PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the eighth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the

words following, viz.:—

"Whereas it appears to us to be desirable to revise the existing table of the scales of "Greenwich Hospital Special Pensions" awarded under the authority vested in us by Your Majesty's Orders in Council:

"We humbly recommend that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to approve of the accompanying Regulations being substituted for those now in force; and whereas we consider it desirable to remove the restriction now enforced under 'Queen's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions,' Article 2045 (K), whereby it is declared that men who are residing out of the United Kingdom are in all cases ineligible for the benefits of Greenwich Hospital Special Pensions, we do hereby recommend that we be empowered to make such pensions payable in Your Majesty's dominions abroad in cases where it shall seem to us that the circumstances are special and exceptional.

"Should Your Majesty be graciously pleased to approve, we would further most humbly recommend that the provisions of these Regulations should be made retrospective so far as to include such cases as have been specially sanctioned by us and all others that would not be excluded by the accompanying table.

"GREENWICH HOSPITAL SPECIAL PENSIONS.

" CLASS I.

"All Petty Officers and Seamen, and all Noncommissioned Officers and Privates of Royal Marines, who have been granted Naval Pensions for life.

If infirm or helpless, and unable to main ain themselves,

Pensions to be made up to 1s. 6d. a-day.

If not infirm or helpless, but unable to maintain themselves,

Pensions to be made up to 1s. 3d. a-day.

If able to contribute in a small degree to their own support,

Pensions to be made up from 9d. to 1s. a-day.

" CLASS II.

"All Petty Officers and Seamen, and all Noncommissioned Officers and Privates of Royal Marines, who have served with good characters for twelve years continuously, or with short intervals.

MEN IN RECEIPT OF TEMPORARY NAVAL PENSIONS.

If infirm or helpless, and unable to maintain themselves,

Pensions to be made up to 1s. 3d. a-day.

If not infirm or helpless, but unable to maintain themselves,

Pensions to be made up to 1s. a-day.

If able to contribute in a small degree to their own support.

Pensions to be made up to 9d. a-day. When the temporary naval pension expires, the Greenwich Special Pension may be continued, and may be made up, at discretion, to the amount of the former combined pensions.

Men whose temporary naval pensions have expired, and who were not in receipt of Greenwich Special Pensions when holding such temporary pensions, may be awarded, at discretion, special pensions of the same amount as the expired naval pensions, if more advantageous to them than the following scale:—

MEN NOT IN RECEIPT OF TEMPORARY NAVAL PENSIONS.

If infirm and helpless, or unable to maintain themselves,

9d. to 1s. a-day.

From 6d. to 9d. a-day.

If able to contribute in a small degree towards their own support,

" CLASSES III AND IV.

"III. All Petty Officers and Seamen, and all Non-commissioned Officers and Privates of Royal Marines, who having served for not less than five years, have been discharged or invalided on account of disease or wounds, and whose present disability is clearly the result of such disease or wounds.

"IV. All Petty Officers and Seamen, and all Non-commissioned Officers and Privates of Royal Marines, who were discharged or invalided on account of disease or injuries, clearly attributable to the Service, and whose present disability is clearly the result of such disease or injuries.

MEN IN RECEIPT OF TEMPORARY NAVAL PENSIONS.

If infirm or helpless, and unable to maintain themselves,

Pensions to be made up to 1s. 3d. a-day.

If not infirm or helpless, but unable to maintain themselves,

Pensions to be made up to 1s. a-day.

When the temporary naval pension expires, the Greenwich Special Pension may be continued, and may be made up, at discretion, to the amount of the former combined pensions.

Men whose temporary naval pensions have expired, and who were not in receipt of Greenwich Special Pensions when holding such temporary pensions, may be awarded, at discretion, special pensions of the same amount as the expired naval pensions, if more advantageous to them than the following scale:—

MEN NOT IN RECEIPT OF TEMPORARY NAVAL PENSIONS.

If infirm or helpless, and unable to maintain themselves,

9d. to 1s. a-day.

If not infirm or helpless, but unable to maintain themselves,

6d. to 9d. a-day.

If able to contribute in a small degree to their own support,

6d. a-day.

" CLASS V.

"All Petty Officers and Seamen, and all Noncommissioned Officers and Privates of Royal Marines, whose claims may be considered special and exceptional, not coming within the other Classes.

Inclusive of-

Men who contributed to the funds of Greenwich Hospital before 1st January, 1830.

Men who have been granted a war medal or clasp.

Men who were employed in the Franklin Search Expedition.

Men who have been injured on duty.

If infirm or helpless, and unable to maintain themselves,

1s. to 1s. 3d. a-day.

If able to contribute in a small degree to their own support,

6d. to 9d. a-day.

"GENERAL NOTE.

"Men in need of hospital treatment, but who prefer a special pension—Pensions may be made

up to 1s. 6d. a-day.

