A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

W HEREAS by Section 2 of "The Customs Amendment Act, 1836," We are authorized from time to time to make, and when made revoke, a Proclamation prohibiting the importation into Our United Kingdom of such Coins coined in a foreign country as are in that behalf specified in such Proclamation; and it is by the said section enacted, that while such Proclamation is in force the Coins therein specified shall be goods prohibited to be imported as if they were specified in section 42 of "The Customs Consolidation Act, 1876."

And whereas We have deemed it expedient, with the advice of Our Privy Council, to make Proclamation accordingly.

Now, therefore, with the advice of Our Privy Council, We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, prohibit the importation into Our United Kingdom of all Coins coined in any foreign country, other than Gold or Silver Coins.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding " of benefices in plurality, and to make better " provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that " Whereas in some instances tithings, " hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts " may be separated from the parishes or mother "churches to which they belong, with great " advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial "may in some instances with advantage be " annexed to parishes or districts to which they are " contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes "for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to "his own diocese it shall appear to the Arch-"bishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of "any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place, or district within the diocese of such Arch-" bishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the " case may be, may be advantageously separated " from any parish or mother church and either be " constituted a separate benefice by itself or be " united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other "adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or "district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to

"form a separate parish or benefice, or that " any extra-parochial place may with advantage "be annexed to any parish to which it "is contiguous, or be constituted a separate " parish for ecclesiastical purposes ; and the said "Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme " in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be " transmitted to the said Archbishop for his " consideration) describing the mode in which it " appears to him that the alteration may best be ' effected, and how the changes consequent on " such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-"diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and "other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, "and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, "may be made with justice to all parties " interested; and if the patron or patrons of the "benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or " their hands to such scheme, or to such modifica-"tion thereof as the said Archbishop may " approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any "such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, " by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall "be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make " an Order for carrying such scheme, or modifica-" tion thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to "make better provision for the assignment of "ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels " augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of "Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That "when by any Order of Her Majesty in Council, " as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical " purposes is constituted, the same shall, on regis-" tration thereof, and with the consent in writing " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or beuefices to be thereby affected, become a " perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister " thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, " and his successors, shall be a body politic and " corporate, with perpetual succession, and may " receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-"forth have within the limits of the district "parish formed under the Church Building Acts, " for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole " and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in "anywise be subject to the controul or inter-" ference of the incumbent or incumbents of the " benefice or benefices to be affected by such " Order, if he or they shall have consented to " such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas James Colquhoun, Lord Bishop of Bangor, hath made a representation in writing to the Right Honourable Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows :-

To the Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend Father in God James Colquhoun Lord Bishop of Bangor do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Anglescy and diocese of Bangor the rectory and parish church of Llanbeulan to which belong the townships or chapelrics of Llanfaelog Llechylched and Crirchiog the boundaries whereof respectively are well known and defined.

sand eight hundred and eighty-one was two hundred and twenty-three persons and the population of the said townships or chapelries was, seven hundred and fourteen, five hundred and seventysix and one hundred and twenty-nine respectively.

"That the said parish church of Llanbeulan affords accommodation for one hundred and forty persons or thereabouts and the respective churches or chapels of the said townships or chapelries of Llanfaelog and Llechylched afford accommodation for two hundred and fifty and two hundred and twenty persons or thereabouts respectively.

"That the annual value of the said rectory of Llaubeulan with the said townships or chapelries after deducting all taxes rates dues and other permanent charges and outgoings is seven hundred and fifty-four pounds eleven shillings the whole of which arises from tithe rent-charge and rent of glebe lands.

"That there is a rectory house of residence situate within the said township or chapelry of Llanfaelog with five acres and twenty-two perches of glebe land in such township or chapelry and nineteen acres three roods and four perches of glebe land in the said parish of Llanbeulan and the parishes of Trewalchmai and Coedana in the said county of Anglesey.

"That the said rectory of Llanbeulan with the said townships or chapelries of Llanfaelog Llechylched and Ceirchiog is in the patronage of the Bishop of Bangor and the Reverend Robert Williams M.A. Clerk in Holy Orders is the present incumbent thereof.

