

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Ann, Ynys-hir, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (some-time district chapelry) of Saint Andrew Llwynypia in the county of Glamorgan, and in the diocese of Llandaff which is bounded upon the south by the parish of Llantrisant, upon the east and upon the north-east by the parish or parochial chapelry of Llanwonno, upon the north by the consolidated chapelry of Tylorstown-with-Ferndale all the said abutting cures being in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of Tylorstown-with-Ferndale from the new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia aforesaid at the point known as Mynachdy Pen Rhys where the road leading from Pen-Rhys-Ap-Tewdwr to Pont Rhondda is intersected by the road which leads from Brynhyfryd over the hill called or known as Cefn Pen-Rhys to Porth and extending thence generally south-eastward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of one mile and seventy chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the stream which flows from Mynydd Troed-y-rhiw to the west of the house called or known as Troed-y-rhiw and to the east of the house called or known as Læthr-ûdu into the Rhondda River and extending thence first southward and then south-eastward along the middle of the same stream for a distance of thirty-five chains or thereabouts, thereby passing under the line of the Rhondda Branch of the Taff Vale Railway, to the boundary in the middle of the said Rhondda River, which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia from the parish of Llantrisant aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the parish or parochial chapelry of Llanwonno aforesaid which is bounded upon the west by the herein-before described portion of the new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia aforesaid upon the north-west and upon the north by the consolidated chapelry of Tylorstown-with-Ferndale aforesaid and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the north-east, and upon the south-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of Tylorstown-with-Ferndale from the parish or parochial chapelry of Llanwonno aforesaid at the point where the road which leads from Pont-y-gwaith to Llanwonno Church is joined by the roadway which leads along the western side of the hill called or known as Cefn-gwyngul and through Maendy Wood to Maendy House and extending thence south-eastward then southward and then south-westward along the middle of the last described roadway for a distance of one mile and three quarters or thereabouts thereby passing to the east of the point called or known as Carn-y-Gwiwer and also passing to the north and west of the house called or known as Pen-rhiw to the point where the same roadway is joined by the footway or track which leads past the point called or known as Gellibêr, and through the wood called or known as Graig-rhiw-gwynt to Porth and extending thence southward along the middle of

the last-described footway or track for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to the point where it is joined by the footway or track which leads towards the house called or known as Brynheulog and extending thence in a direction a little to the north of west and in a straight line for a distance of nine and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the centre of the bridge which carries the tramway which connects the Aber Rhondda Colliery with the Rhondda-fach Branch of the Taff Vale Railway over the Rhondda-fach River which boundary divides the said parish or parochial chapelry of Llanwonno from the new parish of Saint Andrew Llwynypia aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the tenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints situate at Ipswich in the parish of Saint Matthew Ipswich in the county of Suffolk and in the diocese of Norwich.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Saint Matthew Ipswich of the parish of Bramford in the said county and diocese and of the parish of Sproughton in the same county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Matthew Ipswich, of the said parish of Bramford and of the said parish of Sproughton should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for
