

sovereign, not having with him above 2500 Men; But the French having march'd all night, and being ad-
vanc'd beyond the Dutch fort Wijck, gave no time
to put his men in exectuon. The Dutch began about 10
o'Clock in the morning; The Horse in our left Wing
gave way upon the first Charge, but the Foot fought for 6
hours together with the greatest Bravery imaginable,
several Battalions being 3 Ranks deep in 3 rows at once,
for the French took them in the flank and rear, after the
Horse had left them. The Spanish Horse in the right
Wing behaved the same, durst by having routed two
Lines of the Horse in the left Wing, and taken 1200
Prisoners, when they were a long time Masters of; and
had lost the Horse in the left Wing given way as they
did, durst not do it, because the day had been lost.
However, our foot rem'd in good order, with the Horse
of the left Wing that had rallied to Noyen, being now
the second in their Command, because those that attended the
carriages were very away with the Horses; But all the
Baggage was saved, and, by ten o'clock to night of Prince
Wulff's, the great Captain of Battery, which was coming
to the Army, was accommodated, and is in Namur.
The Particulars of our Losses of Officers and Soldiers are not
yet known; but in general it is said, we have lost about
3000 Men: We are inform'd, the French have lost above
double that number, our Foot, and the Horse of the right
Wing, having fought most desperately, and made a
great stand among them. Prince Wulff did all that
a great and brave General could do, and until in 10 or 12
days be reinforced with the Irish Troops that are march-
ing to join him, and have a greater Army than he had
before this fight.

Brussels, June 2. On the first Instant was fought a
very bloody Battel between the French and the Dutch
Armies near Herk; the first was 4000 strong, and the
latter but 2500; and notwithstanding this inequality in
their number, and that the Horse of the Dutch left Wing
gave way immediately, Prince Wulff maintained his
Ground with his Foot, and the Horse of his right Wing,
for 6 hours, with such a slaughter of the Enemy, that
1200 of them are said to be slain in the place, among
which are divers Officers of Quality. Our Losses reck-
on'd about 2000 Men; what Officers are of this number,
we do not know further than that the Count de Serrion
and others are said to be killed & mortified with the Foot,
especially to Noyen, and the Spanish Horse, who behaved
themselves very bravely, and suffered much, retreated to
Ghent. Prince Wulff did come hither this day, and se-
veral Regiments are already marching to reinforce him.
The five French Regiments (who were not in this Action)
are arriv'd here, and the forces of Huy, who are 8 or
9000 strong, have pass'd the Scheldt, and are marching
thowards us; and verily these our Governor-General has a
considerable body of Forces together near Dantzig.

London, June 22. His Majesty left Hesse-Cassel
yesterday evening, and came hither about Noon; and on
Tuesday evening last His Majesty will go from hence
to the place of General Rendezvous. We hear by several
Persons, that the late King James is now Dantzic, with
the Duke of Burgundy, the Earl of Tyrone, and the two
French Lieutenant-Generals, and about 2000 Men.

Paris, June 26. Yesterday, about Noon, our
Fleet was seen off of Domme in the Isle of Wight, about
2 Leagues from the shore, standing to the Westward,
the Wind at South and by East: The French Fleet
follow'd at the same time, the Eastward, being at the like
distance to the Starboard, and about a mile off the two
Navy ships being within 4 Miles of each other, so that
it is said there would have been an Engagement;
but the French Admiral fired a Gun, and went about ship,
and the rest of their Fleet, and stood to the Westward,
and so follow'd them till towards Night. They are now
passing up and down on the back of the Isle of Wight.

Plymouth, June 27. We understand this day
from one of the Victualling Vessels that came from the
Fleet yesterday, that the French Fleet lay at An-
chors on the South side of the Isle of Wight, and our
ship about 2 or 3 Leagues to the Eastward of them, there
being little or no Wind. Admiral Esquemyn, in a Ship of
100 Guns, and a Rear-Admiral, with one Dutch Man of
War more, together with the Lion and Centaur War-
ships, joined my Lord Dartmouth on Tuesday last, in
the Evening; and divers other Ships are hourly expected
to join him.

Coventry, June 28. Yesterday passed by this place to
the Westward Their Majesties Ships the Mardon and Gar-
fet, and this day a Dutch Man of War, called, The
Maid of Enkhuizen, or 72 GUNS, going to joyn our
Fleet.

Appleoremb in the Isle of Wight, June 22, at Eleven
at Night. All day yesterday was cloudy and rainy, ther
we could not see the Seconin the Hills, nor could we hear
any thing of the Fleet. The Persons who have bin
all this morning on the D. river, can see or hear nothing
of them. There is a fresh gale of Wind at Sea, and
French Water, which may give them an opportunity of
Engaging.