" That the said parish church of Llanbeulan is distant from each of the churches or chapels of the said townships or chapelries of Llanfaelog and Llechylched about three miles.

"That the said townships or chapelries of Llechylched and Ceirchiog appear to have been from time immemorial and are now treated as separate and distinct parishes for all civil purposes and baptisms churchings marriages and burials have been solemnized and performed in the churches or chapels thereof and the burial grounds thereto belonging until the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, when such parish churches were pulled down and a new parish church erected in the village of Bryngwran in the said township or chapelry of Llechylched and baptisms churchings marriages and burials have since been and now are solemnized and performed in such new church of Llechylched and the burial ground thereto belonging.

" That it appears to me that the said townships or chapelries of Llechylched and Ceirchiog may under the provisions of the Acts of the first and second years of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter forty-nine be advantageously separated from the said parish and parish church of Llanbeulan and may together be advantageously constituted a separate parish and benefice for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy.

" That if the said townships or chapelries of Llechylched and Ceirchiog be separated from the said parish and parish church of Llanbeulan and together constituted a separate parish and benefice it is proposed to transfer to the said proposed separate parish and benefice the whole of the rectorial tithe rent-charge arising or payable in respect of lands within the said townships or chapelries of Llechylched and Ceirchiog now belonging to the said rectory of Llanbeulan and amounting according to the respective tithe "That the population of the said parish of apportionments of the said townships or chapel-Llanbeulan according to the census of one thouthousand eight hundred and forty-four to the annual sums of two hundred and fifteen pounds and eighty-six pounds respectively making together the sum of three hundred and one pounds together with the glebe and glebe rents belonging to the said rectory of Llanbeulan situate and arising within the said townships or chapelries of Llechylched and Ceirchiog and the monies received by the sale of a portion of the said glebe, particulars of which are as follows :--

"1. A tenement or farm called Lleinar Allor containing together five acres and seventeen roods or thereabouts situate in the said township or chapelry of Llechylched and now let to William Owen at a yearly rent of six pounds.

"2. A tenement or farm called Penygroesion containing together two acres one rood and twenty perches or thereabouts situate in the said township or chapelry of Ceirchiog and now let to John Parry at a yearly rent of five pounds.

"3. A quillet being part of Penygroeslon aforesaid containing two roods and four perches or thereabouts and let to Richard Williams at a yearly rent of ten shillings and

"4. A sum of £202 Os. 4d. Metropolitan £3 per centum Consolidated Stock standing in the names of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and the said Commissioners have promised to grant to the said proposed separate parish and benefice out of their common fund a capital sum of one thousand five hundred pounds to be laid out and expended with the consent of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and of the Bishop of the diocese in or towards the erection of a parsonage-house for the said proposed separate parish and benefice.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop of Bangor have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested.

And I do submit the same to your Grace, together with my consent in writing as patron and the consent of the said Robert Williams as rector of the said rectory of Llanbeulan to the intent that your Grace may, if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consent to Her Majesty in Council. "J. C. Bangor."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Lord Bishop of Bangor, and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows :--

" SCHEME.

"That the said townships or chapelries of Llechylched and Ceirchiog be separated from the said rectory and parish and parish churches of Llanbeulan and be constituted together a separate parish for all ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of the perpetual curacy of Llechylched - cum-Ceirchiog of which parish and benefice the said church of Llechylched shall be the parish church and the same shall be and remain under the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as that under which the said rectory of Llanbeulan now is.

"That the incumbent of Llechylched-cum-Ceirchiog shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said proposed separate parish and benefice. "That baptisms churchings marriages and burials shall be performed celebrated and take place in the parish church of the said proposed separate parish and benefice and in the cburchyard thereto belonging and that the fees for all such and other ecclesiastical offices arising from or in respect of the said proposed separate parish and benefice and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong and be paid to the incumbent of Llechylched-cum-Ceirchiog.

