

(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 29th day of June, 1887.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—the parishes of Mains and Strathmartine, Tealing, Craig and Inverarity, and the detached portion of the parish of Dunnichen called Dumbarrow, in the county of Forfar,—which was declared by Order of Council to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

(SWINE-FEVER.)

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—the whole village of Cowdenbeath, in the parish of Beath, in the county of Fife,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twentieth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the second day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

The following Area (namely),—round Marstow Court Farm, situate in the parish of Marstow, in the county of Hereford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from the Crown Inn at Whitechurch to the Kerue Bridge in the parish of Walford, thence the river to Glewstone-road

in the parish of Marstow, thence the highway through the village of Glewstone by a farm called The Thorn to Stone Bridge near Trebandy in the parish of Llangarren, and thence the road by Ruxton and Trewen to the Crown Inn at Whitechurch aforesaid,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twelfth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, to be an Area infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with swine-fever.
