(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 5th day of August, 1887.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—around the farm called Whitehall Farm, situate in the parish of Egham, in the county of Surrey, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the west the road leading from Callow Hill to Upper Bakeham House, on the north the road and footpath from Upper Bakeham House to Luddington House, on the east the road from Luddington House to Stroude Farm, and on the south the footpath and road leading from Stroude Farm to Callow Hill; the said roads and footpaths forming the boundaries of the said Area being included in the Area,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the seventeenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the sixth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.
