A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

**W**HEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Friday, the thirteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby issue Our Royal Proclamation, and publish and declare that the said Parliament be further prorogued to Thursday, the ninth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, and We do hereby further, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal will and pleasure that the said Parliament shall, on the said Thursday, the ninth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, assemble and be holden for the despatch of divers urgent and important affairs: and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said Thursday, the ninth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

Given at Our Court at *Osborne House, Isle of Wight*, this twenty-ninth day of *December*, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and in the fifty-first year of Our reign.

**I**T is this day ordered by Her Majesty in Council, that the Convocations of the Provinces of Canterbury and York be prorogued from the day to which the same now stand prorogued, to Friday, the tenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight; and the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain is to cause Writs to be prepared and issued in the usual manner for proroguing the Convocations accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by an Order in Council dated the twenty-sixth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four and made in pursuance and by virtue of the twenty-third section of the Supreme Court of Judicature Act, 1875, and the other powers and authorities therein mentioned, it was (amongst other things) ordered that the Winter and Summer Assizes, as defined in the said Order, should be holden as therein provided.

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Order in the manner hereinafter appearing.

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council under and by virtue of the authority aforesaid and of all other powers and authorities enabling Her in that behalf is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly as follows:—

1. The Commission days for the several places on the respective Circuits for the Winter Assizes to be hereafter holden shall so far as may be practicable, and the business to be done may allow, be fixed to end as near as may be on the twentieth of March, except in years when to end on that day would interfere with the Easter Vacation, when they shall be fixed to end as near as may be on the Wednesday before Easter.

2. The town of Croydon shall from and after the date of this Order cease to be a place where Assizes are holden in and for the county of Surrey.

3. From and after the date of this Order there shall be repealed so much of the said Order of the twenty-sixth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four as is inconsistent with any provision contained in this Order.

4. Except where the context otherwise requires, expressions used in this Order shall have the same meaning as in the said Order of the twenty-sixth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

5. This Order may be amended or added to or repealed by Order in Council. C. L. Peel.

THE following Statutes, passed on the 18th day of June, 1887, by the Governing Body of Trinity College or Hall, in the University of Cambridge, and sealed on the 26th day of November, 1887, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

STATUTES to add to, alter, and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict., c. 48), in relation to the College or Hall of the Holy Trinity, in the University of Cambridge, duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 18th day of June, 1887, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of the whole number of persons present and voting, and submitted, for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

We, the Master, Fellows, and Scholars of the said College or Hall do hereby, in exercise of the powers given us by the 54th section of the said Act, alter and amend the Statutes framed by the said Commissioners in relation to our said College or Hall as aforesaid, in the following manner:—

By adding to Statute VIII. of the said Statutes the following words or paragraph.

For the purposes of this Statute, residence shall mean residence within such boundaries as shall be from time to time defined by grace of the Senate under Chapter 1 of the Statutes for the University of Cambridge, approved by Her Majesty in Council, on the 27th day of February, 1882.

By substituting for § 1 of Statute IX the following section to form an amended § 1 of the said Statute.

§ 1. The tenure of the Mastership shall be for life.

If a Fellow be elected or appointed to the Mastership of this, or any other College in the Universities of Cambridge or Oxford, or to a Fellowship in any such College as aforesaid, and accept such Mastership, Headship, or Fellowship, then (unless such Fellowship be Honorary) his Fellowship in this College shall become vacant from the date of such acceptance.

By altering the title of Statute X, from "Educational Staff" to "Educational Staff and Lecturers."

By substituting for § 1 of Statute X the following section, to form an amended § 1 of the said Statute.

Statute X.

*Title.* Amend to "Educational Staff and Lecturers."

§ 1. The Educational Staff of the College shall consist of not more than two Tutors, not more than two Assistant Tutors, a Law Lecturer, and such other Lecturers as are Fellows of the College.

By substituting for § 3 of Statute X the following section, to form an amended § 3 of the said Statute.

§ 3. The Tutors and Assistant Tutors shall be appointed by the Master. Any such appointment shall take effect for a period of three years, but on the expiration of such period the Master shall have power to re-appoint the person so appointed. Provided always that upon request, made in writing and signed by at least four of the Fellows within one month from the said appointment, if made in term, or within one month from the commencement of the following term if made out of

term, the Master shall submit any such appointment or re-appointment to the Governing Body for confirmation at its next Ordinary Meeting or at a Special Meeting convened for the purpose. And thereupon the subsequent proceedings shall be as follows. If any appointment or re-appointment be not confirmed at such meeting by a majority of the Governing Body, the office shall become void from the date of the meeting, and the Master shall again make an appointment to the vacant office, subject to the confirmation of such second appointment by the Governing Body at the same meeting. If the Governing Body refuse to confirm such second appointment, they may themselves proceed to make an appointment, provided that a majority of the Governing Body concur therein; but if at such meeting no such appointment or reappointment be finally confirmed or made, the Master shall appoint or reappoint such person as he shall think fit to fill the vacant office.

