Whereas Their Majesties have received Information upon Oath, That the Persons herein after particularly named, have结合 together, and, with diverse other Persons, the Papists, to raise Rebellion, and for that purpose have made Provision of Arms, and have Listed themselves in several Regiments, Troops and Companies, under pretence of Commissions from the late King James; Their Majesties have thought fit, by the Advice of Their Privy Council, to Issue out this Royal Proclamation, and to hereby Strictly Charge and Command Thomas Tidbale of the Lodge in Mairs Cough in the County of Lancaster, John Gislingham of Theland Castle in the same County, Esq; Thomas Tidbale of the Lodge in Mairs Cough aforesaid, Gent; Robert Butler of the same place, Gent; Henry Butler of the same place, Richard Butler another of the Sons of the said Richard Butler, Alexander Butler of Tandenthal in the said County; Thomas Carus Son of Christopher Carus of Weatherby in said County, Esq; William Westby Son of Francis Westby of Westby Cough aforesaid, Gent. Goodman late of Oakliff in the said County, Chz, George Carus of Seller-hall in the said County, Gent. Thomas Worthington junior, of Wiggan in the said County of Lancaster, Chz, Goodwin a Romish Priest, and also the several Persons lately called by the Names before mentioned, viz Captain Harrington, Captain Penny, Lieutenant Penalt, Colonel Tempeit, Captain Eyre alias Barlow, David Thornton of Oldsteds in the County of York, and Colton of Oldsteds aforesaid, and every of them, forthwith to Restraine themselves to some one of Their Majesties offices of the Peace, and in case they do not Return thitherwards, Their Majesties do hereby Require and Command at their Lodging or Lodges to Detain, Take, and apprehend them wherever they may be found, and to carry them before the next Justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate, who are hereby required to Commit them to the next Gaol, there to remain until they be thence delivered by due course of Law. And Their Majesties do hereby Require the said Justices, or other Magistrates, immediately to give Notice thereof to Their own Council. And Their Majesties do hereby give Notice to all Persons that shall Conceal the Persons above-named, or any of them, or be Aiding or Assisting in the Concealing of them, or furthering their Escape, That they shall be proceeded against for such their Offence with the utmost Severity according to Law.

Commanding all Papists, and Reputed Papists, forthwith to depart from the Cities of London and Westminster, and from within Ten Miles of the same.

Vwhereas notwithstanding the several Acts of Parliament, whereby the Relicting of Papists to the Cities of London and Westminster, and Places thereto adjacent, are declared to be dangerous to the Peace and Safety of this Kingdom, and the Ways and Methods Provided and Enacted, as well for Detaining as punishing them; And notwithstanding the Ma-

nifestation of Their Majesties Popish Subjects to exceed Their Protection and Royal Grace to allowe, or Their Subjects that will leave Quarentine, Persons under Their Government, divers Popish Recusants, being accustomed to their former Dispositions and of Religion apart, as well as others, Refusing to be part of any and Places in great numbers, and thereby having opportunity to Meet, have taken great Advantage to Confide and Prefecture divers Mischievous and Troublesome Devices and Practices, contrary to the Duty of their Allegiance. Their Majesties have therefore thought fit (by the Advice of Their Privy Council) to Issue out this Royal Proclamation, and do hereby Strictly Charge and Command all Popish Recusants, and Persons reputed to be so, (except Merchants Strangers, and such other Persons as in the said Acts are Excepted) on or before the Seven and twentieth Day of this instant June, to Depart out of the said Cities, and from all Places without the space of Ten Miles of the same. And Their Majesties do hereby further Require and Command, That if any of the said Popish Recusants, or so Reputed, shall presume to remain within either of the said Cities, or Ten Miles adjacent, or reprise or return to the same, they be proceeded against as Persons Conspiring against the Peace and Welfare of the Government. A PROCLAMATION.

For the Confinement of Popish Recusants within Five Miles of their respective Dwellings.

