

(2.) Commit any offence against decency, or be otherwise disorderly.

(3.) Use obscene, scandalous, abusive, indecent, or improper language, to the annoyance of any person who shall lawfully be using, or who shall lawfully be in, upon, or about the River Thames, or the banks or towpaths thereof, or any land belonging to or acquired by the Conservators.

(4.) Bathe without proper bathing dress to drawers, unless properly screened from view.

(5.) Bathe or prepare to bathe at any place where or between any hours when bathing is for the time being prohibited by the Conservators.

(6.) Do any act which may cause danger to any person or property, or occasion a nuisance, obstruction, or annoyance to the public or to any person.

(7.) Commit any trespass upon any dwelling-house bordering upon or near to the river, or in anywise coming within the description of a riparian dwelling-house, or upon any curtilage or garden belonging to such dwelling-house.

(8.) Navigate or be concerned in navigating, or be in, upon, or about any of the places specified in sub-section 1 of this Bye-law, whilst in a state of intoxication.

(9.) Cast or throw into, or upon, or place, or cause or suffer to fall or flow into or upon any of the places specified in sub-section 1 of this Bye-law, any sewage, rubbish, or other offensive matter or thing.

(10.) Destroy or injure any flowering or other plant, or any shrub, vegetation, tree, wood, or underwood.

(11.) Light, maintain, throw down, place or leave any fire, or any flaming, smouldering or burning substance, matter or thing, in any place where the same may cause any danger or damage to property of any kind or reasonable annoyance to any person.

(12.) Kill, injure, take, catch or trap, or attempt to kill, injure, take, catch or trap any bird, or the young of any bird or animal: Provided always, that this sub-section shall not extend to prevent any person employed by the Conservators, or acting under the consent of the Conservators, from killing vermin, or shall affect any right of fowling, shooting, hunting, or sporting, existing on the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

(13.) Take, destroy, search for, or disturb the nest of any bird.

(14.) Destroy, injure, disturb, or take out of, or remove from the nest, whether permanently or temporarily, the egg of any bird.

(15.) Move, injure, or deface any notice, notice board, work, or thing whatsoever, the property or in charge of the Conservators, or set up by them or with their consent.

(16.) Do any act injuriously affecting the safety or amenity of the river.

15. Any person guilty of any act or default in contravention of any of these Bye-laws shall be liable to a penalty of, and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding, forty shillings, and any person who shall after due notice repeat or continue any such act or default, shall be liable to a penalty of, and shall forfeit a sum not exceeding, five pounds.

16. Provided always, that nothing in these Bye-laws shall be construed to in anywise prejudice or prejudicially affect any remedy of the Conservators now existing, or shall interfere with or diminish any powers of the Conservators, or shall be construed to deprive any riparian owner of any legal rights in the soil or bed of the river which he may at the time of the passing of the "Thames Preservation Act, 1885," have possessed,

or of any legal remedies which he may then have had for preventing the anchoring, mooring, loitering or delay of any vessel, or to give any riparian owner any right as against the public which he did not possess before the passing of the said Act, to exclude any person from entering upon or navigating any back-water, creek, channel, bay, inlet, or other water, whether deemed to be part of the River Thames, as in the said Act defined or not, or shall be construed to render dispensable or punishable, in any less manner or degree, any act or default now by law punishable.