"That the whole of the rectorial tithe rentcharge arising or payable in respect of lands within the said proposed separate parish and benefice now belonging to the said rectory of Llanbeulan and amounting together as mentioned in the above written representation to the annual sum of three hundred and one pounds together with the glebe and glebe rents situate and arising within the said proposed separate parish and benefice and the moneys received by the sale of a portion of the said glebe the particulars of which are also mentioned in the above written representation be annexed and belong to and form part of the endowment of the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Llechylched-cum-Ceirchiog.

"That the inhabitants of the said proposed separate parish and benefice shall be exonerated from all liability to repair any churches situate elsewhere than within the limits of the said proposed separate parish and benefice but shall be liable subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act 1868' to repair the said parish church of the said proposed separate parish and benefice.

"That the inhabitants of the said proposed. separate parish and benefice shall be entitled to resort to and attend the said parish church thereof and to be accommodated with sittings therein but. shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommoda.-tion in the churches of Llanbeulan and Llanfaelog.

"That nothing herein contained shall affect or be construed to affect the right of patronage to the said benefice of Llanbeulan but that the same shall remain continue and be as it now is and that the patronage of the said proposed separate parish and benefice of Llechylched-cum-Ceirchiog shall belong to and be vested in the Right Reverend James Colquioun Lord Bishop of Bangor and his successors for ever.

"That nothing herein contained shall affect or be construed to affect the revenues and endowments of the said rectory of Llanbeulan with the township or chapelry of Llanfaelog except as hereinbefore-mentioned.

"Given under my hand this sixth day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six. "J. C. Bangor.

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proposed, and to every matter and thing ther contained."

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend James Colquhoun Lord Bishop of Bangor has represented unto us amongst other things :--

"That there is in the county of Anglesey and diocese of Bangor the rectory and parish church of Llanbeulan to which belongs the townships or chapelries of Llanfaelog Llechylched and Ceirchiog the boundaries whereof respectively are well known and defined.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said townships or chapelries of Llechylched and Ceirchiog may under the provisions of the Act 1 and 2 Victoria chapter 106 and 2 and 3 Victoria chapter 49 be advantageously separated from the said parish and parish church of Llanbeulan and may together be advantageously constituted a separate parish and benefice for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop as the patron of the benefice and of the Reverend Robert Williams the incumbent of the same has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"The undersigned William, Lord Archbishop of York, Primate of England and Metropolitan, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six hereby reports to Your Majesty in Council.

"That there is in the county and diocese of York the parish of the vicarage of Sancton which comprises the township of North Cliffe the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That there is also in the same county and diocese the parish of the vicarage of North Cave which adjoins the said township of North Cliffe.

"That according to the last census the population of the said parish of Suncton was four hundred and ninety-one, that of the said parish of North Cave was one thousand three hundred and sixty-five, and that of the said township of North Cliffe, one hundred and twenty-five.

"That the net annual value of the said vicarage of Sancton is three hundred and twentyfive pounds and that of the said vicarage of North Cave is two hundred and seventy-five pounds or thereabouts.

"That His Grace the Archbishop of York is patron of the said vicarage of Sancton and the Reverend Edward Kaye Holt is the present vicar of the said vicarage.

"That Edward John Stracey Clitherow a Colonel in Her Majesty's Army is the patron of. the said vicarage of North Cave and the Reverend John Jarratt is the present vicar thereof.

"That the said patrons and incumbents are consenting parties to the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed.

"That it appears to the said Archbishop that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament passed in the session held in the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six the said township of North Cliffe may be advantageously separated from the parish of Sancton to which it at present belongs and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of North Cave.

" That pursuant to the directions contained in the before-mentioned Act the Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him the alteration above proposed may be best effected, and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect of patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme he doth by this report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty in Council with the consents in writing to the said scheme of the patrons and incumbents of the parishes to be affected to the intent that Your Majesty in Council in case it shall be thought expedient and proper so to do may make an Order for carrying such scheme into effect.

"As witness the hand of the said Archbishop this first day of February one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

And whereas the scheme and consents, referred to in the report of the said Archbishop arc as follows :--

" The SCHEME referred to in the foregoing Report.