THeir Majesties having received Information, That divers Popish Recusants bearing Correspondence with, or favoring Their Majesties Enemies, do withdraw from their Habitation, Distraying and Endeavouring to corrupt and Seduce Their Majesties Subjects, and thereby Erecting to Sedition and Rebellion, at this time, whilst Their Majesties, with most of the Power of Christendom, are Engaged in a necessary War against the French King, for Their common Security, and the particular Preservation of these Kingdoms, wherein the Interest and Safety of all and Regular Their Majesties Subjects do depend, Have thought fit (by the Advice of Their Privy Council) to Issue this Royal Proclamation, and do hereby Strictly Charge and Command all Popish Recusants, being above the Age of Sixteen Years, born within any of Their Majesties Realms or Dominions, or made Denizens, That they and each of them do according to the Statutes in that behalf made, return to their respective Places of Abode, and if they have no Places of abode, return to the Places where the Father or Mother of such respective Papists, or that be their dwelling, and do not thereafter Remove or Pass above Five Miles from thence. And Their Majesties do hereby further Strictly Charge and Command all Their Justices, Judges, Magistrates, Officers and Officers, That if such Popish Recusant, or Person reputed so to be, shall not return to his or her Place of Abode, and thereof continue with it Removing or Passing more Five Miles from thence, according to the said Statute and Rule of the Statute.

that before, That then such Popish Recusants, or Persons so reputed respectively, be Prosecuted and brought to Punishment, as well by turning unto them the Oaths mentioned in an Act of Parliament made in the First Year of Their Majesties Reign, Entituled [An Act for the Abrogating the Oaths of Supremacy and Allegiance, and Appointing other Oaths.] as by putting in Execution the just Lawes which are now in force against them.

Venice, June 15. The Emperor, upon the News he received on the 13th instant, by an Express from the Governor of Milon, of the Duke of Parma's having declared against France, has resolved to send immediately 3000 Men to his Army, under the command of Prince Eugent of Savoy, who is gone Post to Turin, to give that Duke Assurance from Imperial Majesty, that a sufficient Secur. shall be sent his Highlands, to secure him against the Invasions of the French, and to free him from the Invasion they have made into his Country. The Letters from the blockade of Gran Herstal of the 22d put it down, that the Count de Corbilly, who commands there, having left 600 Men in Ambush, sent a Detachement to drive out of the Castle that were hiding under the Walls of that place, where upon the Enemy fled out to the number of 300, and our Men according to their orders retired, and drew them into the Ambush, where above 100 of the Turks were killed, with several principal Officers of the Garrison, and most of the rest taken prisoners. In this Action we had 12 Men killed, and 8 wounded. The Articles from Bulgaria, the Grand Viceroy had appointed the General rendezvous of the common Army at Pafijack on this side of Sphax; but that he would not put himself in this post till towards the end of this Month.

Zwick, June 19. The last Letters from Savoy tell us, that 14000 Men of the Forces of the Manane, with the Duke's Troops and the Marca of Modena were marching against the French. That they had already made a good beginning, a Body of Piedmontais and Venetians, assisted by some of those of Modena, having taken up the French Quarters near the Pass de Sape, a strong Post, killed and dangerously wounded above 420, and taken a Colonel, a Lieutenant-Colonel, and 5 Captains, with a great number of common Soldiers Prisoners. And that they had hopes of forcing the Peakes behind Montecucco, and cutting off his Army, which is said to be about 14000 strong. We hear likewise, that the French are in a great Alarm in Dauphine and Bresse, not having at present 1500 Men of regulated Troops on that side, where they lie very open.

From the Imperial Army near Murbach, June 20. The Elector of Brandenburg arrived here last night, the whole Army being drawn up in Battalia to receive him. We shall now decamp in 2 or 3 days, and then in a day or two we shall pass the Rhine at Mainz. The Elector's Standard is likewise come hither. The French Army is still between Landau and Lauterbach.

