W Naples, June 6. We have an account by Letters of the 29th past from *Messina*, of the arrival there of the Pope's Gallies with those of *Malta*, in their way towards the *Levant*. Our Viceroy has taken up a considerable Sum of Money at Interest, to be remitted to the Governor of *Milan*; and there will be likewise sent from hence 2000 Men for the Service of that State.

Rome, June 10. The Pope has named Signior *Strozzi* to go his Nuncio to the Duke of *Savoy*, and has order'd him to depart forthwith. The Minister residing here from that Duke, had two days ago a long Audience of the Pope, whom he acquainted with the Resolutions his Highness has taken for the Defense of his Country against the Invasion of the French. The Cardinal de *Fourbin* is very much expected here from *France*. We have advice, that the Pope's Gallies are joyned with those of *Malta* at *Messina*.

Leghorn, June 12. The Gallies of *Naples* are just now arrived here with Soldiers for the State of *Milan*.

Turin, June 11. There are now come to our assistance from the State of *Milan* 5000 Men, 10 wks, 6000 Horses, and 9000 Foot, with 22 Pieces of Cannon, 8 Mortars, and a great quantity of Bombs, Granadoes, and Carcasses; The greatest part of this Army are already arrived in our Neighbourhood, and the rest are expected to morrow. Thus, the French have made some Ravage in our Villages, but upon the news of the approach of these Forces, they decamped with all the halt they could, and are going to put themselves under the Cannon of *Pignero*, into which place part of their Foot are already entered. In the mean time the *Vandals*, with those of *Mondovi*, who are about 10000 strong, do the French a great deal of mischief, and have kill'd and taken great numbers of them. The Militia of *Mondovi* is commanded by *Sebastian Pazum*, who has sent to the Governor of *Pignero* to demand 60000 Livres for Contributions, threatening the Neighbouring Country, in default of payment, with Military Execution. Besides, in *Milan* and *Piedmont* the Gentry are forming a considerable Body of Horse, and 4000 Men are coming from the Emperor, so that his Highness will quickly have a great Army, and he will put himself at the Head of it to enter into *Droghda*, where they are in a great Consternation by reason the *Vandals*, and those of *Mondovi* have already seized all the Passages of *Montgenevre*, which will hinder the French from sending any Succors to *Montieur Catinat*, or to *Pignero*, and gives us an easy passage into *Provence* and *Dauphine*. We have advice, that the French are in a great Alarm at *Grenoble*; and we are assured, that the People of *Pragelas* are joyned with those of *Mondovi*.

Vienna, June 18. The Letters from *Nissa* of the 27th past inform us, that General *Veterani* had been to visit the Fortres of *Precopiz*, and the Passage of *Leconny*, and had given Orders for the raising several new Works for the greater security of those places. That they had advice, that 1000 Turkish Horse had in two Parties advanced as far as *Piret*, and had seized upon the Cattel they found in the Neighbourhood of that place, but that the Governor of *Piret* sallying out with part of the Garison, had beaten back the Enemy, pursued them above a mile, and recovered all the Booty they had taken.

That 2000 *Rafsiens*, being joyned by 300 Germans, had, on the 19th of the last Month, taken the Town of *Bagna*, putting the greatest part of the Turks in Garison there to the Sword, and making the rest Prisoners, except the *Basha*-Commandant, and about 100 Men, who got away. And that another Party of *Rafsiens* had surpris'd a small place called *Berkowitz*, where 250 Turks were killed or taken. We have an account from *Widin*, that the Imperial Regiments, that came lately from *Transylvania* under the command of Major-General Count de *Taufmandorf*, were marched toward *Vipalanka*, where they were ordered to pass the *Danube*, and a Bridge was making for that purpose. The advices from *Turkey* say, that the Cham of *Turkey* had promised to go into the Field with the Grand Visier this Summer.

From the Imperial Camp at *Sintzheim*, June 21. The Elector of *Brandt*, the day after his arrival in the Camp, held a Council of War with all the General Officers. The greatest part of our Artillery is arrived, and the rest, with the Regiments that are now on their march to join us, are expected in 2 or 3 days; and then we shall decamp, and march towards *Bretzen*.