"That the township of North Cliffe in the parish of Sancton and county and diocese of York shall be separated from the said parish of Sancton to which it at present belongs and be united to and form part of the parish of North Cave in the same county and diocese for ecclesiastical purposes. "That the vicar of the parish of Sancton shall cease to have cure of souls within the said township of North Cliffe and the vicar of the parish of North Cave, shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of such township."

"That the inhabitants of the said township of North Cliffe, shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Sancton or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected within that parish but shall be liable as other inhabitants of the parish of North Cave for the repair of the parish church of North Cave and the chapel-of-case of Saint John, South Cliffe within the limits of the said parish.

"That the inhabitants of the said township of North Cliffe shall have the same rights as to pews and the performance of all offices and services of the church at the said parish church of North Cave, and the said chapel-of-ease of Saint John, South Cliffe and otherwise in relation to the same church and chapel as other inhabitants of the said parish of North Cave.

"That the fees for all such offices and services performed for the inhabitants of the said township of North Cliffe as aforesaid or arising within the limits of the same and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the incumbent of the benefice of North Cave.

"That no alteration shall be made as to the patronage or endowment of either of the said benefices to be affected by this scheme.

"CONSENTS.

Lord Archbishop of York, Primate of England and Metropolitan, the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage and parish church of Sancton in the county and our diocese of York, in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend Edward Kaye Holt, Clerk, Bachelor of Arts, the present vicar of the said vicarage and we Edward John Stracey Clitherow of Hotham Hall in the county of York, Esquire, the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage and parish church of North Cave in the same county and diocese in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend John Jarratt, Clerk, Master of Arts, vicar of the said vicarage. do hereby respectively signify our assent to the foregoing report and scheme.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, initialed "An Act to abridge the holding "of benefices in plurality, and to make better "provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever "it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Pro-

"vince, with respect to his own diocese, and "whenever it shall be represented to him by the "Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any "two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that " one or more benefice or benefices, and one or " more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, "vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or " dioceses, being either in the same parish or con-" tiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five " hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value " shall not exceed five hundred pounds, may, with " advantage to the interests of religion, be united " into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the " Province shall inquire into the circumstances of " the case ; and if on such enquiry it shall appear " to him that such union may be usefully made, " and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that "the patron or patrons of the said benefices, "sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicar-" ages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, " such consent being signified in writing under the " hands of such patron or patrons, the said Arch-" bishop shall, six weeks before certifying such " inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as herein-" after directed, cause with respect to his own dio-" cese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in "other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid " representation to be affixed on or near the prin-" cipal outer door of the church, or in some public " and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, " sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to " any person or persons interested, that he, she, or " they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in " writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, "to the said Archbishop, against such union; " and if no sufficient cause be shown within such " time, the said Archbishop shall certify the in-" quiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in "Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for "Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an "Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, " sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicar-"ages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, " for ecclesiastical purposes only."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eightyseven, in the words following, that is to say :--

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Edward Lord Bishop of Lincoln as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the vicarage of East Ravendale and the perpetual curacy or vicarage of West Kavendale both in the county and diocese of Lincoln having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice, we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the Venerable John Hodgson Iles of Lichfield in the county of Stafford Clerk Archdeacon of Stafford and the Reverend Woodthorpe Johnson of Grainsby in the county of Lincoln Clerk being as trustees of a certain indenture of settlement bearing date the ninth day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven the patrons of the said benefices and Robert John Hinman Parkinson of East Ravendale aforesaid being as equitable tenant for life in possession under the same indenture of settlement the person entitled to nominate to the said benefices if the same respectively were now vacant consent to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be adixed to the principal outer door of the parish church of East Ravendale and in a public and conspicuous place namely in a place where notices are usually affixed in the parish of West Ravendale the parish church being in ruins with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lincoln our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"As witness our hand this twenty-eighth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

And whereas Ernest Roland Wilberforce, Lord Bishop of Newcastle hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented in a writing dated the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, to the Right Honourable William Archbishop of York, as follows :--

"To the Most Reverend William Lord Archbishop of York.