"Men in need of hospital treatment, but who prefer a special pension—If not in receipt of pension, Greenwich Special Pension of 1s. 6d. a-day may be granted

"All the above pensions to be given permanently or temporarily, at discretion.

" MEN NOT ENTITLED TO SPECIAL PENSIONS.

"Men who are materially able to contribute towards their own support.

"Men with less than twelve years' service, however old they may be, who were discharged in good health, and do not come under Class V.

"Men discharged for any form of venereal disease, unless they are life pensioners; and men suffering from any such disease contracted since their discharge from the Service, whether life pensioners or not.

"Men whose general character has been inferior to 'good.'

"Men in workhouses."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial of Cirencester.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her said Majesty chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the archdeaconries and rural deaneries or some of them which are within the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas there are at present three archdeaconries within the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, to wit the Archdeaconry of Gloucester, the Archdeaconry of Bristol, and the Archdea-

conry of Cirencester.

"And whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the said archdeaconries and rural deaneries or some of them within the said diocese are desirable and should be carried into effect, and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect.

"And whereas the said arrangements involve the transfer in certain cases of certain parishes or cures from one archdeaconry to another archdeaconry, that is to say, they involve the transfer of one parish or cure (that is to say the parish of Kemerton) from the Archdeaconry of Cirencester to the Archdeaconry of Gloucester, and the transfer of one parish or cure (that is to say, the parish of Poulton) from the Archdeaconry of Bristol to the Archdeaconry of Cirencester; and also the transfer of certain parishes or cures from certain rural deaneries to certain other rural deaneries.

"And whereas the same arrangements also involve among other alterations of the areas of certain of the rural deaneries within the said three archdeaconries, the extinction or absorption of one rural deanery as such to wit, the Rural Deanery of Northleach (South) in the said Archdeaconry of Cirencester and they involve certain changes in the names of four of the rural deaneries in the said Archdeaconry of Gloucester and of the names of six of the rural deaneries in the said Archdeaconry of Bristol and of the name of one of the rural deaneries in the said Archdeaconry

"And whereas the two statutory schedules (prepared under the provisions of the hereinbefore lastly mentioned Act) of the rural deaneries within the said two Archdeaconries of Gloucester and of Bristol respectively are each dated the thirtieth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and since that date, the Archdeaconry of Cirencester has been constituted out of the said two Archdeaconries of Gloucester and of Bristol by an Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the thirtieth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

"And whereas there exists no statutory schedule of the rural deaneries comprised within

the said Archdeaconry of Cirencester.

"And whereas by virtue of 'The Bishopric of Bristol Act, 1884,' it is provided that if and when the Bishopric of Bristol shall be reconstituted as a separate bishopric the diocese shall (inter alia) consist of,—

(a) The Deanery of Bristol (City Division and

Rural Division); and

(b) The following three Deaneries of North Wilts, that is to say:

Malmesbury, North, Malmesbury, South, and Cricklade.

"And whereas the area above specified under the heading (a) is, in the said statutory schedule of rural deaneries within the archdeaconry of Bristol aforesaid, described as 'The Deanery of Bristol (City Division)' and 'The Deanery of Bristol (Rural Division).'

"And whereas it is proposed by this scheme that the names of the two last-mentioned rural deaneries and also the names of the said two Rural Deaneries of Malmesbury, North, and of Malmesbury, South, respectively shall be changed as

hereinafter appears.

"And whereas it is further proposed by this scheme that the area of the said Rural Deanery of Cricklade shall be altered by the transference of the parish or cure of Poulton from that rural deanery to the Rural Deanery of Fairford in the said Archdeaconry of Cirencester as hereinbefore-

mentioned and as hereinafter appears.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (in testimony whereof he hath set his hand and his episcopal seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the said Archdeaconry of Gloucester the said Archdeaconry of Bristol and the said Archdeaconry of Cirencester respectively shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries, the names of which are set down in order under the name of each of the said three archdeaconries respectively in the schedule to this scheme annexed, and that the name which in the said schedule is given to any rural deanery shall be the name thereof; and that every parish or cure, the name of which is set down in numbered order, in the first column of the said schedule, under the names of any one of the said three archdeaconries respectively and under the name of any specified rural deanery in any one of the said three archdeaconries respectively, shall belong to and be and form a part of the archdeaconry and of the rural deanery under the respective names of which it may appear as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the archdeacon of the same archdeaconry and of I