Any appointment made by the Governing Body, shall take effect for a period of three years, and shall be subject to the like powers and provisions with respect to reappointment and otherwise, as are hereinbefore contained with reference to an appointment originally made by the Master.

By substituting for § 4 of Statute X the following section to form an amended § 4 of the said Statute.

§ 4. The Law Lecturer, and any such other Lecturers as the Governing Body may from time to time decide on employing, shall be appointed by the Governing Body, and shall hold office for such periods as the Governing Body may determine, provided that in cases of emergency the Master shall have power to make such temporary arrangements in respect of any Lectureship as may be necessary till the next ordinary College meeting shall be held.

THE following Statute, passed on the 3rd day of December, 1887, by the Governing Body of University College, Oxford, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

Ex parte the Master and Fellows of the College of the Great Hall of the University commonly called University College in Oxford.

A STATUTE made to amend a Statute framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 (40 and 41 Vict. c. 48) in relation to the College of the Great Hall of the University commonly called University College in Oxford, duly made at an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 3rd day of December, 1887, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of the whole number of persons present and voting, and submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Statutes of University College in the University of Oxford do enact

1°. In Statute II 4, which regulates the emoluments of the Mastership, as follows:—

“ II 4. There shall be attached to the Mastership a fixed annual stipend of £670, clear of income tax, payable out of the Corporate revenues of the College, in addition to the sum of £530, which shall be charged on the fund arising from Dr. Radcliffe's benefaction, called the 'Linton Fund.' ”

2°. And in Statute III 22, which regulates the emolument of Fellows, as follows:—

“ III 22. There shall be attached to each Fellowship a fixed emolument of £200 per annum free of income tax. In addition to this emolument, every Prælector or Tutor holding his Fellowship under the provisions of clause 12 (a) of this Statute shall be entitled to receive out of the Corporate Revenue the annual sum of £100, together with such payment as may be assigned to him out of the Tuition Fund hereinafter mentioned: Provided that the number of persons receiving such annual sum shall never exceed six.”

3°. And in Statute VII 3, which regulates the application of any surplus revenue of the College, as follows:—

“ VII 3. If at any time it shall appear to the Lord Chancellor that the revenues of the College have become more than sufficient to provide for its expenditure, the Lord Chancellor may, if he think fit, make an order directing that any part of the surplus revenue shall be set apart and applied to purposes relative either to the College or to the University, according to a scheme submitted or to be submitted to him by the College and approved by him. After an order so made by the Lord Chancellor, any sums thereby directed to be set apart shall be applied in conformity with a scheme submitted to and approved by the Lord Chancellor as aforesaid, and under an order of the Lord Chancellor confirming the same, and not otherwise.”

4°. And in Statute VIII 5, which empowers the Visitor to suspend or reduce certain of the charges upon the College Revenues, in case these become insufficient, as follows:—

“ VIII 5. If in any case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Visitor that owing to any cause the revenues of the College are insufficient to provide for the charges created by these Statutes, and to defray the rest of its expenditure, it shall be lawful for the Lord Chancellor, on a petition presented to him by order of the Master and Fellows at an Extraordinary General Meeting, to direct that any vacant Fellowship or Scholarship shall, either permanently or during any limited period, be kept vacant, or (subject to vested interests) that the payments directed to be made out of the Tuition Fund be reduced, or that the charges created by these Statutes shall be rateably diminished, either permanently or for a limited period.”

5°. And in Statute X 4, which regulates the commutation of the emoluments of Fellows existing at the time of the enactment of the said clause, and gives to such Fellows a certain priority of claim upon the College Revenues, as follows:—

“ X 4. The Master and Fellows may (if they think fit) by Resolution at any stated General Meeting commute with the consent of any existing Fellow the total emoluments of the Fellowship held by him (inclusive of all allowances) for a fixed yearly sum of £300. Such fixed sum shall in the appropriation of the revenues of the College have priority over all

“ new charges created by these Statutes: Provided that, if in any year the revenues of the College be not sufficient to pay as well the emoluments of existing Fellows who shall not have accepted a commutation and the sum of £300, to each Fellow who shall have accepted it as the sum of £200, to every Fellow holding under the provisions of these Statutes, then the said sums of £300 and £200 respectively shall be subject to abatement *pro rata*: Provided further that the commutation shall not be liable to abatement on account of any contribution with which the College may be charged for University purposes.”