"I the Right Reverend Ernest Roland Wilberforce Lord Bishop of Newcastle do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Northumberland and my diocese of Newcastle the vicarage of Chollerton the parish whereof comprises amongst other places the townships of Tone and Chipchase the boundaries of which township of Tone and portion of the township of Chipchase hereinafter more particularly referred to are well known and defined and are more particularly delineated and described in the map or plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured round with red the township of Tone being marked 'Township of Tone' and the said portion of the township of Chipchase being marked 'Portion of the Township of Chipchase.

"That the said portion of the township of Chipchase is bounded by the high road leading from Birtley Pit Houses (otherwise Sooty Row) on the east by the North British Railway Bridge and the entrance-gate of Chipchase Castle on the south and turning north on the west to Warkshaugh Farm and the River North Tyne.

"That there is no church or chapel within the boundaries of the said township of Tone or the said portion of the township of Chipchase and such township of Tone and the said portion of the township of Chipchase are distant from the parish church of Chollerton aforesaid at the nearest point

four miles and three quarters of a mile and at the remotest point seven miles and a half of a mile.

"That the populations of the said township of Tone and the said portion of the township of Chipchase together according to the last census is estimated to be one hundred and forty persons.

"That there is also in the said county of Northumberland and my diocese of Newcastle the vicarage of Birtley the boundaries of the parish whereof are well known and defined and are more particularly delineated and described in the said map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured round with blue.

"That the said township of Tone and the said portion of the township of Chipchase are contiguous to the parish of Birtley and are distant from the parish church of Birtley at the nearest point one-half of a mile and at the remotest point four miles.

"That the population of the parish of Chollerton aforesaid according to the last census amounts to one thousand two hundred and ten persons and that of the said parish of Birtley according to the same census amounts to three hundred and ninetythree persons.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Chollerton not reckoning the house of residence as an item is four hundred and fourteen pounds.

"That the patronage of the said vicarage of Chollerton is vested in the present vicar thereof the Reverend Christopher Bird.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Birtley not reckoning the house of residence as an item is one hundred and eighty pounds.

"That the patronage of the said vicarage of Birtley is vested in the Most Noble Algernon George Duke of Northumberland and the Reverend George Rome Hall is now the vicar thereof.

"That the patron and incumbent of the said vicarage and parish church of Chollerton and the patron and incumbent of the said vicarage and parish church of Birtley are all consenting parties to the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed as is testified by their respective hands to the consents in writing hereto annexed.

"That it appears to us that the said township of Tone and the said portion of the township of Chipchase may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter fortynine be advantageously separated from the said parish of Chollerton and be annexed to the said parish of Birtley for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it seems to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do submit the same to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this first day of December one thousand eight hundred and eightysix. "E. R. Newcastle."

"It is proposed to separate the township of

Tone and portion of the township of Chipchase in 1 the parish of Chollerton in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle(the boundaries whereof are well known and defined and are more particularly delineated in the map or plan annexed hereunto and thereon coloured round with red) from the said parish of Chollerton to which they belong and to annex them to the parish of Birtley in the said county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle to which they are contiguous for all ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the vicar of the parish of Chollerton shall cease to have cure of souls within said township of Tone and the portion of the township of Chipchase which are coloured round with red upon the said map or plan and the vicar of the parish of Birtley shall have sole and exclusive charge of souls within the same.

"That the inhabitants of the said township of Tone and the said portion of the township of Chipchase shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Chollerton or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected within that parish but shall be liable as other inhabitants of the said parish of Birtley to the repairs of the parish church of Birtley and that the inhabitants of the said township of Tone and the said portion of the township of Chipchase shall have the same rights as to pews and the performance of all offices and services of the church at the said parish church of Birtley and otherwise in relation to the same church and the parish belonging thereto as other inhabitants of the same parish.

" That the fees for such offices and services performed for the inhabitants of the said township of Tone and the said portion of the township of Chipchase as aforesaid or arising within the limits of the same and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the incumbent of the benefice of Birtley.