the rural dean of the same rural deanery and shall not belong to or be or form a part of any other archdeaconry or rural deanery nor be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other archdeacon or rural dean, the intent of these our recommendations and proposals being, that the said schedule to this scheme annexed, shall, as to the first column thereof, be (in so far as the same legally can or may be) as from the day aforesaid, substituted for the two before-mentioned statutory schedules of rural deaneries within the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol as aforesaid; so that upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette as aforesaid, the said three Archdeaconries of Gloucester and of Bristol, and of Circucester respectively, shall as aforesaid comprise and consist of the rural deaneries which are in that behalf set out and specified under the name of each such archdeaconry respectively in the said schedule to this scheme annexed; and so that every rural deanery in each such archdeaconry shall comprise and consist of the parishes or cures which are in that behalf set out and specified under the name of each such rural deanery in the said first column of the same schedule; the second column of the same schedule containing in the case of each of the said three archdeaconries, a statement as to the name of the rural deanery within which any parish or cure specified in the first column of the said schedule has been heretofore situate, and also as to each of the two parishes or cures hereinbefore in this behalf referred to, (that is to say, the parishes of Kemerton and Poulton,) a statement as to the name of the archdeaconry within which each of the said parishes has been heretofore situate, and from which it is to be transferred as aforesaid: Which recommendations and proposals in this scheme and in the said schedule thereto set forth aforesaid, will have the effect (as by the same schedule appears,) of extinguishing one rural deanery, namely, the Rural Deanery of Northleach (South) in the said Archdeaconry of Circucester, and of absorbing it into the Rural Deanery of Northleach within the said Archdeaconry of Cirencester; and which recommendations and proposals will have the effect of making the following changes in the names of four of the rural deaneries in the said Archdeaconry of Gloucester, that is to say 'The Rural Deanery of Stonehouse (North)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Bisley; 'The Rural Deanery of Stonehouse (South)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Stonehouse; ' 'The Rural Deanery of Winchcomb (North)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Winchcomb; and 'The Rural Deanery of Winchcomb (South)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Cheltenham;' and will also have the effect of making the following changes in the names of six of the rural deaneries in the said Archdeaconry of Bristol that is to say 'The Rural Deanery of Bristol (City Division)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Bristol;' 'The Rural Deanery of Bristol (Rural Division)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Stapleton; 'The Rural Deanery of Hawkesbury (North)' will become 'The Rural Hawkesbury (North)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Hawkesbury;' 'The Rural Deanery of Hawkesbury (South)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Bitton;' 'The Rural Deanery of Malmesbury (South)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Chippenham;' and 'The Rural Deanery of Malmesbury (North)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Malmesbury,' and will also have the effect of making the following change in the name of one of the rural deaneries change in the name of one of the rural deaneries

in the said Archdeaconry of Cirencester, that is to say, 'The Rural Deanery of Northleach (North)' will become 'The Rural Deanery of Northleach.'

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"Whereas by the authority of an instrument bearing date the first day of July in the year one thousand, eight hundred and seventy-five and being under the common seal of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and under the hand and episcopal seal of the then Bishop of the diocese of Chester certain portions of the new parish of Saiut Anne Aigburth, of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wavertree, and of the district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park, all in the said county of Lancaster and at that time in the diocese of Chester, were assigned as a particular district to the consecrated church of Saint Matthew, and Saint James situate at Mossley Hill in the new parish of Saint Anne Aigburth aforesaid and the same was named 'The Particular District of Saint Matthew and Saint James Mossley Hill.'

"And whereas under the authority of an Order of His late Majesty King George the Fourth in Council bearing date the fifteenth day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, and published in the London Gazette on the fourth day of July in the same year, a portion of the parish of Childwall in the said county of Lancaster and also at that time in the diocese of Chester aforesaid, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church or chapel at Wavertree, and the same was known as 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity Wavertree.'

" Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Matthew and Saint James Mossley Hill shall be altered so as to include within its limits all that portion of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Wavertree which is described in the schedule hereunder written and which is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink, and also all that portion of the said district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park which is described in the same schedule and which is delineated and set forth on the said map or plan and is thereon coloured green, and that from and after the same date and without any assurance in law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portions of the said new parish and of the said district chapelry respectively so to be included as aforesaid shall become annexed to and become and be and shall together form part of the said new parish of Saint Matthew and Saint James Mossley Hill.

" And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Matthew and Saint James Mossley Hill in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool, being :-

"I. All that contiguous portion of the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wavertree in the said county and diocese, which is bounded upon the north-west by the hereinafter-described detached portion of the district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park in the said county and diocese, upon the west by the new parish of Saint Matthew and Saint James Mossley Hill aforesaid, upon the south-east and upon a small part of the north-east by the particular district of Allerton, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining part of the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of Allerton from the new parish of the Holy Trinity Wavertree aforesaid at the point where Green-lane joins Allertonroad and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said Allerton-road for a distance of half a mile or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the same road with the Heathfield-road and with Penny-lane which boundary divides the said new parish of the Holy Trinity Wavertree from the detached portion of the district chapelry of Christ Church Toxteth Park next hereinafter mentioned.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the chapelyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.