And whereas We, the Master and Fellows of the said College, have found the College Revenues insufficient in the year last past to provide for the charges created or authorized by the College Statutes and to defray the rest of its expenditure, and whereas the reports prepared by our Bursar and Agents of the College Estates lead us to believe that the said Revenues will prove to be increasingly insufficient in the current year, and will so continue for several years to be insufficient to provide for all of the said charges and to defray the rest of the said expenditure, and whereas moreover we, the said Master and Fellows, entertaining doubts as to the order of priority of the several charges created or authorized under our said Statutes, and as to other provisions contained therein, and being ourselves the persons as to whose priority of claim under the now existing Statutes upon the Revenues of the College the aforesaid doubts have been raised, are unanimously desirous, and have so declared our resolution, to be severally bound by the Statutes after they shall have been amended by the Statute, hereinafter set forth, made by us the said Master and Fellows, to the same extent as if the said amending Statute had been part of the Statutes, which were framed in relation to the College by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 (40 and 41 Vict. c. 48), and were approved by Her Majesty in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882.

Now, therefore, We, the Master and Fellows of the said College, who are the Governing Body thereof, being desirous of reducing and of more effectually regulating the charges upon the Revenues of the College, and also of removing doubts as to the meaning and effect of the Statutes in certain cases have made an amending Statute as follows:—

We, the Master and Fellows of the said College, do hereby in exercise of the powers given us by the 54th section of the said Act and by Statute XI of the Statutes of the said College.

In the first place, alter and amend Statute II 4, by substituting for the words “a fixed annual stipend of £670” the words “a fixed annual stipend of £500”;

And in the second place, do alter and amend Statute III 22, by inserting after the words “the annual sum of £100” the words “free of Income Tax”;

And in the third place, do alter and amend Statute VII 3, by inserting at the beginning thereof the words “If in any year the Revenues of the College shall be insufficient to provide for all of the fixed charges created or authorized by these Statutes and to defray the rest of its expenditure, then such of the said fixed charges, as are sums payable to the Master and Fellows, or to a Prælector or Tutor as provided by Statute III 22, or to the Pension Fund of the College as provided in the Schedule of the

"Pension Scheme I, 1 B (a), shall be rateably diminished for that year";

And in the fourth place, do alter and amend Statute VIII 5, by substituting for the word "created" wherever it occurs the words "created or authorized," and by substituting for the words "petition presented to him by order of the Master and Fellows at an Extraordinary General Meeting to direct that any vacant Fellowship or Scholarship shall, either permanently or during any limited period, be kept vacant," the words "petition passed at an Extraordinary General Meeting specially summoned for the purpose, by a majority consisting of not less than two-thirds of those present and voting, and presented to him by order of the Master and Fellows, to direct that any vacant Fellowship or Scholarship shall be kept vacant, either permanently or during any limited period or that the payment be suspended during any limited period of the sum of £200 charged annually on the general Revenues of the College in accordance with the provisions contained in the Schedule of the College Pension Scheme I, 1 B (a).";

And in the fifth place, do alter and amend Statute X 4, by omitting the whole of the clause after the words "for a fixed yearly sum of £300" and by inserting immediately after these words the words "free of Income Tax, which sum shall be deemed to be a fixed charge on the Revenues of the College created or authorized by these Statutes."

Christ Church Statute XXVIII altered by the Governing Body on 7th December 1887 by adding after the words "(if members of the Governing Body)," the following words "and any other Students doing work for the House."

STATUTE XXVIII.

No clause or provision herein contained shall extend to or include the estate held under the Will of Bishop Wood for the benefit of the Senior Masters of the House, being Students, or any payments or allowances which may be made thereout pursuant to the said Will, but so that only Official Students, including Dr. Lee's Readers, and the Treasurer and the Steward (if Members of the Governing Body) and any other Students doing work for the House shall be deemed Students of the House within the meaning of the said will.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

##### *Definitions.*

1. In this Warrant

(1.) The expression "Parcel," means a postal packet, which is posted as a parcel in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same.

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom," includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

##### *Places between which Parcels may be transmitted.*

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation, parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and Spain by way of France.

##### *Rates of Postage.*

3. On all parcels not exceeding six pounds and the half of another pound in weight, transmitted by post under this Warrant, from the United Kingdom to Spain, there shall be charged and paid a postage of two shillings and one penny.