"That no alteration shall be made in respect of the patronage or any glebe land tithe or tithe rent-charge or other endowment of either of the said benefices of Chollerton and Birtley.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirtyseven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint Mary Rawtenstall, out of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint James Waterfoot, and out of the parochial chapelry of Newchurch-in-Rossendale all in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs the following extract from a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Porto Rico, relating to quarantine regulations in force there :-

A DECREE has been published under the direction of the Acting Governor-General of Porto Rico in the Official Gazette of the 3rd of this month, announcing that, in consequence of the existence of cholera in the ports of South America and Brazil, his Excellency, in con-formity with the rules laid down by the Provincial Sanitary Commission, has thought fit to decree, that all vessels coming direct from these ports will be regarded as foul, and suspected if coming from St. Thomas, which island does not adopt adequate precautionary measures; and that vessels arriving from the localities indicated will be required to perform quarantine according to sanitary regulations.

It is laid down in these regulations that all vessels coming from the United States and Windward Islands, even with clean bills of health, are to be subjected to a period of from three to five days' observation, whilst those proceeding from South American ports and elsewhere with foul bills of health must undergo ten to fifteen days' quarantine if no sickness has broken out during the voyage, and for a longer period if the contrary should be the case. The regulations further enjoin that quarantine is to be performed at either St. John's, Mayaguez, or Ponce, and that vessels carrying cargo, passengers, or mails are subject to fumigation and other approved sanitary measures.

No Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel), or which shall exceed in weight eleven pounds, shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

Prepayment.

5. The postage chargeable according to the respective rates hereinbefore mentioned shall, in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant), be prepaid at the time of posting by means of adhesive postage stamps.

Times of Posting.

6. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post, may be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :-

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sun-days, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

7. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

8. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office, that is to say :

- (1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at the counter in such office.
- (2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form, and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.
- (3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof, according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned, shall be prepaid as hereinbefore provided, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the Post without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration as aforesaid; and until such Parcel has been so measured and weighed, and the postage chargeable

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may, if he think fit, from time to time authorize such officers as he inay direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Irregular Posting of Parcels.

10. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post which, from any words or marks thereon, other external evidence, appears or to have been intended for transmission រាន a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter Box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say :-

- (1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).
- (2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, the same may be forwarded to its destination as a Parcel charged with the sum of one penny in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel. Provided that the postage prepaid upon any such Packet shall be allowed in part payment of any postage or other sum charged under this clause.

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels. 11. With regard to—

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office to be called for, or to a place beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, or at Smyrna, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and
(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or for any other sufficient reason;

The following provisions shall apply, that is to

- (1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined.
- (2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the parcel, or the declaration a companying the same, notice shall be given by post to the sender that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up

to the sender, or his agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid or, at the request of the sender, will be forwarded to a corrected address, or returned to him by post in either case upon the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

- (3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel, notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), that the Parcel will in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender, or his agent, or be returned to the sender by post.
- (4.) In any case the notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel, during a period to be specified in such notice, from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.
- (5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.
- (6.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions :---
 - (a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not, at the time of such correction, lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.
- (b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, there shall be paid a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.
- (7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."
- (8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage, and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable, if not prepaid by the sender, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to him.
- (9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.
- (10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to

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the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may, in his discretion direct or authorize.

(11.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General, it becomes offensive or injurious to any Officer of the Post Office or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Re-direction of Parcels.

12. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom or Smyrna, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or Smyrna is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom or Smyrna, as the case may be, to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

14. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

Prohibitions.

15. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel---

- (1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not; or
- (2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.
- (3.) Consisting of or containing-

(a.) Any explosive substance.

(b.) Any dangerous substance.

(c.) Any filth.

- (d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.
- (e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.

(f.) Except with the special permission of

the Postmaster-General, any living creature.

(g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance, or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

16.—(1.) There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses.

(2.) If any such Parcel be posted or tendered for conveyance by post the contents thereof, so far as the same consist of Parcels, may be forwarded to the addressees of such Parcels charged with new and distinct rates of postage according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and so far as the same consist of other Postal Packets may be treated and charged as unpaid Postal Packets, or such Parcel may be otherwise dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

17. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the Regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for safety of Parcels.

18. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

19. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage. 20. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

21. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

22. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

23. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.
