; that he had sent to *Monieur Cardinal*, to retire with the French Troops out of his Dominions, within 24 hours, declaring he would otherwise treat them as Enemies; that he had put a Guard upon the French Ambassador, in order to keep him as a Hostage for his Ambassador in *France*. That he had given leave to all the *Vandis* to return home; and had released such of them as were Prisoners. That he had raised the Militia of *Piedmont*; that 3000 Spanish Horse were come to *Ast*, and that 8000 Foot were not far behind them. That he had offered assistance from the *Swiss-Companie*; and that the Republick of *Venice* had promised to assist him with a considerable Sum of Money, with many other particulars, which would take up too much room to be here set down. All the Spanish Letters, say, that our Squadron under the Command of the Vice Admirals *Ridgway* and *Denonville*, was engaged with the French Ships from *Toulon*, and that they had taken three and sent them into *Gibraltar*, we impatiently expect the farther particulars. The Marriage between the Prince of *Poland* and the Princess of *Neuburg* is concluded.

Perth, June 7. The Ships that were in this Harbour bound for *Ireland* filled on the 2nd instant, and are well and good by this time to their Port, having had a fair Wind and a fresh Gale.

Towmarch, June 10. Yesterday arrived here the *Palatine* and the *Swiss*, both of this place, from the *Barbarians*. Whence they parted on the 28th of April in Company of 42 Sail of Merchant-Men; whereof 11 are gone to *Bombay*, and the rest, consisting of two East-India Men, being bound for *China*, were round by *Scotland*. The Fleet that went from hence in *March*, was not yet shipt at the Anchors when these Ships came away;

Which they expected there with the more impatience; that they intended upon its arrival to attack the French, who were in great wants, not having in a long time received any Supplies from *France*. Yesterday likewise arrived the *William and Sarah* from *Virginia*; and the *Ms Gailey* sailed from hence with several Merchant-Ships under her Convoy for the *Down*.

Deal, June 13. Yesterday in the Afternoon Their Majesties Fleet, under the Command of the Earl of *Torrington*, sailed out of the *Down* to the *Westward*.

Lisburne, June 8. On Thursday last arrived at *Belfast*, Dutch Regiment of Horse, and yesterday a more, as also the Battalions of the Dutch Foot Guards, together with Artillery and Stores. The Regiments of *Lord, Basing, Cutts, Hastings, Foulkes*, all the *Danes* both Horse & Foot, and the Regiments of Dutch Horse will march tomorrow, or next day, in order to form a Camp by *Armagh*, whether the rest of the Forces will speedily follow. The General goes to-morrow to the *White-hill*, four Miles on this side *Belfast*, to see the Train of Artillery. We hear the Enemy are drawing together at *Armagh*.

Crother, June 12. His Majesty embarked yesterday Morning at *Hughstown*, and set sail about Noon, with a VVind, attended by a fleet of above 300 Ships.
