Their Majesties have thought fit, by the Advice of Their Privy-Council, to Issue out this Their Royal Proclamation, and to hereby strictly Charge and Command Thomas Tildesley of the Lodge in Mairs Cough in the County of Lancaster, John Gillingham of the Thurland Cattle in the same County, Esq; Thomas Tildesley of the Lodge in Mairs Cough aforesaid, Gent. Robert Fiddell of the same Place, Gent. Henry Butler of the same Place, and of Lancashire in the said County of Lancaster, Esq; Richard Butler another of the Sons of the said Richard Butler, Alexander Butler of Tanderiffe in the said County, Thomas Carus Son of Christopher Carus of Westhall in the said County, Esq; William Westby Son of Francis Westby of Mairs Cough aforesaid, Gent. Gooden late of Oakliff in the said County, Esq; George Carus of Seller-hall in the said County, Esq; Thomas Butler Gent. another Son of the said Richard Butler Esq; Knype eldest Son of William Knype of Hallinghall in the County of York, Gent. Cole late of Thurland Castle, Gent. Captain Harrington, Captain Penny, Lieutenant Penalt, Colonel Tempett, Captain Hyerley alias Barlow, David Thornton of Oldfields in the County of York, and Colton of Oldfields aforesaid, and every of them, forthwith to Rendre themselves to some one of Their Majesties Justices of the Peace. And in case they do not Rendre themselves, Their Majesties do hereby Require and Command all Their Loving Subjects to Discover, Take, and Apprehend them wherever they may be found, and to carry them before the next Justice of the Peace or Chief Magistrate, who are hereby required to Commit them to the next Gaol, there to remain until they be thence delivered by due course of Law. And Their Majesties do hereby Require the said Justice, or other Magistrate, immediately to give Notice thereof to Them or Their Council. And Their Majesties do hereby give Notice to all Persons that shall Conceal the Persons above-named, or any of them, or be aiding or assisting in the Concealing of them, or furthering their Escape, That they shall be proceeded against for such their Offence with the utmost severity according to Law.

A PROCLAMATION.

For the Confinement of Popish Recusants within Five Miles of their respective Dwellings.

MARIE R.

THEIR MAJESTIES having received Information, That divers Popish Recusants having Conspired with, or Encouraged Their Majesties Enemies, do withdraw from their Habitations, Disguising and Endeavouring to Conspire and Seduce Their Majesties Subjects, and thereby Excite to Sedition and Rebellion, at this time, whilst Their Majesties with most of the Princes of Christendom, are engaged in a necessary War against the French King, for their common Security, and the particular Preservation of these Kingdoms, wherein the Interest and Safety of all and singular Their Majesties Subjects do depend; Have therefore (with the Advice of Their Privy-Council) to Issue this Their Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Popish Recusants, being above the Age of Sixteen Years, born within any of Their Majesties Realms or Dominions, or made Denizens, That they and every of them do (according to the Statutes in that behalf made) repair to their respective Places of Abode, and if they have no Places of Abode, then to the Places where the Father or Mother of such respective Person is, or shall be then dwelling, and do not thereafter Remove or Pass above Five Miles from thence. And Their Majesties do hereby further strictly Charge and Command all Their Justices, Justices, Magistrates, Ministers and Officers, That if such Popish Recusants, or Person reputed so to be, shall not repair to his or her Place of Abode, and there continue within a Removing or Passing above Five Miles from thence, according to the true Intent and Meaning of the Stat

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that behalf, that such Popish Recusants, or Persons reputed respectively, be prosecuted and brought to Punishment, as well by Towing into some the Oaths mentioned in an Act of Parliament made in the First Year of Their Majesties Kings, Edward [An Act for the Abrogating the Oaths of Supremacy and Allegiance, and Appointing other Oaths,] as by putting in Execution the several Statutes which are now in force against them.

Paris, June 15. The Emperor, upon the News he received on the 13th Instant, by an Express from the Governor of Milan, of the Duke of Savoy's having declared against France, has resolved to send immediately 3000 Men to his Aid, under the command of Prince Eugene of Savoy, who is gone Post to Turin, to give that Duke Assistance from Imperial Majesty, that a sufficient Succo. shall be sent his Highness, to secure him against the Inroads of the French, and to free him from the Invasion they have made into his Country. The Letters from the Count de Coislin, who commands there, having had 600 Men in Ambush, sent a Detachment to drive away the Cavalry that were lying under the Walls of that place, when the Enemy chased out to the number of 300, and our Men according to their orders retired, and drew them into the Ambush, where above 100 of the Turks were killed, with several principal Officers of the Garrison, and most of the rest taken Prisoners: In this Action we had 12 Men killed, and 8 wounded. The Affairs from Bulgaria, the Grand Vicer had appointed the General Rendezvous of the Ottoman Army at Passarick on this side of Sphax; but that he would not part himself from Sphax till towards the end of this Month.