##### *Maximum Dimensions and Weights.*

4. Except by permission of the Postmaster-General, no parcel, the dimensions of which shall exceed in length two feet, or in length and girth combined four feet, shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

5. No Parcel which shall exceed six pounds and the half of another pound in weight shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

##### *Prepayment.*

6. The postage chargeable, according to the rate hereinbefore-mentioned, shall, in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant), be prepaid at the time of posting; and such prepayment shall, in the United Kingdom, be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps, or at such post offices, within such hours, and under and subject to such regulations as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time prescribe, in money.

##### *Times of Posting.*

7. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post, may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

##### *Mode of Posting.*

8. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant all Parcels shall, in the United Kingdom, be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

##### *Posting at Post Offices.*

9. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:—

(1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must bear the name and address of the sender and the exact direction of the addressee, and must be packed in a manner adequate for the length of the journey, and for the protection of the contents. The Parcel must also be so packed as to prevent any tampering with its contents without leaving an obvious trace of its violation, and must be sealed by means of sealing-wax, lead, or otherwise with some impress or mark of the sender. Such Parcel must also be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

(3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned), the postage thereof, according to the rate hereinbefore mentioned shall be prepaid as hereinbefore mentioned, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without the beforementioned requirements being complied with; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without such requirements being complied with, such Parcel shall be detained, and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof, or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

*Collection of Parcels.*

10. The Postmaster-General, may, if he thinks fit, from time to time authorize such of his officers as he may direct, to receive Parcels for the post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

*Irregular Posting of Parcels.*

11. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom, which from any words or marks thereon or other external evidence appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter-box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or if the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet, as the case may be.

*Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.*

12. With regard to—

- (a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and
- (b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or for any other sufficient reason;

The following provisions shall apply, that is to say:—

- (1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined.
- (2.) Notice shall be given to the sender through the Post Office of the country in which the Parcel was posted, that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender's agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be returned to him by Post upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned.
- (3.) The notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel, during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.
- (4.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.
- (5.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to

the corrected address, subject to the following conditions:—

- (a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not at the time of such correction lying at a Returned Letter Office no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.
- (b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, the sender shall pay a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.
- (6.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."
- (7.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable.
- (8.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.
- (9.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails, to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct or authorize.
- (10.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General, it becomes offensive or injurious to any officer of the Post Office or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel have not been or have only partially been complied with.

*Charge for Re-direction.*

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or Spain is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed; and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

14. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such

Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

*Remission of Re-direction Rates.*

15. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

*Prohibitions.*

16. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel—

- (1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not; or
- (2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.
- (3.) Containing or bearing any letter or communication in the nature of a letter.
- (4.) Containing any article or thing not authorized by the Customs or other laws of Spain.
- (5.) Consisting of or containing—
  - (a.) Any explosive substance.
  - (b.) Any dangerous substance.
  - (c.) Any filth.
  - (d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.
  - (e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.
  - (f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature.
  - (g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

17. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses, and any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by Post, may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

*Non-compliance with Regulations.*

18. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

*Provision for Safety of Parcels.*

19. In any case where any officer of the Post

Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

*Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.*

20. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

*Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage.*

21. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect of or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

*Customs Regulations.*

22. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

*Remission of Postage.*

23. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

*Commencement of Warrant.*

24. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation, Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the British Post Offices at Constantinople and Smyrna, by way of France.

*Rates of Postage.*

3. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant, there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage, that is to say:—

On every Parcel not exceeding three pounds in weight two shillings and four pence.

On every Parcel exceeding three pounds and not exceeding seven pounds in weight two shillings and eleven pence.

*Maximum Dimensions.*

4. Except by permission of the Postmaster-General no Parcel, the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches, or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel), shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

*Maximum Weight.*

Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post which, from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter Box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or if the said Packet is fully prepaid with the letter or Book Packet rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).

*Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.*

12. With regard to—

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office to be called for, or to a place beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, or at Constantinople or Smyrna, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and

(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or for any other sufficient reason:

The following provisions shall apply, that is to say:—

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined

- (2.) Notice shall be given to the sender that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender's agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or, at the request of the sender, will be returned to him by post upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned.
- (3.) The notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.
- (4.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.
- (5.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions:—
- (a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not, at the time of such correction, lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.
- (b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, the sender shall pay a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.
- (6.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."
- (7.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable.
- (8.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.
- (9.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct or authorize.
- (10.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General, it becomes offensive or injurious to any Officer of the Post Office or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or

disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel, have not been or have only partially been complied with.

