ART. 5. The importation into the Kingdom of rags or worn clothes, coming from the Island of Malta, is absolutely prohibited until further orders.

The Prefects of seaboard provinces, captains of ports, and harbour masters are charged with the execution of the present Decree.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch, dated 11th instant, from Her Majesty's Representative at Vienna, enclosing the following copy of a Government Circular published by the authorities at the port of Trieste, imposing quarantine on arrivals from Malta:—

In consequence of cholera having manifested itself at Malta, vessels arriving from that island which have sailed after the 2nd instant will be subjected, in Austrian ports, to a quarantine observation of seven days, provided they have had a clean passage and arrive in normal health.

The sanitary treatment of vessels arriving with cases of sickness on board will be decided, from time to time, by the Maritime Board, to whom a report of the case, telegraphic if necessary, is to made.

Vessels having a doctor on board will be allowed to reckon the time of their voyage as a part of the quarantine observation.

Ships subjected to the above measures will be disinfected according to the prescriptions for vessels arriving from cholera infected ports.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch, dated 5th instant, from Her Majesty's Representative at Sofia, transmitting the following copy of the Regulations drawn up by the Medical Council, respecting quarantine measures in Bulgaria:—

(1.) The entrance into Bulgarian ports of all ships, travellers, and merchandize coming from Sicily and from the coasts of Italy, is prohibited, unless they have submitted to a quarantine of ten days in some Ottoman Port.

(2.) Travellers who disembark from vessels which have undergone such quarantine in Ottoman ports, are subjected in Bulgarian ports to a medical inspection.

(3.) Ships which are bound direct for Russia are free to pass without undergoing quarantine, but they are prohibited from communicating with our ports.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch, dated 11th instant, from Her Majesty's Representative at Copenhagen, enclosing the following quarantine Notice, issued by the Minister of Justice, on the 4th instant:—

Under date of the 4th instant, the Minister of Justice issued the following Quarantine Notice:

1. All arrivals from Malta, and all vessels which on their voyage have communicated with ships coming from that Island, are subject to quarantine.

2. The usual prohibition as to the importation of articles, except they form part of passengers' luggage, is to apply to objects coming from Malta.

The quarantine against all other places mentioned in the previous notice, reported in my Despatch No. 39, Commercial, of the 23rd ultimo remains in force.