Coblentz, June 21. This morning marched from hence a Battalion of Brandenburgers to the Camp above Murbach in the County of Eguisheim, where there are now above 15000 Men in a Body. The Troops of Monsieur are gone to the Rhine, which they will pass at Kayserswerth, and from thence continue their march to the forenamed place of Rhenish. We are told from Trier, that the French are preparing to quit that City, and to treat him in the same manner as they did Spire, Worms, &c. building a bridge to the Landholders to remove their Goods in 24 hours, and to carry them to Saar-Louis, Toulonville, Luxemburg, or Monschau, in preparation for the Galley.

Hannover, June 22. The English Army began their march on the 20th towards the Rhine, and the Hesse will follow in few days. They write from Coblenz, that the King of Sweden was on his departure from thence to Paris yesterday.

Berlin, June 23. Prince Württemberg decamped yesterday from Coblenz, and marched to Pons de Selle on the River Moselle; He has a Regiment with him too a Dragoon Man, without reckoning 4000 Horse under the Command of the Vice-Marshal Count Nassau, which, according to our Advice, were still at Pons, about 10 Regiments of Foot, and the 1500 Spanish Horse commanded by Lieutenant-General d'Alvarez, with several other Troops that have not yet joined the Army. The Duke of Luxembourg is Encamped near Mayence, and a Body of 12 or 14000 French are posted in Thuringia, under the command of the Marechal d'Herbreville. Our General is about Ghent with his Forces, and it's thought he will advance towards the French Territories. They write from Coblenz, that the Troops of Monsieur were on their march to join Count Charles of Schomberg, who is Encamped with a Body of Men in the Eifel.

Hannover, June 24. The States of Holland are adjourned till the 1st of the next Month. This day two Plenipotentiaries from the Elector of Brandenburg produced their Powers, and took their Place at the Meeting of the Allies. Prince Württemberg marched the 24th, with 30000 Men, to Berlin, and Encamped within six hours march of the French Army, which lies near Murbach. The Baron de Turenne, Vice-Admiral of Savoy, is come hither by Land, being to command the 12 Sardinian Men of War that are duly expected in due seas, in order to join with our Fleet. We have advice from several Parts, of the Successes that are marching to Savoy, where in a short time will be formed an Army of 30000 Men, of which this Duke is to be Generalissimo. They write from France, that the French Fleet which sailed the 9th, was returned to Brest, where it was till the 12th of this Month.

Erfburg, June 24. This day the Parliament Adjourned to the 26th instant. There is a General Fete appointed throughout this

Kingdom, for the exploring the Building of castles in the Country, and Preservation of His Majesties Sacred Person, and the Property of Their Majesties Arms, to be kept there throughout on the South side of the River Tyne, and the Hill of Bay on the North side of the same.

Pembroke, June 14. Yesterday morning came into this Harbour the Sophie from Chatham, and the William and Mary of Bristol to Virginia.

Warrington, June 16. The 12th was shipp'd here the Dutch Regiment of Horse of Montgomery, which set sail that night for Ireland. The 14th, in the morning, Lieutenant-General Ginkel sailed with the Regiment of Gren, and in the evening followed that of Bonn. The Dragoons sailed the 15th, in the morning, from Kirkcudbright.

Plonmouth, June 17. This day arrived here the Nonsuch and Pembroke Frigates, with divers outward-bound Merchant Ships under their Convoy.

Chester, June 18. The Earl of Portland's Regiment sailed on the 16th instant from Highgate, whether part of the Earl of Oxford's we marched from hence, and the rest will follow to morrow or next day.

Bengal, June 16. His Majesty at his arrival here found his Forces in a very good condition, Provisions plentiful, the Ground full of Corn, the Grass well grown, and in a word, all things to his Satisfaction. His Majesty intends to part them hence on the 15th instant, the Troops being already on their march to the place appointed for their Rendezvous. The Dutch Regiments of Horse and Dragoons are arrived from Knickerbocker and Amsterdam.