*Charge for Re-direction.*

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom or Constantinople or Smyrna, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or Constantinople or Smyrna is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom or Constantinople or Smyrna, as the case may be, to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

14. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

*Remission of Re-direction Rates.*

15. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

*Prohibitions.*

16. There shall not be posted or conveyed, or delivered by post any Parcel—

- (1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not; or
- (2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.
- (3.) Containing any article or thing not authorized by the Customs or other laws of Turkey.
- (4.) Consisting of or containing—
  - (a.) Any explosive substance.
  - (b.) Any dangerous substance.
  - (c.) Any filth.
  - (d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.
  - (e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.
  - (f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature.
  - (g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance, or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained, and either

returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

17. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses, and any such Parcel if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

*Non-compliance with Regulations.*

18. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the Regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

*Provision for Safety of Parcels.*

19. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

*Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.*

20. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

*Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage.*

21. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect of or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

*Customs Regulations.*

22. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

*Remission of Postage.*

23. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

*Commencement of Warrant.*

24. This Warrant shall come into operation on the fifteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

**TREASURY WARRANT.**

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

*Definitions.*

1. In this Warrant:—

(1.) The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet, which is posted as a Parcel, in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same.

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

*Places between which Parcels may be transmitted.*

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and Portugal, direct by sea, and between the United Kingdom and Madeira, and the Azores, by sea, via Lisbon.

*Rates of Postage.*

3. On all Parcels not exceeding seven pounds in weight transmitted by post under this Warrant, from the United Kingdom to Portugal, there shall be charged and paid a postage of two shillings and one penny.

4. On all Parcels not exceeding seven pounds in weight, transmitted by post under this Warrant from the United Kingdom to Madeira, there shall be charged and paid a postage of two shillings and sixpence.

5. On all Parcels not exceeding seven pounds in weight transmitted by post under this Warrant from the United Kingdom, to the Azores there shall be charged and paid a postage of two shillings and eleven pence.

*Maximum Dimensions and Weights.*

6. Except by permission of the Postmaster-General, no Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in any direction two feet shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

7. No Parcel which shall exceed seven pounds in weight shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

*Prepayment.*

8. The postage chargeable according to the respective rates hereinbefore mentioned shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall in the United Kingdom be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps, or at such Post Offices, within such hours and under and subject to such regulations as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time prescribe, in money.

*Times of Posting.*

9. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland, on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

*Mode of Posting.*

10. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall in the United Kingdom be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

*Posting at Post Offices.*

11. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:—

- (1.) It shall be the duty of a person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at the counter in such office.
- (2.) Such Parcel must bear the name and address of the sender, and the exact direction of the addressee, and must be packed in a manner adequate for the length of the journey, and for the protection of the contents. The Parcel must also be so packed as to prevent any tampering with its contents without leaving an obvious trace of its violation, and must be sealed by means of sealing wax, lead, or otherwise, with some impress or mark of the sender. Such Parcel must also be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.
- (3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight herebefore mentioned) the postage thereof according to the respective rates herebefore mentioned shall be prepaid as herebefore mentioned, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without the before-mentioned requirements being complied with; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without such requirements being complied with, such Parcel shall be detained, and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

*Collection of Parcels.*

12. The Postmaster-General may, if he thinks fit, from time to time authorize such of his officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

*Irregular Posting of Parcels.*

13. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom, which from any words

or marks thereon, or other external evidence appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office letter-box or otherwise than according to the manner herebefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or if the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).

*Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.*

14. With regard to

- (a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and
- (b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or for any other sufficient reason.

The following provisions shall apply, that is to say:—

- (1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined.
- (2.) 16. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland parcel.

*Remission of Re-direction Rates.*

17. *Customs Regulations.*

24. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

*Remission of Postage.*

25. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

*Commencement of Warrant.*

26. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board: Amending Regulations with respect to Remuneration of Vaccination Officer:—

Parish of Alverstoke.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Parish of Alverstoke, in the county of Southampton;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS We, the Local Government Board, by a General Order dated the thirty-first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, made rules and regulations relating to the appointment of Vaccination Officers and Assistants to Vaccination Officers by Guardians of the Poor of certain Unions and Parishes, including the said Parish of Alverstoke; and by Article 9 of that Order it was provided as follows:—

"The Guardians shall pay to any Vaccination Officer such salary or remuneration, and such only, as the Local Government Board may direct or approve, whether for ordinary duties or for occasional services; and such salary or remuneration may be in-

creased or reduced as that Board may from time to time direct or approve."

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Order as hereinafter mentioned, so far as regards the said Parish of Alverstoke:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, We hereby Order that with respect to the said Parish of Alverstoke, the above-cited Article shall be amended by the addition of the following proviso:—

Provided that the Guardians, with the approval of the Local Government Board, may pay to any Vaccination Officer or Assistant Vaccination Officer a reasonable compensation on account of extraordinary services, or other unforeseen circumstances connected with his duties or the necessities of the said Parish.
