The Day was observed as a Collar Day.

The Queen was received everywhere by the enormous crowds assembled with the greatest enthusiasm.

The arrangements for the preservation of order throughout the day were successfully carried out by the Metropolitan Police under the command of Colonel Sir Charles Warren, G.C.M.G., the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis.

On The Queen's return from the Abbey, luncheon was served in the Supper Room at 3.45, for Her Majesty and all The Royal Guests, and luncheon for The Royal Household and Suites in Attendance on The Royal Guests was served in the Marble Hall.

Her Majesty's Body Guard of the Yeomen of the Guard were on duty in the Palace.

After luncheon The Queen proceeded to the Bow Drawing Room, from the Balcony of which, Her Majesty saw the Guards of Honour of the Royal Navy assembled in London, numbering 600 men. They marched past on the lawn of the garden, under the command of Captain Compton Domvile, of Her Majesty's ship "Excellent."

Admiral His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh, K.G., was with The Queen. The Right Hon. Lord George Hamilton, First Lord of the Admiralty, and Captain Lord Charles Beresford, C.B., R.N., were present in the Garden.

Her Majesty received then in the Blue Drawing Room a present from all Her Children and Grand-children, and presents from Their Majesties The King and Queen of the Belgians, and Their Royal Highnesses The Count and Countess of Flanders. The Queen Kapiolani of Hawaii likewise gave Her Majesty a present.