Vienna, June 19. The last Letters from Savoy tell us, that 14000 Men of the Forces of the Milanese, with the Duke's Troops and the Militia of Mantua were marching against the French. That they had already made a good beginning, a Body of Piedmontese and Venetians, assisted by some of the Duke's Troops, having taken up in the French Quarters near the Pas de Saas, a strong Post, killed and dangerously wounded above 400 and taken a Colonel, a Lieutenant-Colonel, and 5 Captains, with a great number of common Soldiers Prisoners. And that they had hopes of forcing the Passes behind Monsieur Curmar, and cutting off his Army, which is said to be about 14000 strong. We hear likewise, that the French are in a great Alarm in Dauphine and Bress, not having at present 1500 Men of regulated Troops on that side, where they lie very open.

From the Imperial Army near Linzheim, June 20. The Elector of Brandenburg arrived here last night, the whole Army being drawn up in Battalies to receive him. We shall now decamp in 2 or 3 days, and march a day's journey, that we shall pass the Rhine at Mannheim. The Viceroy of Sicily is likewise come hither. The French Army is divided between Landau and Linzheim.

Colmar, June 21. This morning marched from hence a Battalion of Brandenburgers to the Camp at Manderscheid in the County of Ergau, where there are now above 15000 Men in a Body. The Troops of Moravia are come to the Rhine, which they will pass at Neuchâtel, and from thence continue their march to the French-occupied place of Benzenheim. We are told from Trier, that the French are preparing to quit that City, and to retreat to the Camp of Metz, and thence to the Rhine, &c. having given notice to the Inhabitants to remove their Goods in 24 hours, and to carry them to Saar Louis, Luxembourg, Luxemburg, or Montroy, in part of being sent to the Galleys.

Hannover, June 21. The Swedish Fleet began their march on the 20th towards the Rhine, and the Harle will follow in few days. They were informed, that the King of Sweden was on his departure from thence to the West Indies.

Brussels, June 21. Prince Maurice decamped yesterday from Cologne, and marched to Pass de Saas on the River Pison: He has at present with him 3000 fighting Men, without reckoning the 4000 that are under the Command of the Viceroy-Marshal Count Nassau, which are also marching to Pass de Saas, about 10 leagues from Cologne, and the 1500 Spanish Horse commanded by Lieutenant-General Struyck, with several other Troops that have not yet joined the Army. The Duke of Luxembourg is encamped near Manderscheid, and a Body of 12 or 14000 French are posted in Havelon, under the command of the Marschal d'Hervilliers. Our Governor-General is about Ghent with his Forces, and it's thought he will advance towards the French Territories. They write from Cologne, that the Troops of Monsie were on their march to join Count Charles of Salmberg, who is encamped with a Body of Men in the Esfeld.

Hague, June 21. The States of Holland are Adjourned till the 10th of the next Month. This day two Plenipotentiaries from the Elector of Brandenburg produced their Powers, and took their Place at the Meeting of the States. Prince Waldecke marched the 24th, with 3000 Men, to Havelon, and encamped within six hours March of the French Army, which lies near Manderscheid. The Baron de Turenne, Vice-Minister of Sweden, is come hither by Land, being to command the 12 Swedish Men of War that are daily expected in this Town, in order to join with our Fleet. We have advice from several Parts, of the Success that are marching to Savoy, where in a short time will be formed an Army of 30000 Men, of which the Duke is to be Generalissimo. They write from France, that the French Fleet which sailed the 6th, was returned to Brest, where it was still on the 13th of this Month.

Essex, June 14. This day the Parliament Adjourned to the 26th Instant. There is a General Fast appointed throughout this

Kingdom, for the imploring the Blessing of God in the Preservation of His Majesty's Sacred Person, and the Prosperity of Their Majesties Arms, to be kept the 29th Instant on the South side of the River Tyne, and the 11th of July on the North side of the same.

Pembroke, June 14. Yesterday morning came into this Harbour the Sloop from Carlsberg, and the William and John of Bristol from Leghorn.

Worcester, June 16. The 12th was shipped here the Dutch Regiment of Horse of Monteville, which set sail that night for Leghorn. The 13th, in the morning, Lieutenant-General Ginkel sailed with the Regiment of Ozen, and in the evening followed that of Boncour. The Dragoons sailed the 15th, in the morning, from Rotterdam.

Plymouth, June 17. This day arrived here the Newcastle and Pembroke Frigates, with divers outward-bound Merchant Ships under their Convoy.

Chichester, June 18. The Earl of Portland's Regiment sailed on the 16th Instant from Highgate, whether part of the Earl of Oxford's are marched from hence, and the rest will follow to-morrow next day.

Brighton, June 16. His Majesty at his arrival here found his Forces in a very good condition, Provisions plentiful, the Ground full of Corn, the Grass well grown, and in a word, all things to his Satisfaction. His Majesty intends to part them hence on the 19th Instant, the Troops being already on their march to the place appointed for their Rendezvous. The Dutch Regiments of Horse and Dragoons are arrived from Rotterdam and Antwerp.
