At the conclusion of the Service The Princes and Princesses on the Dais all kissed Her Majesty's hand, and were embraced by Her Majesty afterwards.

The Procession having been re-formed, The Queen, accompanied by The Royal Family, returned to the Vestibule at the West Door, followed by the Archbishops and Clergy.

The Carriage Procession of The Queen and Her Majesty's Royal Family was then re-formed, as on proceeding to the Abbey, and Her Majesty returned to Buckingham Palace at 2.45 o'clock.

The Route of the Procession on returning was by Parliament Street, Whitehall, Cockspur Street, Pall Mall, St. James's Street, Piccadilly, and down Constitution Hill to Buckingham Palace.

The two Processions of The Queen's Guests then followed, and The Royal Family and Indian Princes afterwards retired from the Abbey.

The Lord Chancellor occupied a seat on the Floor of the South Transept, the whole of which was appropriated for Peers and Peeresses. He was received at the Door of the Abbey at Poet's Corner, and conducted to his seat by Her Majesty's Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, Admiral Hon. Sir James Drummond, K.C.B.

The Speaker of the House of Commons occupied a seat on the Floor of the North Transept, the whole of which was appropriated to the House of Commons. He was received on entering at the North Door by Sir Algernon West, K.C.B., Gentleman Usher to Her Majesty.

The Foreign Ambassadors and Chefs de Mission, and Special Representatives of Foreign Sovereigns and States, and other Distinguished Foreigners, were placed in Galleries in the South Transept, where General Sir Francis Seymour, Bart., K.C.B., Colonel Chaine, and Hon. R. Moreton, Her Majesty's Master, Assistant Master, and Marshal of the Ceremonies were in attendance.

Galleries were set apart in the North and South of the Choir respectively, for Representatives of the Colonies and of India.

Seats were also provided for the Members of both Houses of Convocation, and other Representatives of the Church, and of the Church of Scotland, for The High Legal Functionaries, The Lords Lieutenant, High Sheriffs, Mayors and Provosts, and for Representatives of the Chambers of Commerce and Agriculture of the United Kingdom and Ireland; for The Lord Mayor and Corporation of the City of London, and The Lord Provost and Bailies of Edinburgh; The Metropolitan Board of Works, The Metropolitan Asylums Board, The London School Board, and The Court of Burgesses of Westminster; for Representatives of The Army, Navy, Marines, and Reserve Forces, The Civil Service, The Universities and Public Schools, Medical and Religious Bodies, The Learned Societies, The various Non-Conformist Bodies, Trade and Commerce, Arts, Science, and Industry of all Kinds, as well as for many other Bodies and persons selected to represent the Nation.

Guards of Honour of the 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards, under the command of Captain M. Drummond, were mounted at Buckingham Palace, and of the 2nd Battalion Coldstream Guards under the command of Captain Douglas Dawson, at the West Door of Westminster Abbey.