Frankfurt, June 25. Great quantities of Provisions and Ammunition are daily brought hither for the Imperial Army, which, we believe our next Letters will tell us, is marched from *Sintzheim* towards *Bretzen*. The Lieutenant-General the Count de *Strum* passed through this place on the 23d Instant, going Post from the Elector of *Brandt* to the Court of *Saxony*, to hasten the march of the Saxon Forces towards the *Rhine*. The French Army continues between *Spire* and *Landau*. We are told from *Strasbourg*, that General *Souches* was posted with 10 Imperial Regiments on this side *Basle*, and that the Marquis d'*Oxelles*, who lies with a Body of French Troops near *Hannungen*, not thinking himself strong enough to make head against them, had sent to the Marschal de *Lorge* for a Reinforcement. They write by the way of *Saxony*, that 12000 Men of the Forces of the *Milaneze*, commanded by the Maistie de Camp General the Count de *Lowigny*, were entred into *Savoy* for the assistance of that Duke.

Cologne, June 27. The Confederate Forces that were encamped at *Schiederdal* are marched to *Bunz*. This City furnishes 12 half Cannon, 50 Gunners, &c. for the Service of this Army. The Forces of *Altonster* are expected this Evening at *Meckenham*. A Detachment of *Brandenburgers*, that was sent out to raise Contributions, met and defeated 2 or 3 days ago a French Party, of whom they killed 50, and took above 100 Prisoners. Here is a Report this day, that the French have begun to quit the City of *Trier*.

Hamburg, June 27. The Letters from *Berlin* tell us, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* would part from thence this day towards his Army, which is drawing together between the *Rhine* and the *Meuse*.

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Brusse's, June 23. Prince Waldeck is Encamped on the River Pirene, not far from the Samire; and 120 Pieces of great Cannon are coming up the *Muse* to *Nismes*, for the use of his Army. Our Governor-General continues with the Spanish Forces between *Alst* and *Dendermond*. The Duke of *Luxemburg* having, in his Retreat from *Duise*, been joyned at *Leffe* by some French Troops that were posted at *Messines*, continued his march by *Perrigny* towards *Quarain*, and Encamped the 23d near *Mau-buys*; where, we are told, he has not with him above 20000 Men. The Marechal d'*Hamillon* is with 10 or 12000 about *Courtray*. The Forces of *Munster* and *Paderborne*, 9000 strong, have passed the *Rhine*, and march to their Rendezvous in the *Eyfel*.

Hague, June 30. We continue to receive very good News from *Savoy*; the last Advices from thence telling us, that Monsieur *Catinat* was forced to retire under the Cannon of *Pinerol*; that he had a great distast of the *Swissers* that serve under him; and that the *Vauban* (who are daily reinforced by considerable numbers of French Protestants) were very troublesome to the French Troops, and had cut off a Detachment that was marching to joyn Monsieur *Catinat*. Prince *W. Lock* is Encamp'd at *Pieton*, and the Duke of *Luxemburg* near *Mauberge*. The Elector of *Brandenburg* is gone from *Berlin* to put himself at the Head of his Army.

Edinburgh, June 19. Major-General *Mackay* parted from hence last night, intending to be this day at *Perth*, where is appointed the Rendezvous of the Forces that hold their Quarters in these Parts.

B. Feb. 20. 1690. His Majesty went from hence this day to *Edinburgh*, and will be on Saturday at *Longbricken-ham*, and on Sunday at *Norwich*. The Forces march in two Batches; and on Tuesday next the whole Army will Encamp in the Plain near *Dunblane*. We hear, that the Enemy have taken 11000 Men together about *Arde*, and that they are there intending themselves.

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P. mouth, June 21. On Friday last, in the Evening, the French Fleet were seen off this Harbour, and the next Morning they stood to the Eastward, being about 110000 of all Sorts.

Portsmouth, June 24. Yesterday morning the Earl of *Terrington* sailed with the Fleet under his Command from *St. Helen's*, the Wind at N. E. and stood towards the French Fleet (which was seen the Evening before off *Portsmouth-Gate* in the Lie of *Wight*) with a resolution to fight them; but the Wind taking them short, he came to an Anchor not far from *Dunabel*, within 5 Leagues of the French, who at Eight that morning were at Anchor in *Canterbury Bay*. We expect every minute to hear of an Engagement, which our Fleet is extremely well provided for, the Ships being all in excellent Order, and the Men full of Courage, and very desirous of Action. This Afternoon Their Majesties Ship the *Lyon*, and several Dutch Men of War, joynd our Fleet.
